Reading many books, starting fashion trends, or collecting t-shirts also became another uniqueness of the class of 92.



sets the record in the class as the number one top reader of novels. Jason Voelkel and Michael Cave's interests in racing and basketball encouraged them to collect several Tshirts.



Nevertheless, students tried to get away with things they weren't supposed to do. They sometimes got away with it, but sometimes they got caught in the act!










Post Prom





The mental attitude award was achieved by the two seniors, Jeremy




Running Strong










