Senior Survey

The seniors were surveyed over the winter about their future plans. 
For the first time in six years, the students of Northeast Dubois had the option of early graduation. The option was dropped in 1988 after the State Board of Education changed graduation requirements from 36 to 39 credits. They also required a fourth year of English to be taken. Early graduation was reinstated because of high drop out rates. The following nine students took advantage of seven semester graduation: Brook Hall, Mindy Schneider, Joline Kerstiens, Kellie Harner, Steve Wilson, Adam Burke, Duane Thewes, Jeff Kluesner, and Ryan Burgan, (not pictured Roy Beckman). 





AFTER TWENTY-FIVE YEARS as principal, Mr.James Wahl receives an honorary diploma from school board president Mr. Larry Lorey.








CD'S ARE ANOTHER hot item. While some items are only popular for a few months, CD's are here to last.


Spirit Week






PROM '94 "Amazing"











Cheerleading










