
















NEVER BEFORE HAVE the students had as many opportunities to get to see what the real world has to offer since the Internet has been installed.






Uniting Our Hearts In Difference Never Before-A Snowball


While some lockers were spotless and decorated with friends others were personal wastebaskets, or tributes to some "legend."



Never Before-A Swim Team




It's Been A Long, Strange Trip


At Blue Chip competition at Forest Park all their hard work showed. At this meet the teams all did well and the Interdisciplinary team placed first.



The first competition was Blue Chip. It was held at Forest Park. The team placed first with a score of 71 words spelled correctly out of 90.




The 1997 Northeast Dubois Queen Crowning was held on Friday, January 31 against South Knox.








