

With the aid of Miss Kathy McFadin, chorus instructer, the chorus gave several fine performes,





Sexes join for spirit


The Forest Park Pep Club, with the addition of the Boys Booster Club, shook the rafters as they cheered with enthusiasm to back the Ranger teams.

FHA donates time for others







Scientists look to the future



















The J.V. team had a light schedule as far as the amount of games were concerned, but never as far as action!
















