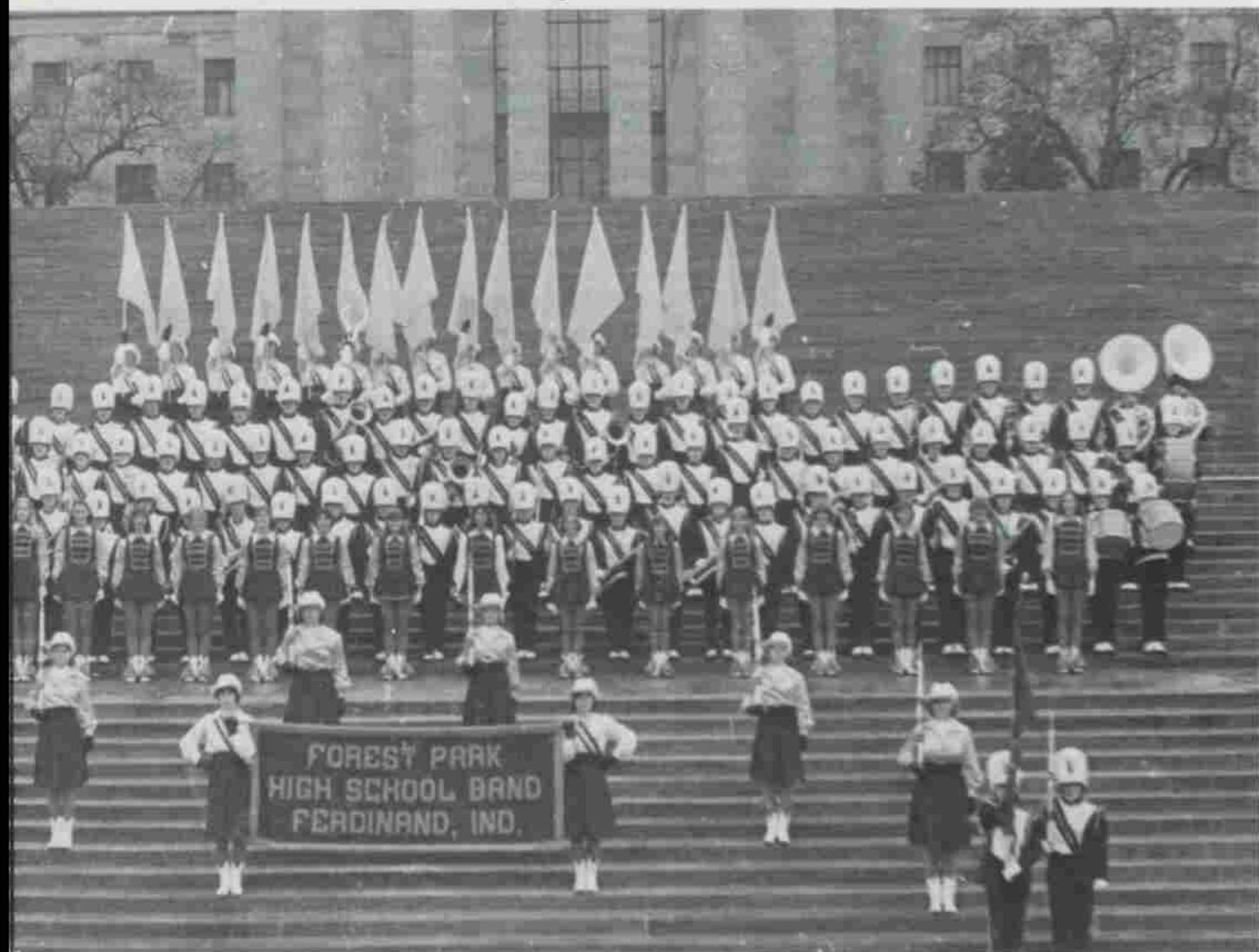

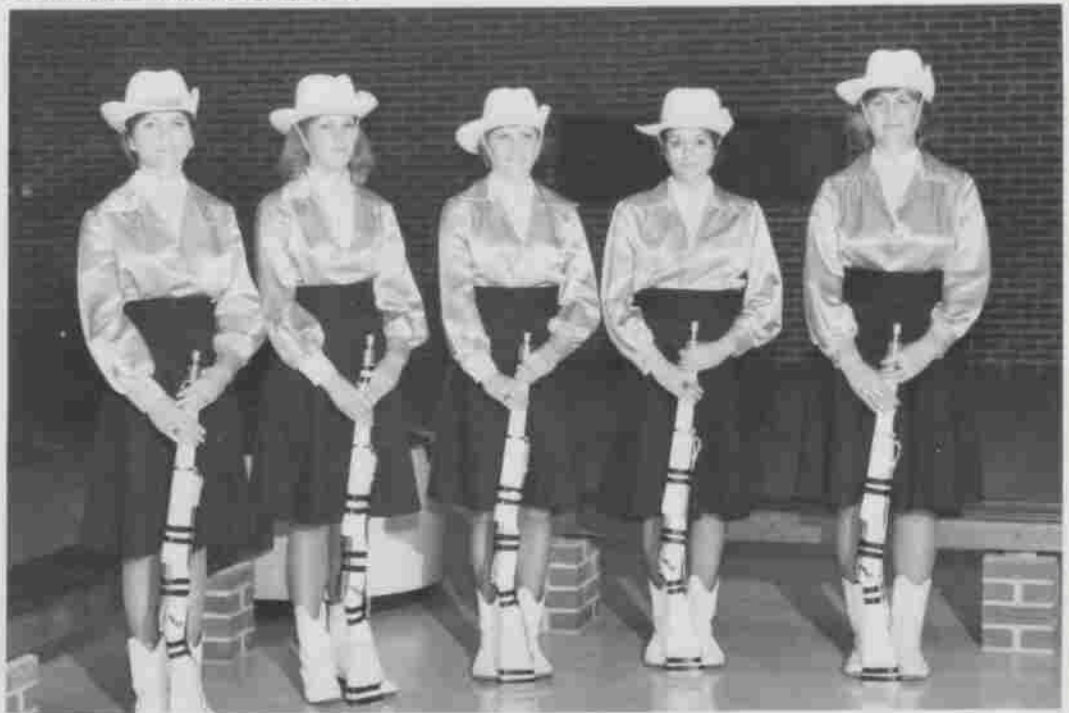

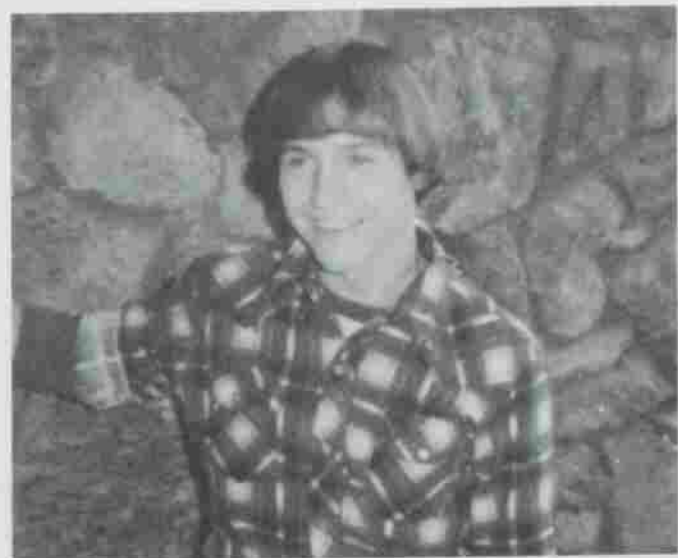
# Beta strives on

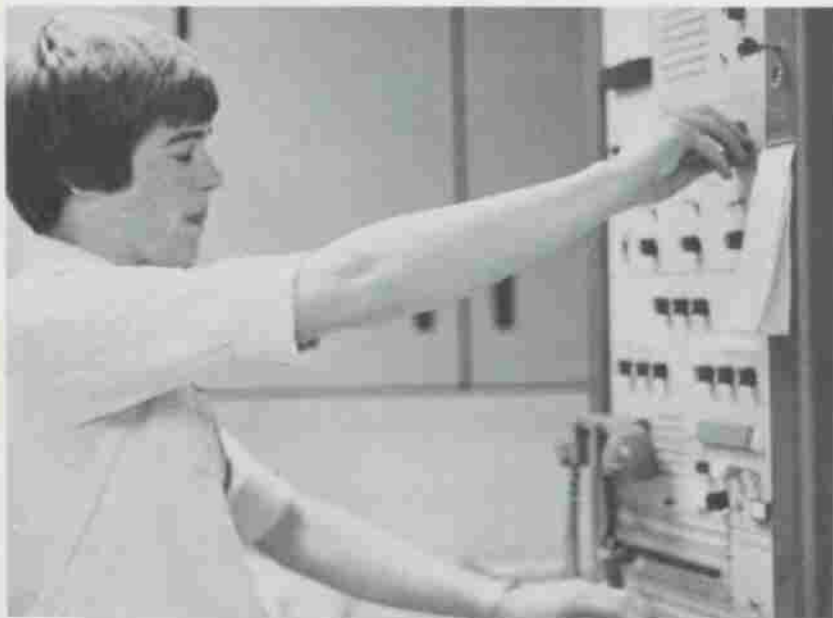

Our Future Homemakers of America chapter specializes in projects to serve others. Among these projects were the annual clothing drive, and the preparation

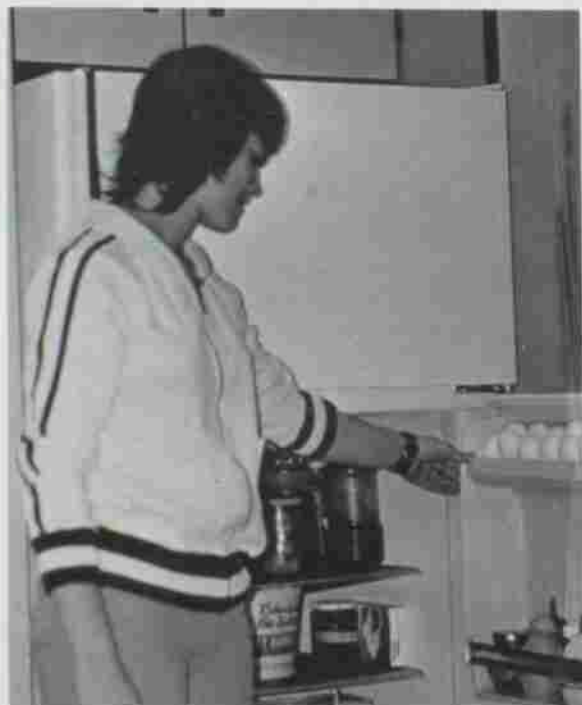
of "cheer boxes" for the elderly. The highlight of the year was the FHA's annual Mother-Daughter Banquet.

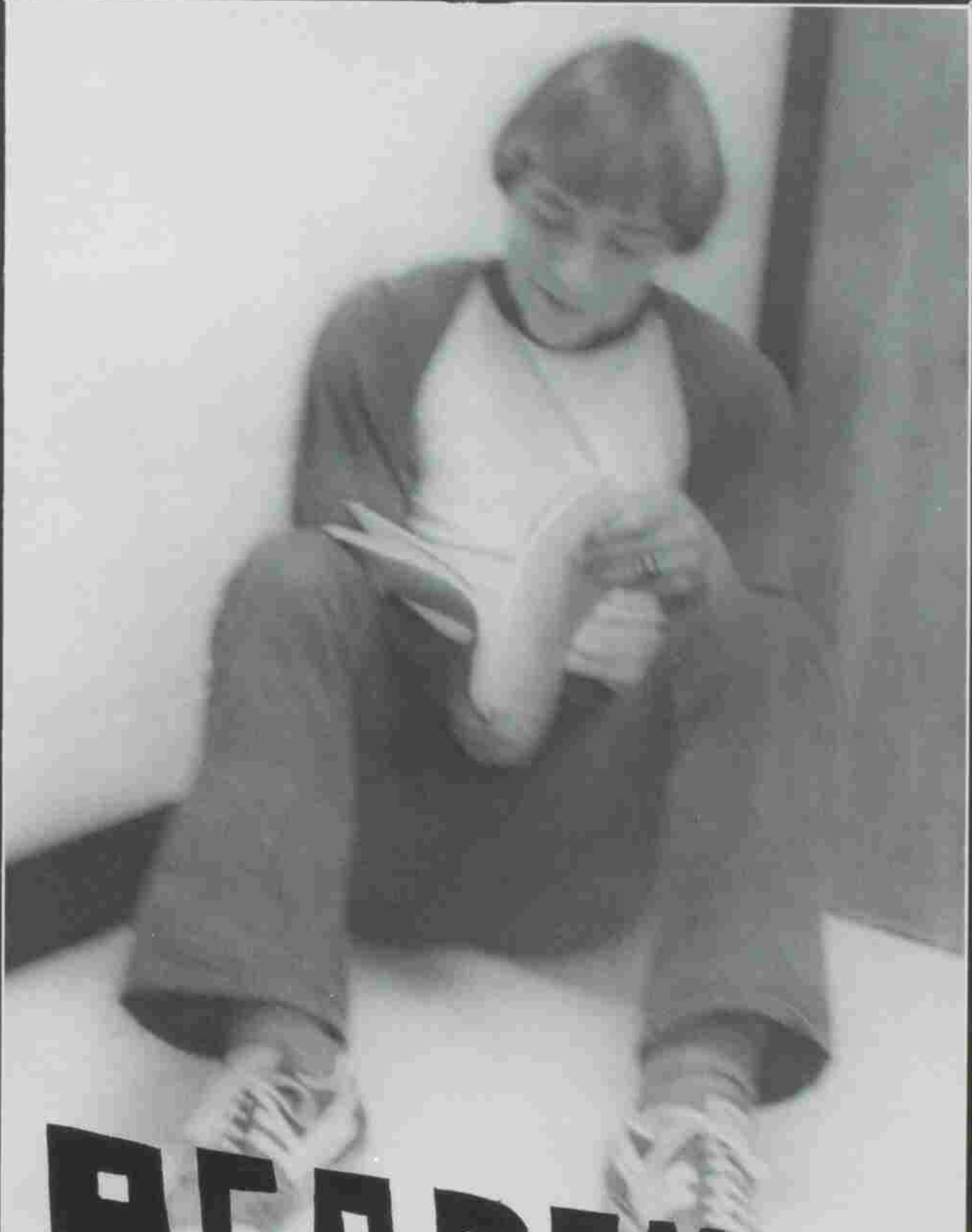

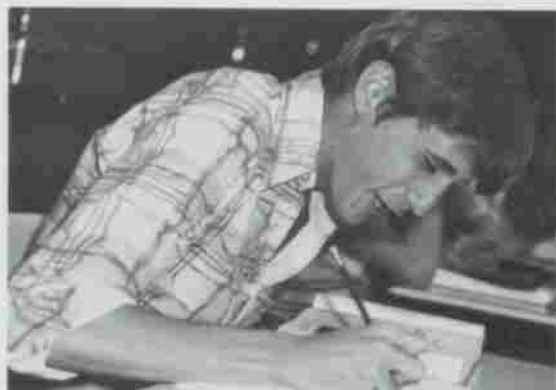

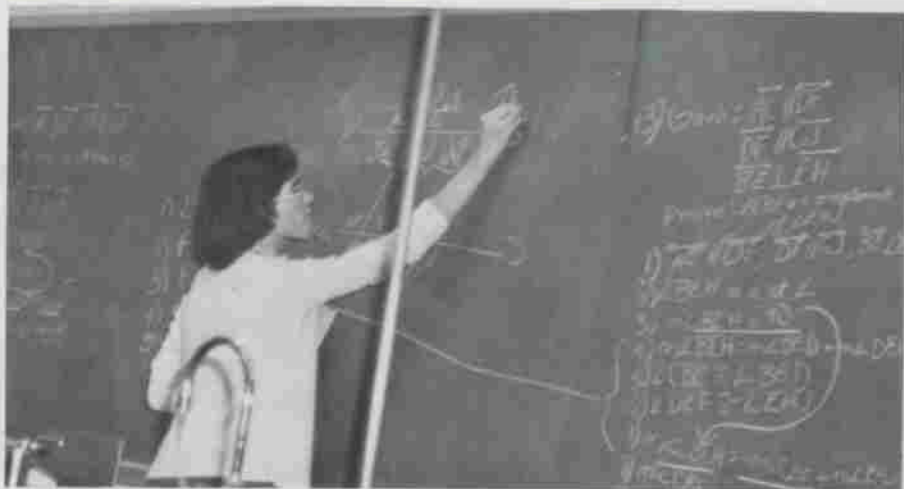

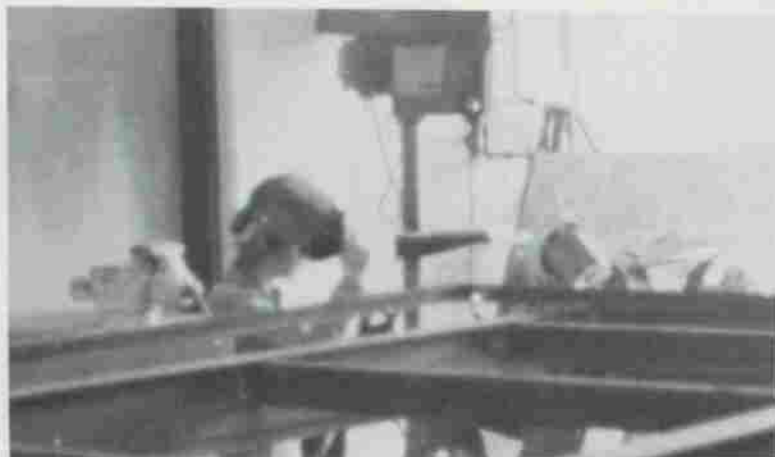
# Agriculture

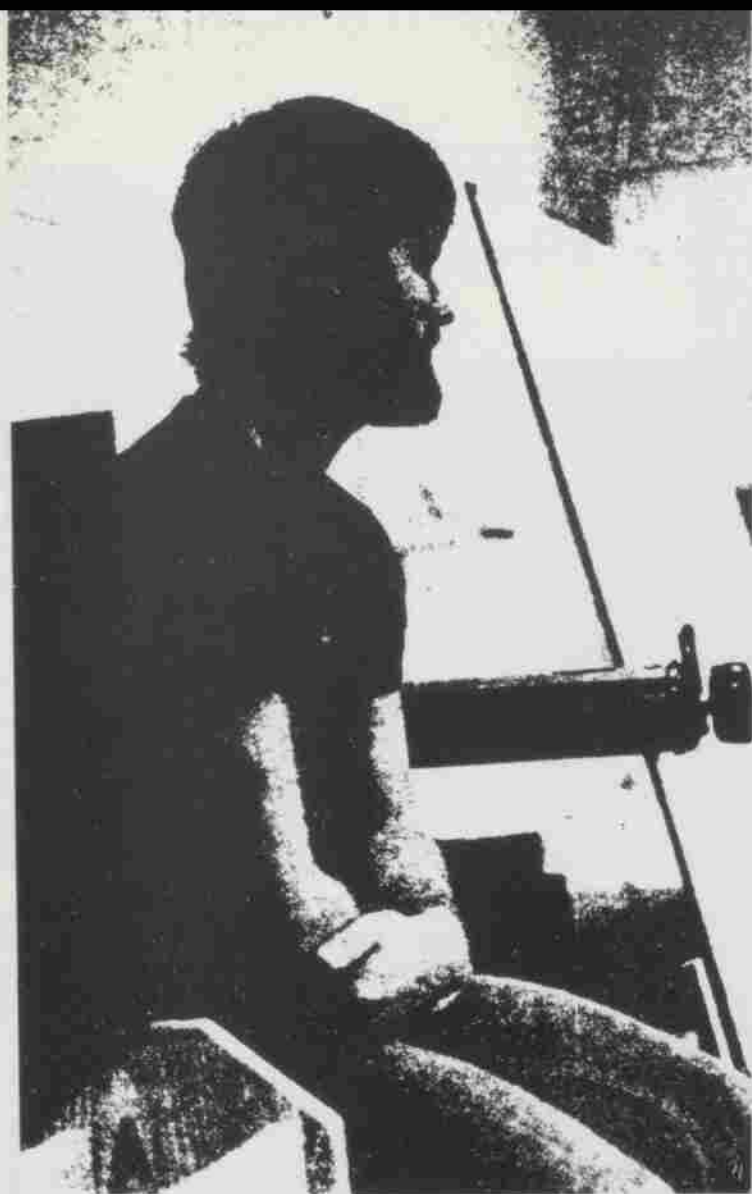

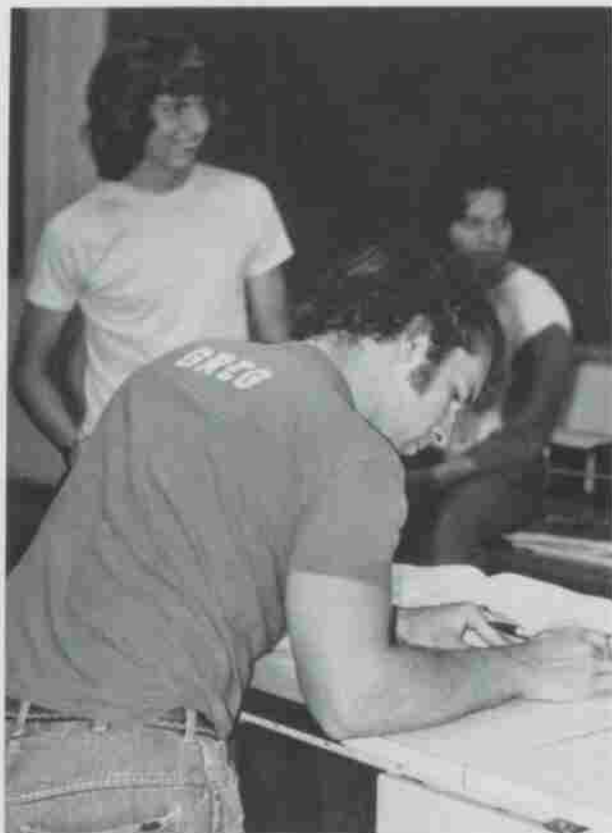


# Industrial Arts

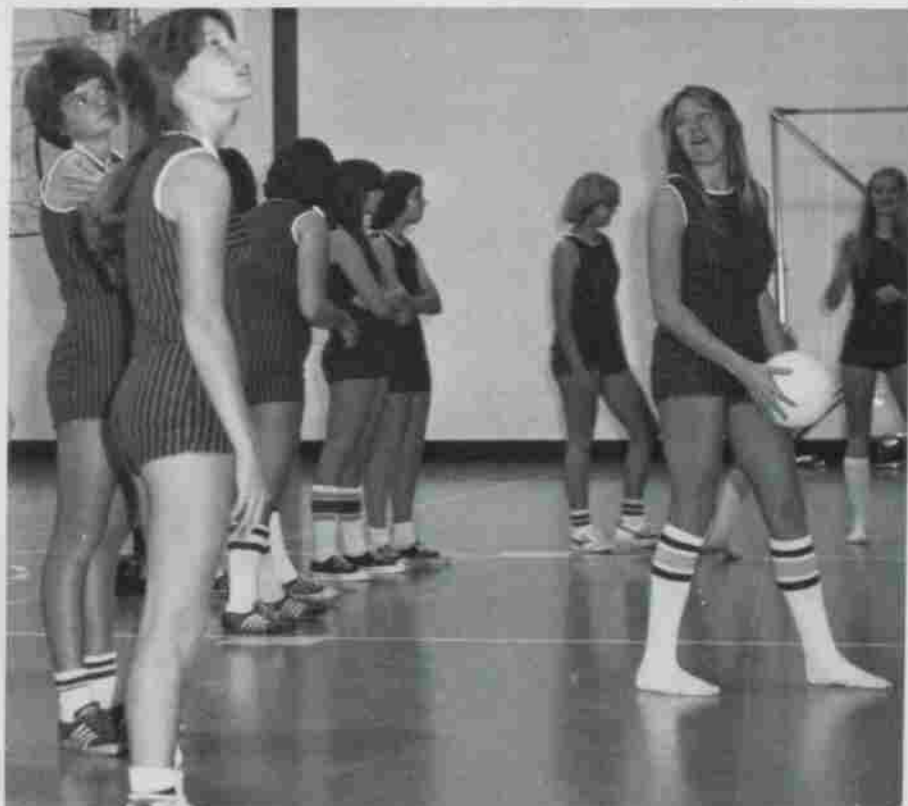
## Safety comes first

In the annual senior-faculty game, the teachers lost 64-60, despite a strong comeback by the faculty in the second half.



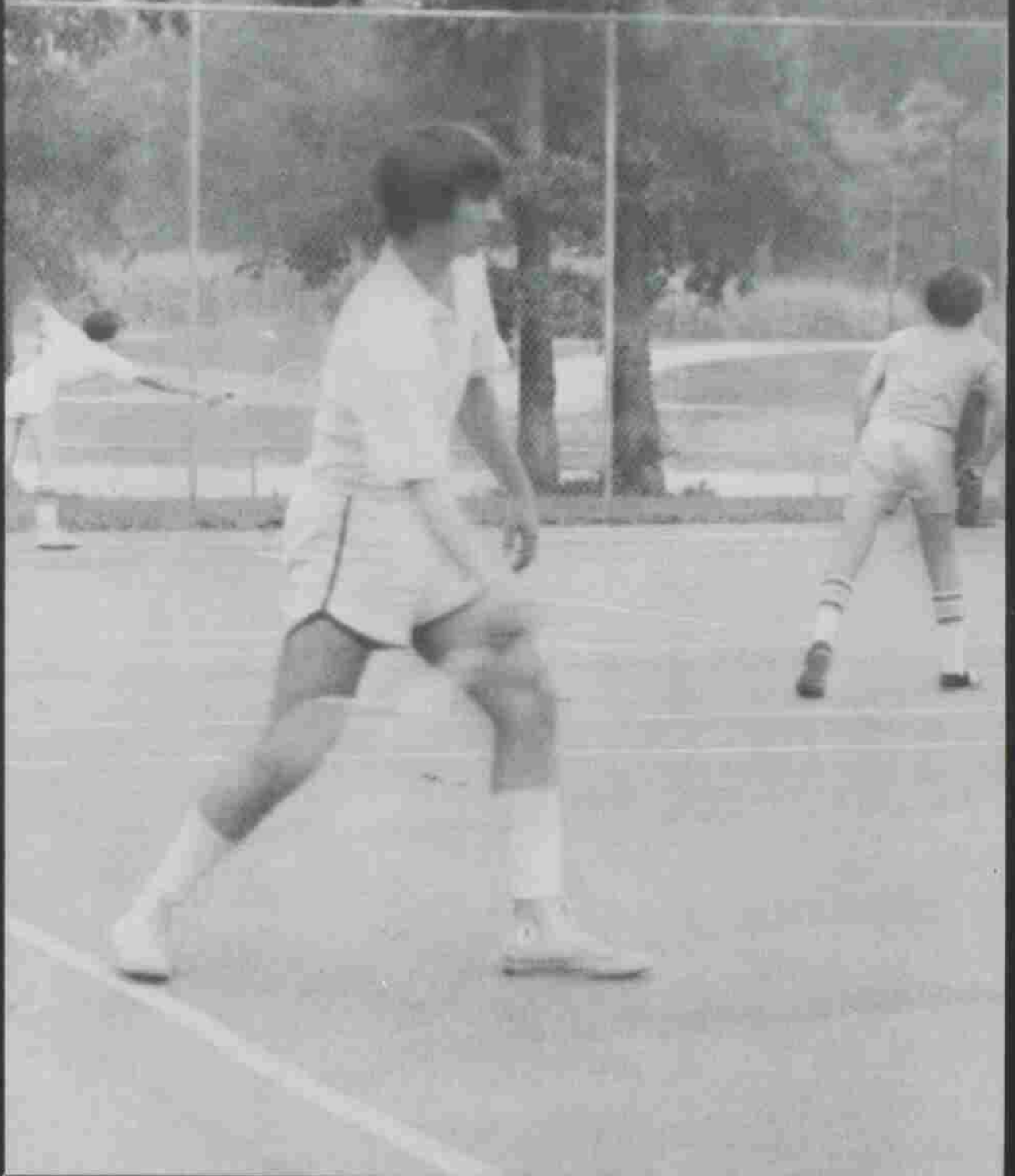

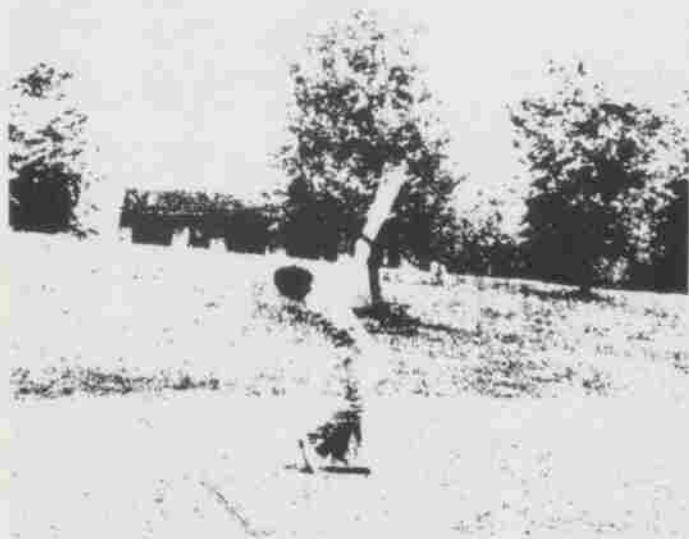

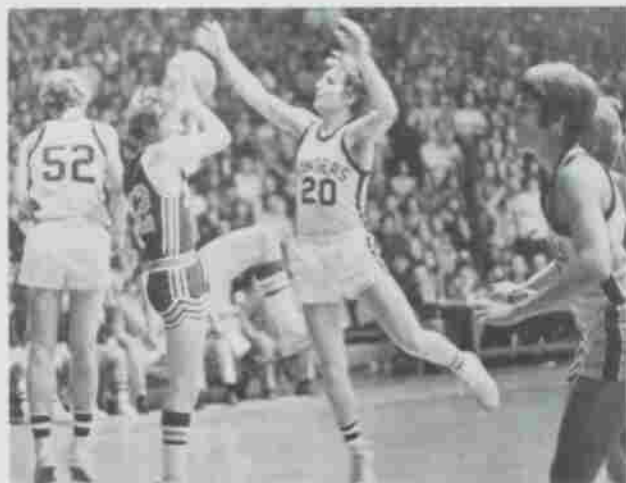

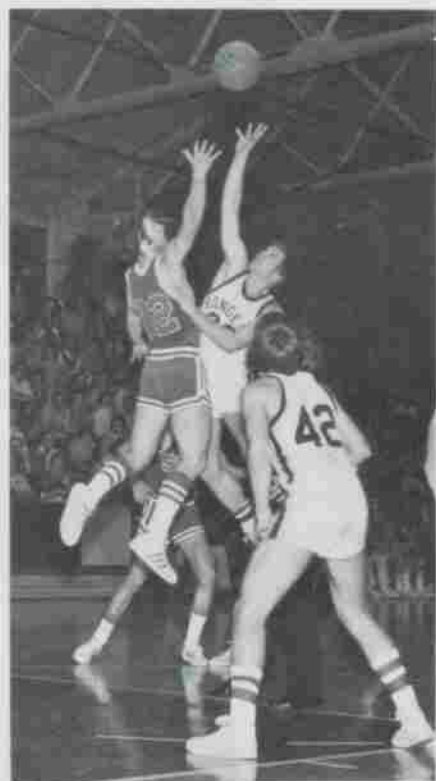
