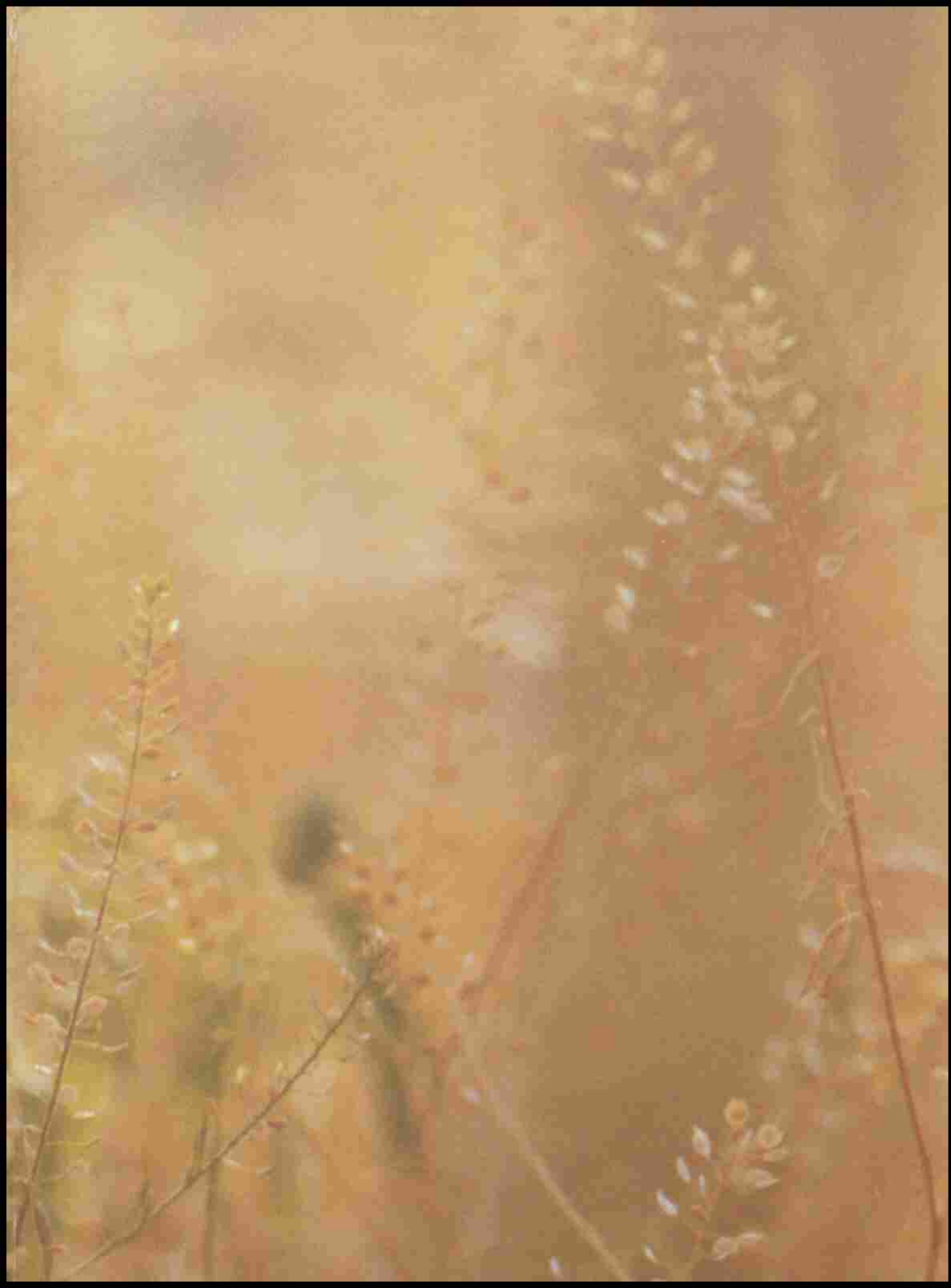

Many long and hard hours of practice proved a great help as the auxiliaries tried to achieve perfection and add flash to the band.

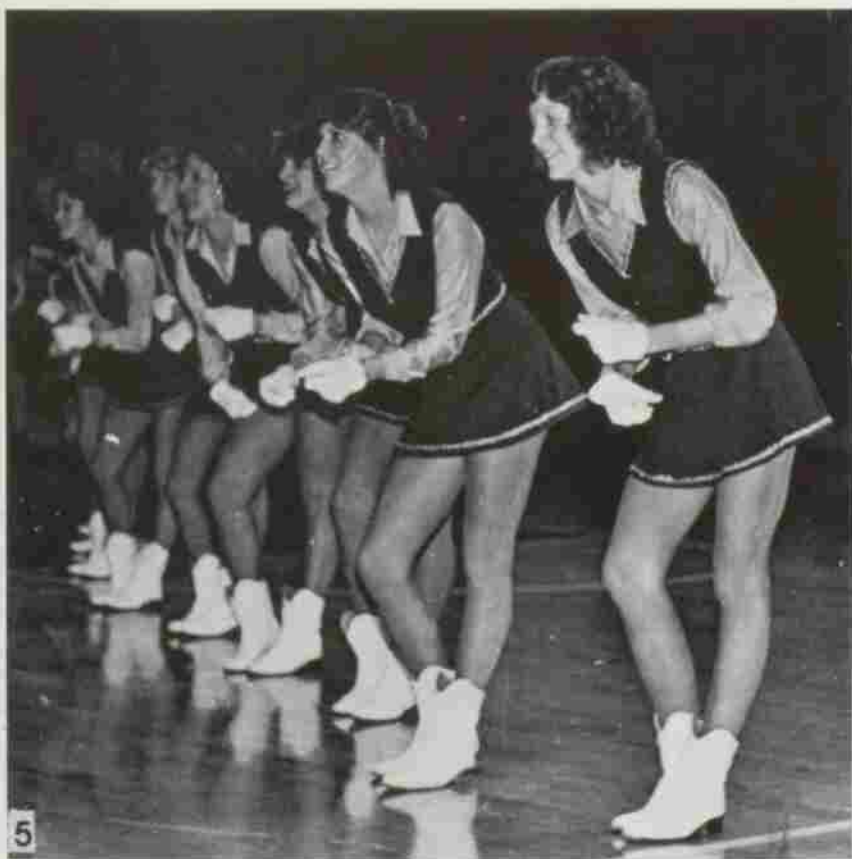
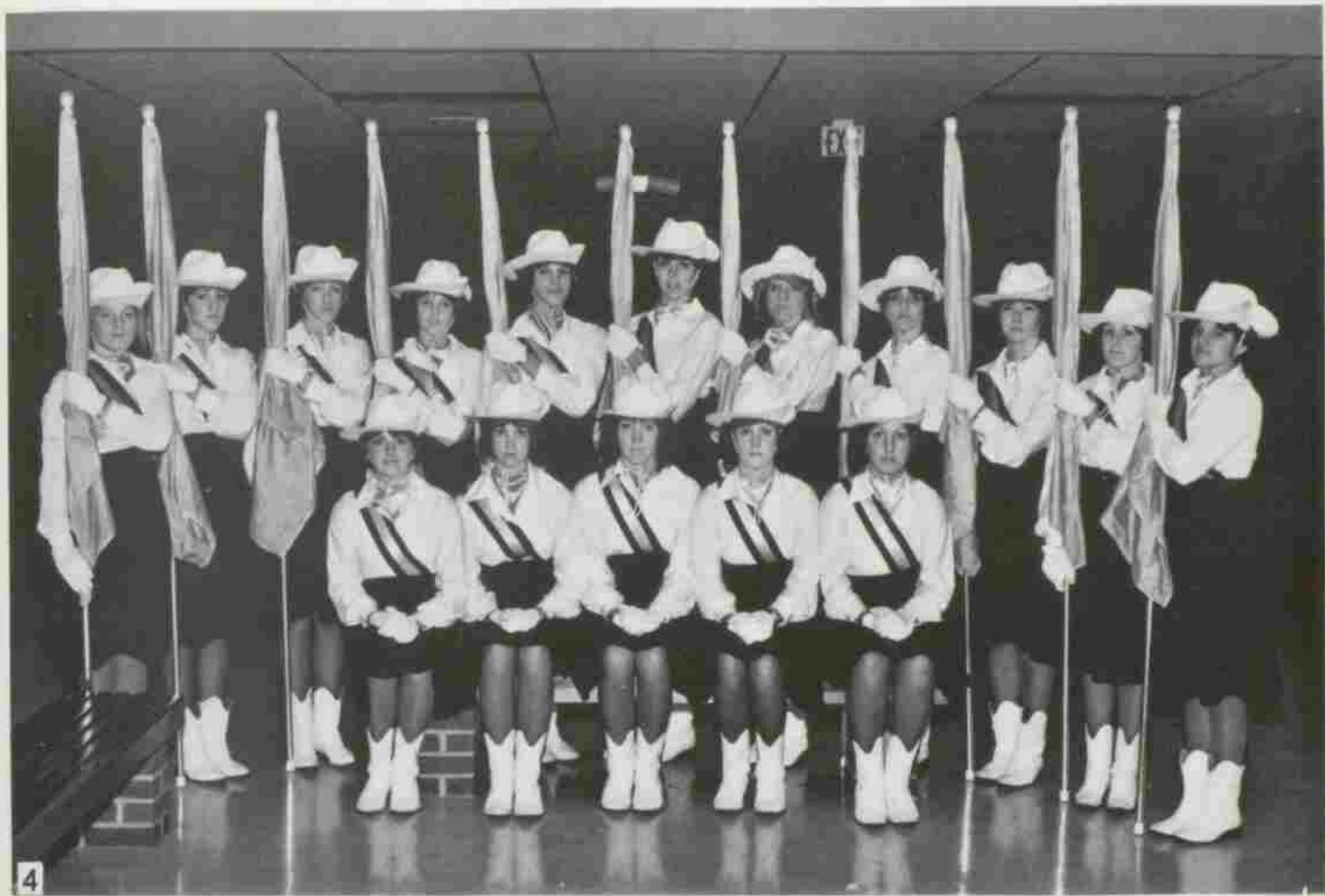
The Flag Corps and Drill Team combined into one

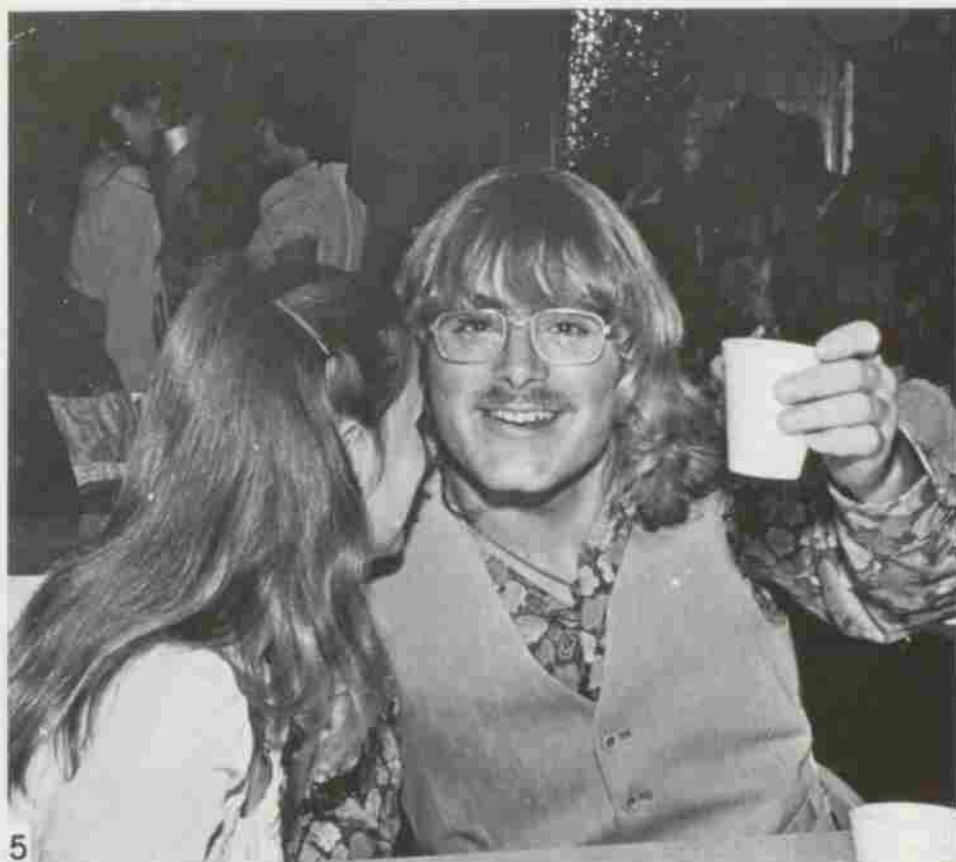

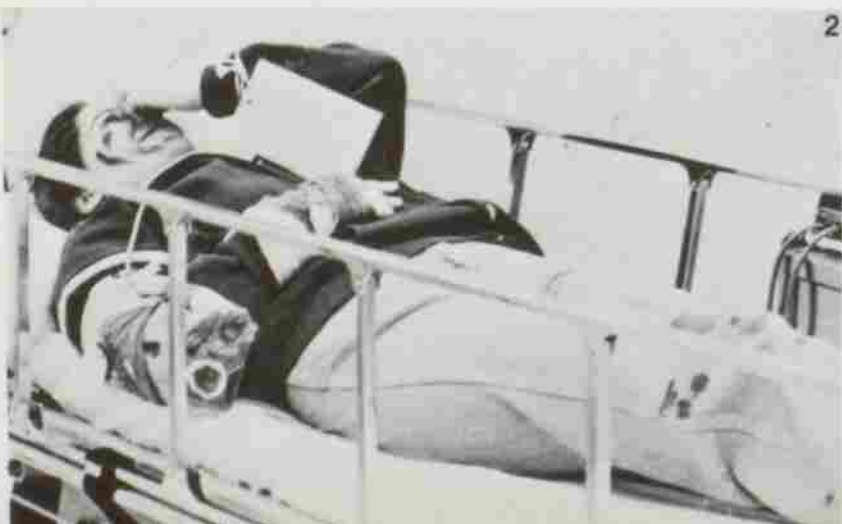




NaHoSo serves school, community

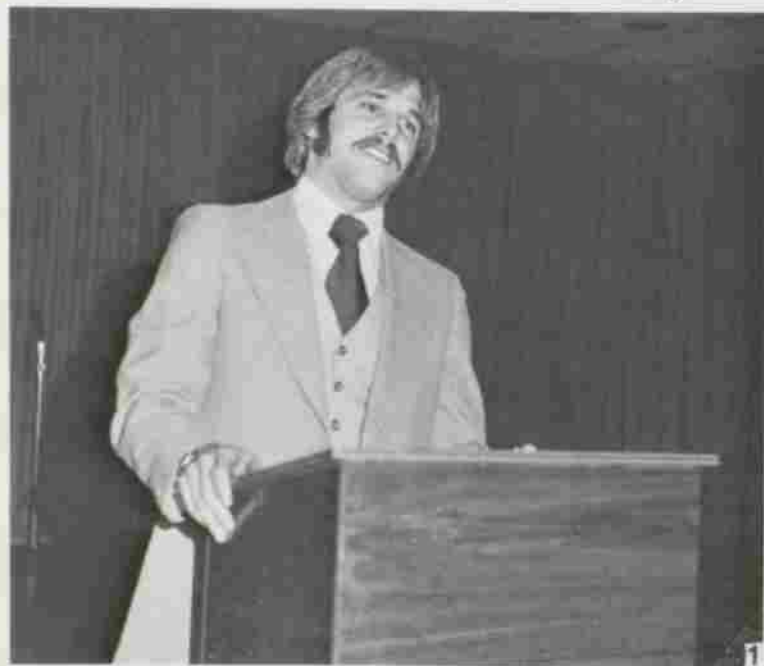
Quill & Scroll rewards journalism achievements

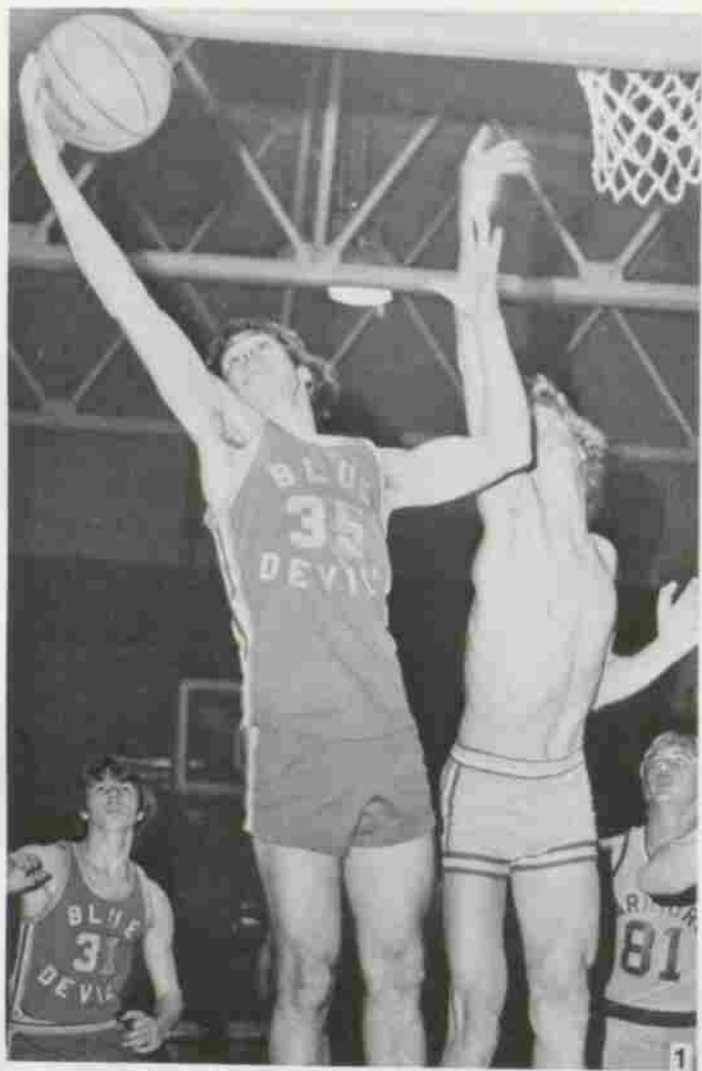

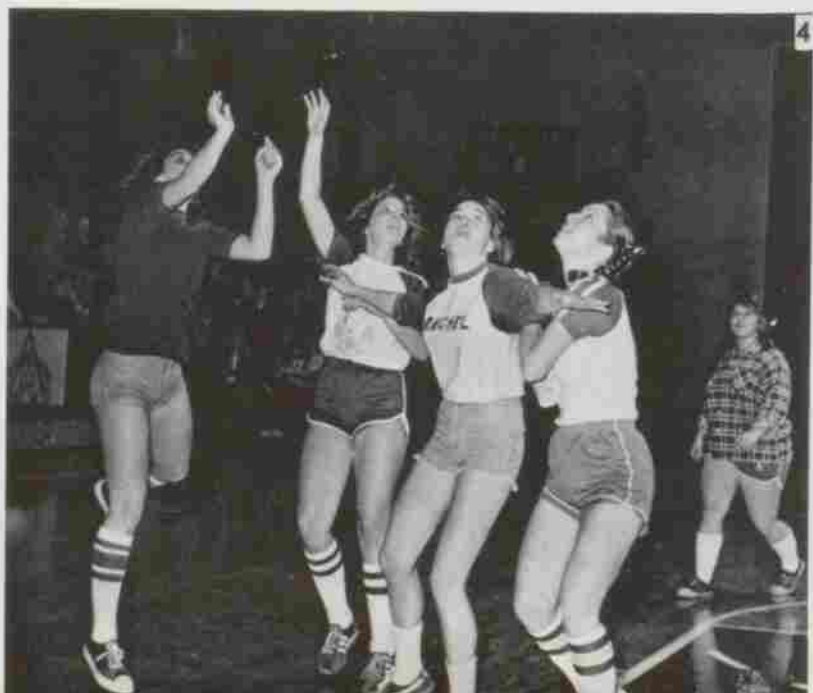
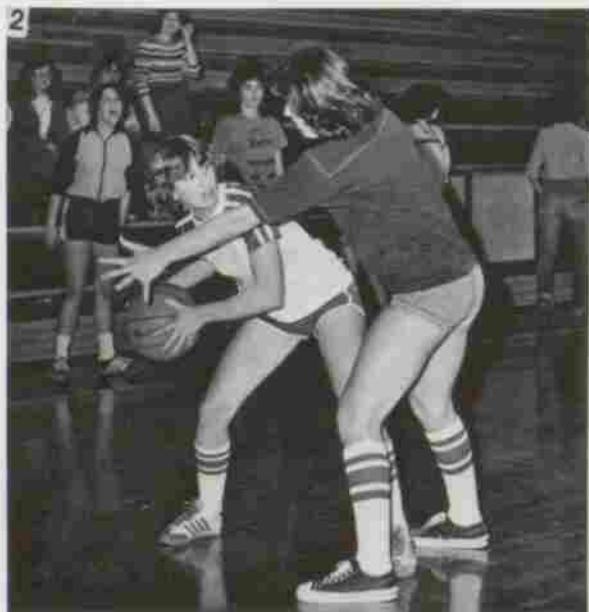


Senior girls, junior boys win class tournaments

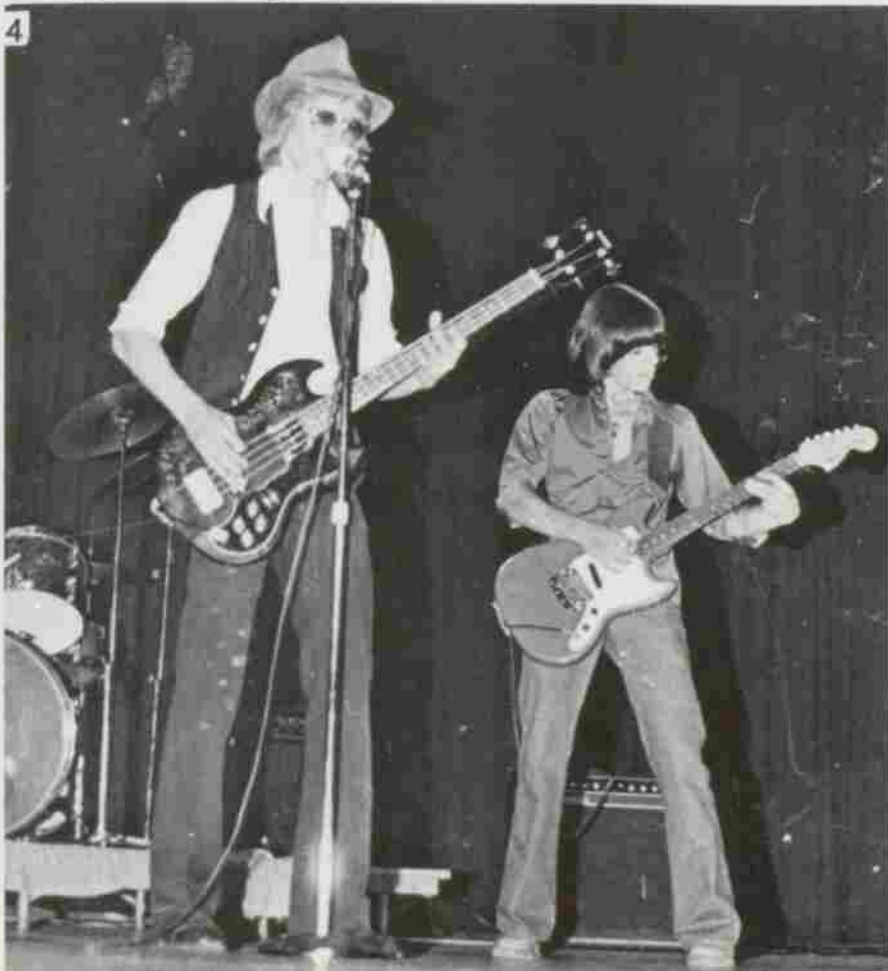


Variety Show a big hit

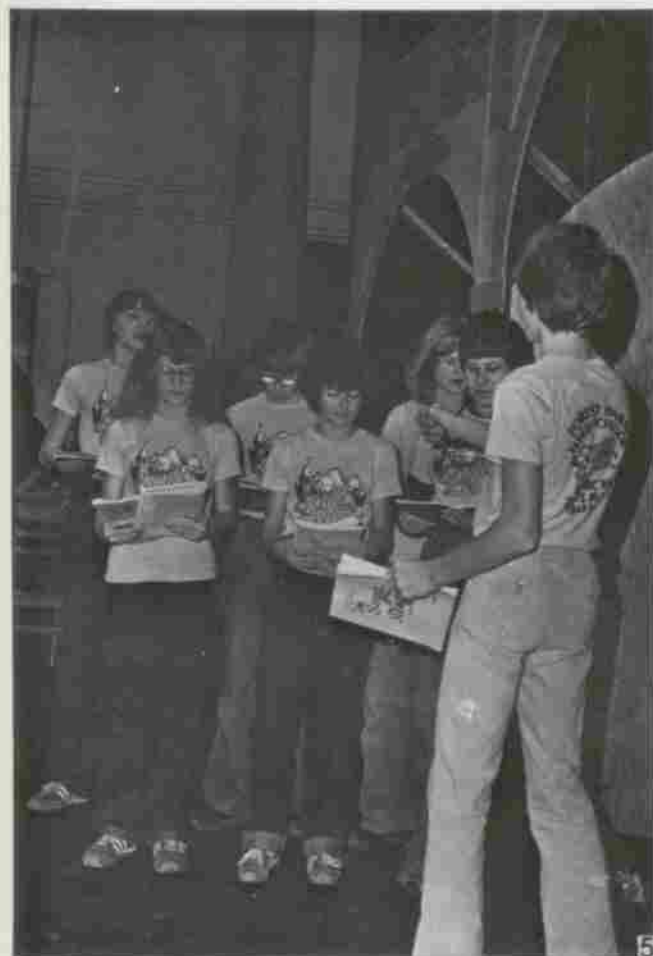


F. P. Drama Department presents *The*

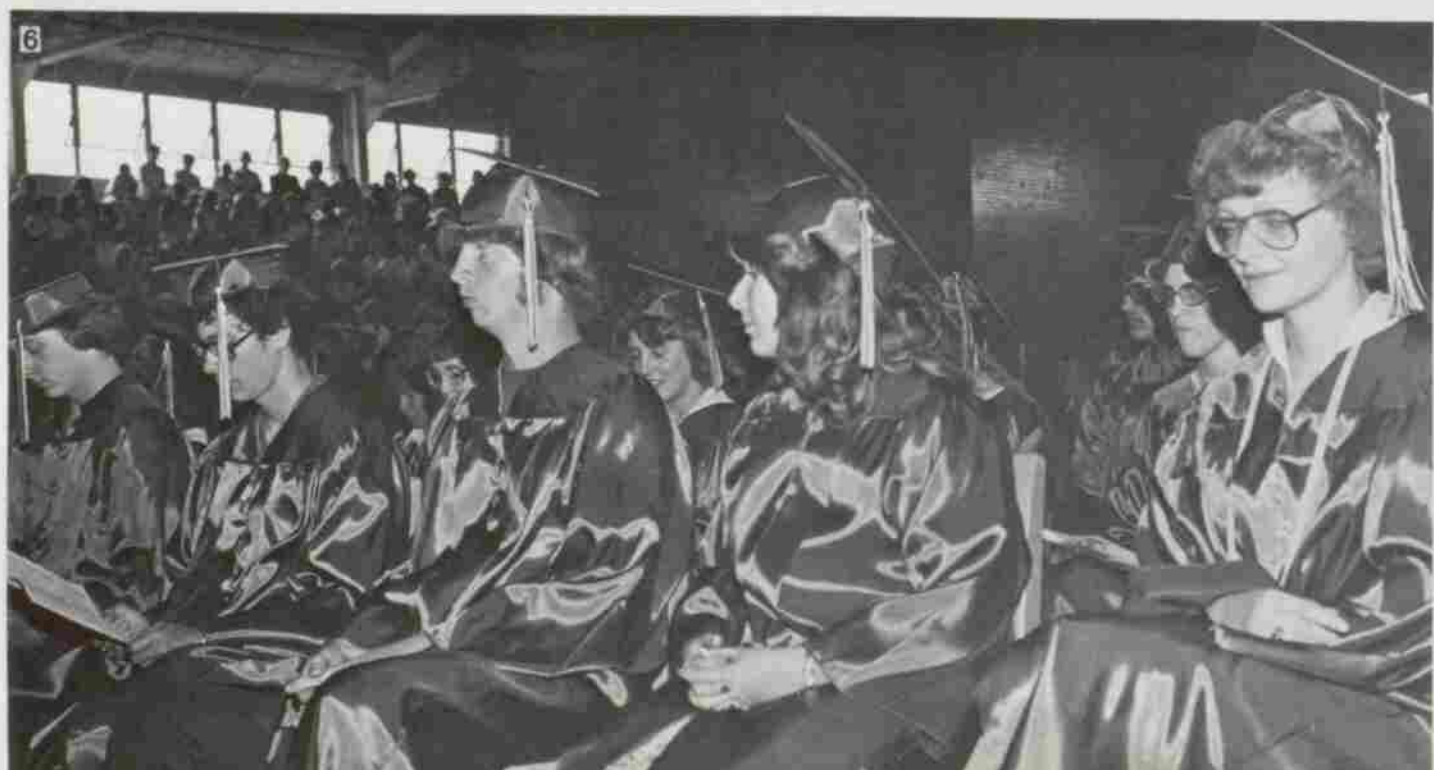

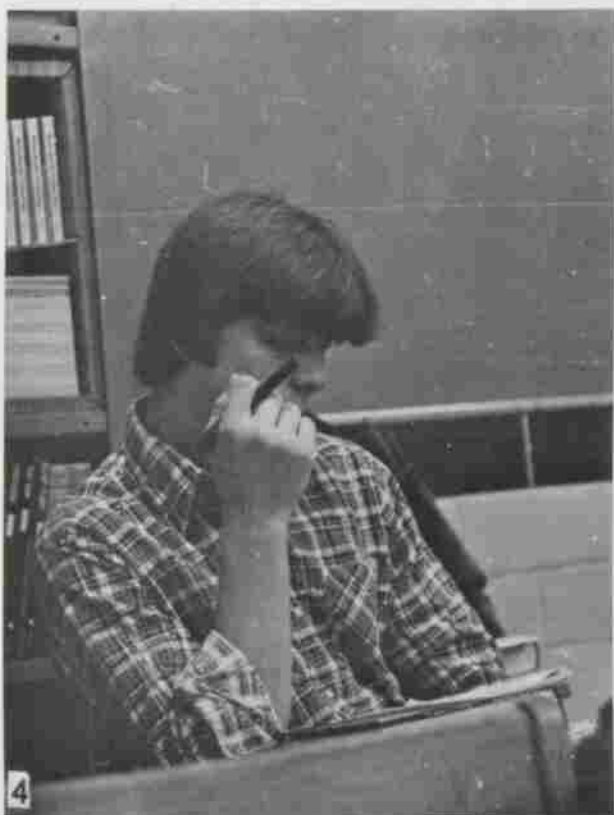


English... learning the basics

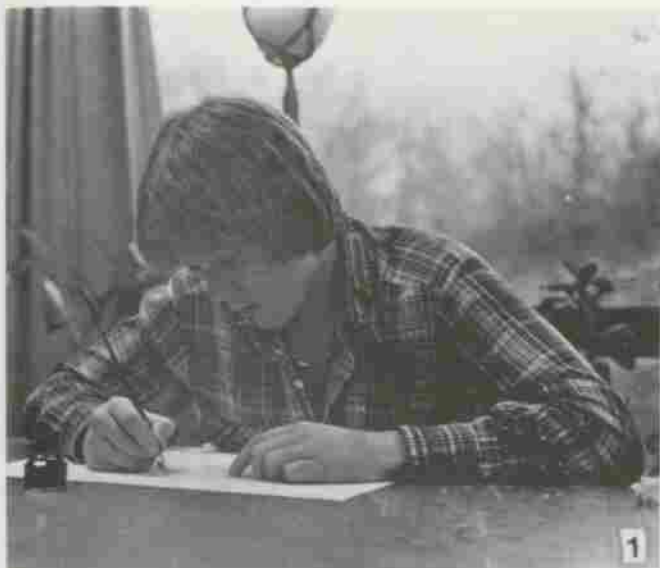

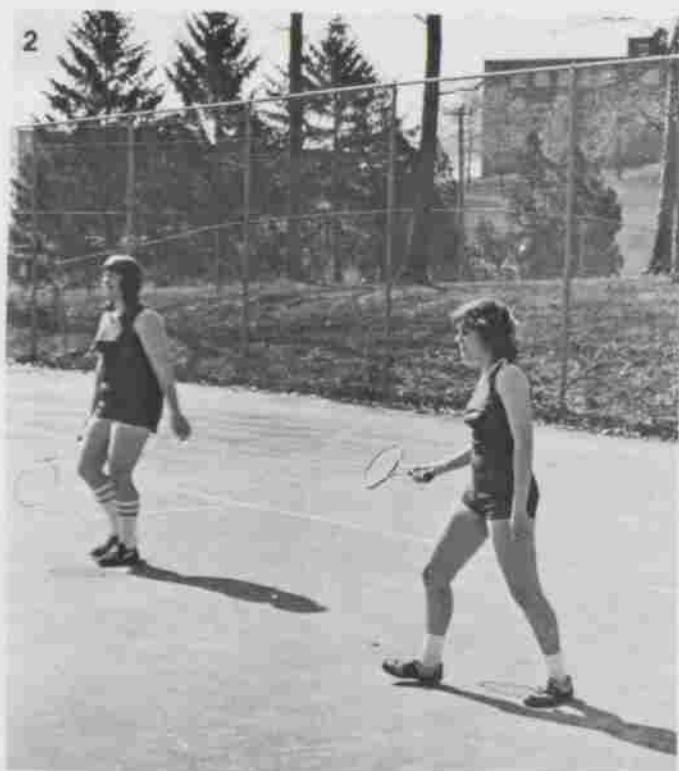

V-ballers end 14-5; loss to Trojans in sectional mars season

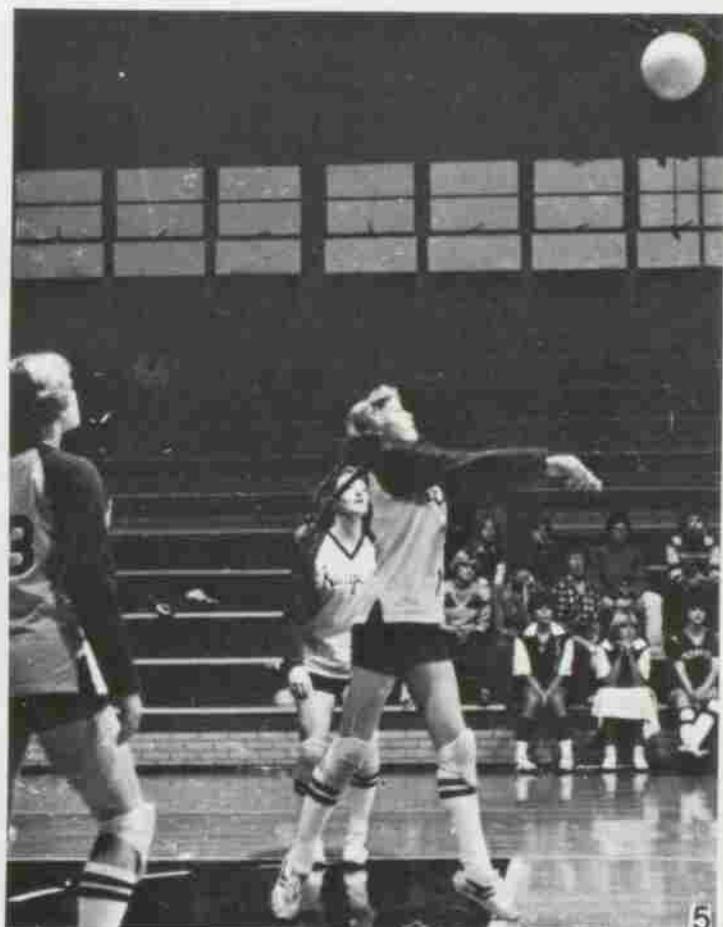

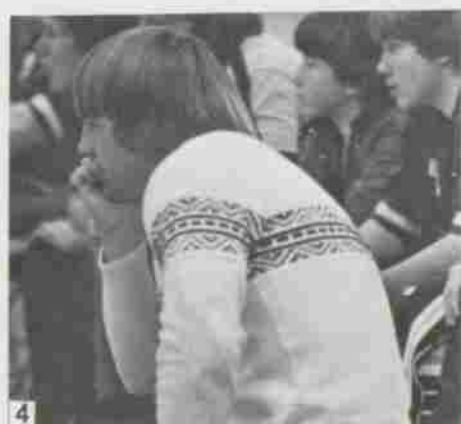

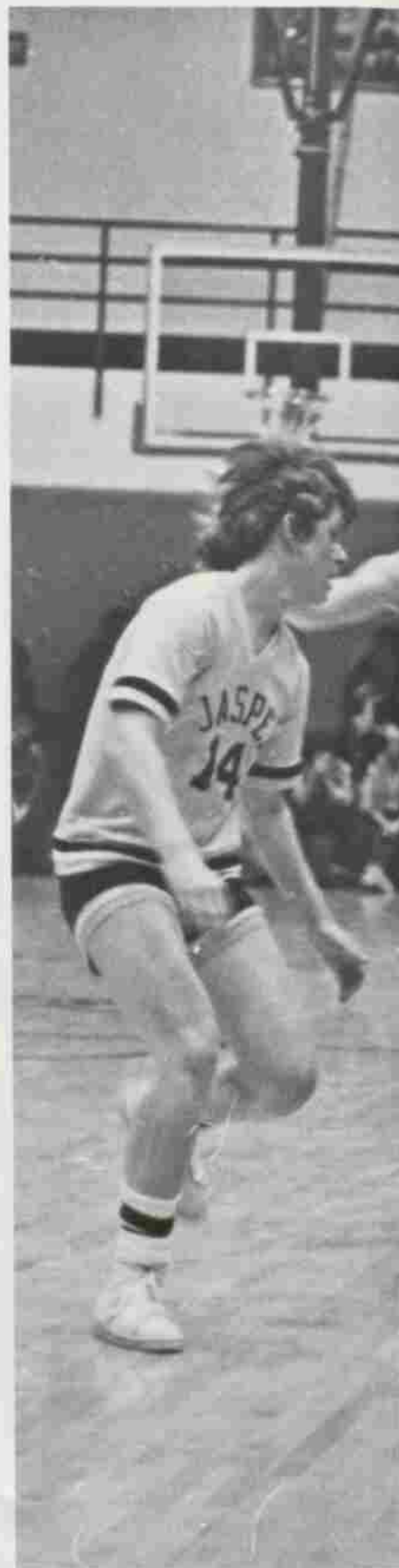
Breaks three scoring records

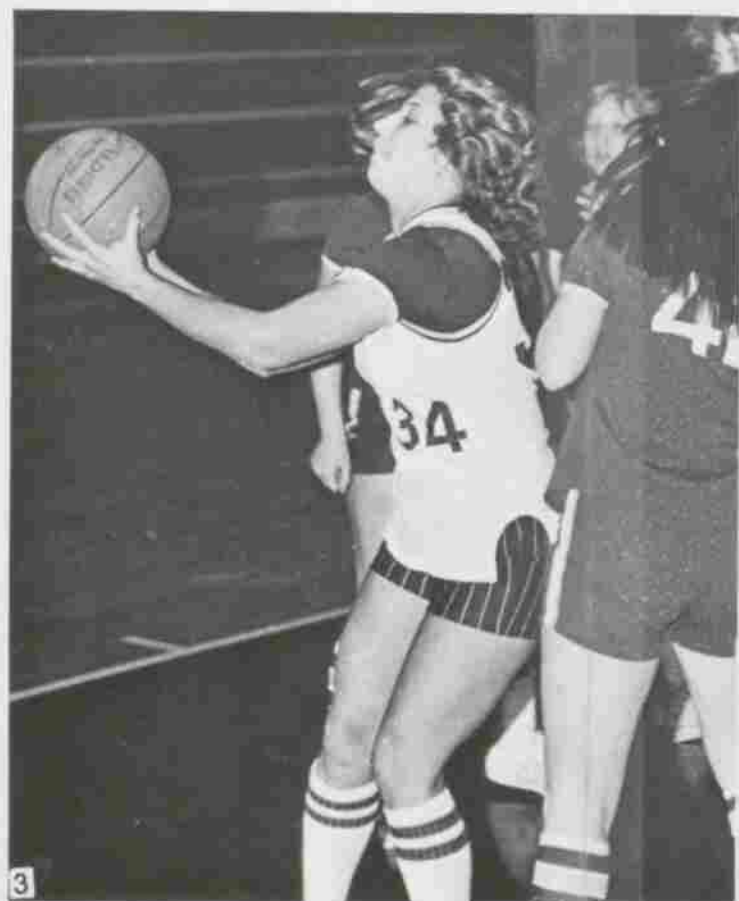

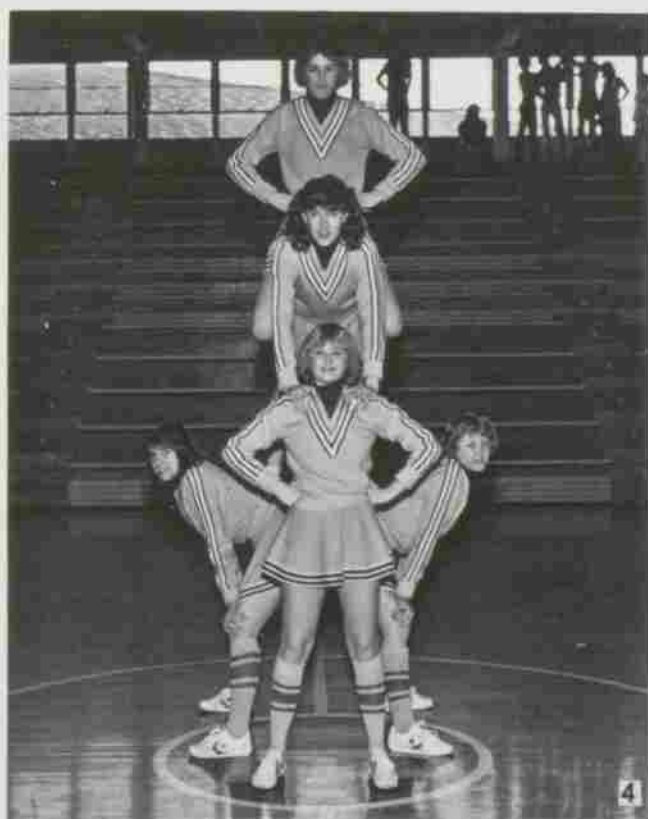

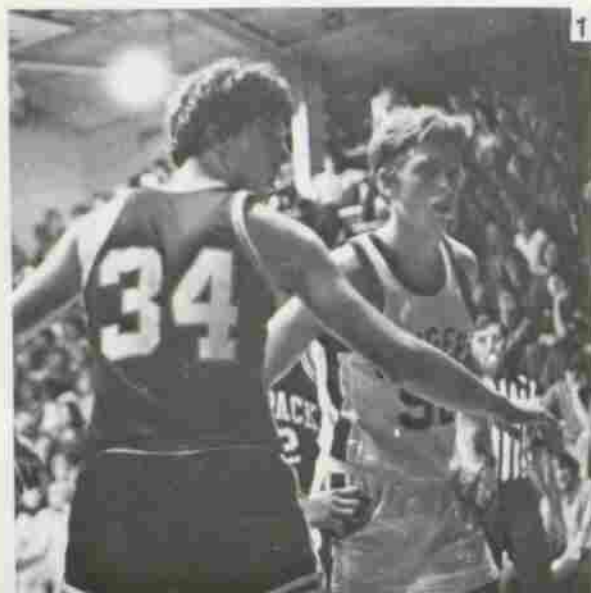

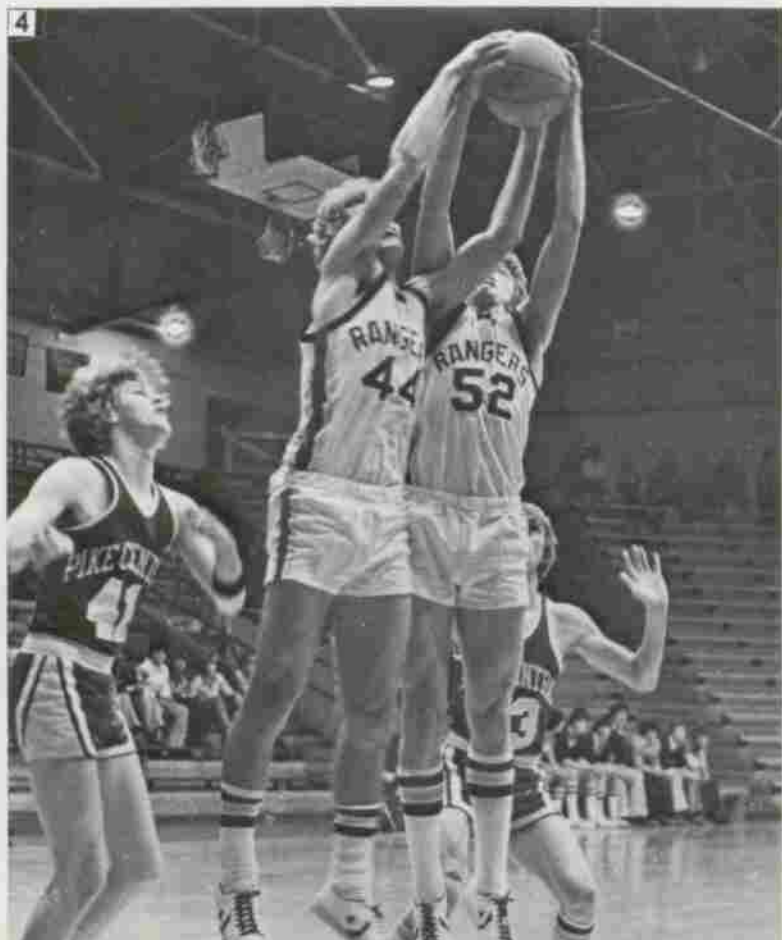

Hopes of F.P.'s first sectional crown fall short

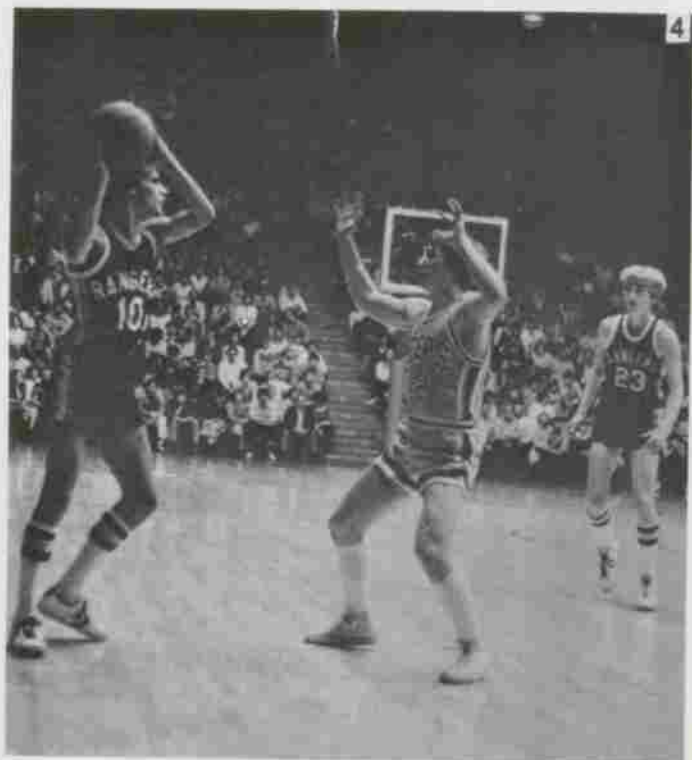

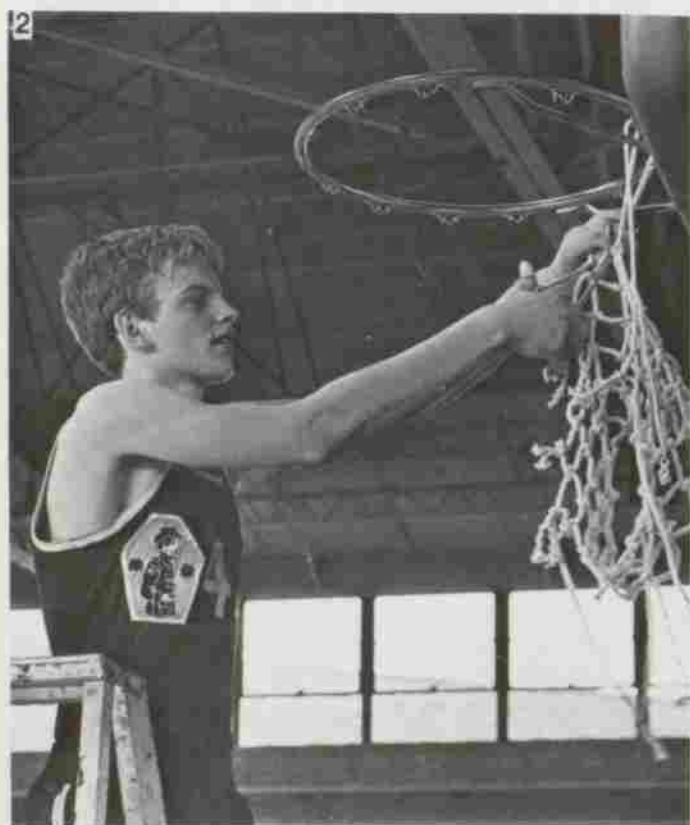
Freshman squad finishes 11-5

the team in assists, free throws and was the third highest scorer. Gary Braunecker was the top scorer with a 12.3 points per game average.



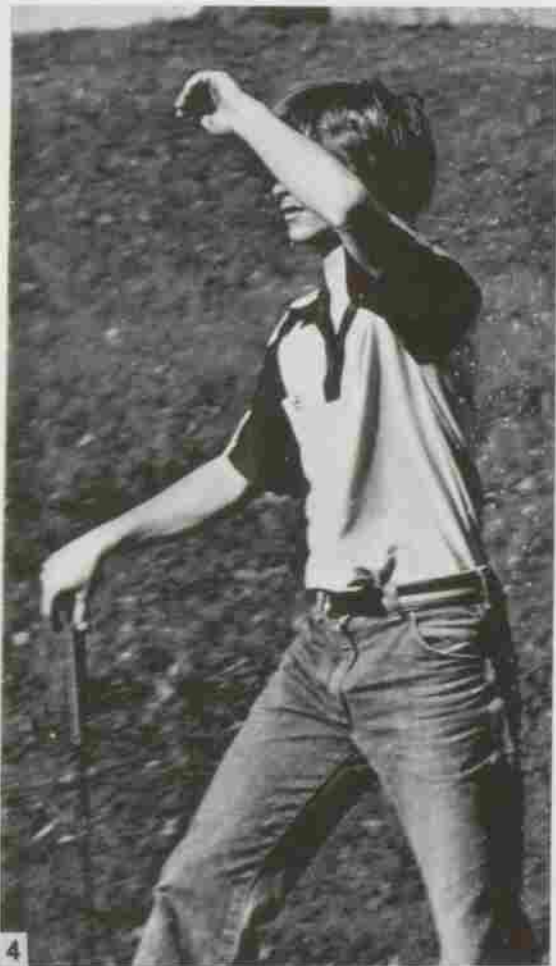

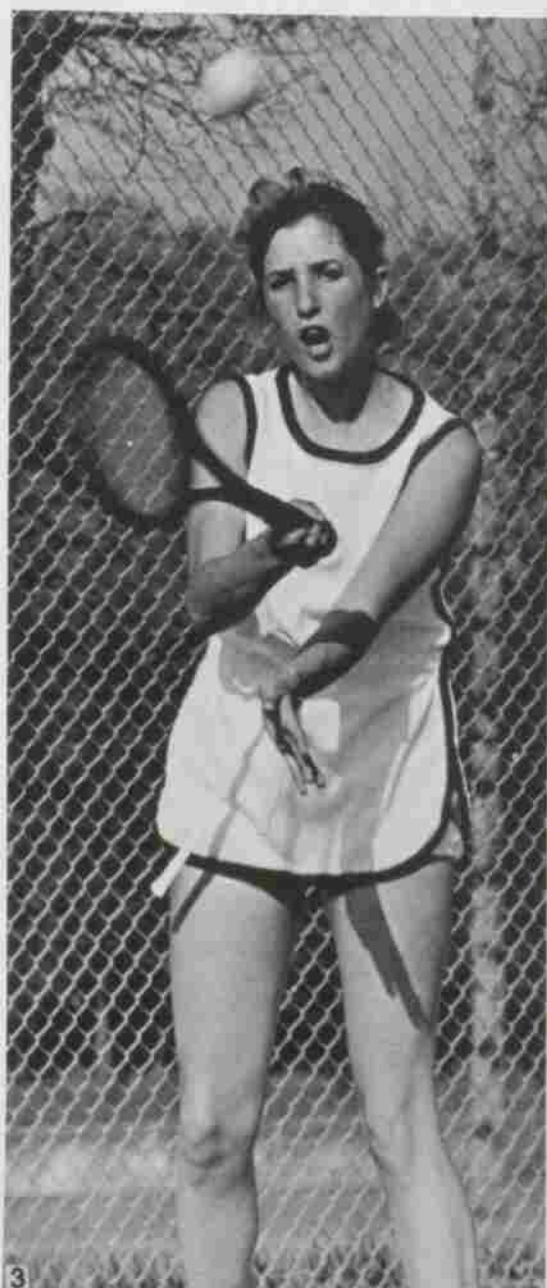
