FP Rangers

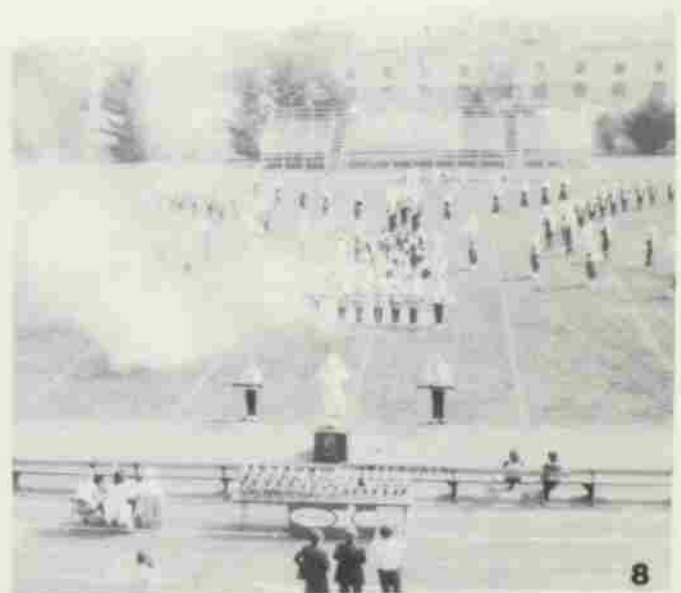

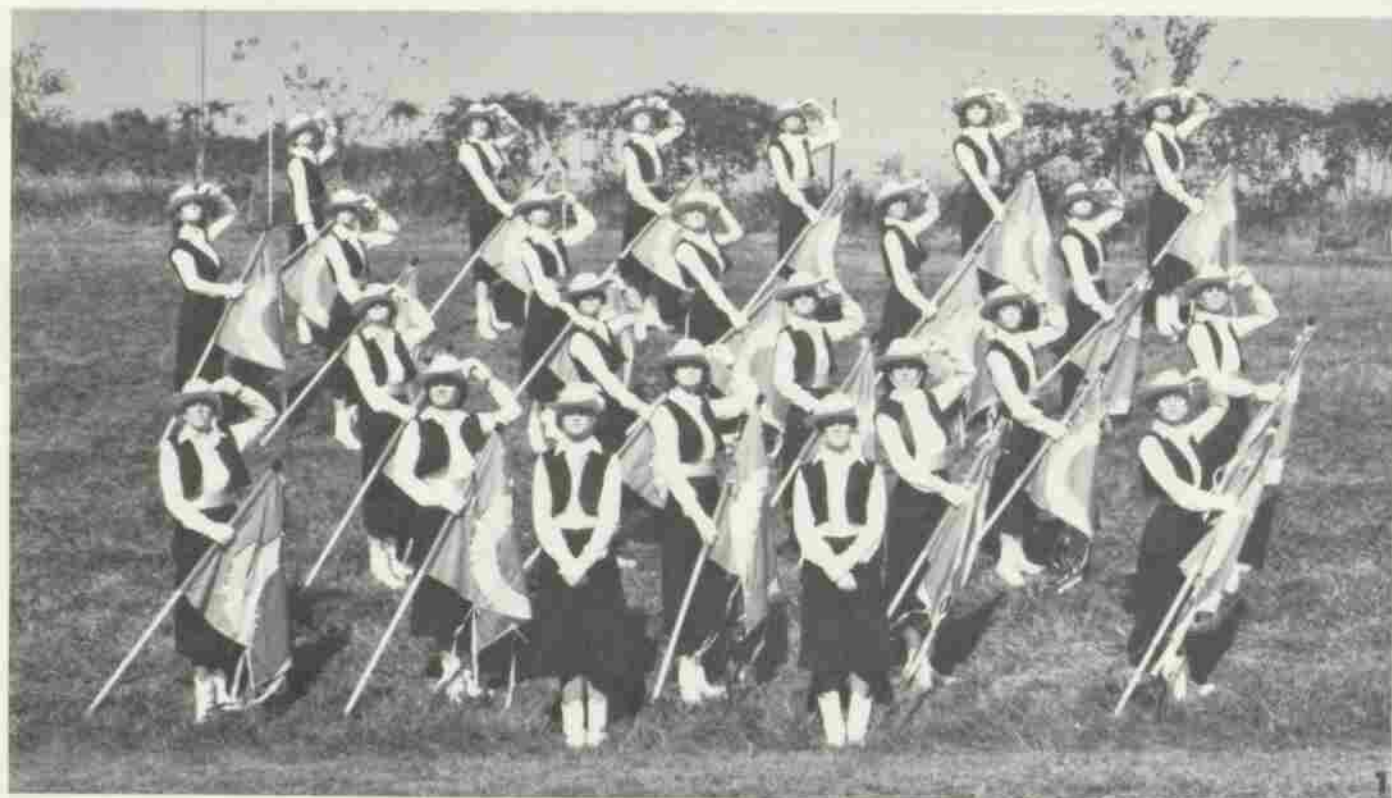

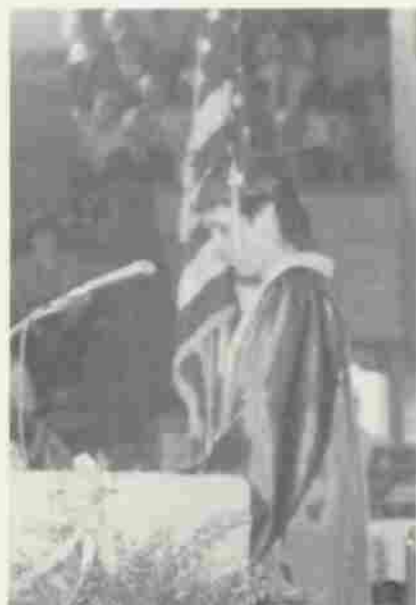
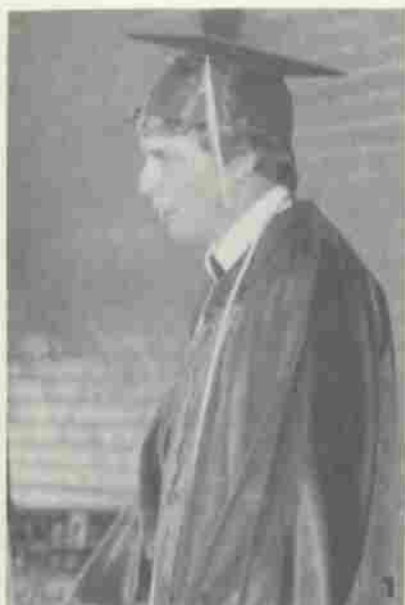
Memories are like old songs

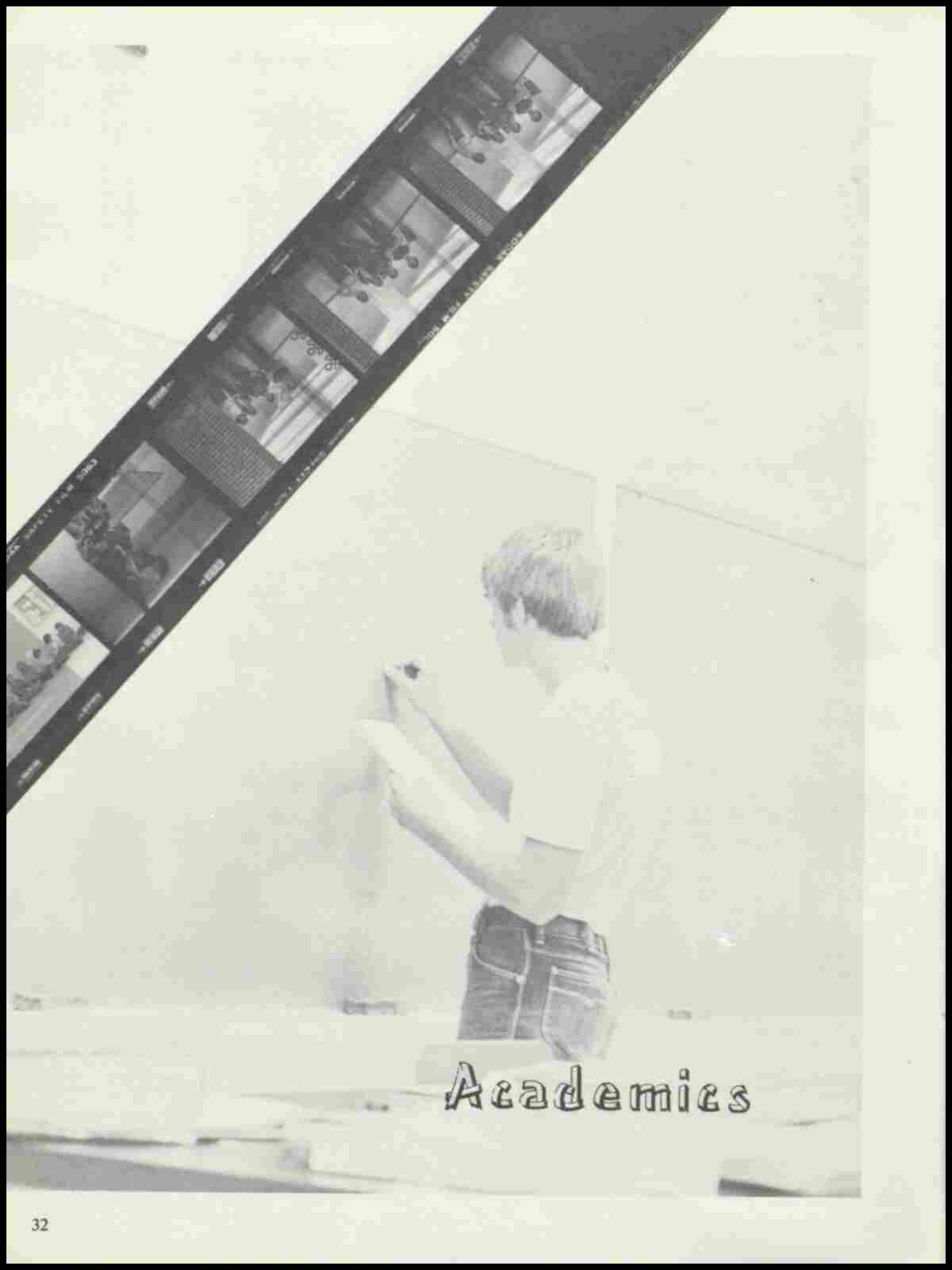

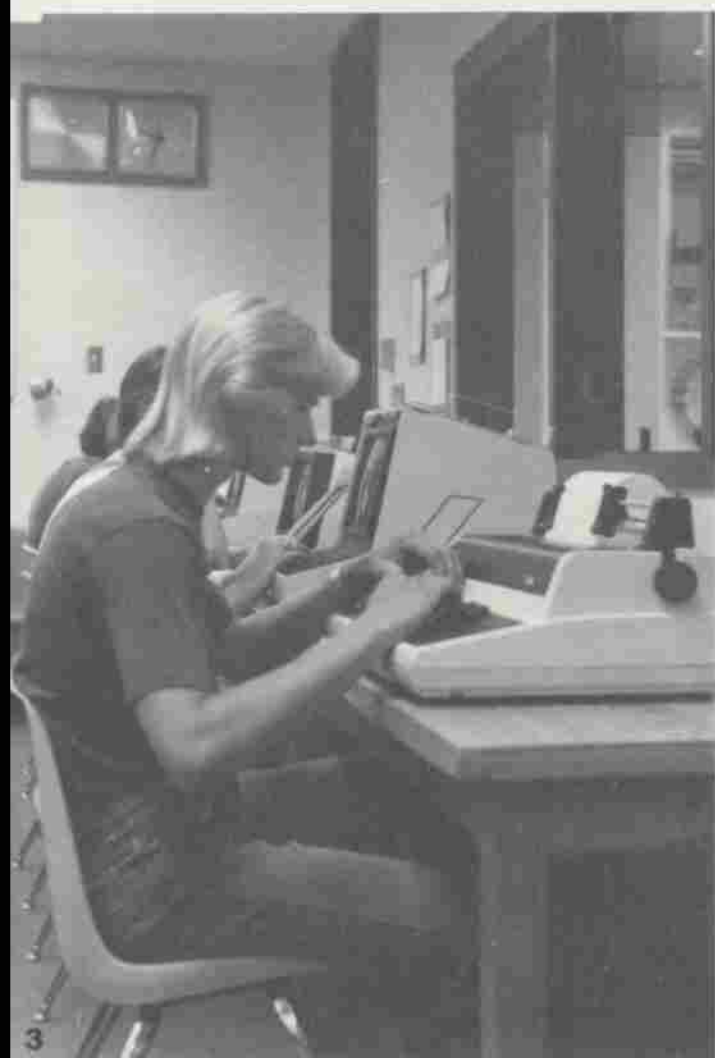


Academics

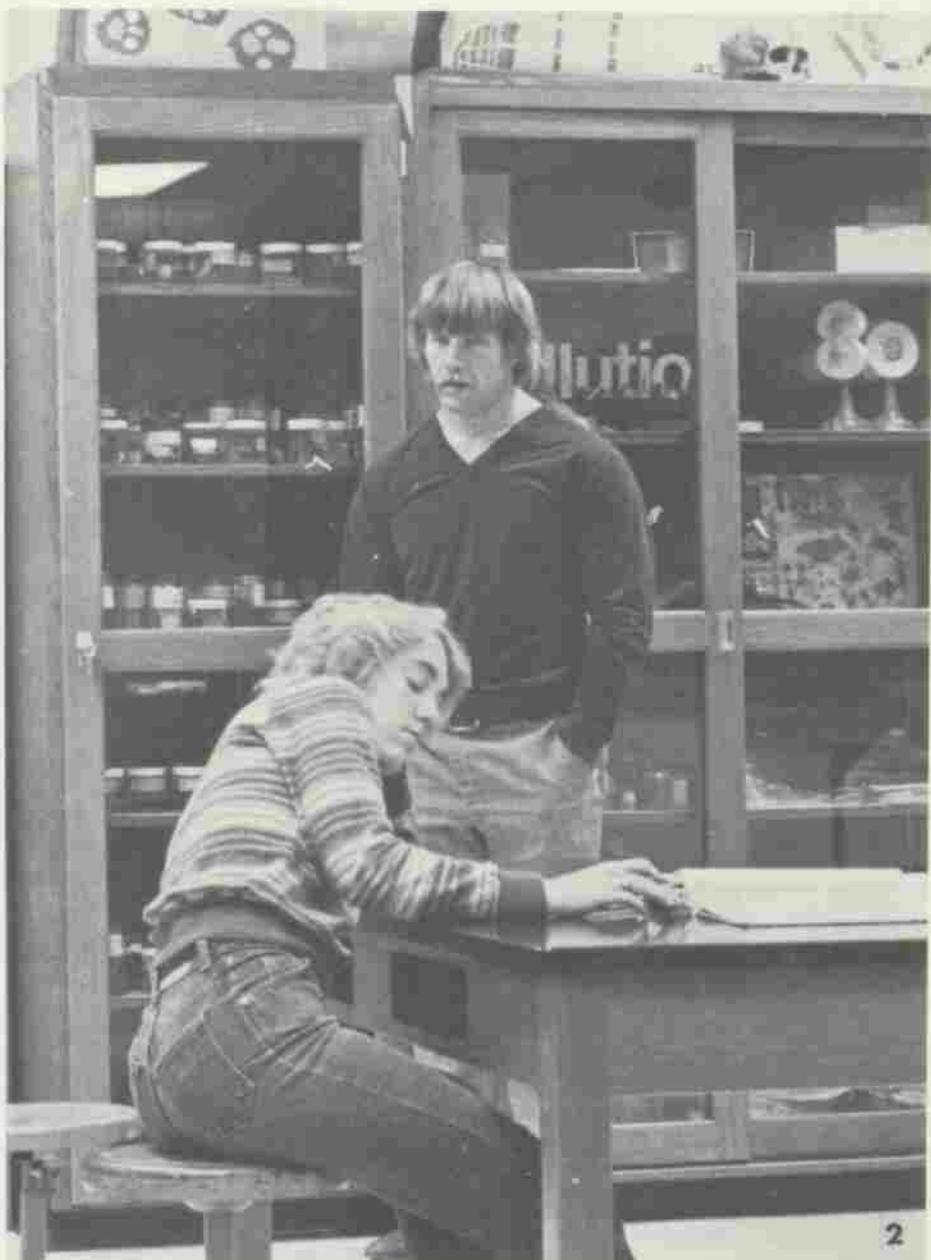

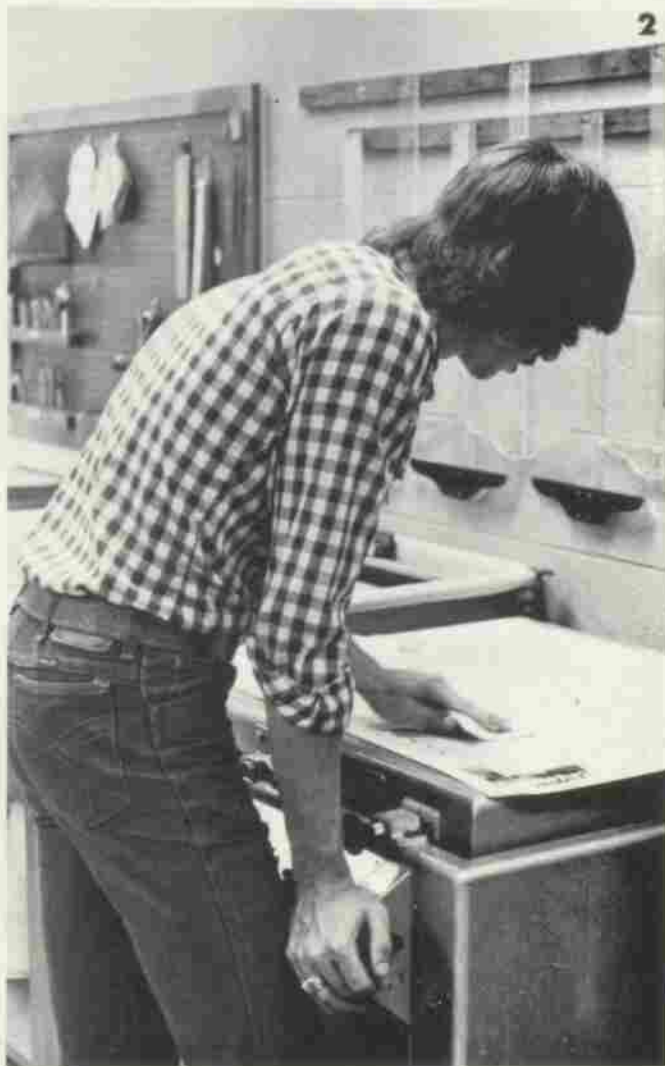


Working the printing press

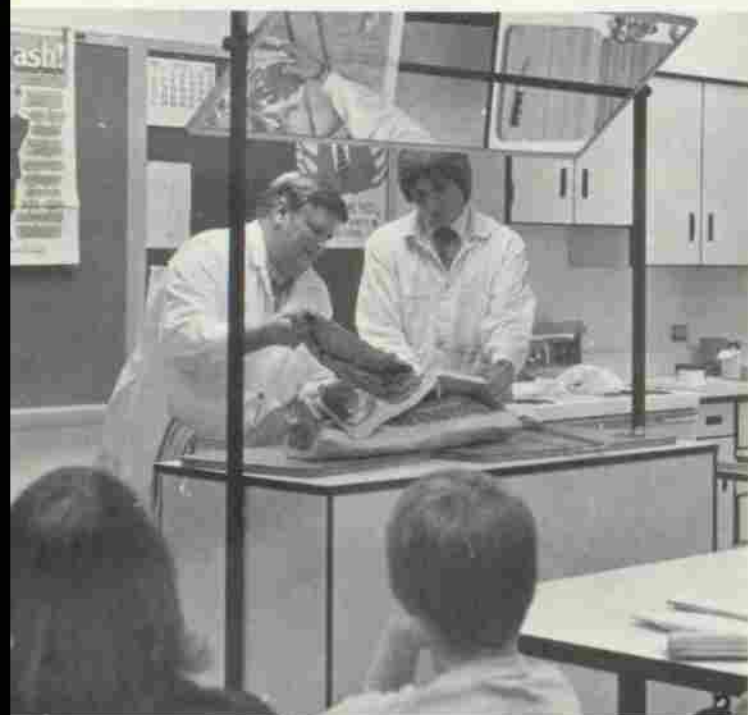
Agriculture... for the future

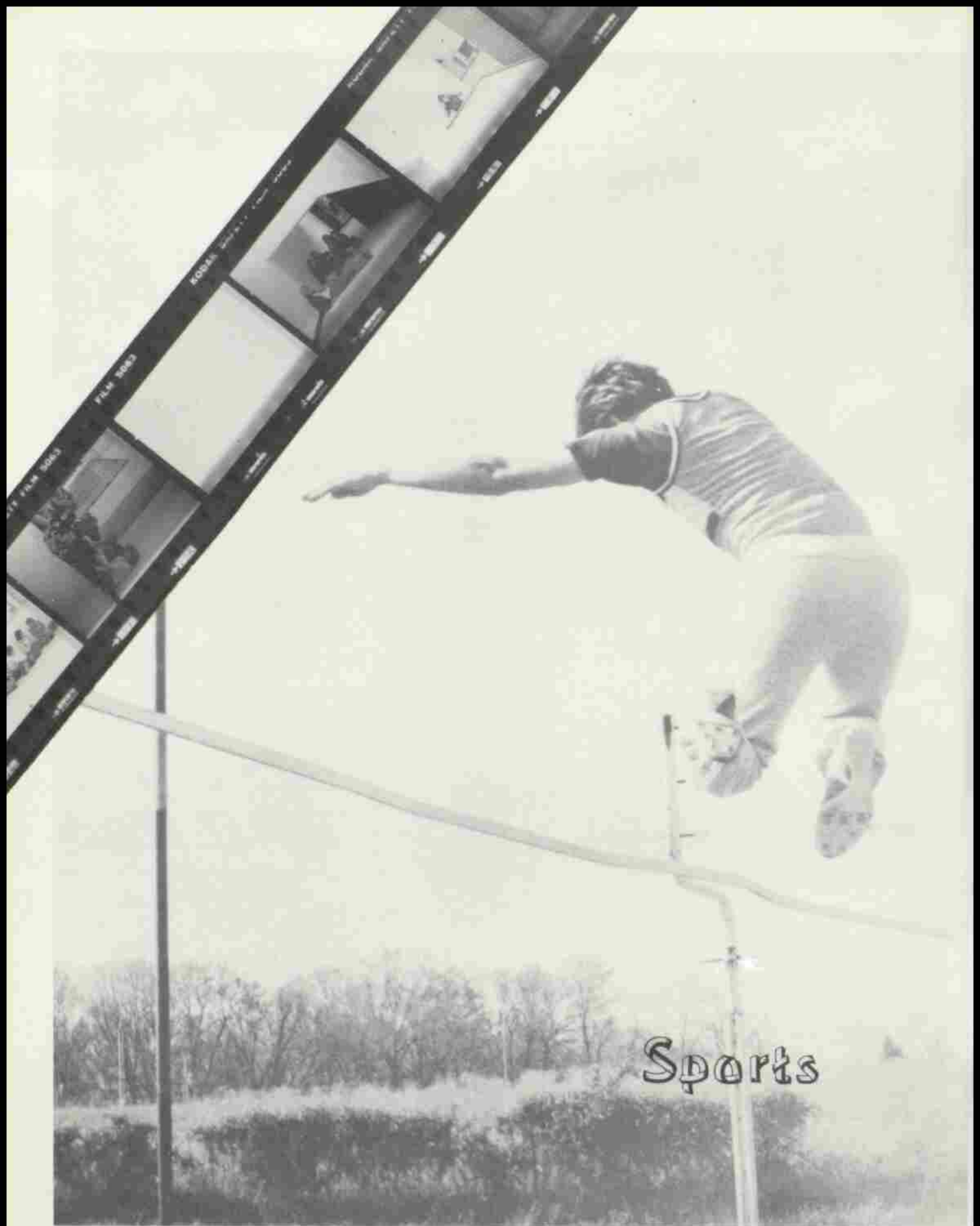

Harriers post 24-45 season

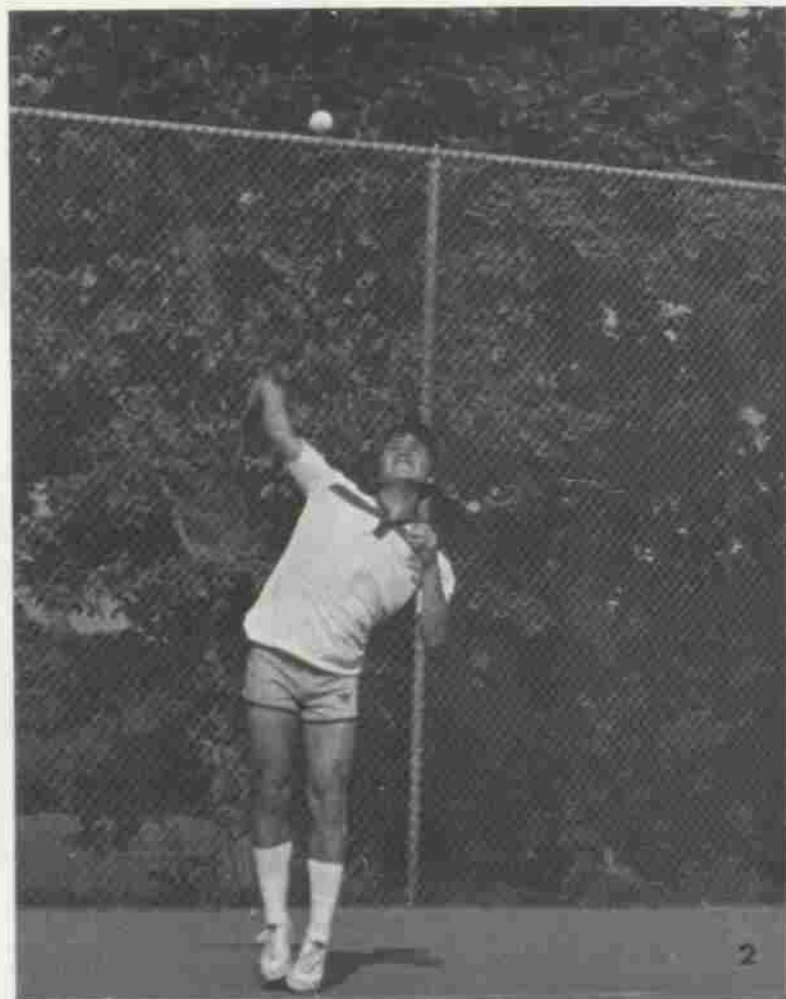

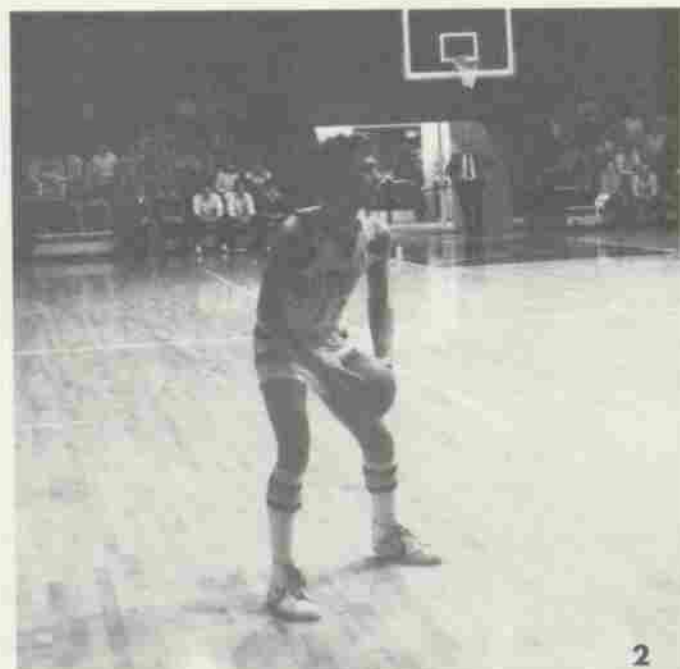
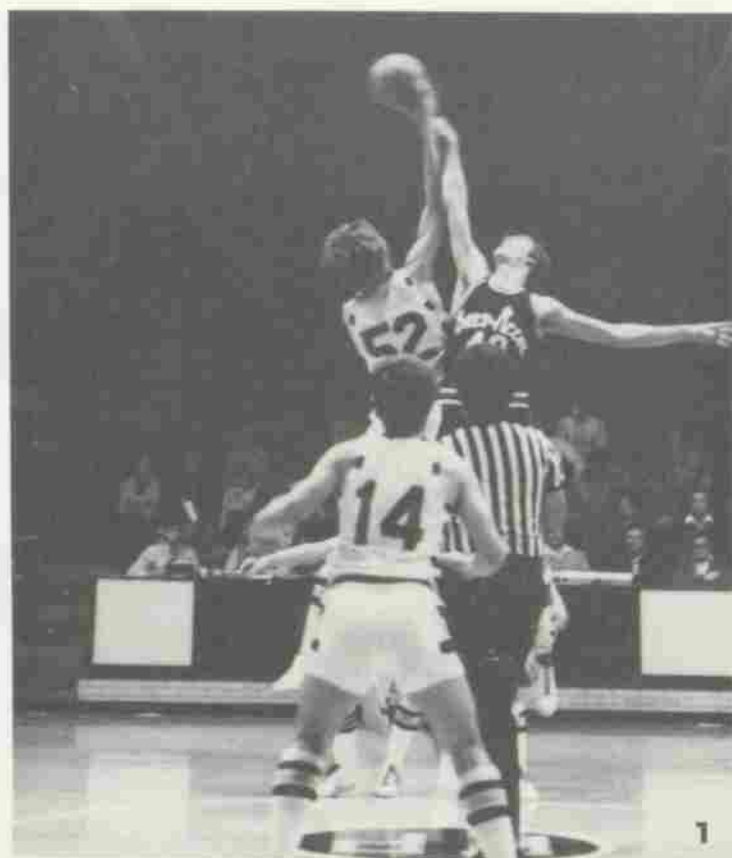

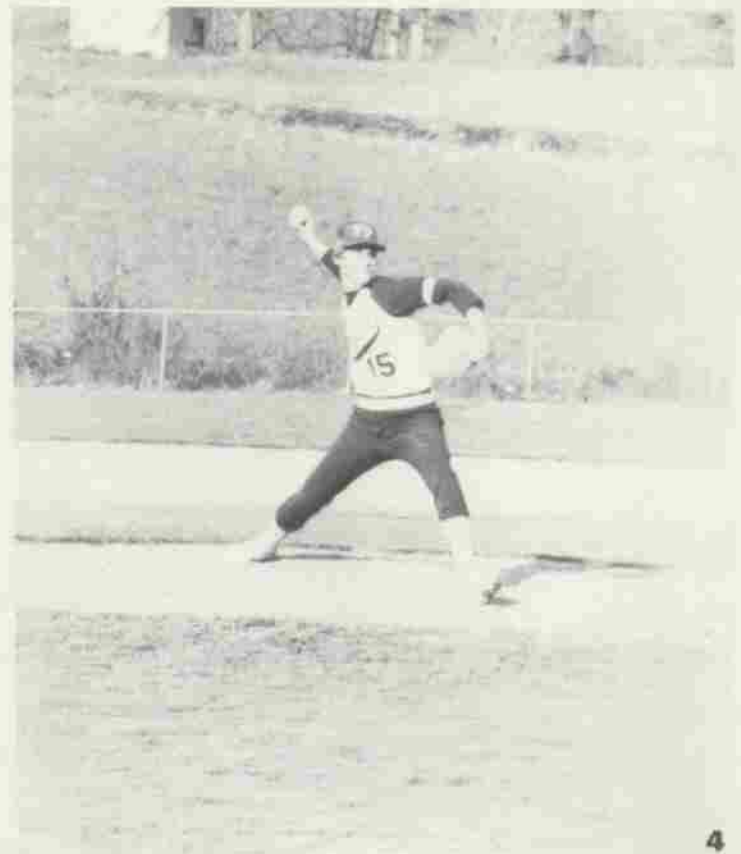

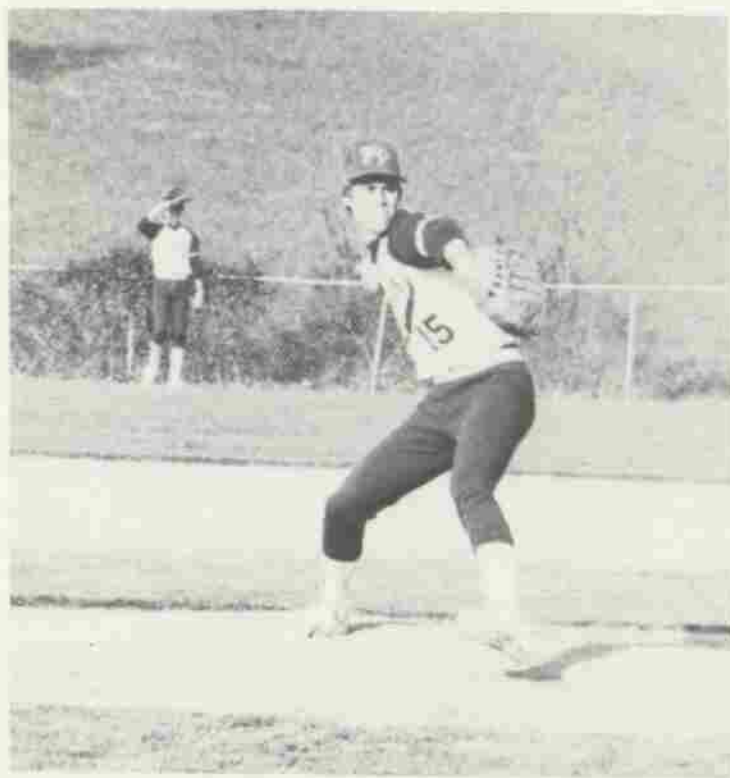

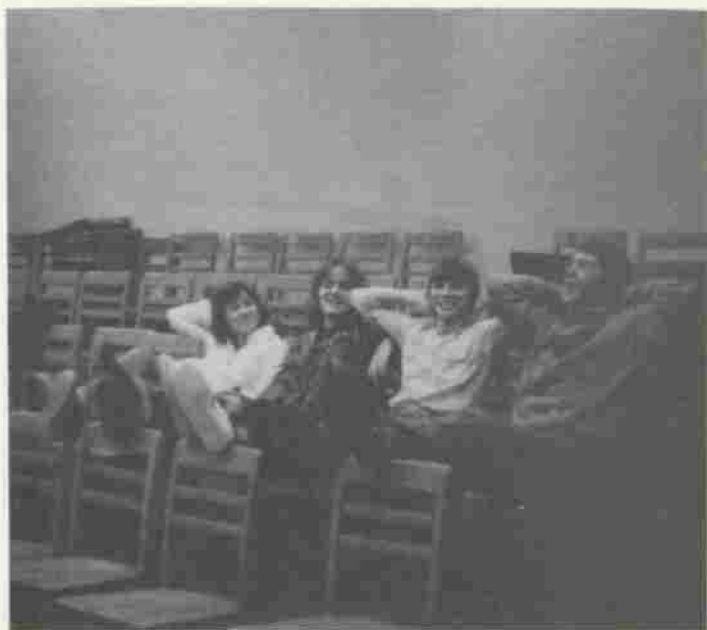
Sophs mark half way point
