

Movies such as Beverly Hills Cop, Breakfast Club, 2010, and Friday the 13th part 5 made their debut this year breaking many attendance and profit records.





It was a good year—so let's take a look at 1984-85. Here is the year in pictures.


















Dedication


Mr. Blessinger will be sadly missed by all Forest Park students and teachers.




















FFA has many accomplishments in '85

















Data classes learn to use computers






Business Dept. leaps into the computer age




Graphic arts Keeping the presses running












Tennis team shows promise









Young wrestlers gain experience















Lady Rangers capture second sectional title
