




This yearbook means a lot of things to a lot of different people, but to everyone it symbolizes the friendships and memories we encountered while we were students at FP.






### NaHoSo sets high standards

Mrs. Peggy Huff, All Star sponsor, said, "This year's








### Students learn by the numbers

### Learning the language










# German and Spanish are offered

## Journalism learns responsibility



#### Art classes experience new things








## Graphics uses skills to do printing

# Industrial arts prepares students for the future


















## Rangers tie for Blue Chip Conf. title








## Golfers win 4; Todd goes to regional






