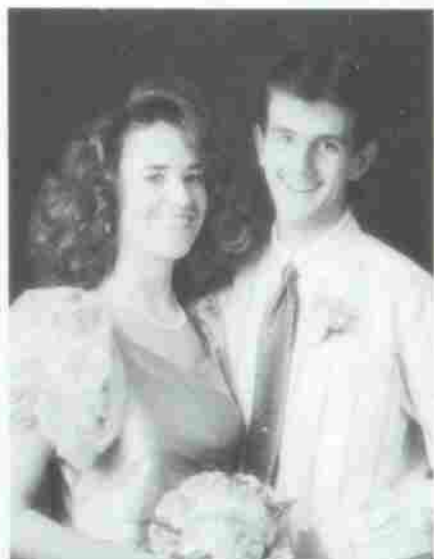

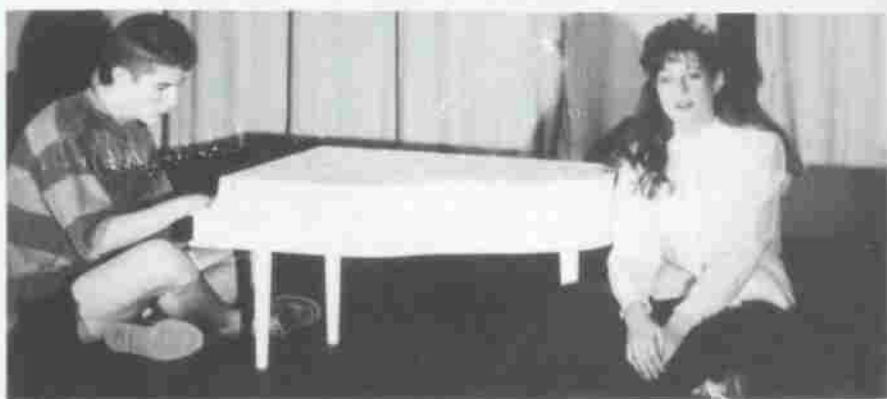
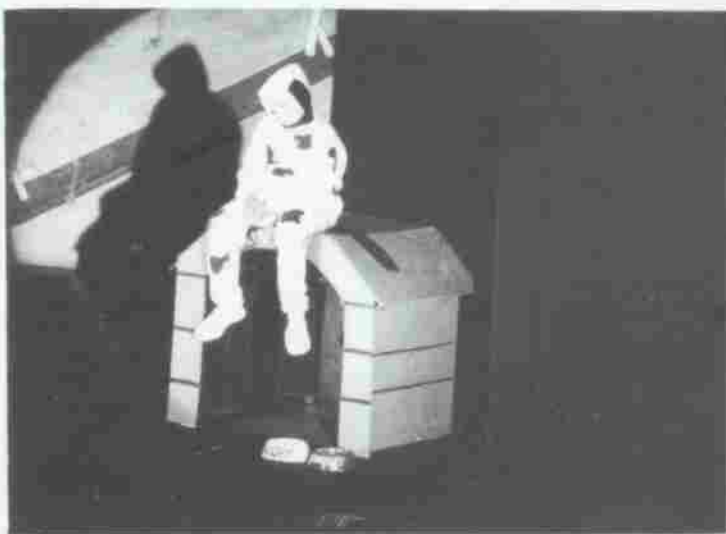


FP students present *Charlie Brown*

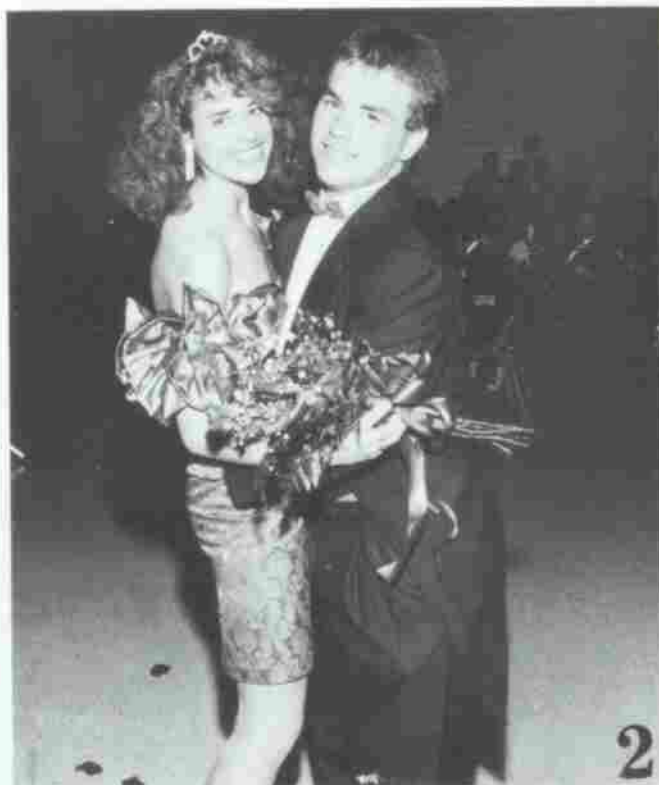


"High Enough" is Prom theme

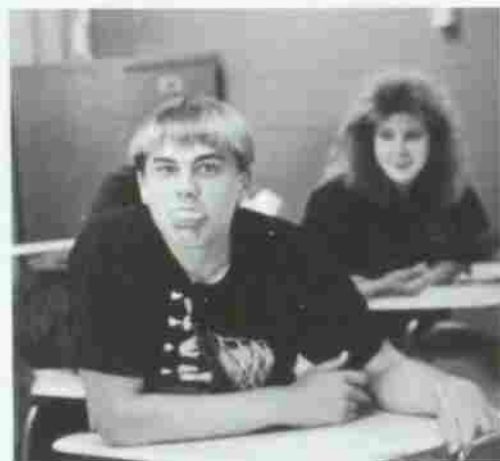

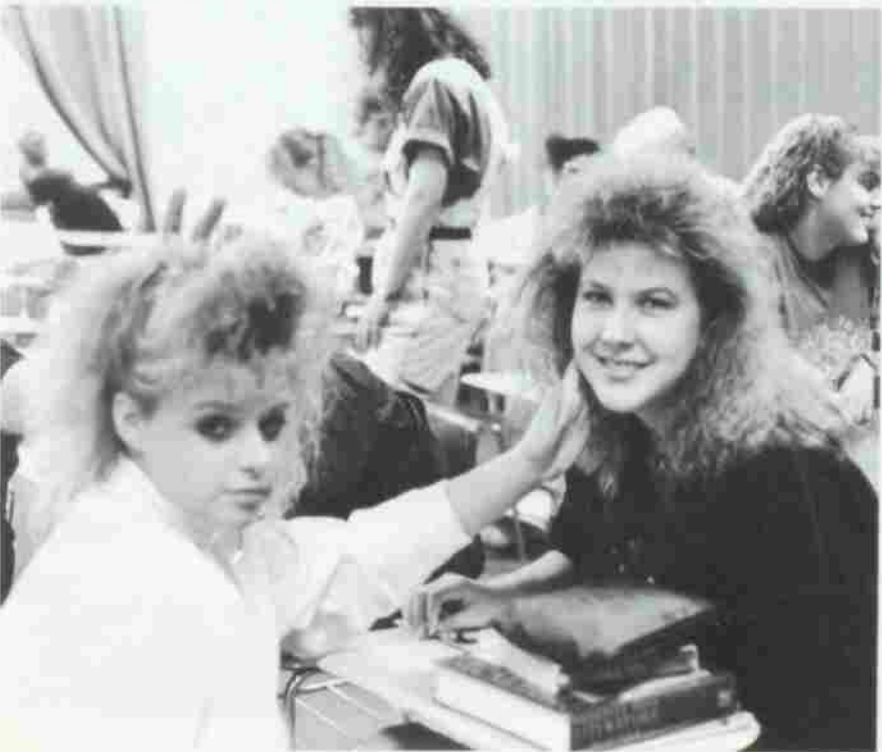


English department emphasizes writing

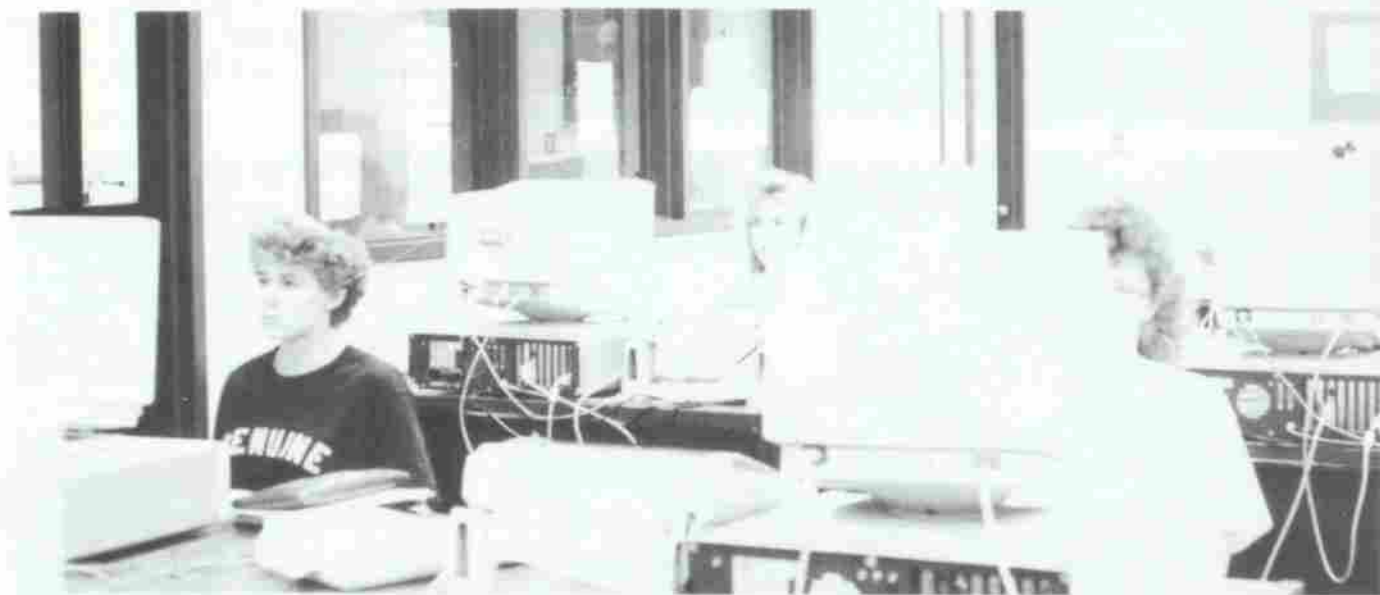

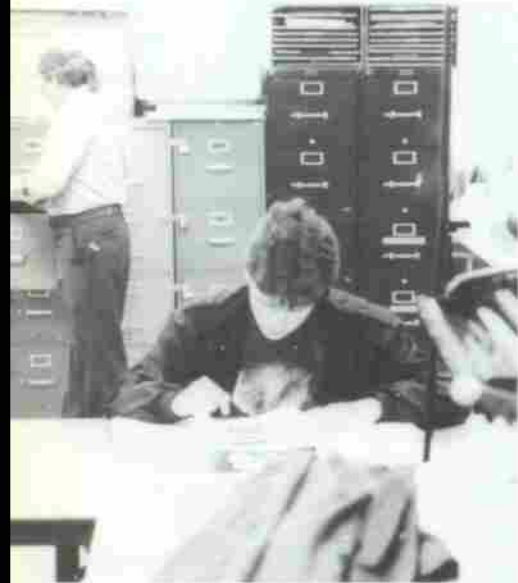


Japanese teacher makes a visit to Forest Park

Students in the graphic arts classes learned about the many aspects of the science and the industry of printing. The classes were taught by Mr. Steve Stoffel.



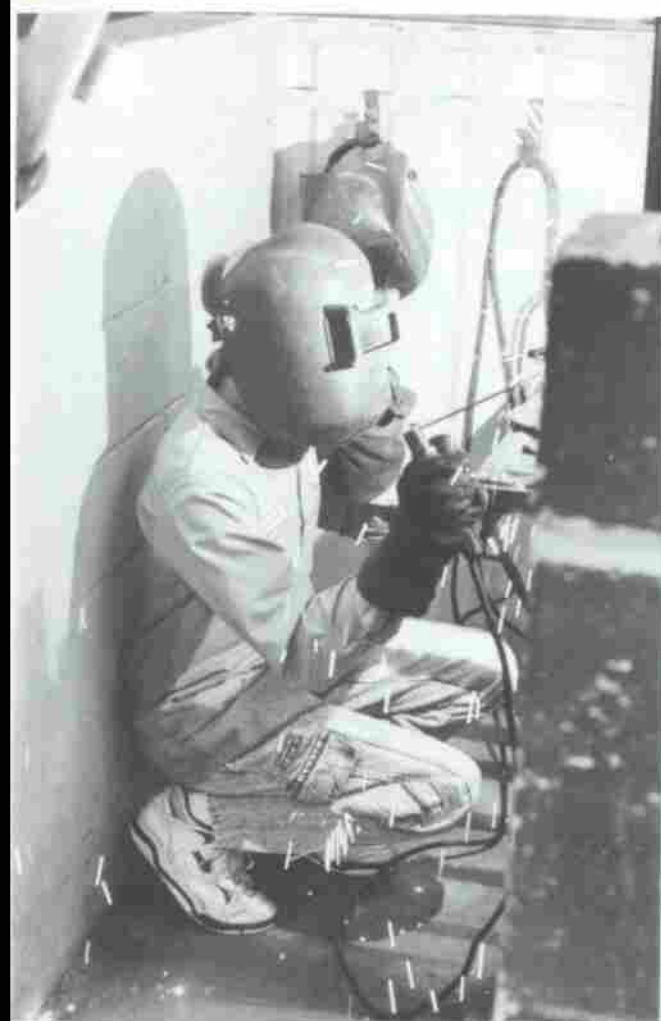

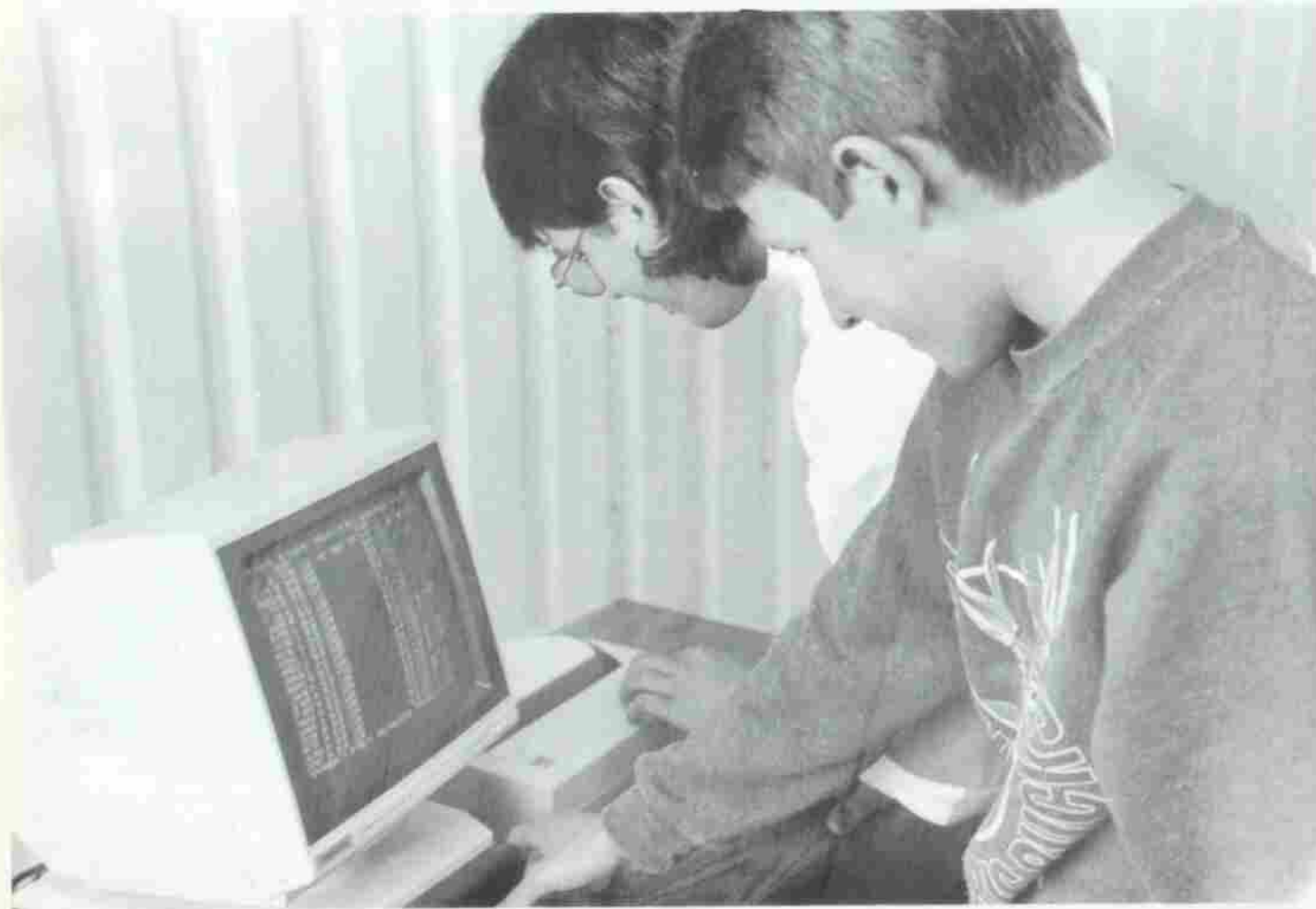
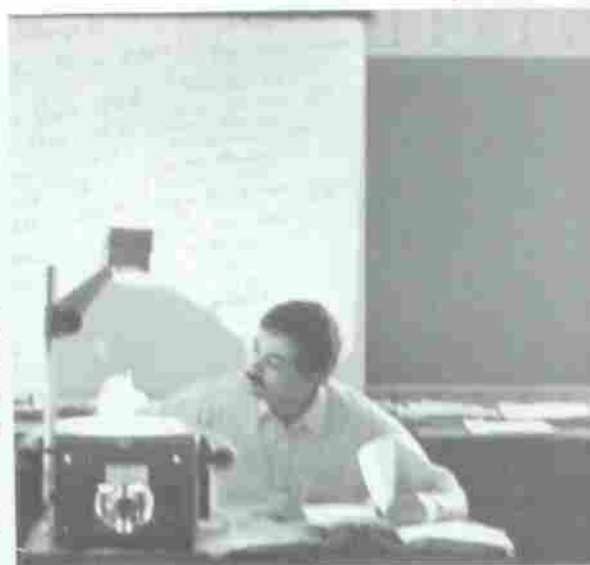

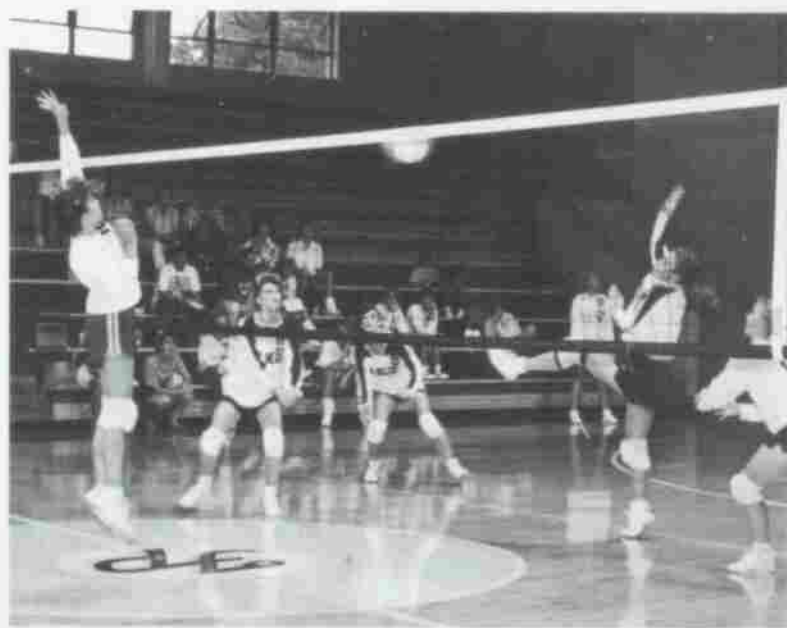

Lady Rangers Post a 15-4 Season

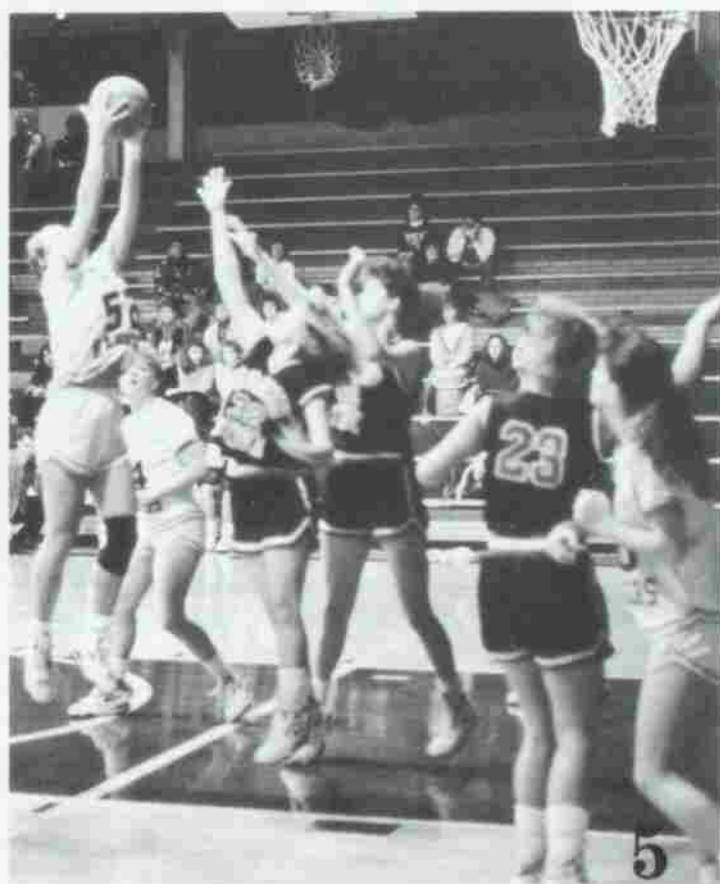

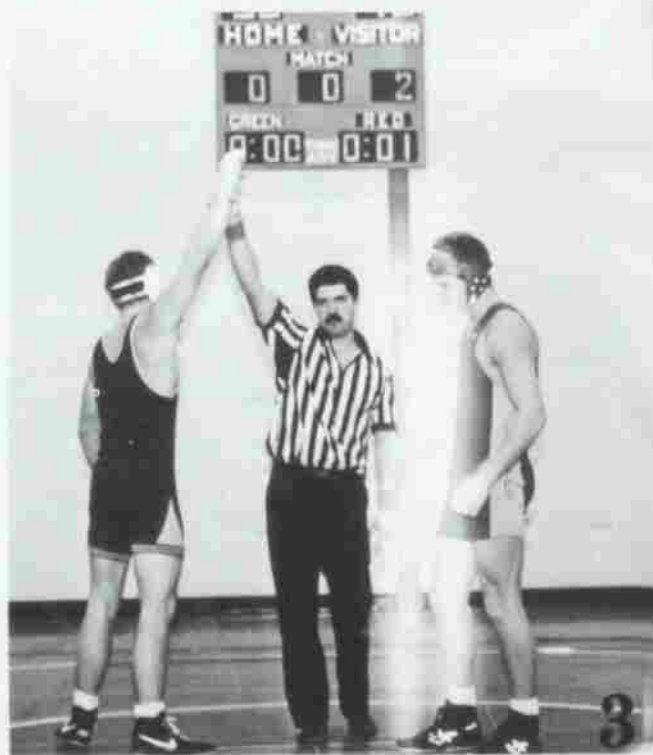
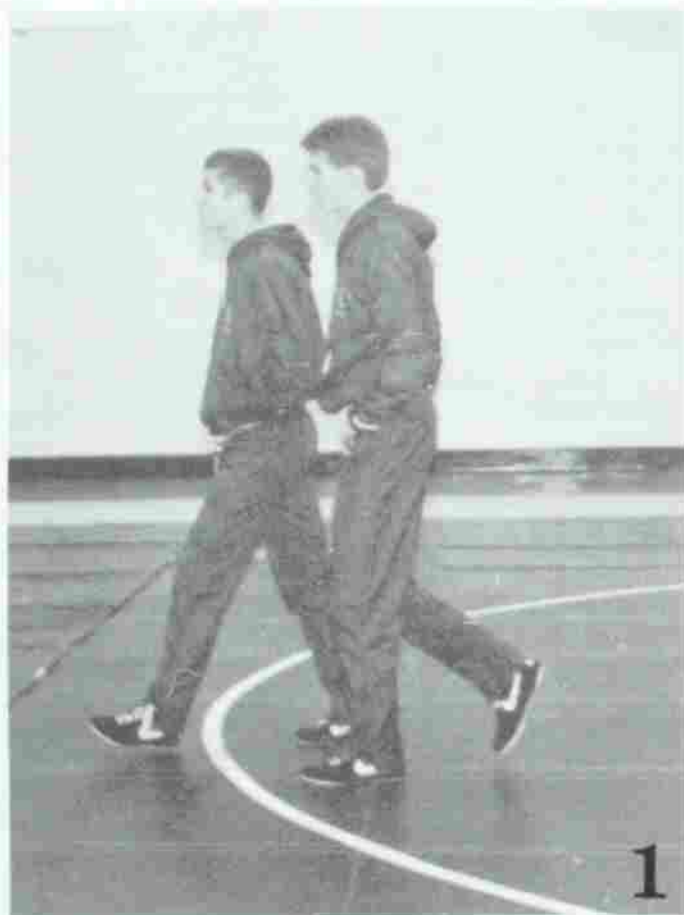
The Forest Park wrestling team ended their season with a 7-20 record.

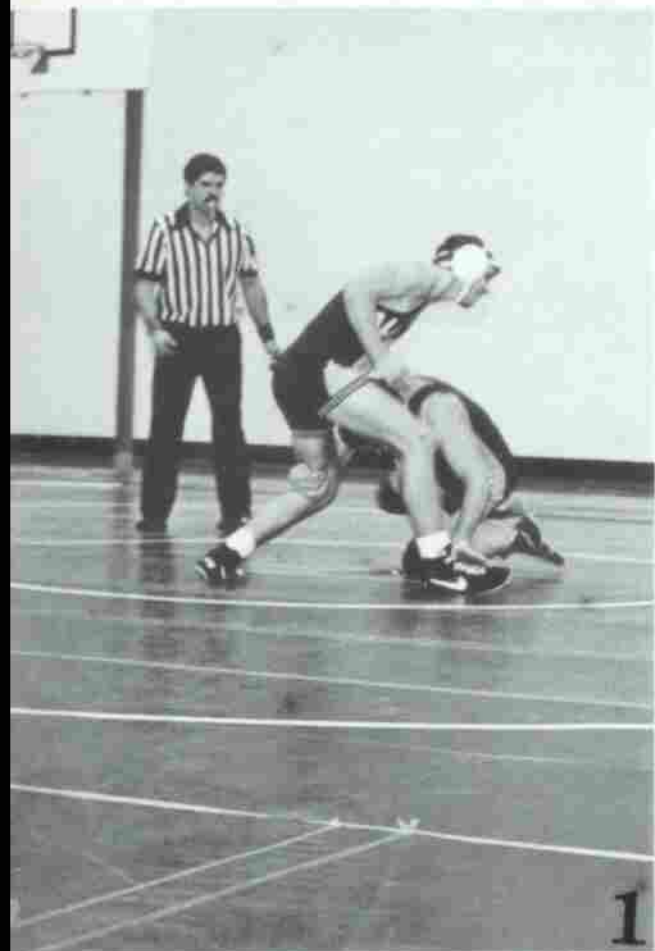

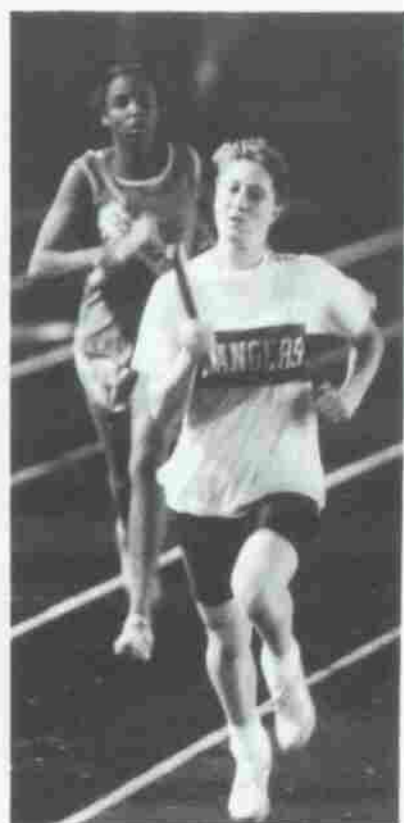

The biggest news of the 1991 girls' track season was that junior Jodi Burger qualified for the state finals in the 200m dash.

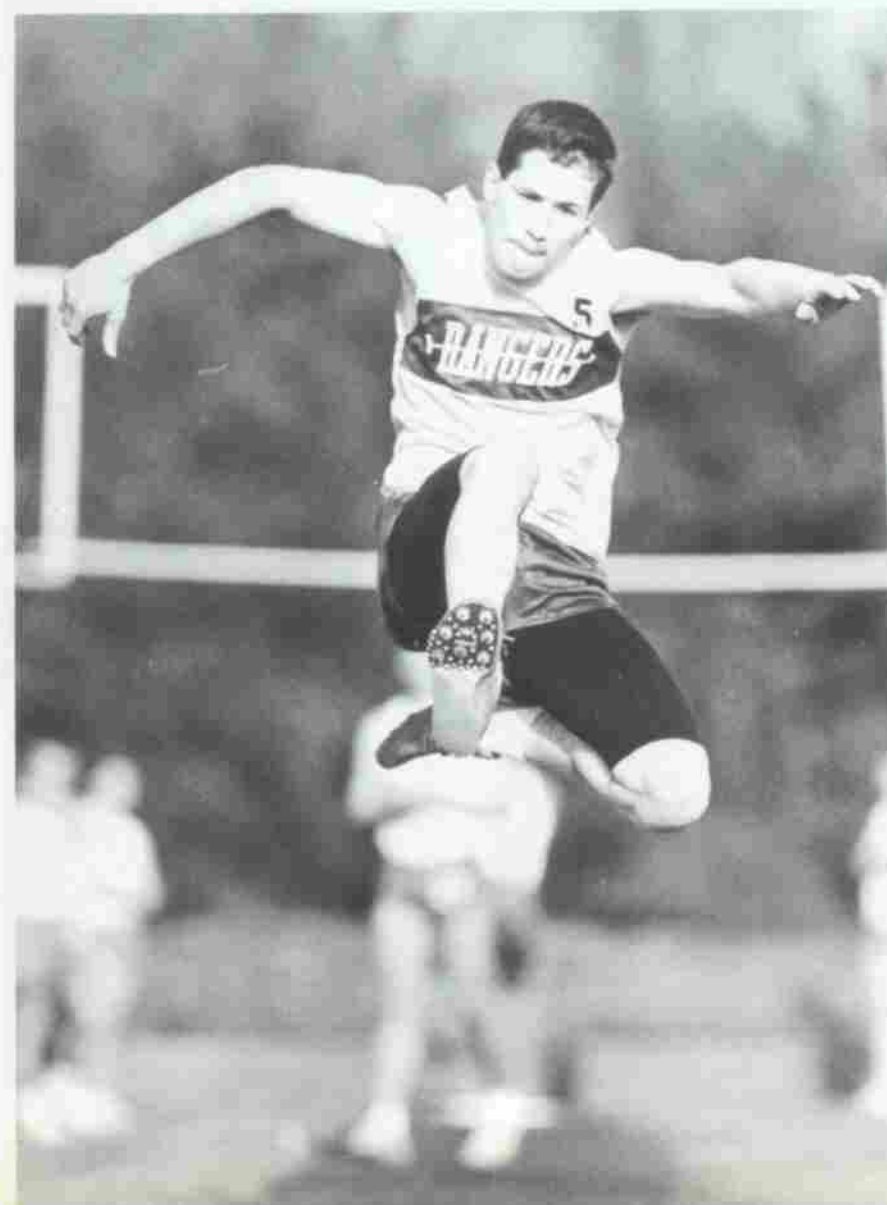
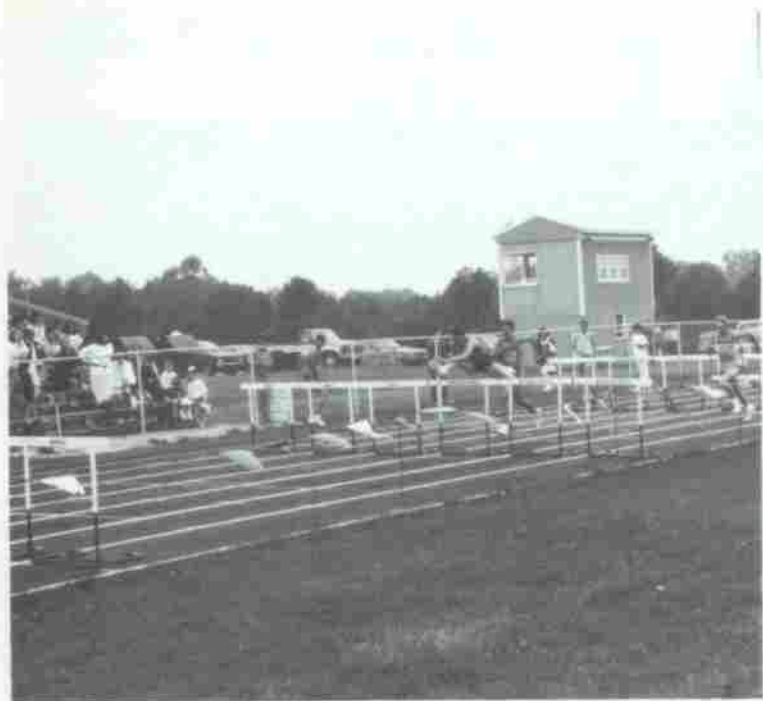
