
In this yearbook we, as the editors, have tried to capture some great events. These events have helped to create new memories for some people.






## Freshman team has plenty of manpower, talent, and enthusiasm



## Boys end season with 18 wins








#### Cheerleaders promote spirit









## Baseball team plays tough schedule






#### JV baseball team has a very good year

#### Boys have an exceptional year














## All Stars give presentations to kids

### Academic Team does well at contests










# Health and fitness lead to a happy life





## Students learn homemaking skills




