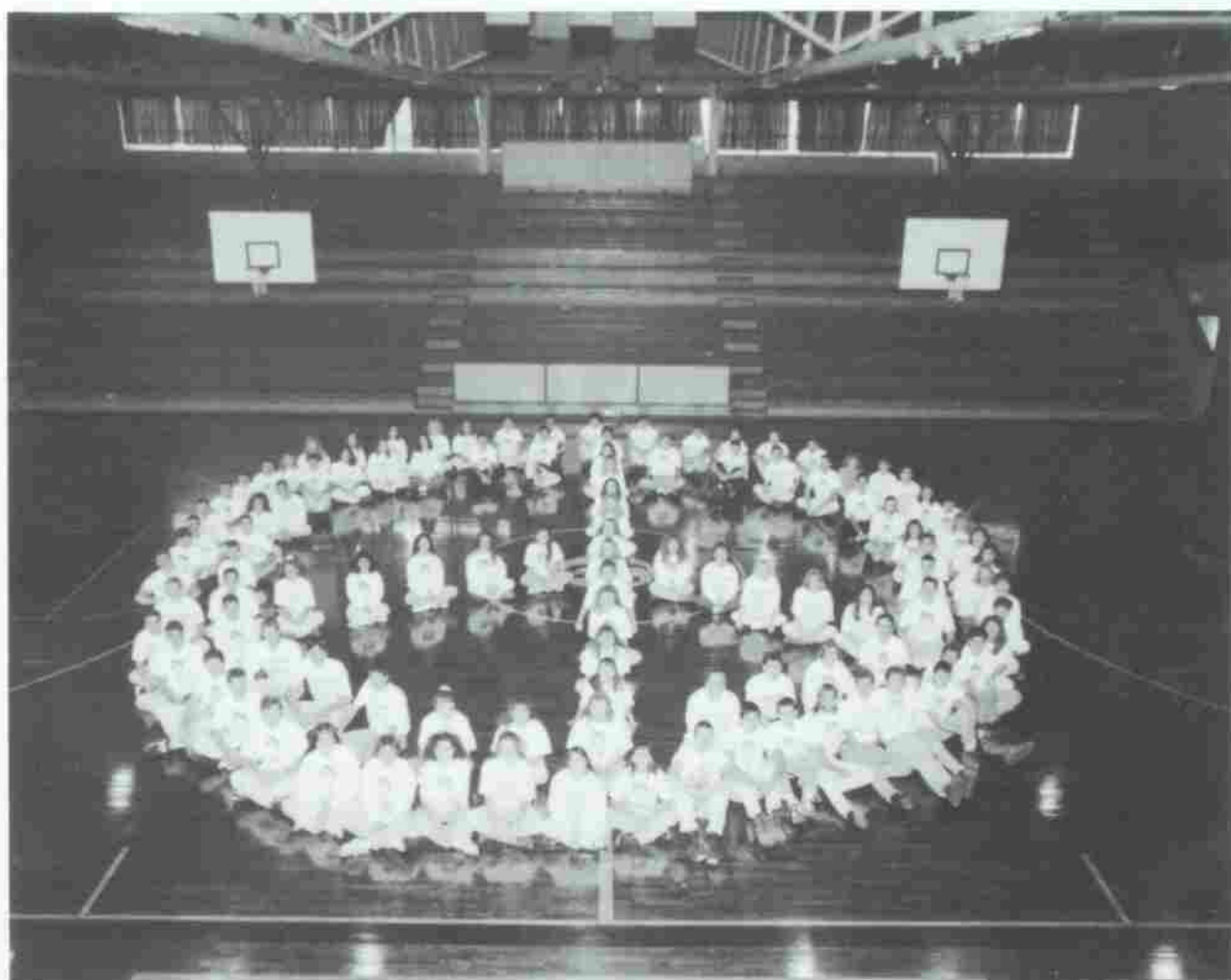

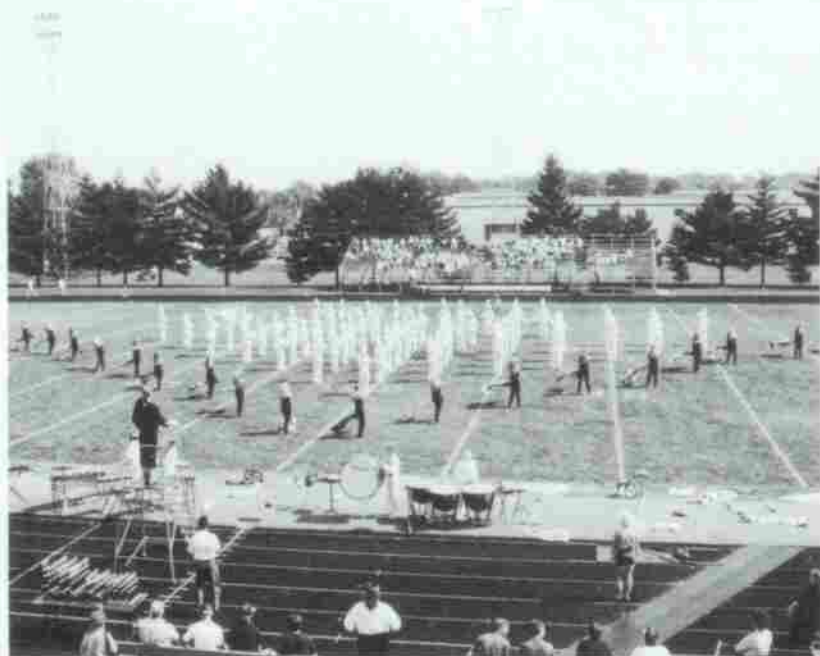
The band marches to the music

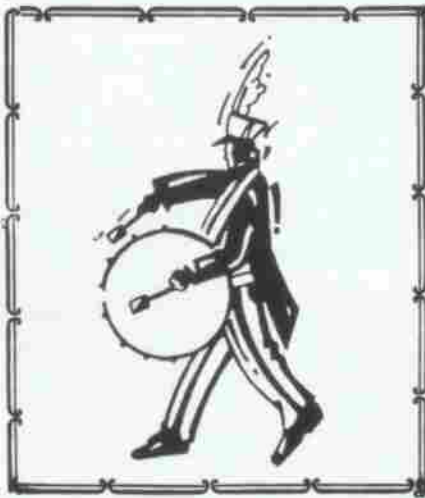

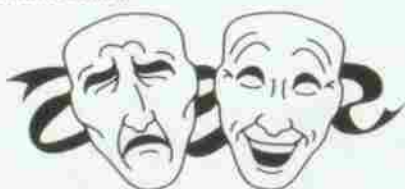

Chorus gets a standing ovation

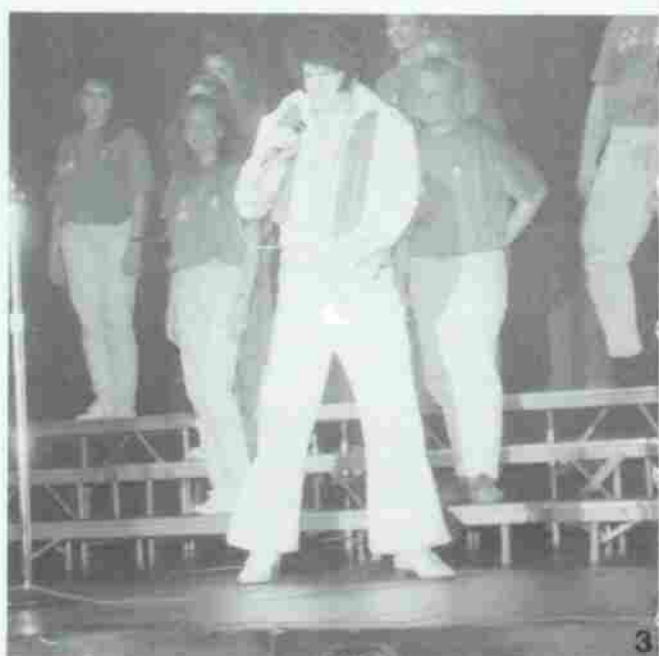

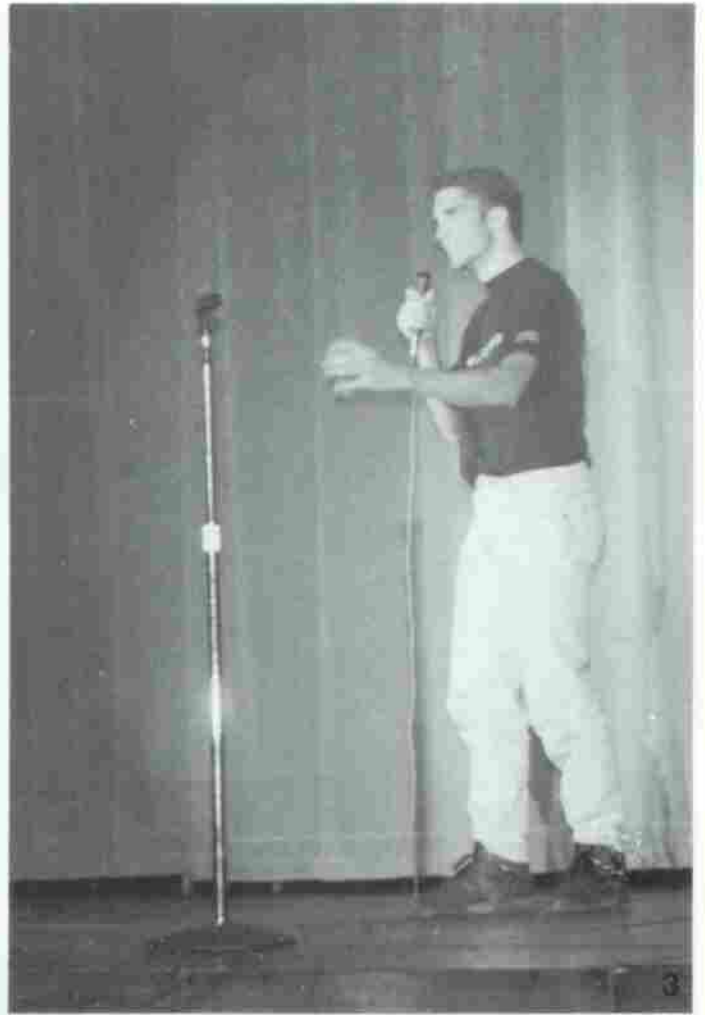

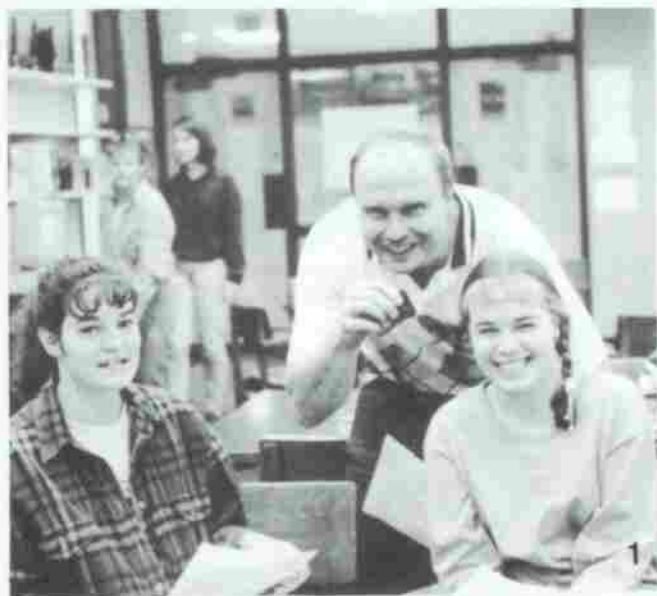
Placing second at state was the science team of Lisa Welp, Chris Welp, and Ken Fischer.

The All Stars try out new activities

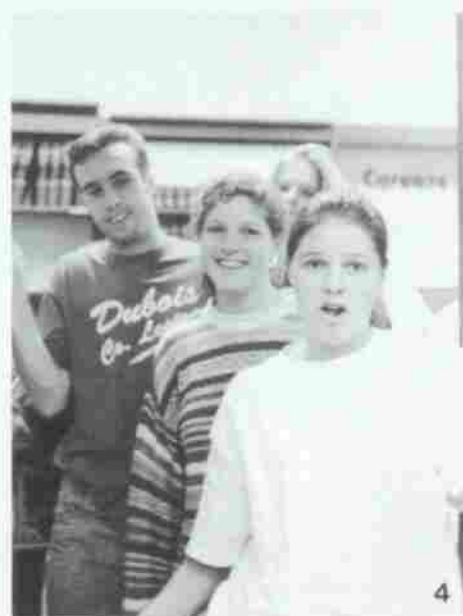
The All Stars did it again! Once again they had an outstanding year with plenty of activities.

Every student in the high school is able to help the environmental cause in their own way. Paper recycling boxes are placed in each classroom for easy access.

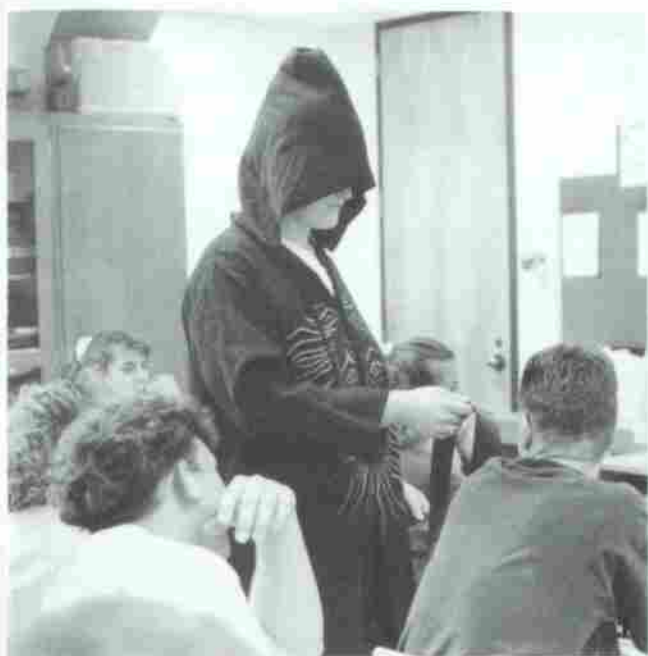

OM teams show a new twist

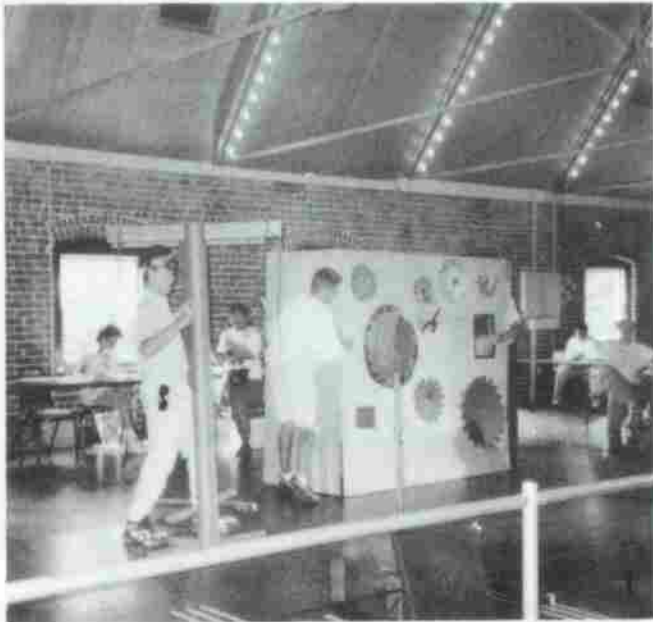
Two Odyssey of the Mind teams competed this year on the state level and one continued to world competition.

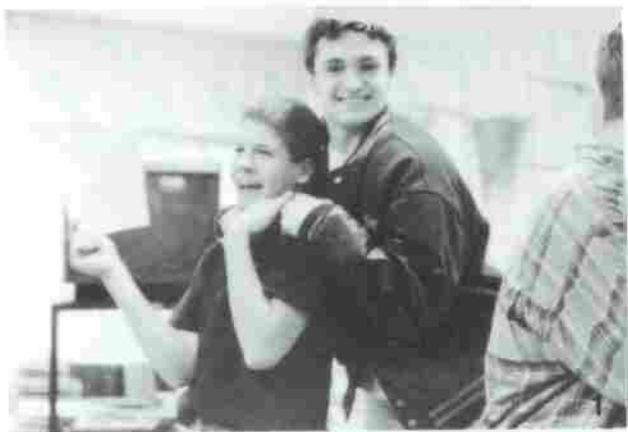
FP's chapter was one of the national Superior Chapter Award winners, and they were an Indiana Star Chapter, which means they were in the top 30 out of 218 chapters.

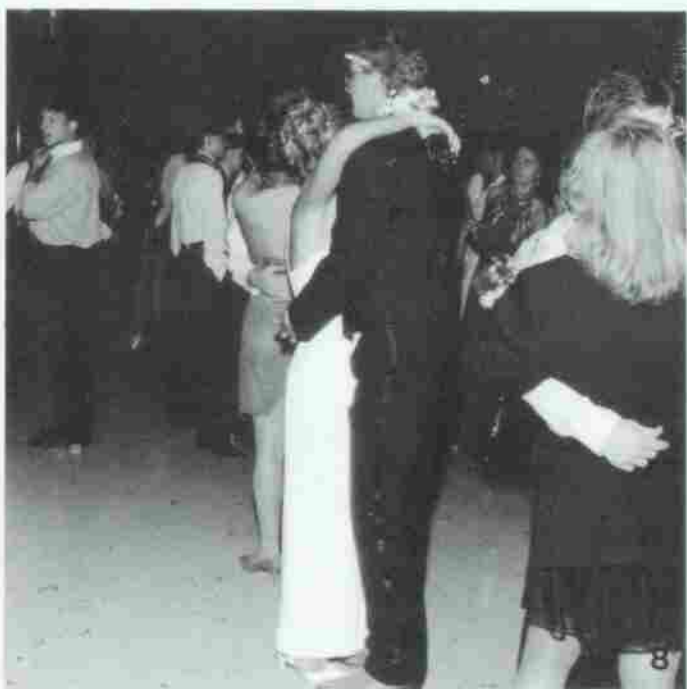

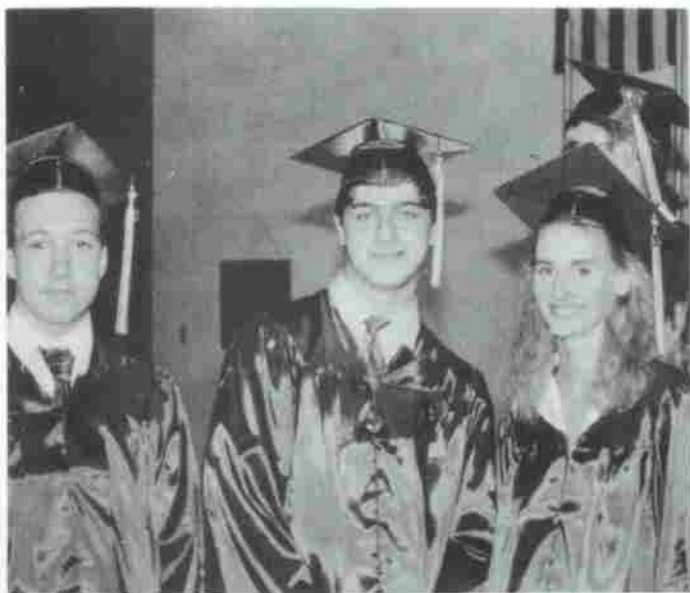

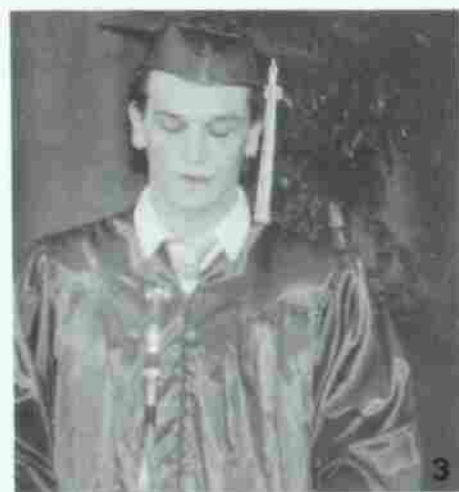
After several scholarships were presented, the chorus sang "Letting Go." Then Salutatorian Nathan Brames and Valedictorian Ken Fischer gave their speeches.

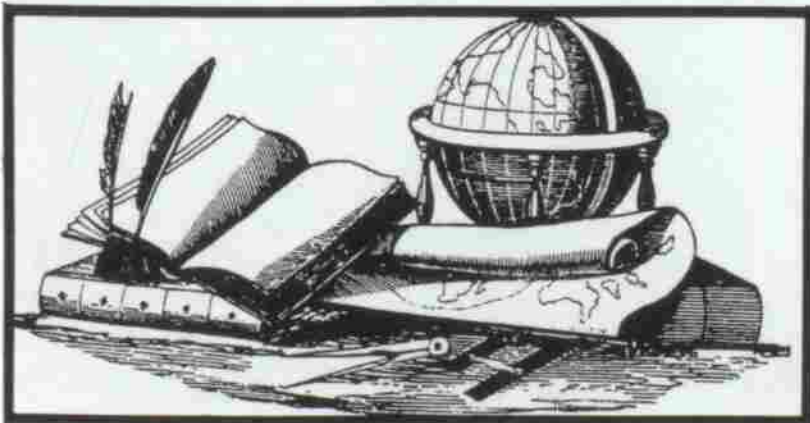

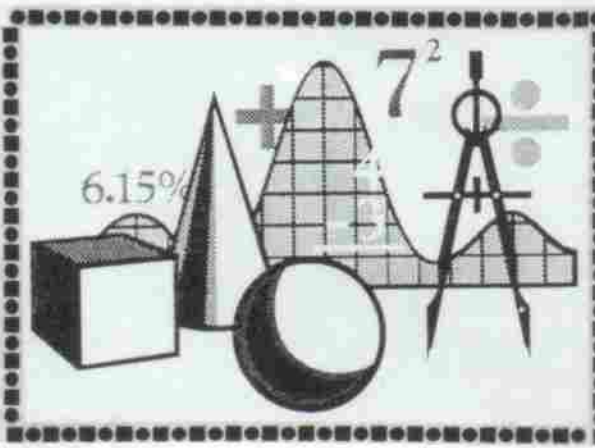
write essays, term papers, poems and other works. This year portfolios are kept of the students' work, and they will add to them throughout school.

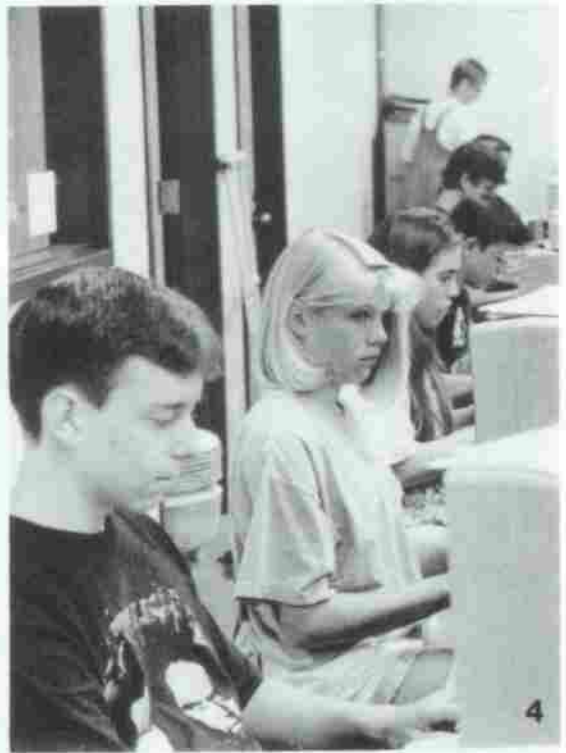
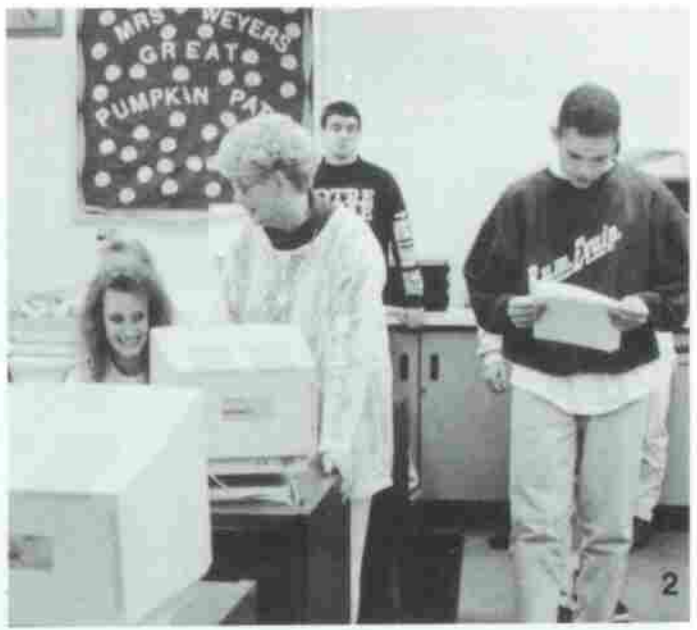
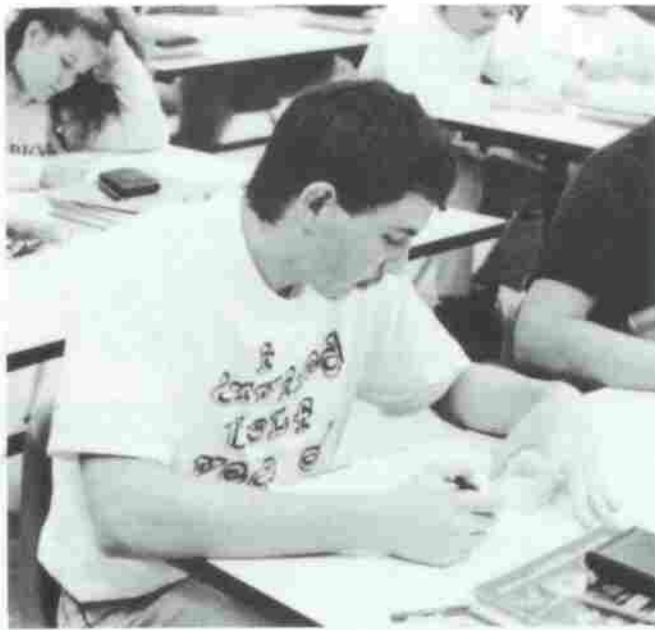

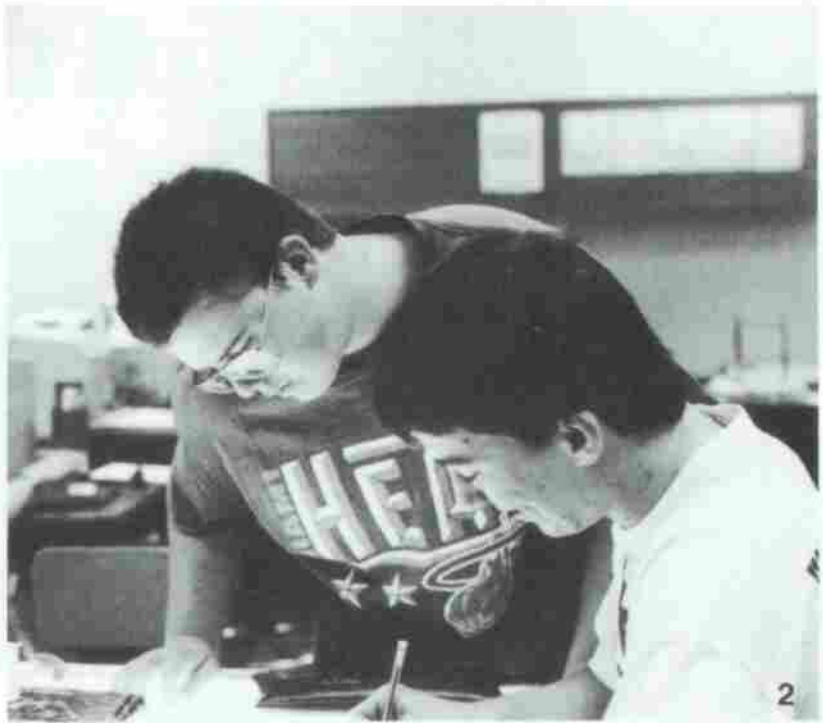

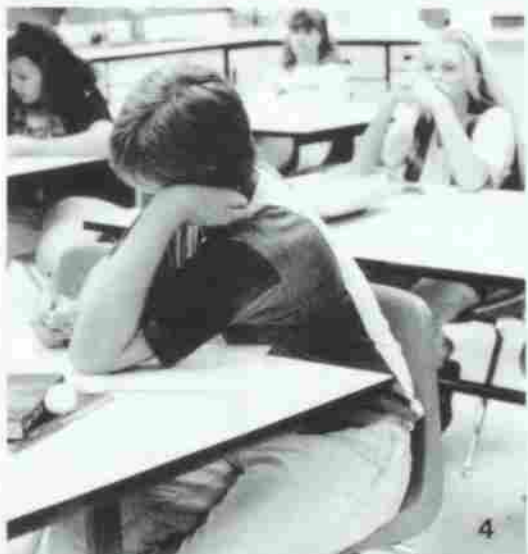


Ag plants for the future

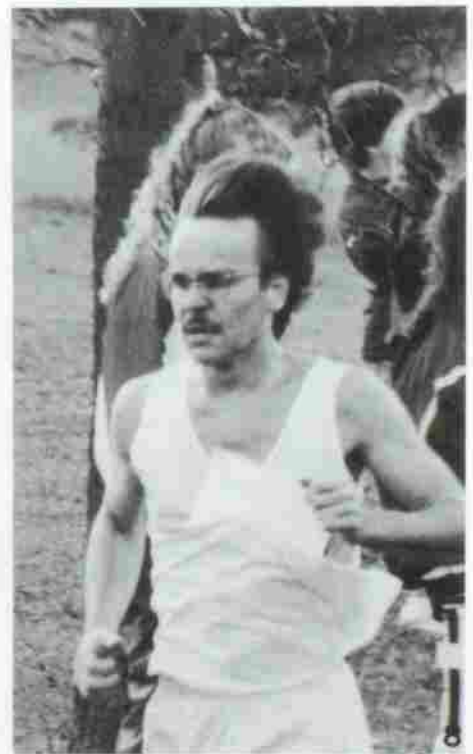
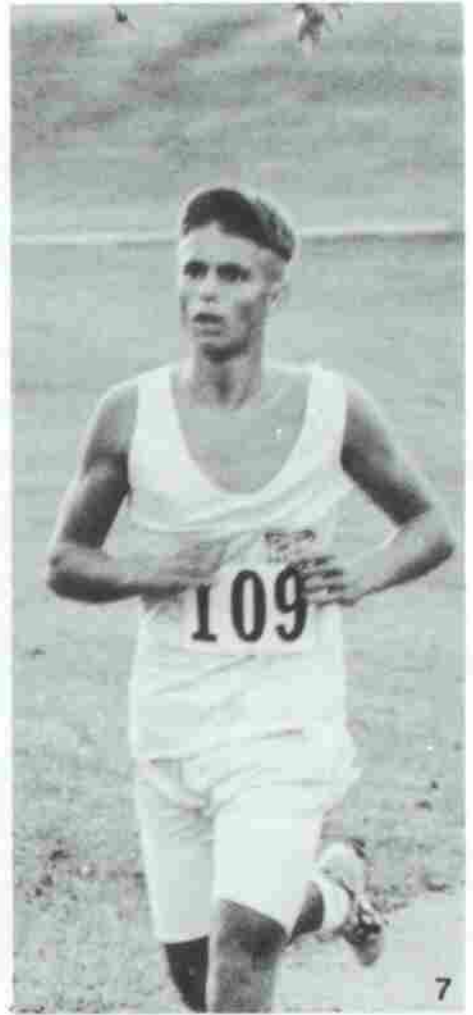
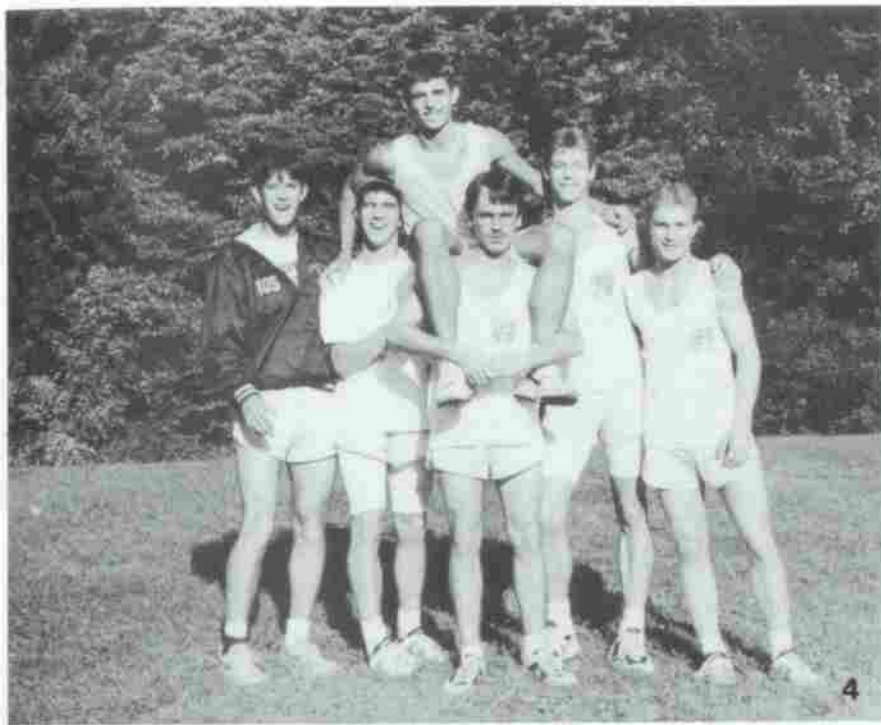
Boys' cross country wins sectional

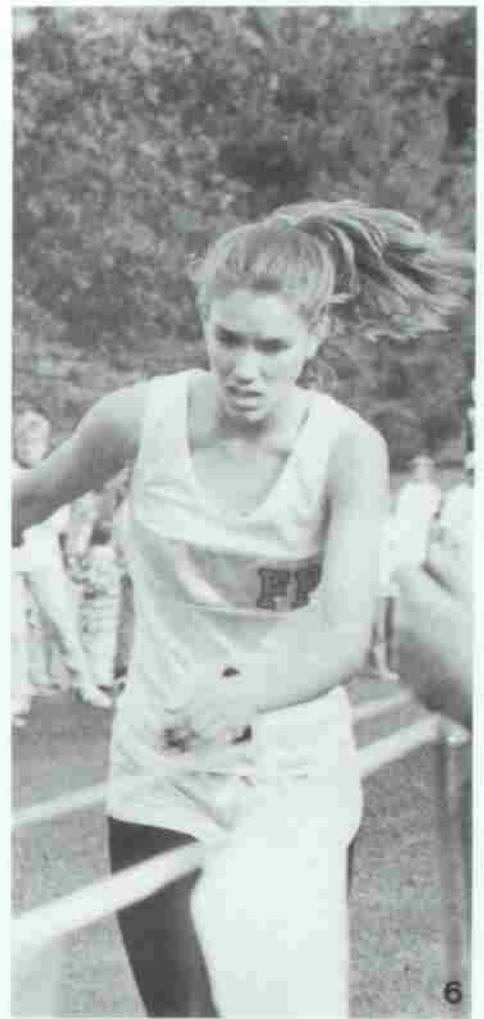
Girls' cross country finishes strong



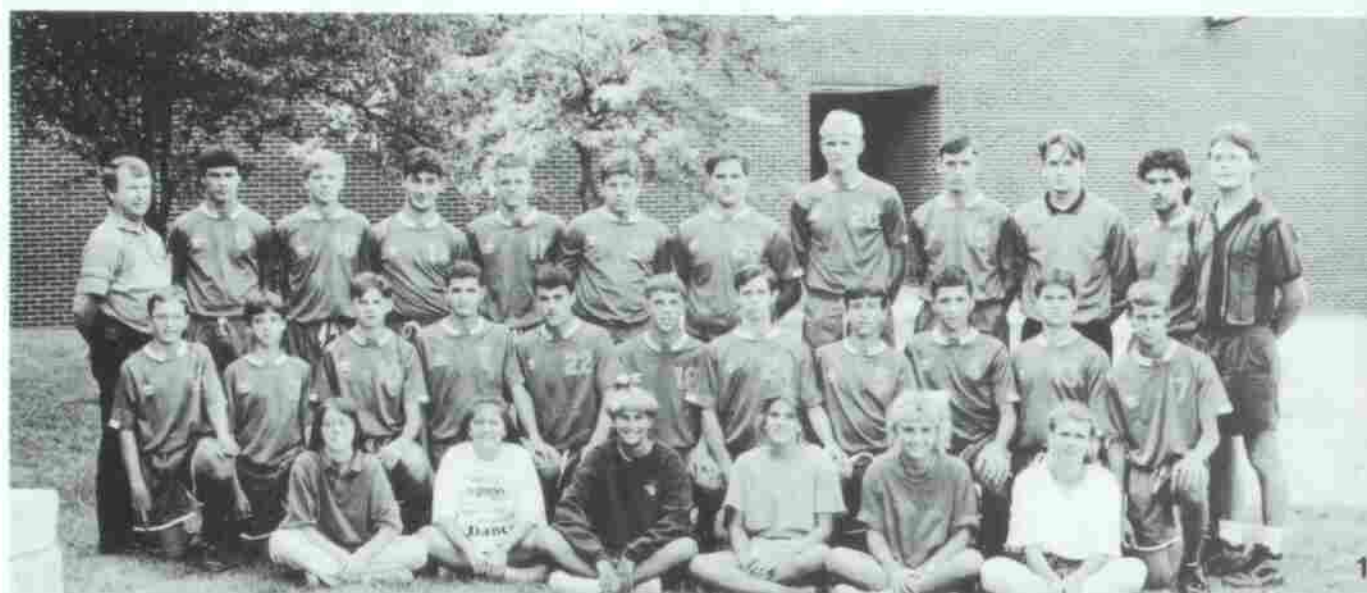

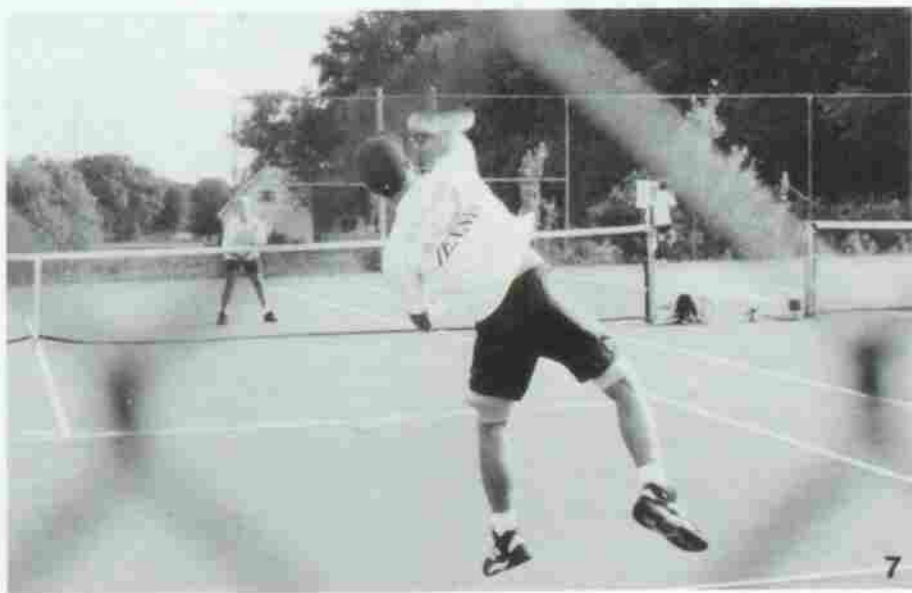
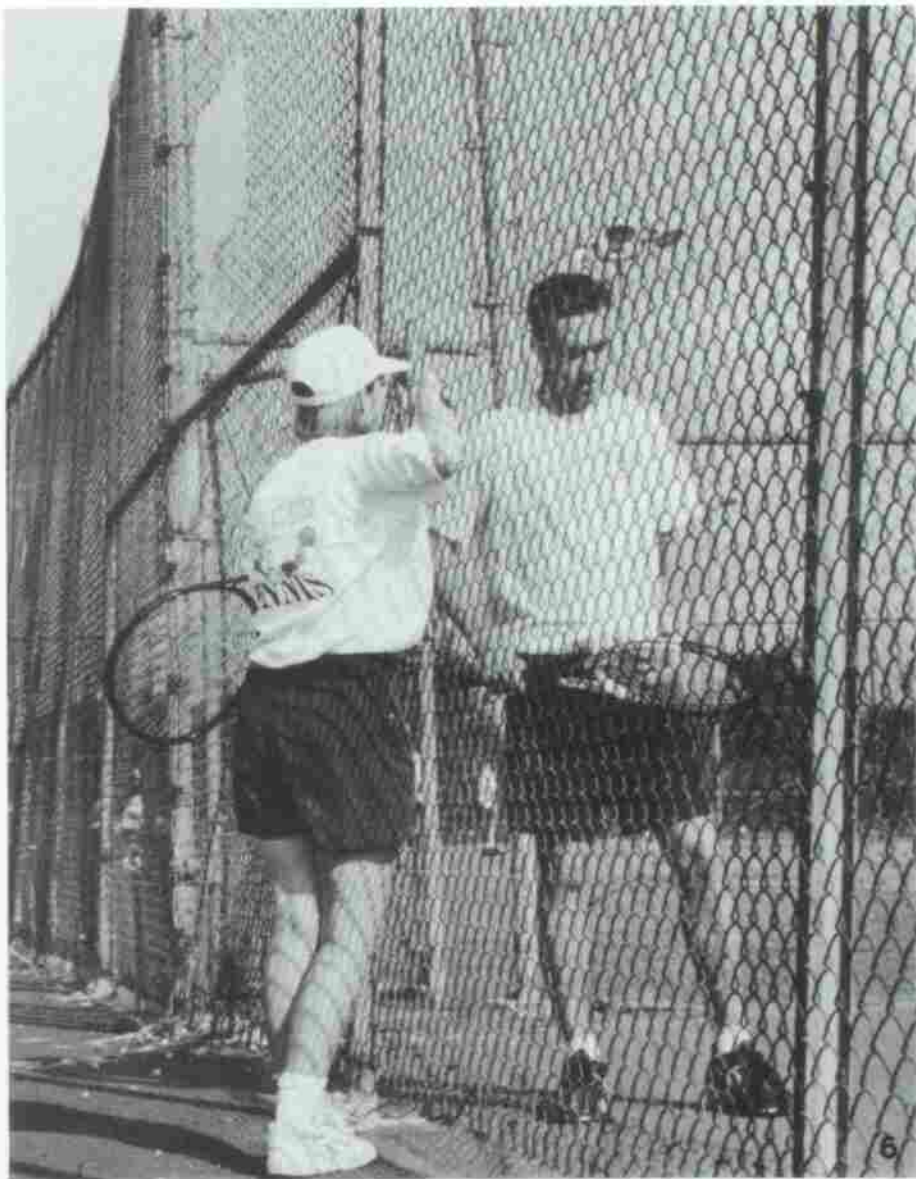
FP tennis team has an impressive season

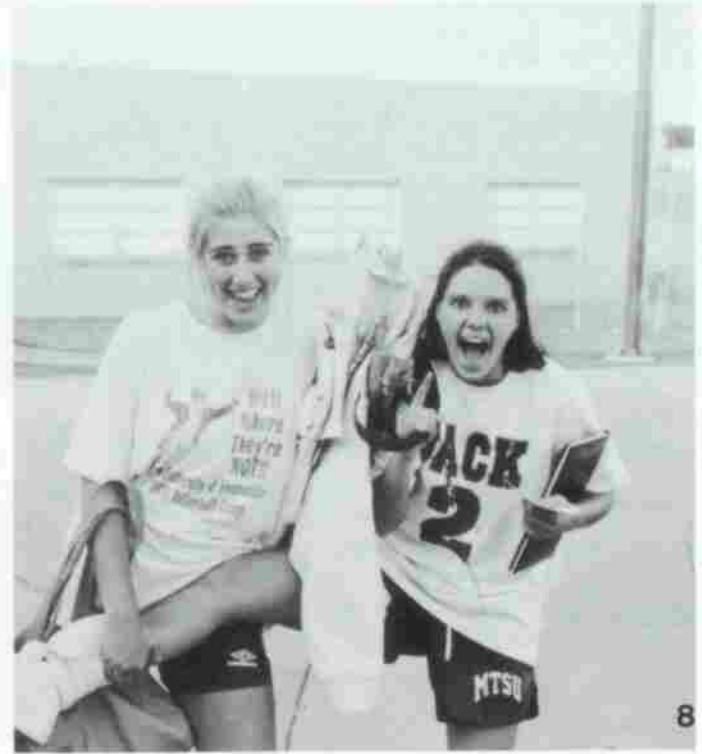
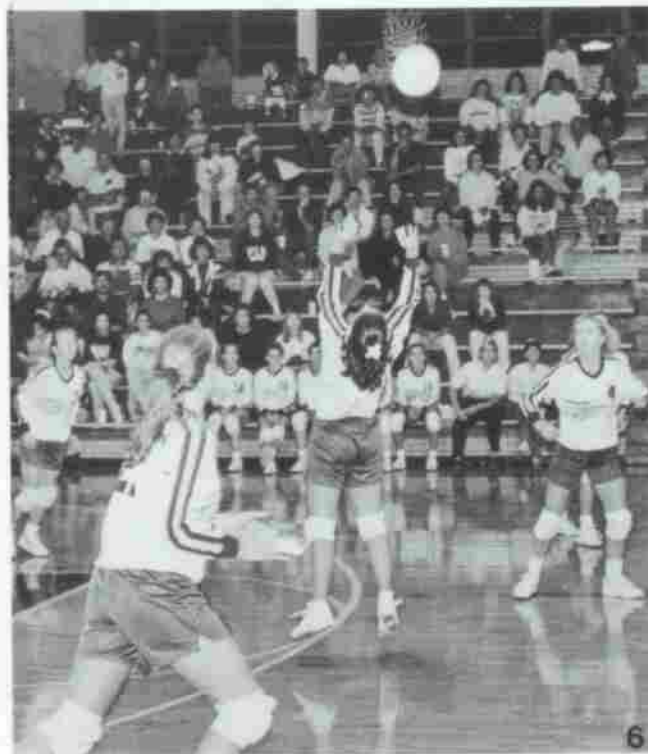
Volleyball team ties for first in Blue-Chip

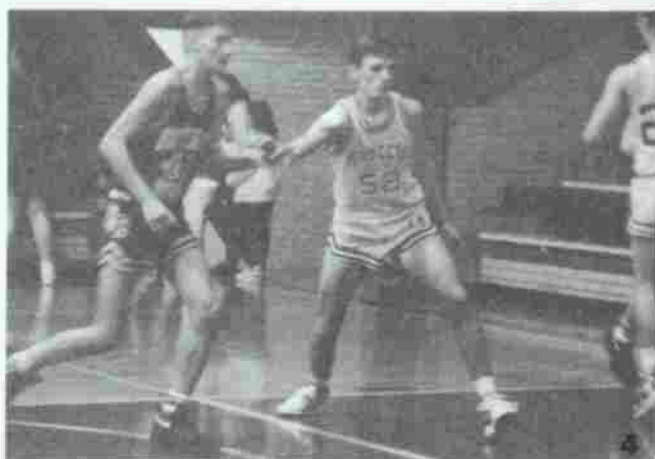

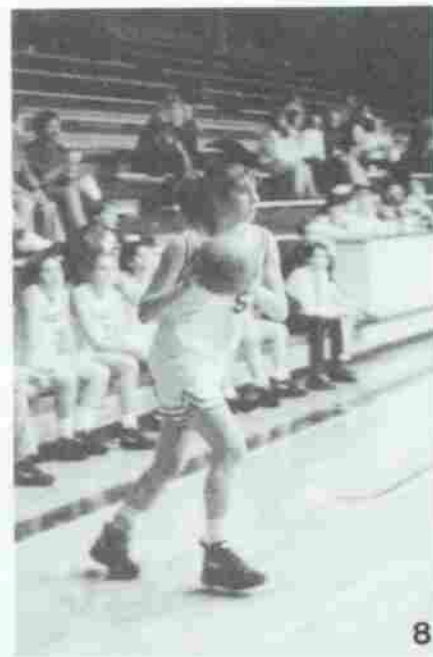

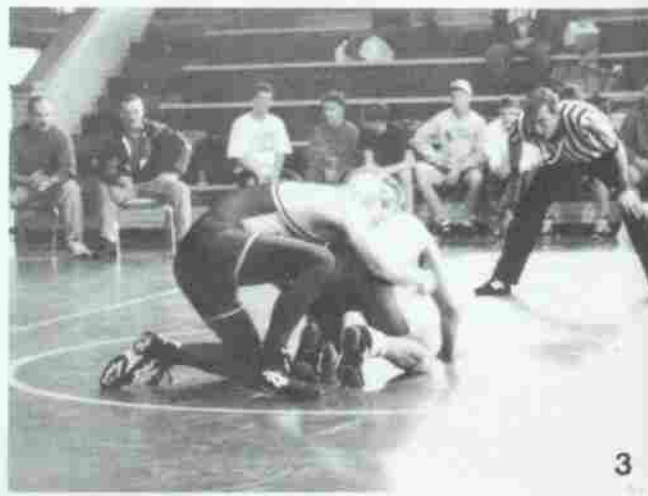
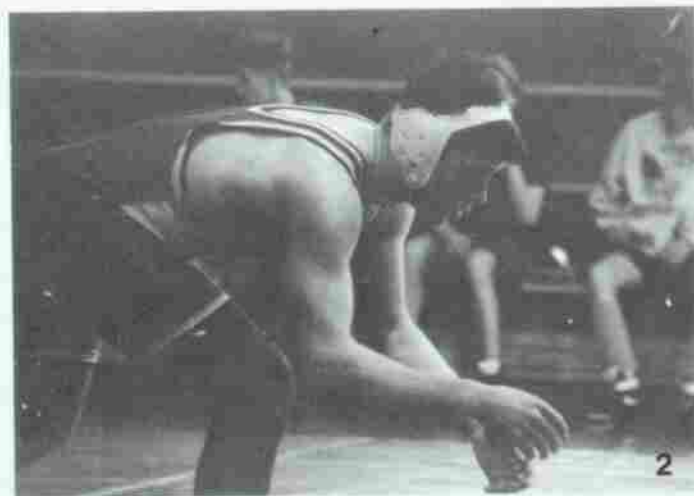
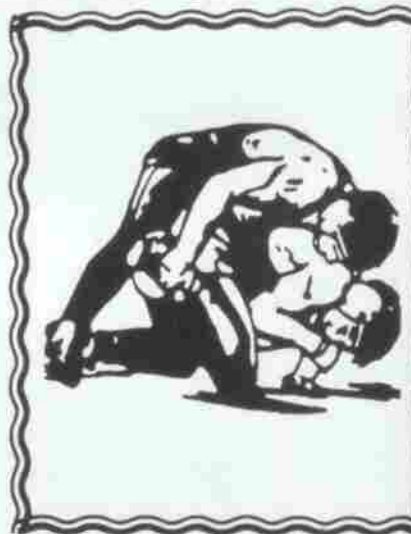


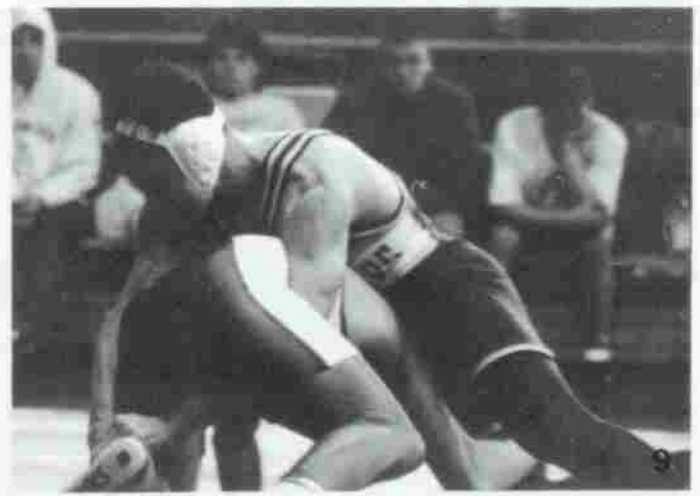
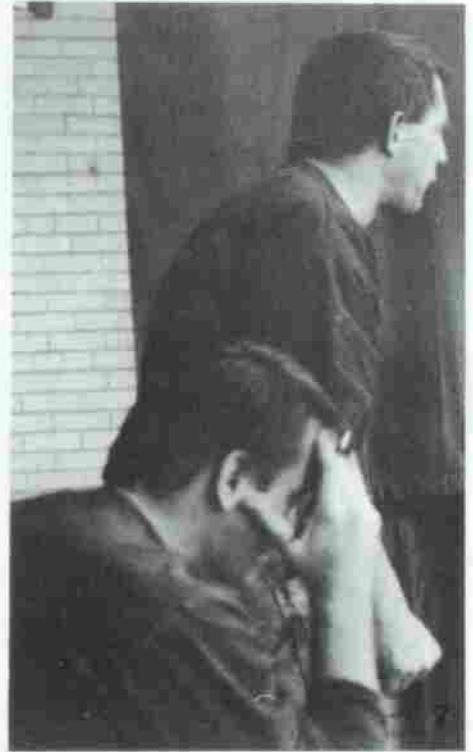
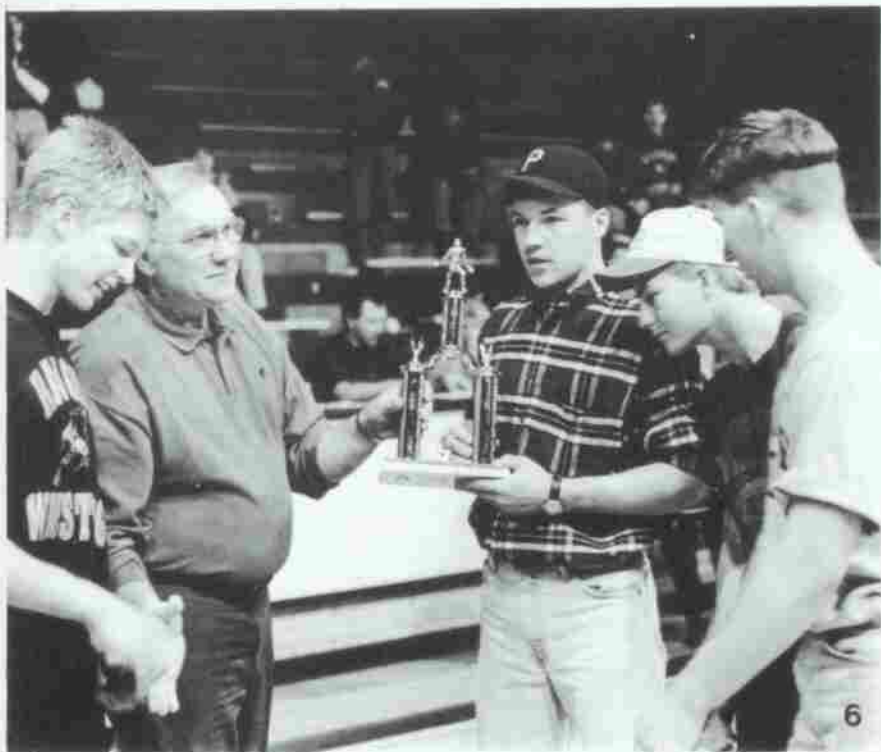
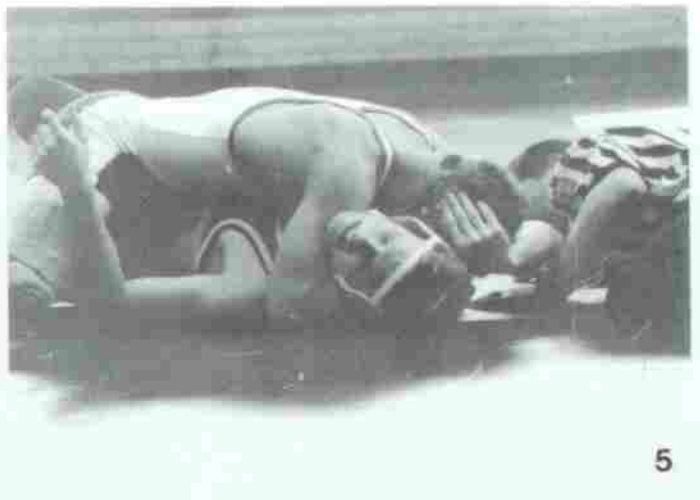
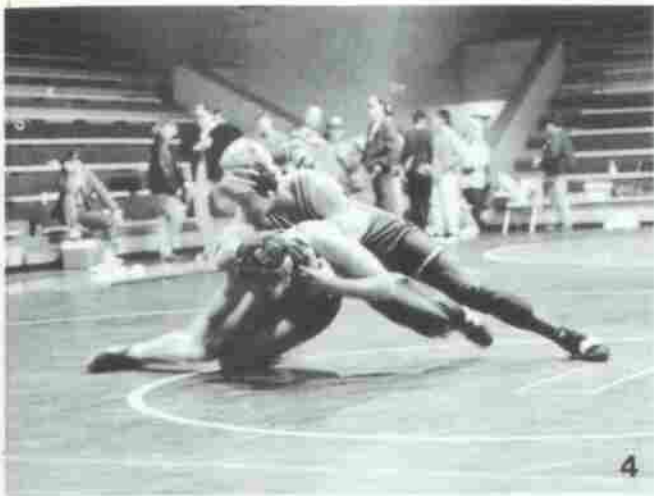
Wrestlers advance four to semi-state

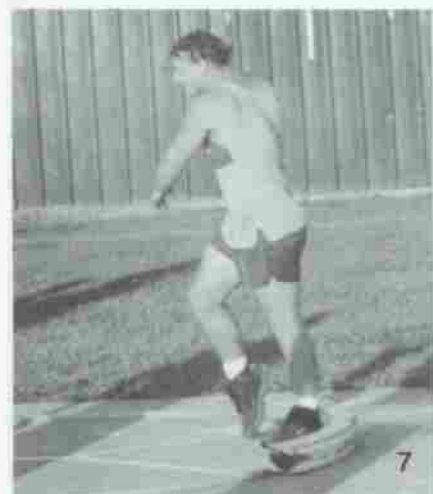




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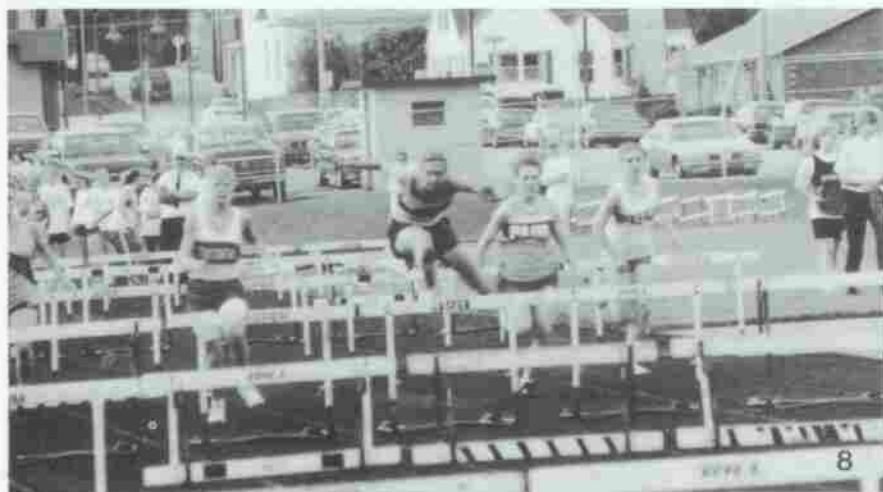

Golf team has impressive season

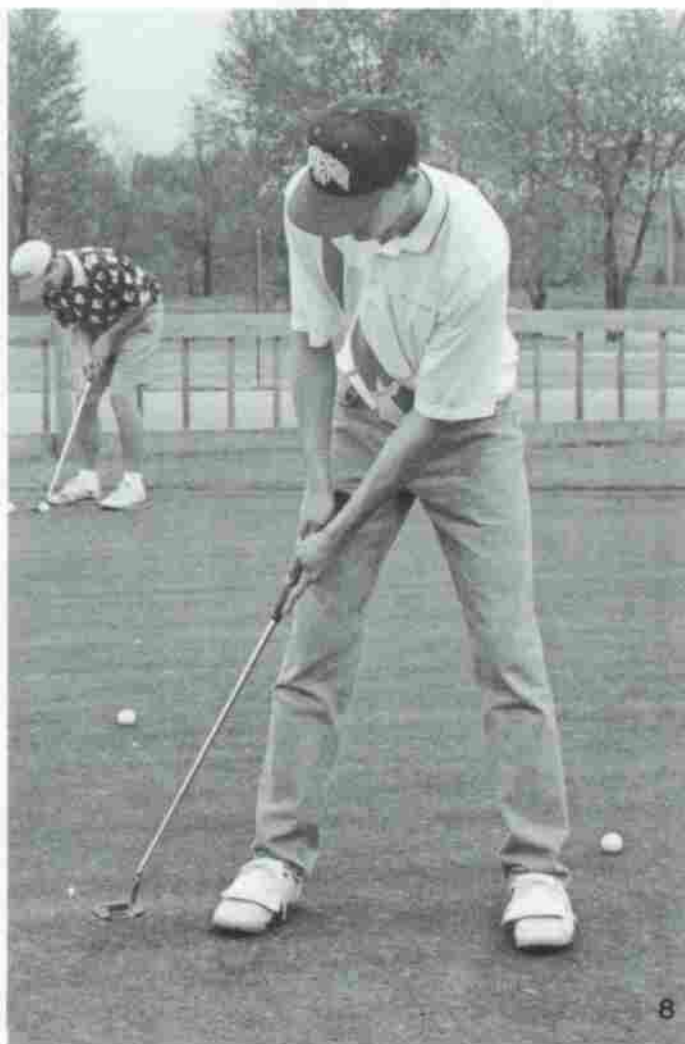

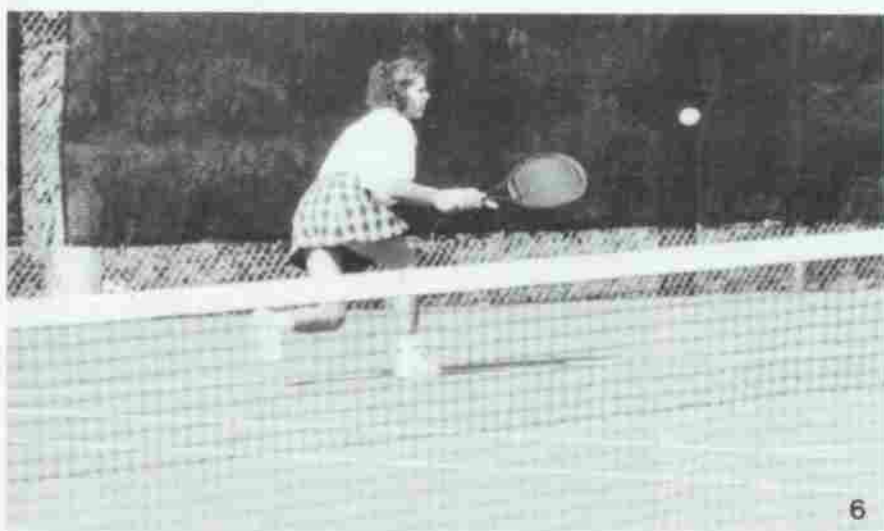

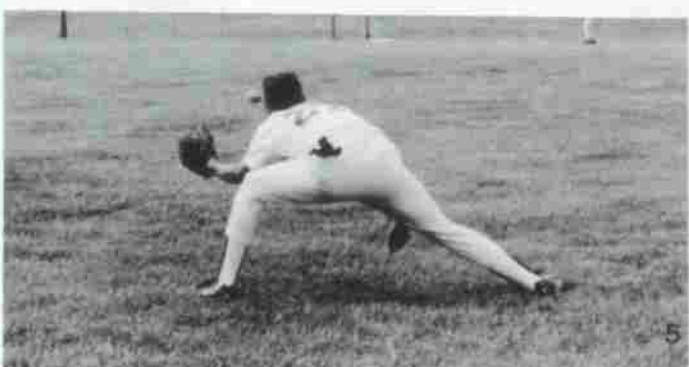
JV team wins 14 out of 20 games

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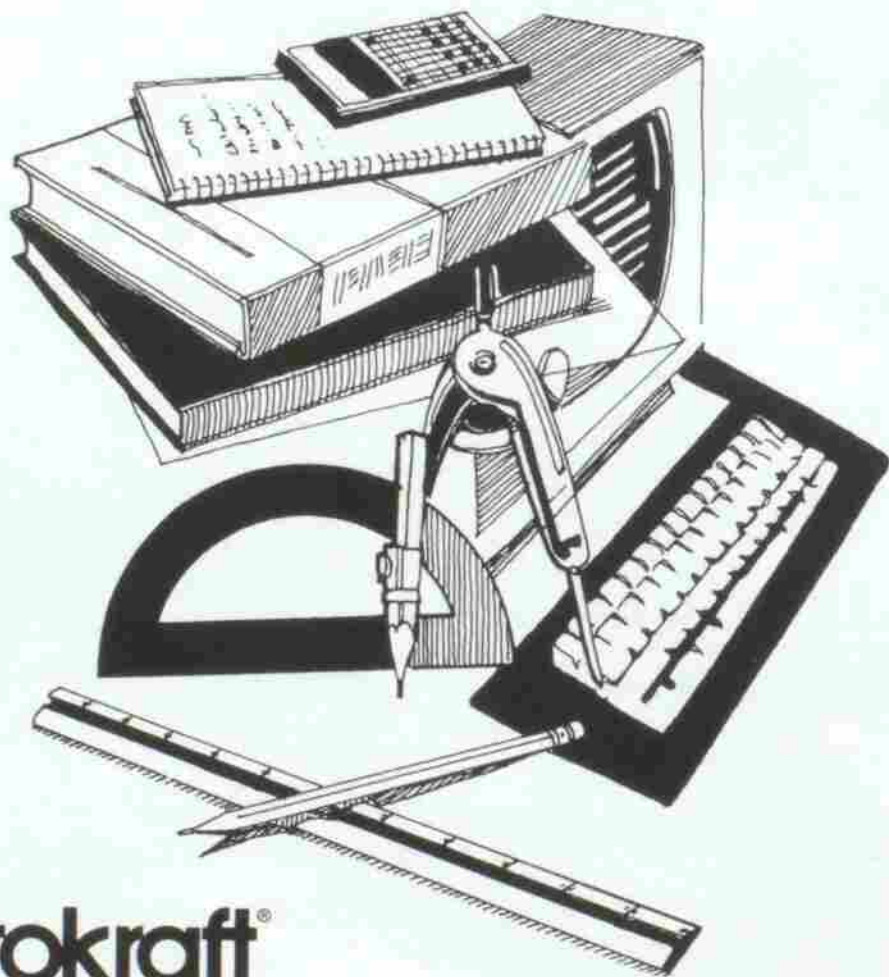
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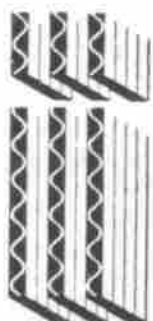
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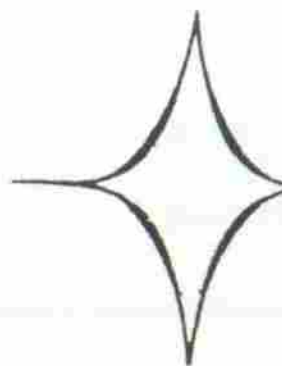
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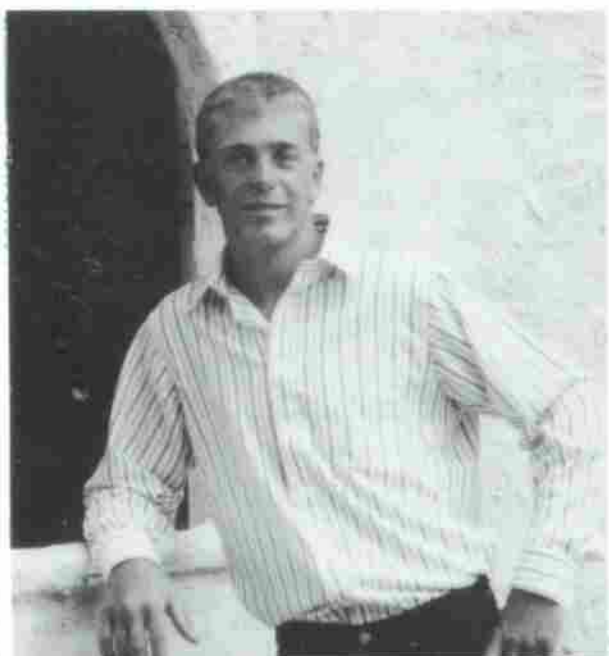
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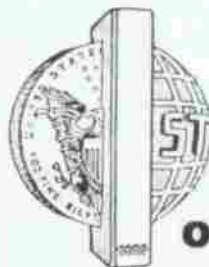


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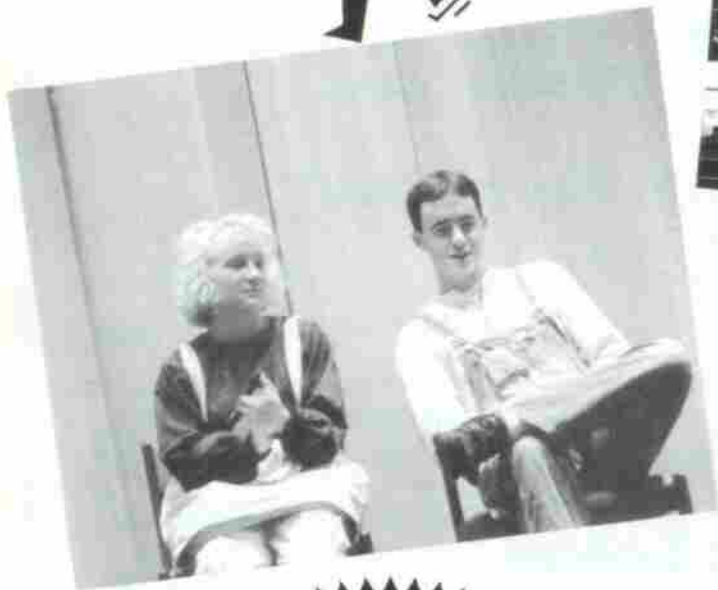
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Tears, idle tears

And thinking of the days that are no more.

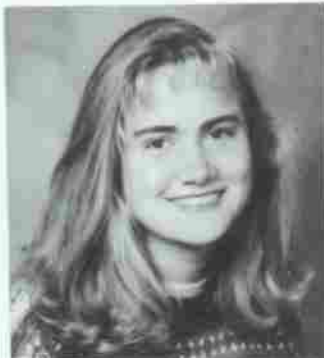
Fresh as the first beam glittering on a sail,
