Only to be replaced by another





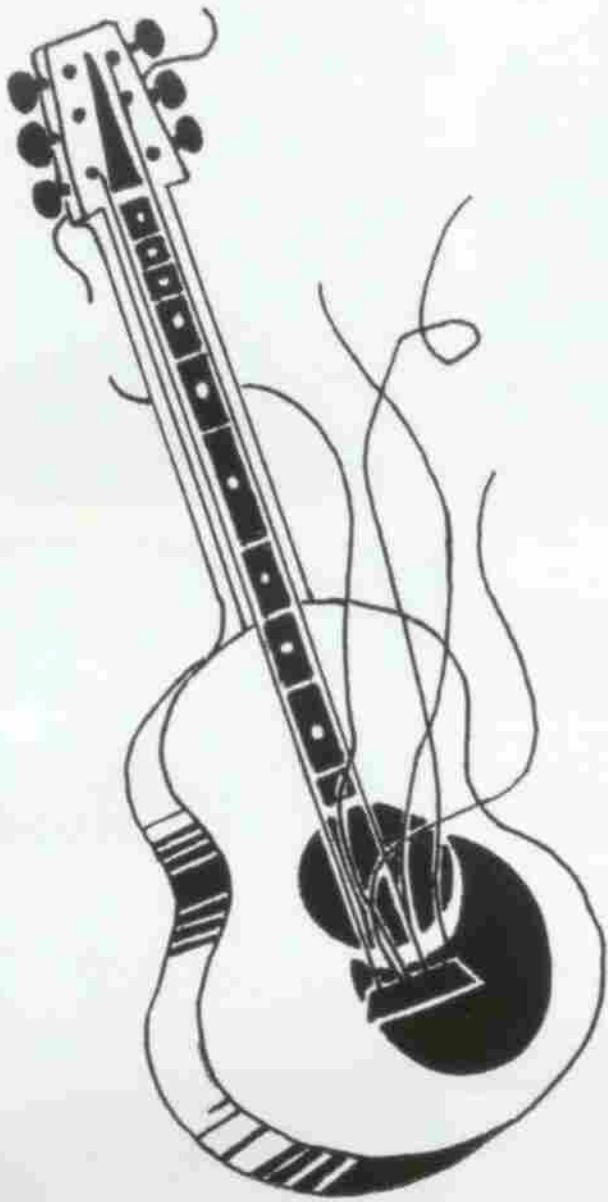

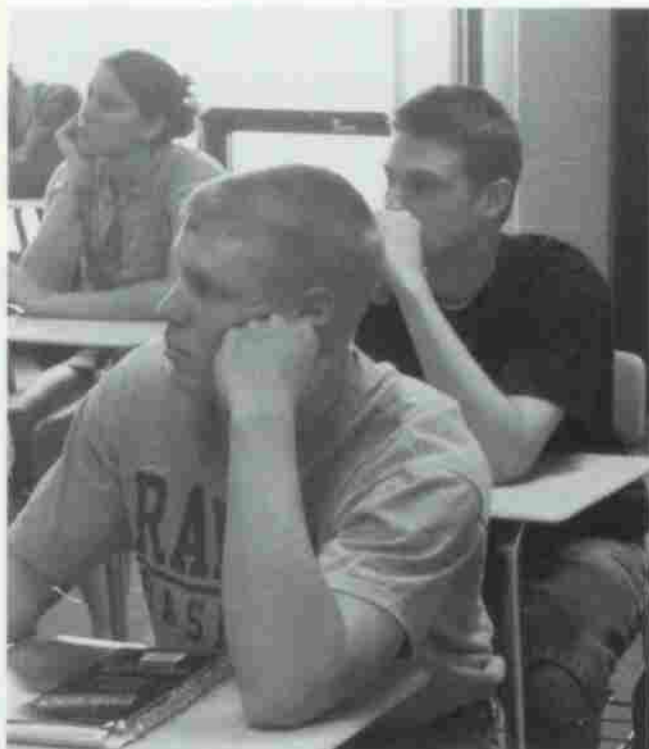

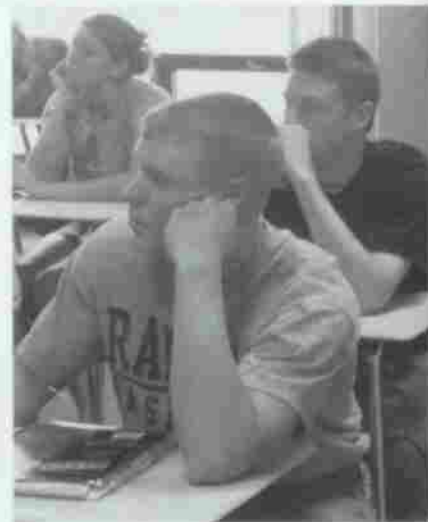


Shakespearean language is kept alive

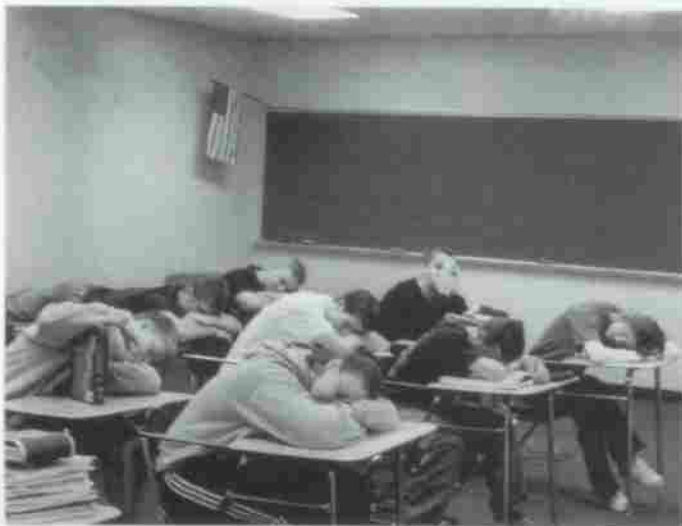
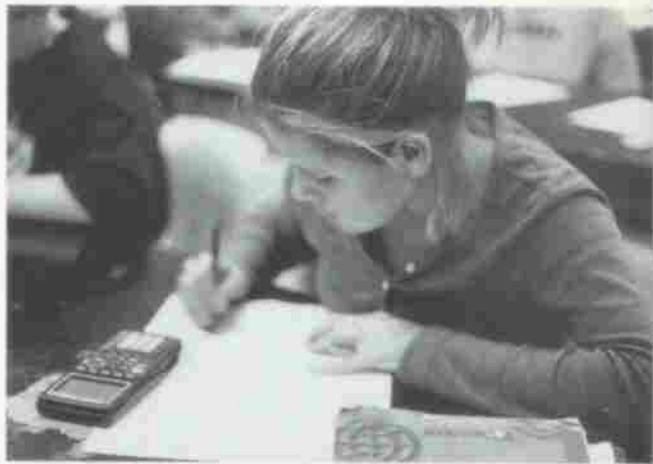
Math

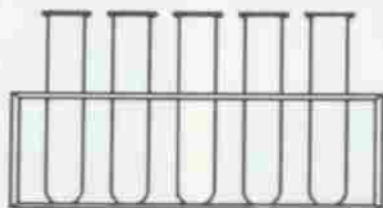
Accidents happen

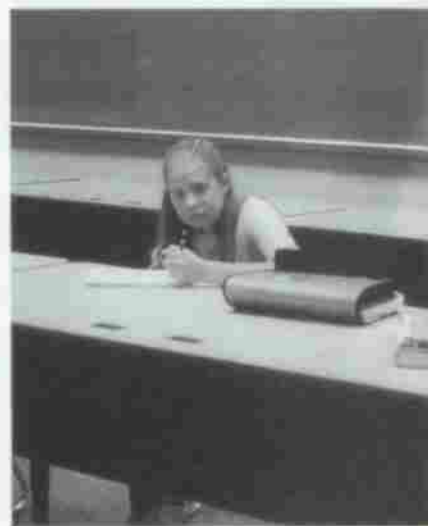
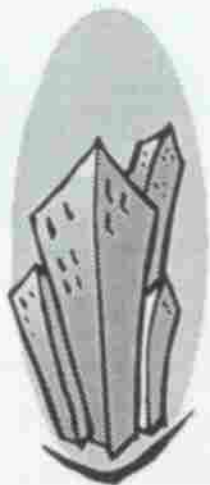
Business

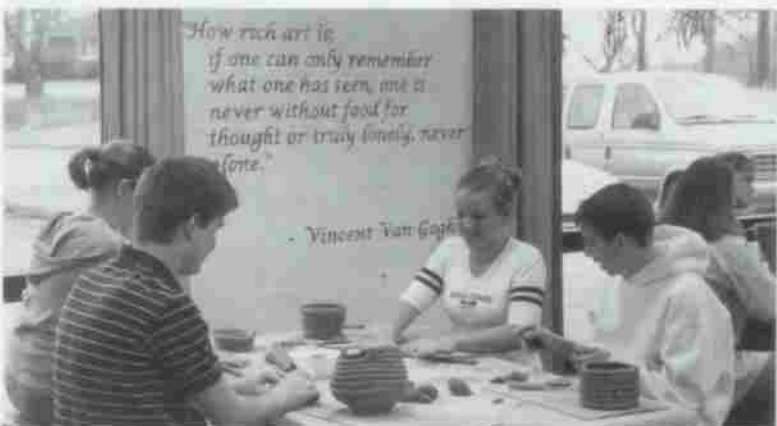
FP's communication hub (s)prints on

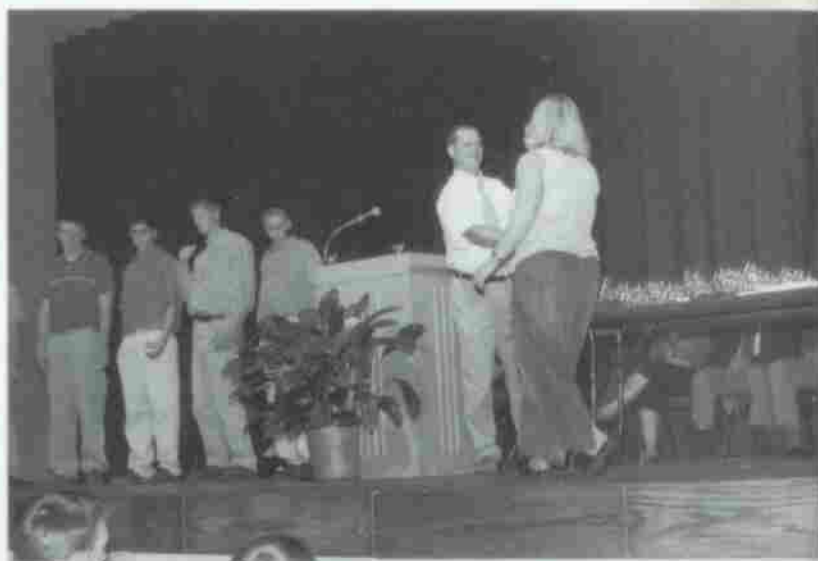
Family and consumer science keeps up with today's busy world

scholarships were presented.

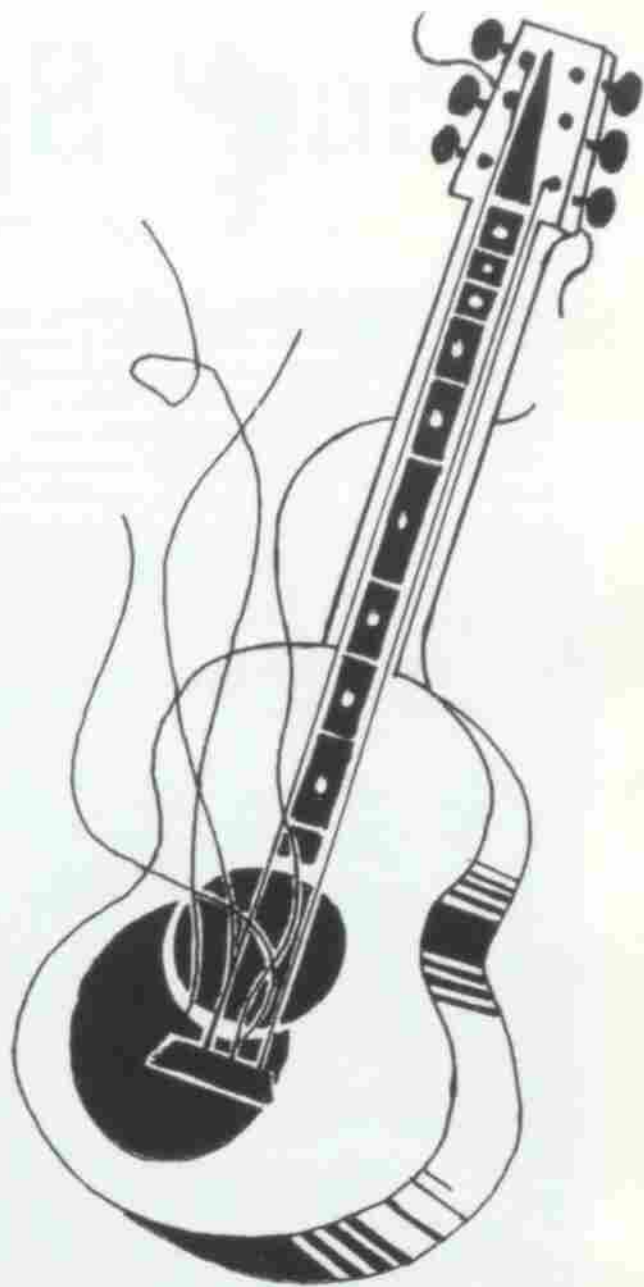

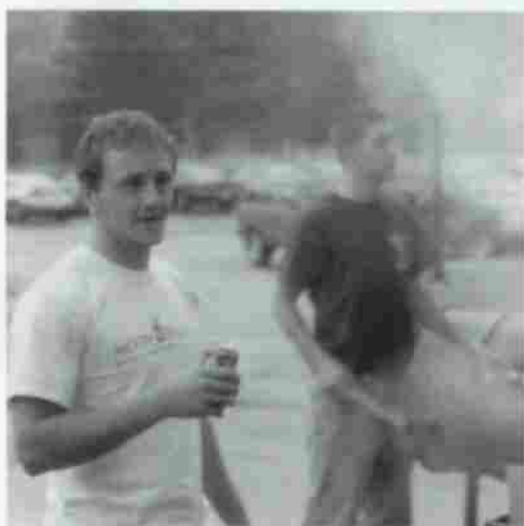


Student Council stirs the pot of leadership

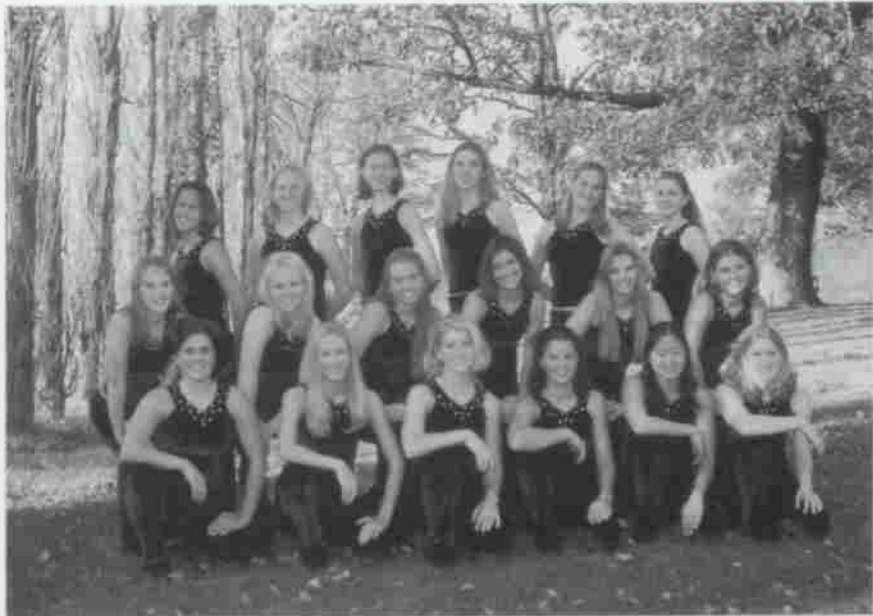


Dance team struts their stuff

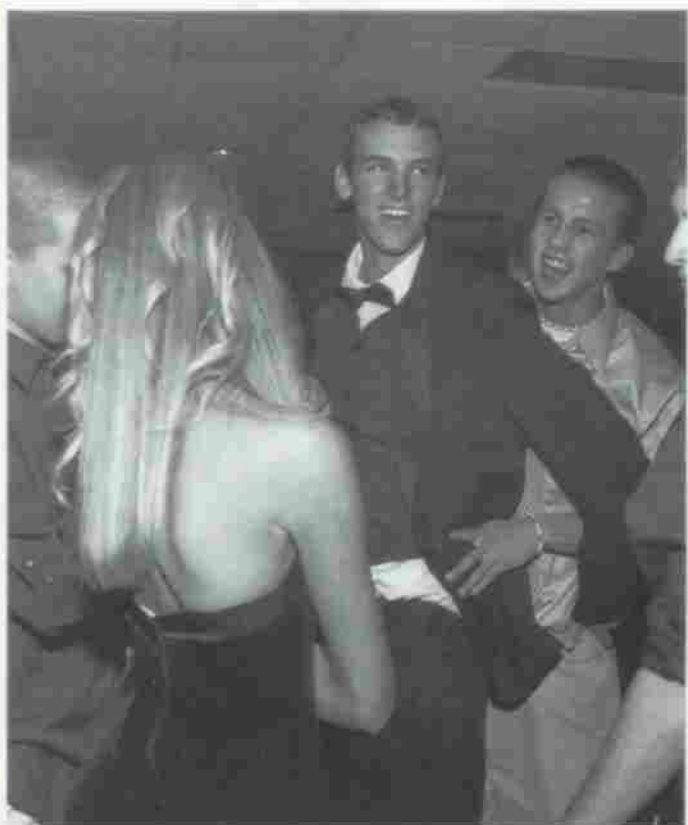
Sara Rohleder crowned homecoming queen

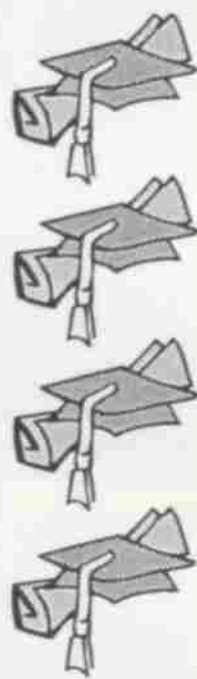

Three of Forest Park's valued staff members retired at the end of the 2001-2002 school year.

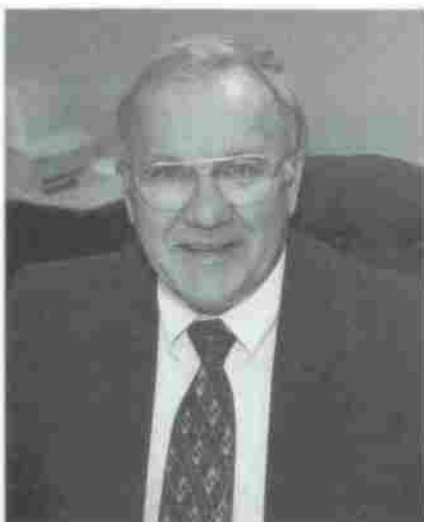

Events of Sept. 11 bring FP's mission into focus this year

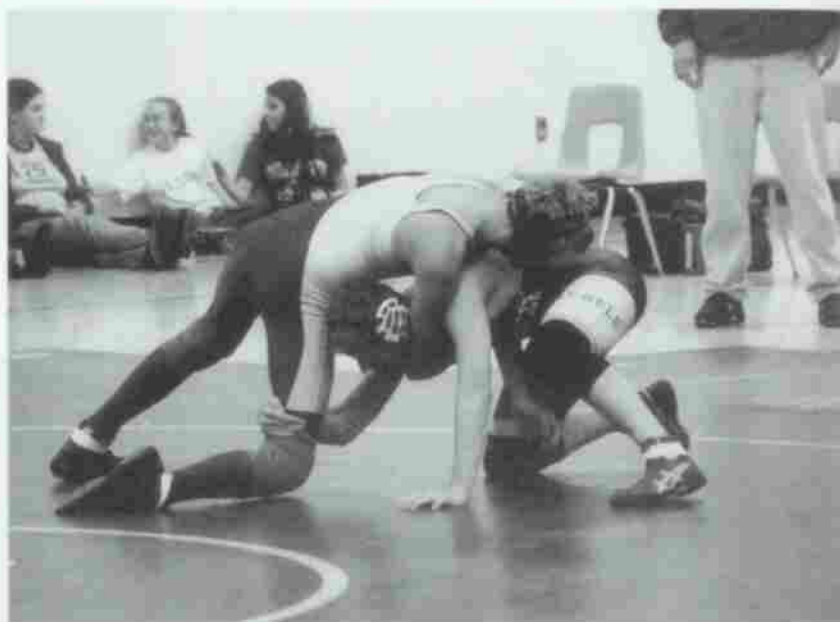

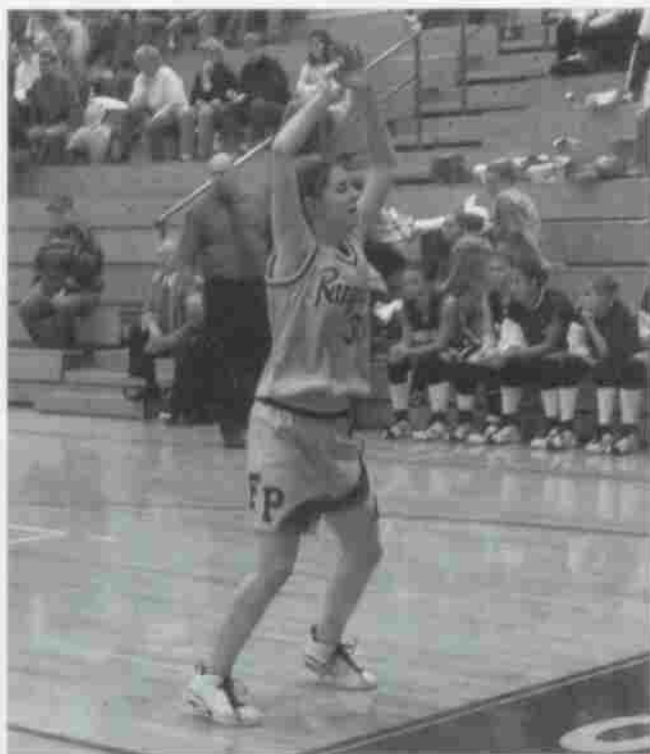

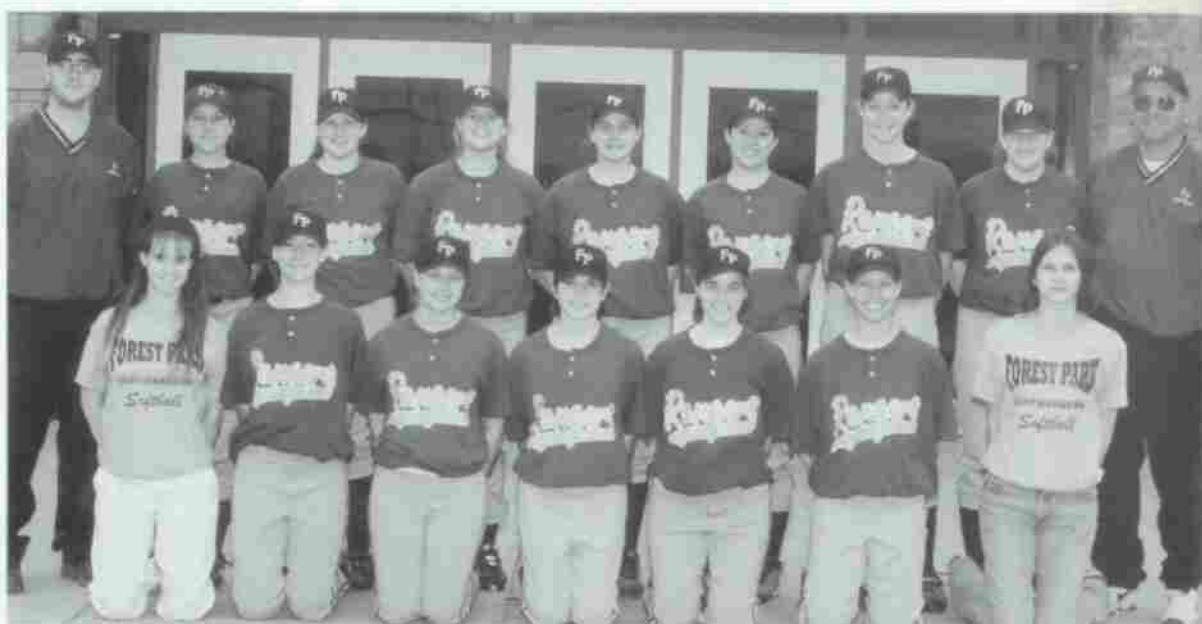
