






Academics



This school year the band also had Christmas and spring concerts. They also went to concert band competition at F.J. Reitz in April and brought home another plaque for the wall.





This year's marching band show was a lot different than the other years because junior Hillary Cremeens, center, sang during the ballad and the colorguard wrapped her in batmers.
















Industrial Tech classes lead the way







FP art classes work hard to create the best designs in history






FACS classes prepare for future







FFA and FCCLA help make a better community




FCCLA has been very busy this year. They had a Halloween party for children, hosted volleyball for all area FCCLA club members, and had a Teacher Appreciation breakfast.







When asked what he liked about Key Club, Logan said, "It's great to help the community and everyone in need."









Senior Krystal Krust said, "I like how Renaissance promotes the betterment of students and I want our school to be the best it can be."









Forest Park received two foreign exchange students for the 2006-2007 school year. One was Pia Woien who was a senior, and the other was Karoline Mueller who was a junior.





The difference in this year's postprom than last year was that if you left post-prom early, your parents would be informed.
































Boys' track racing to the finish


