We didn't know how to share them with the world


So we changed them but soon became bored


Maybe things will change somewhere along the way


#### Student Council helps students carry out their ideas for the school

The FP chapter of Fellowship of Christian Athletes had a new sponsor this year, Mr. Greg Meyers. The group met once a month and had several guest speakers.



## FP team competes in Super Mileage contest For the first time ever, Forest Park Technology Department sent a team to the Super Mileage contest














Sophomore = (noun) A person in the second year of carrying out an endeavor; a second year student. Related to adj. sophomoric, exhibiting immaturity.











Rebecka Nystrom came from Sweden. Her home town was just outside Stockholm. She lived with the Dilger family while attending Forest Park.


Rebecka's favorite sport is soccer. She likes to travel and has visited many places in Europe as well as Thailand and Egypt.


















# FP wrestlers dominate the competition




