






FFA AKA working hard and having fun















Getting started as early as 8:00 in the morning, the decorating committee spent a lot of time and effort to make this event the success it continues to be.













How to properly train for RUNNING EVENTS

Injuries

>It's very important to come back slowly from an injury, and you shouldn't rush the process. Cut way back on running or eliminate it entirely until you recover from your injury.

>Biking and swimming are good aerobic exercises to get you off your feet but keep you in shape.

>Adjust your goals and expectations so that you don't get frustrated and injure yourself again. Enjoy your rest; it's actually good for you.

Hills

-Effort increases as you run up a hill

>>>The best way to run a hill is
to maintain effort and forget about pace
while on the hill. Trying to maintain
pace on the hill is like surging and varying the body's perceived effort, which
will only tire you prematurely in the long
run.

- The mental factor

>>>Many see hill repeats as an opportunity to practice conquering or attacking the hill. One tactic is to approach the hill as a friend rather than foe.

Hot weather tips

• Slow down early – The later you wait to slow down, the more dramatically you'll slow down at the end and the longer it will take to recover from the run.

 Wear lighter garments – Loosefitting clothes allow heat to escape.
 Don't wear cotton clothing. Sweat soaks into cotton, causing it to cling to your skin, increasing heat buildup.

 Pour water over yourself – Up to 70 percent of the heat you can lose goes out through the top of your head so regularly pour water over your hair.

obes cold water – Not only does cold water leave the stomach of a runner quicker than any type of fluid, it produces a slight physiological cooling effect – and an even greater psychological cooling effect. But don't drink too much.









Outstanding senior athlete awards went to Casey VanWinkle and Kaci Verkump.







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
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
