
Making miles of smiles Super Mileage




Taking a new perspective



34 new members inducted













German teacher Larry Tenbarge added eighth grade nine-week classes this year. Four years of


high school German were offered. In German they read Scheneewittchen (Snow White) by the Grimm Brothers.




English: Readin' and writin'


























Girls notch big wins, but lose momentum in sectional finals








