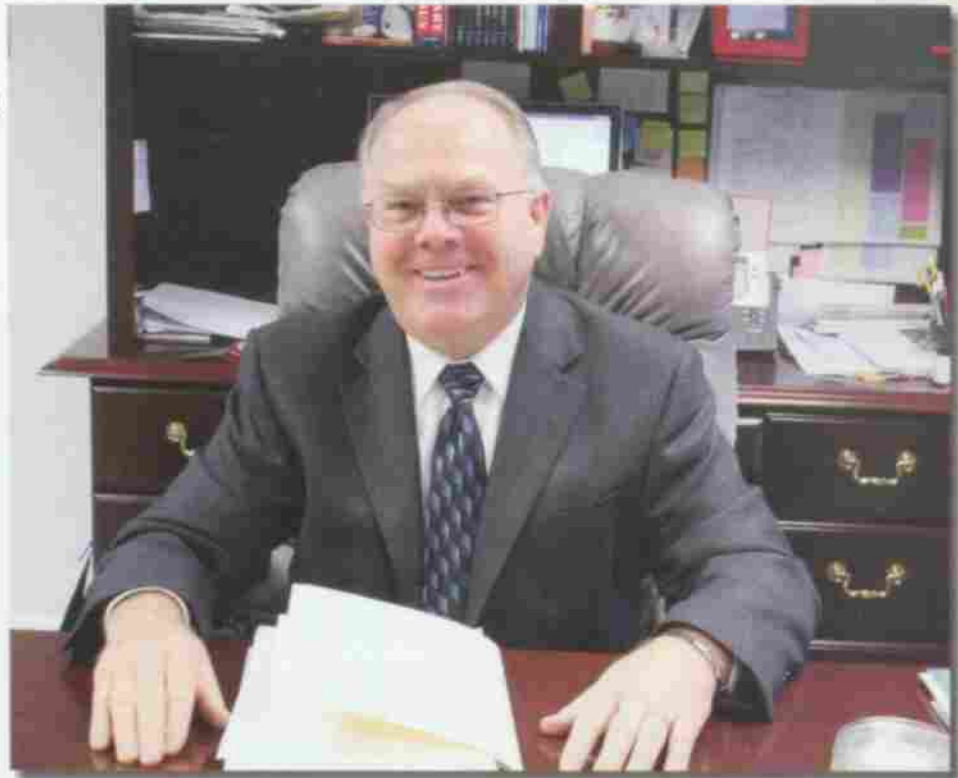
Dedication

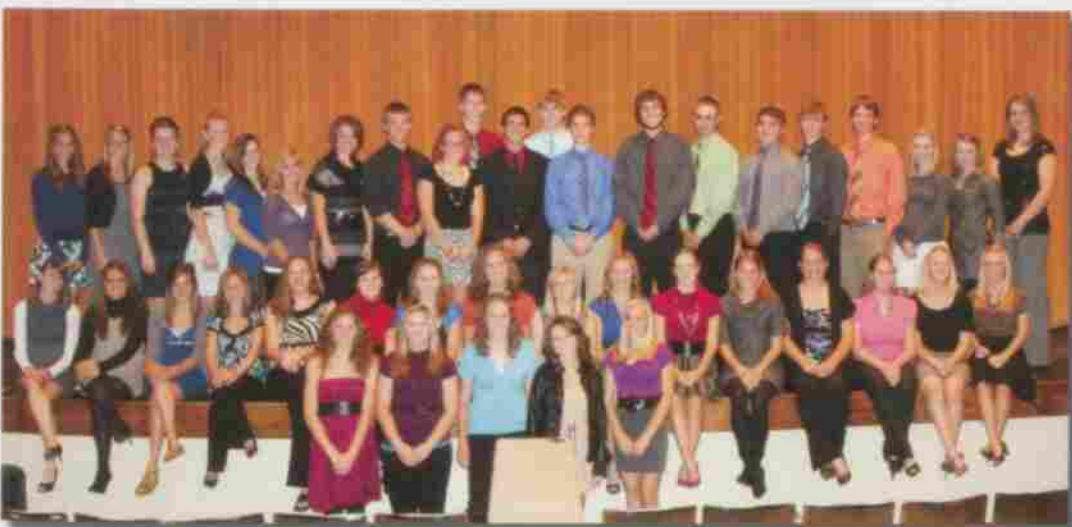

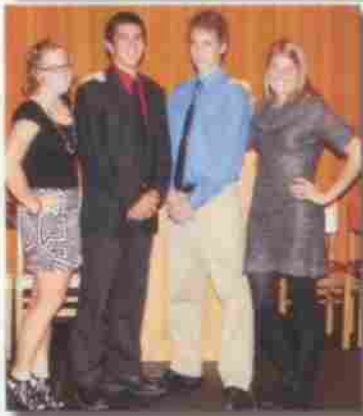
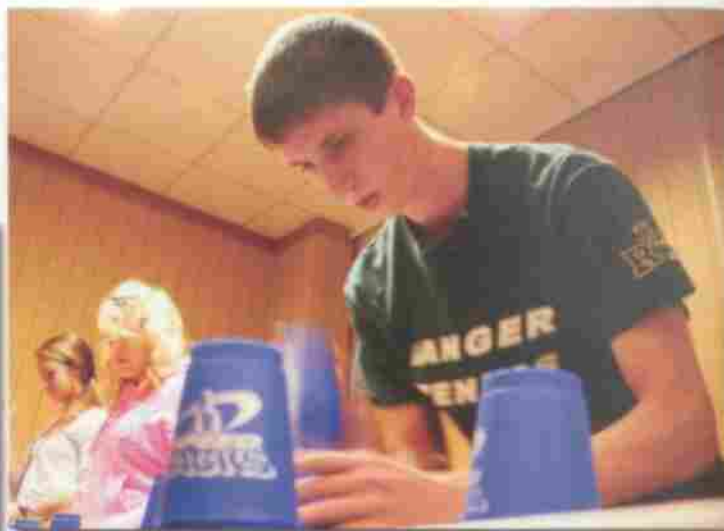

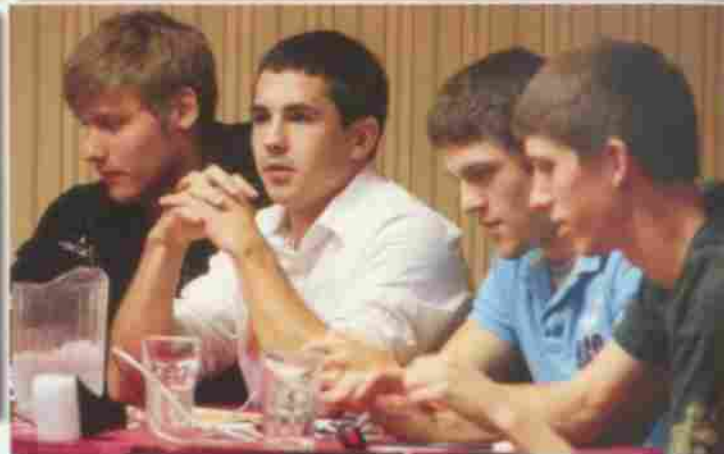

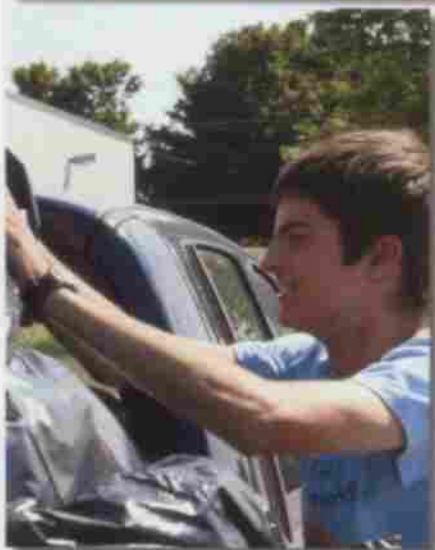

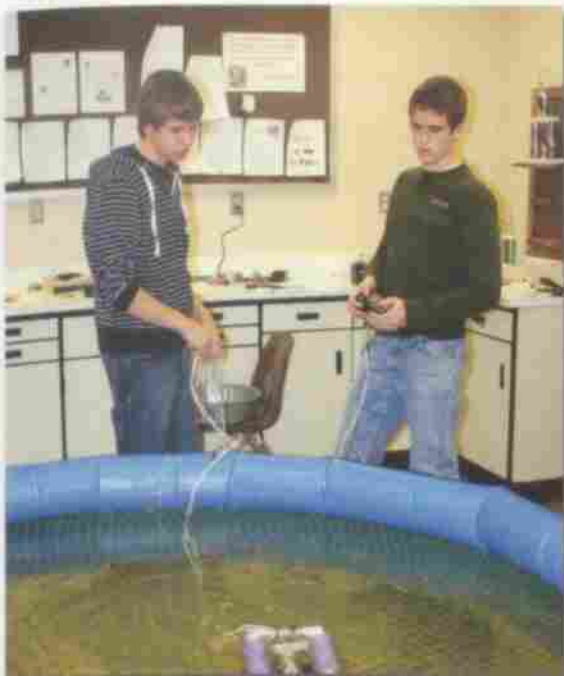

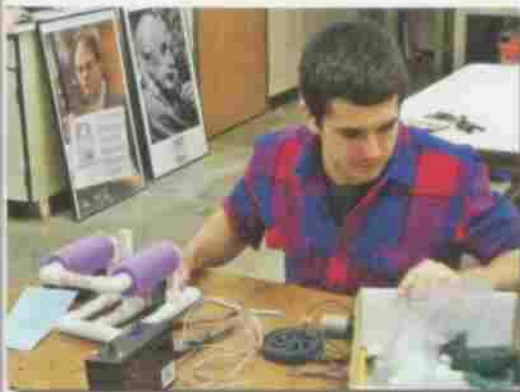

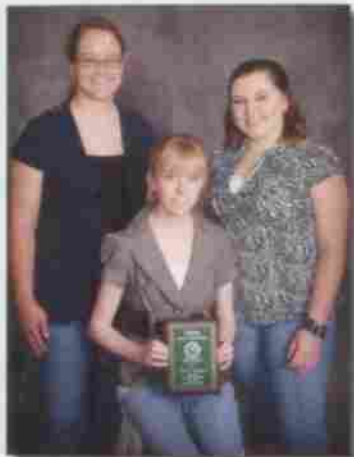

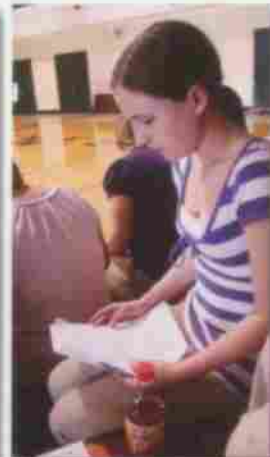

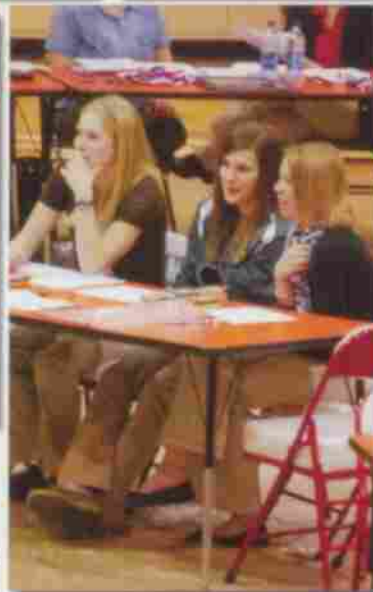

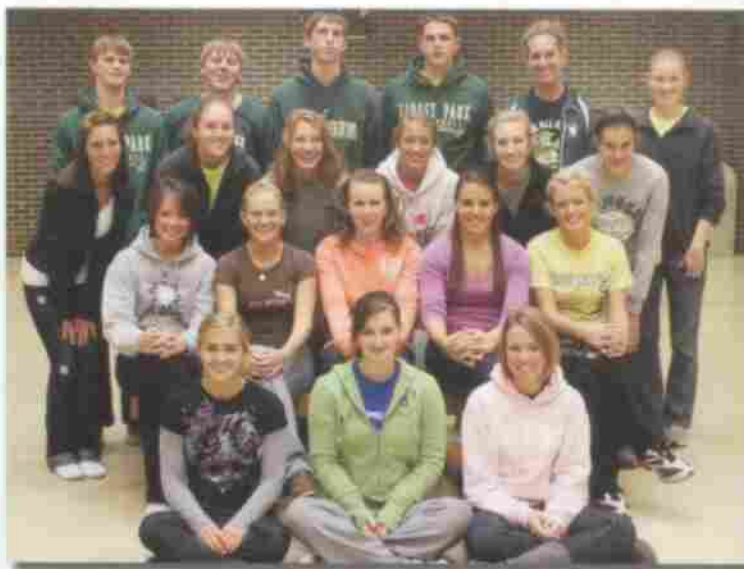

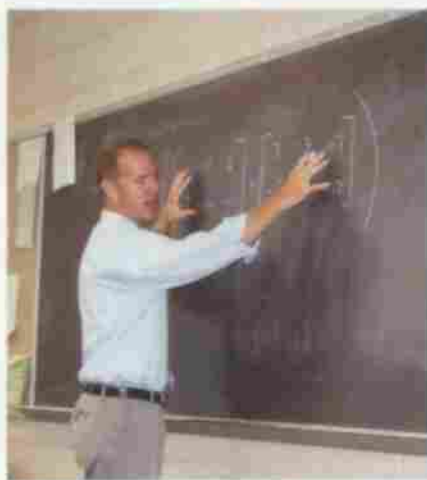

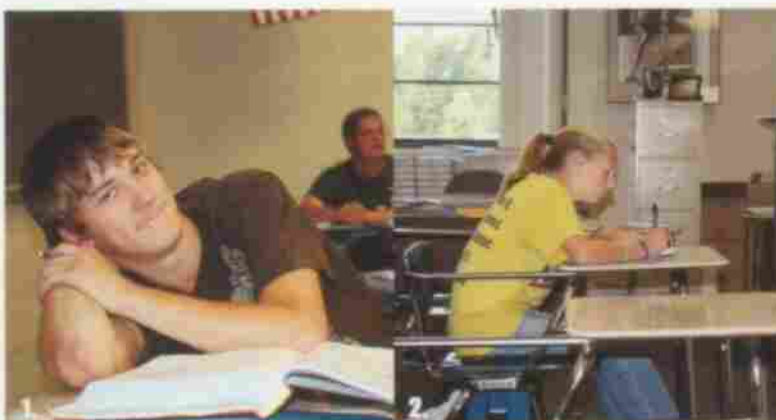

Social Studies

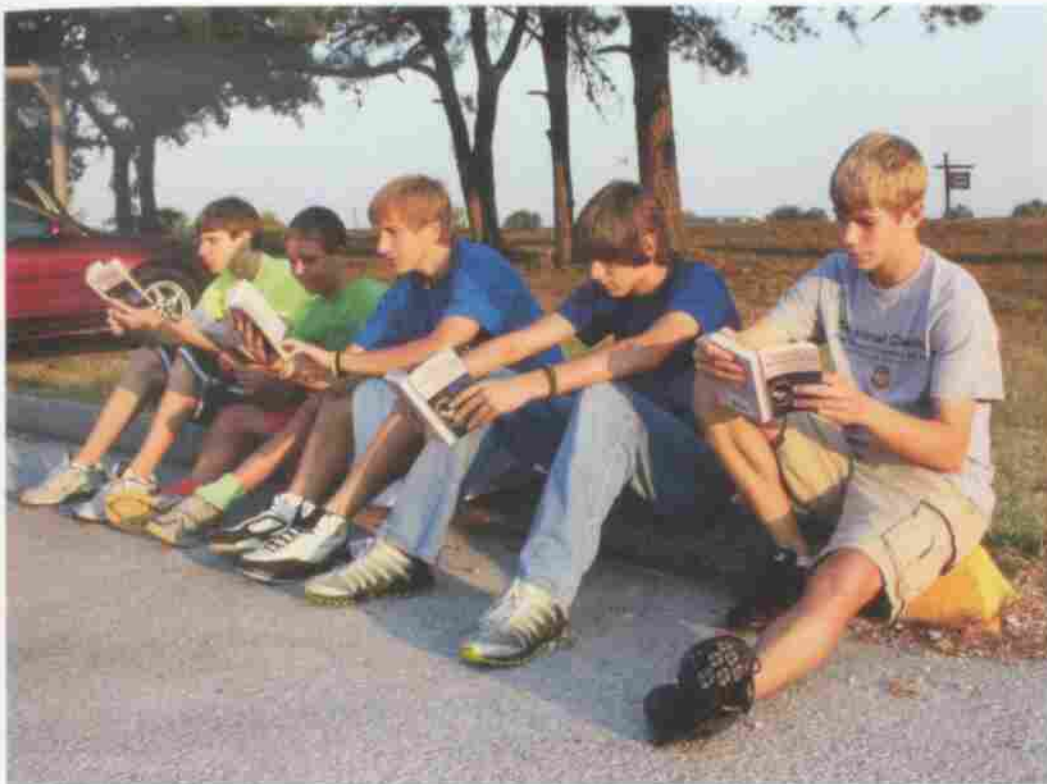

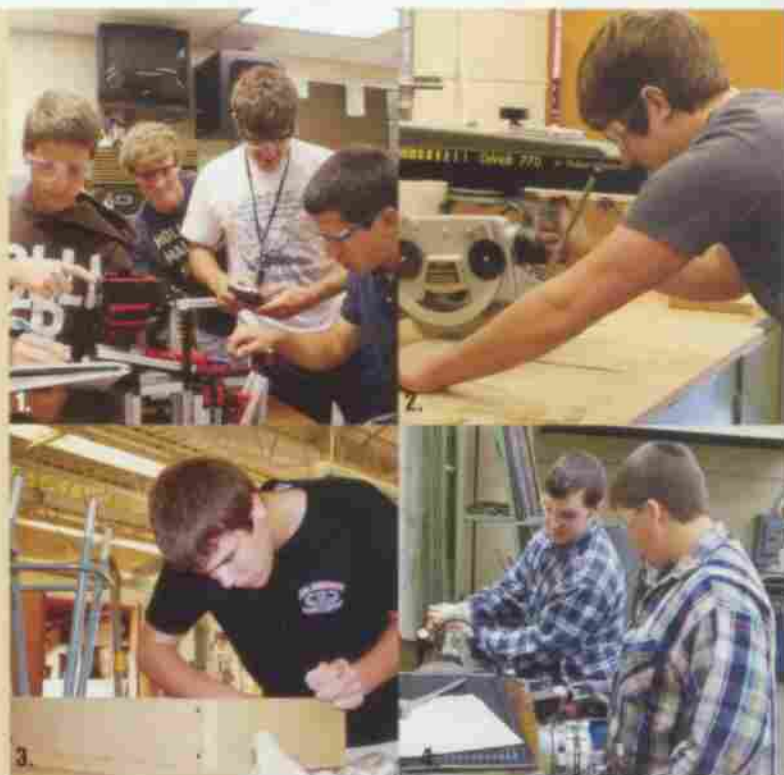

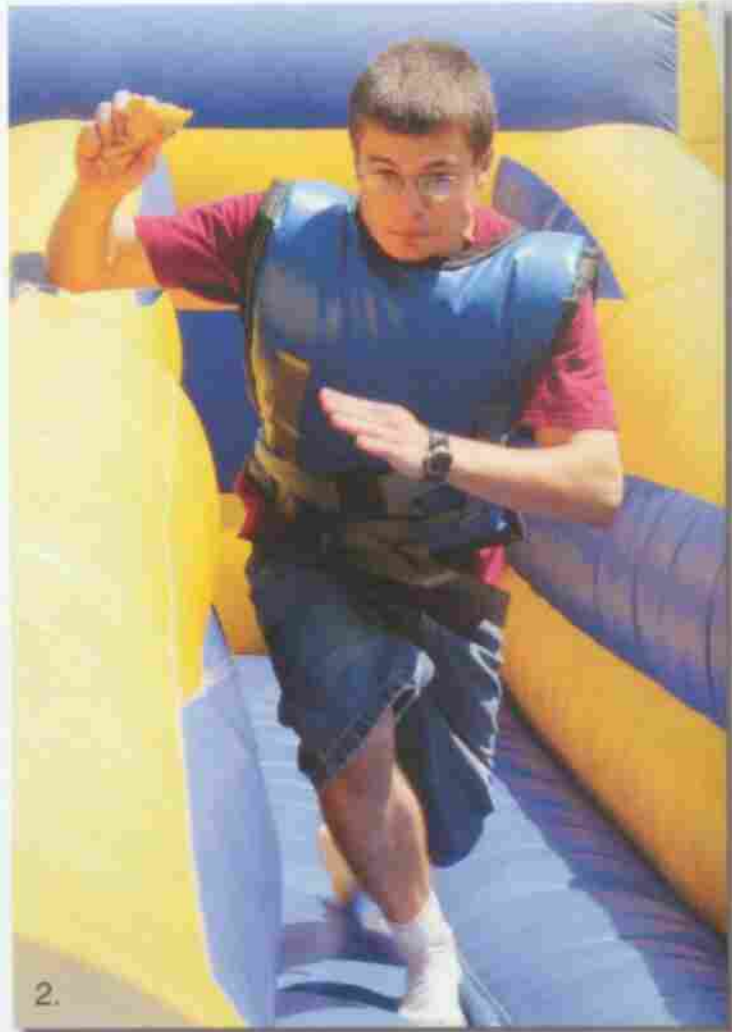

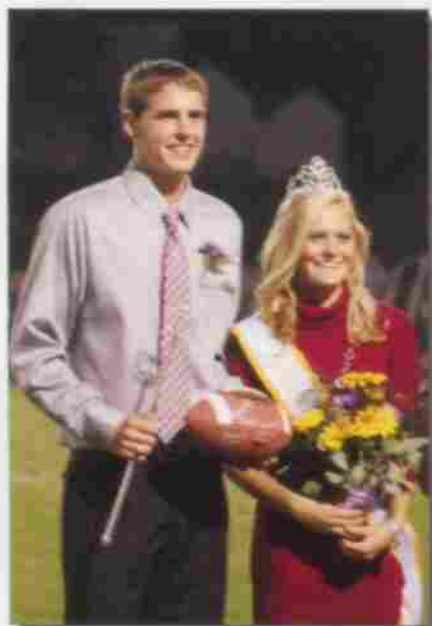

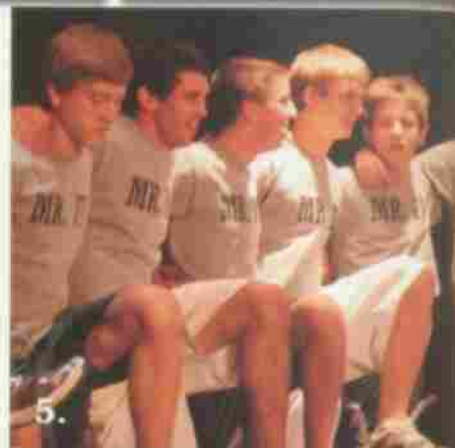

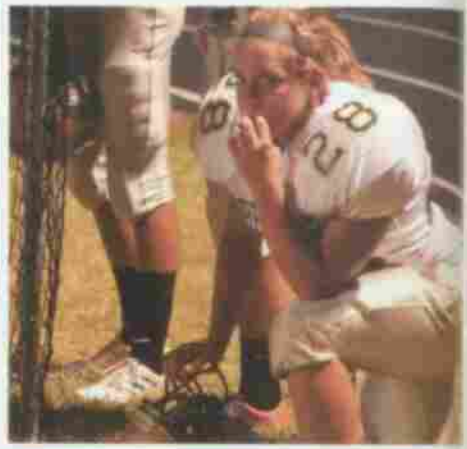

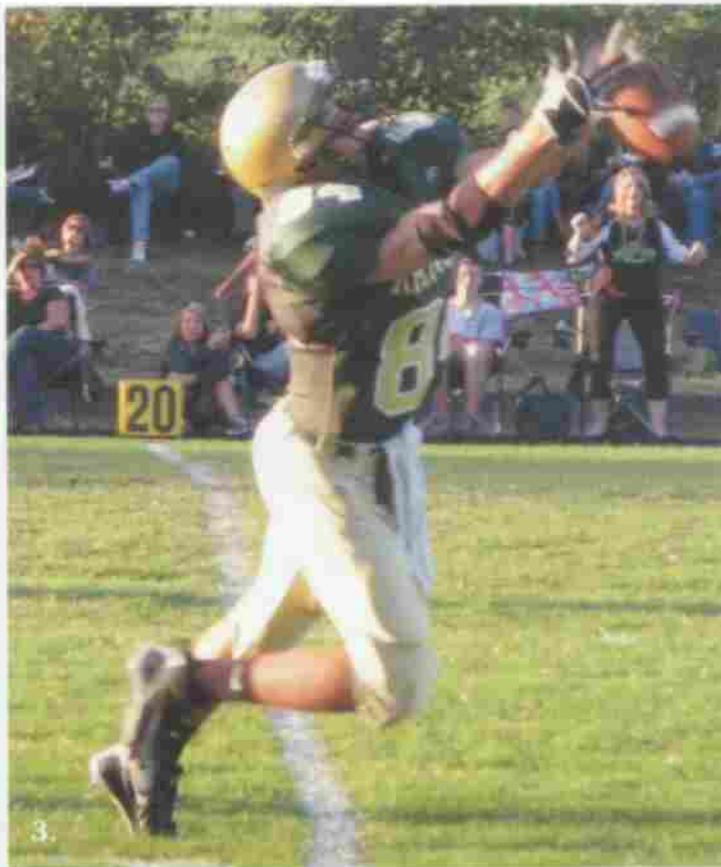

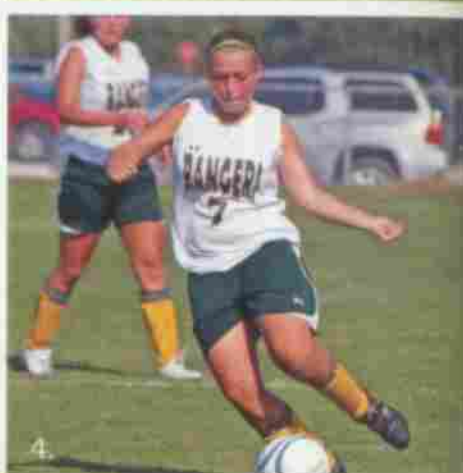

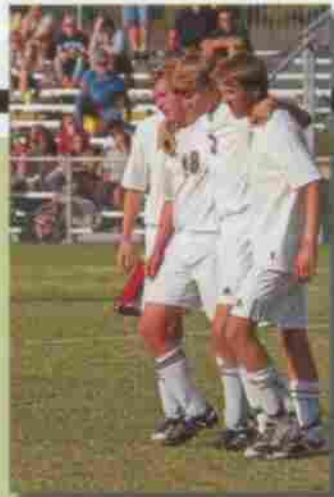

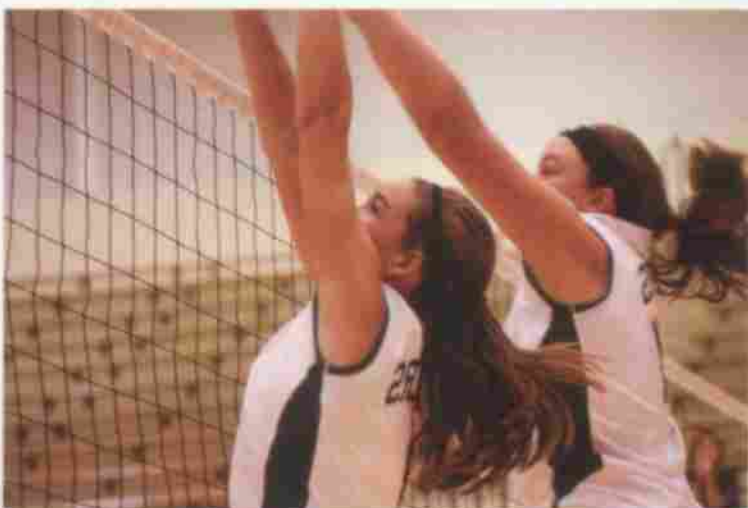

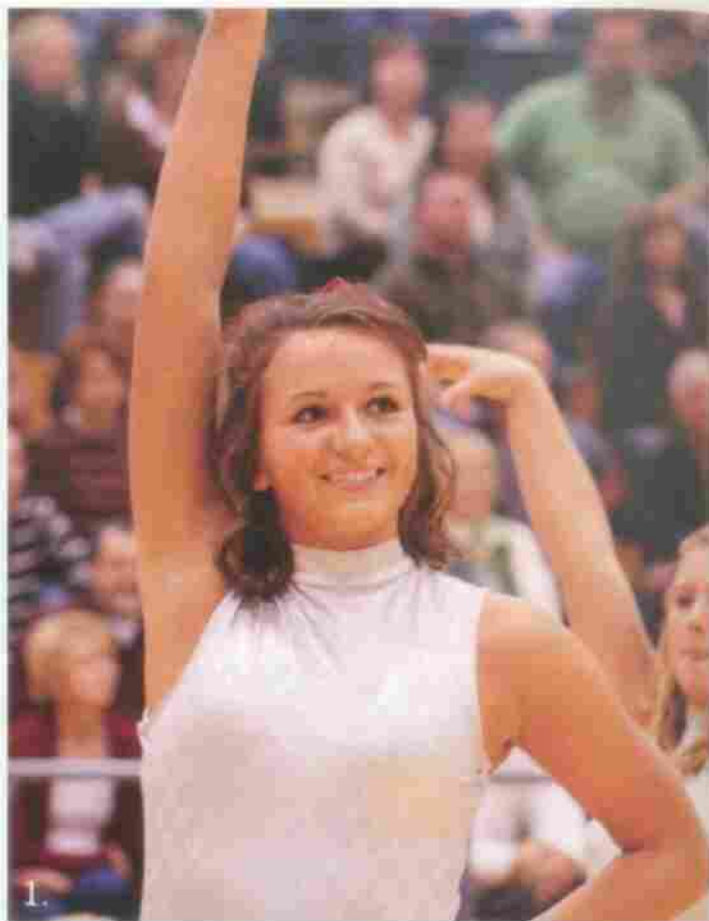

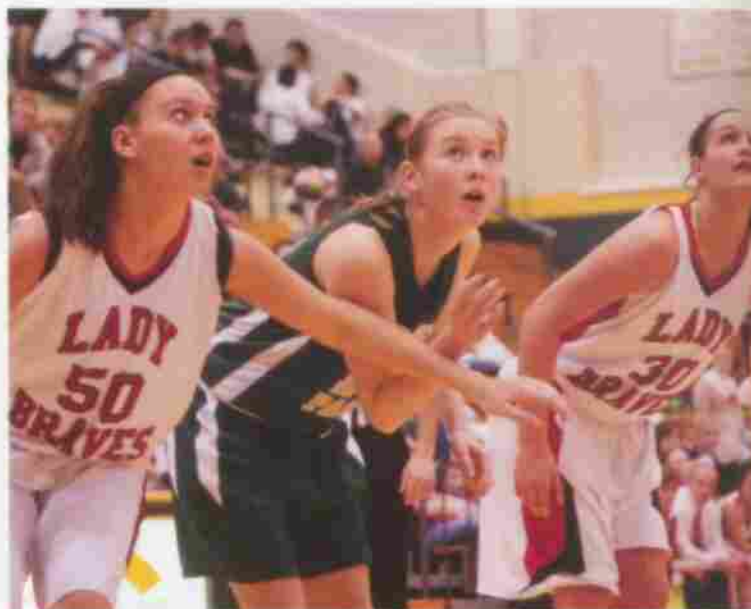

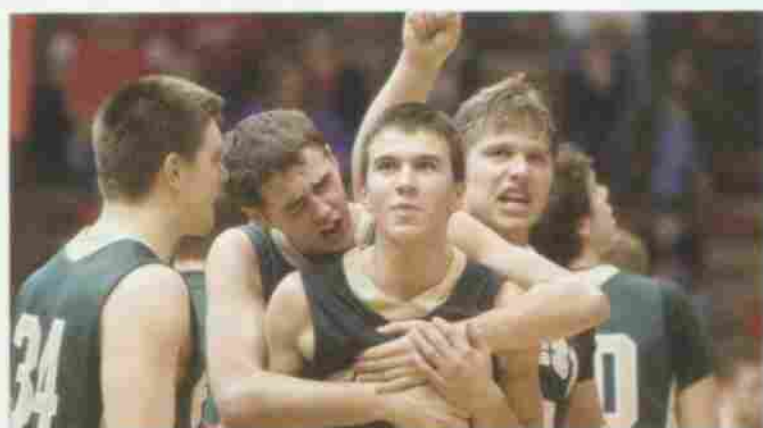
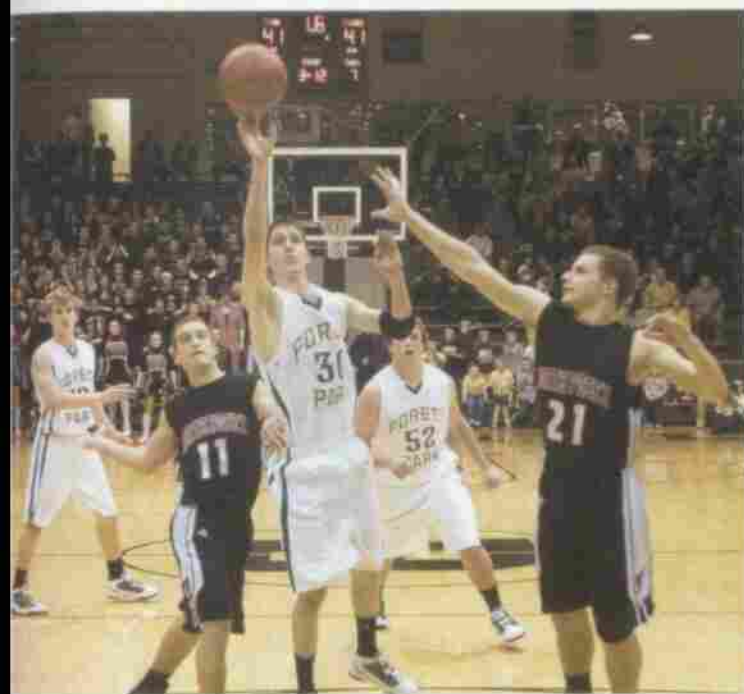

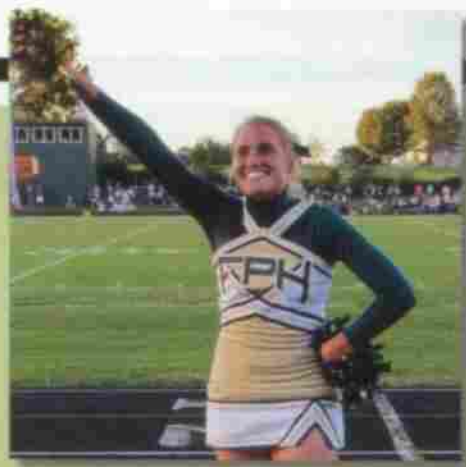

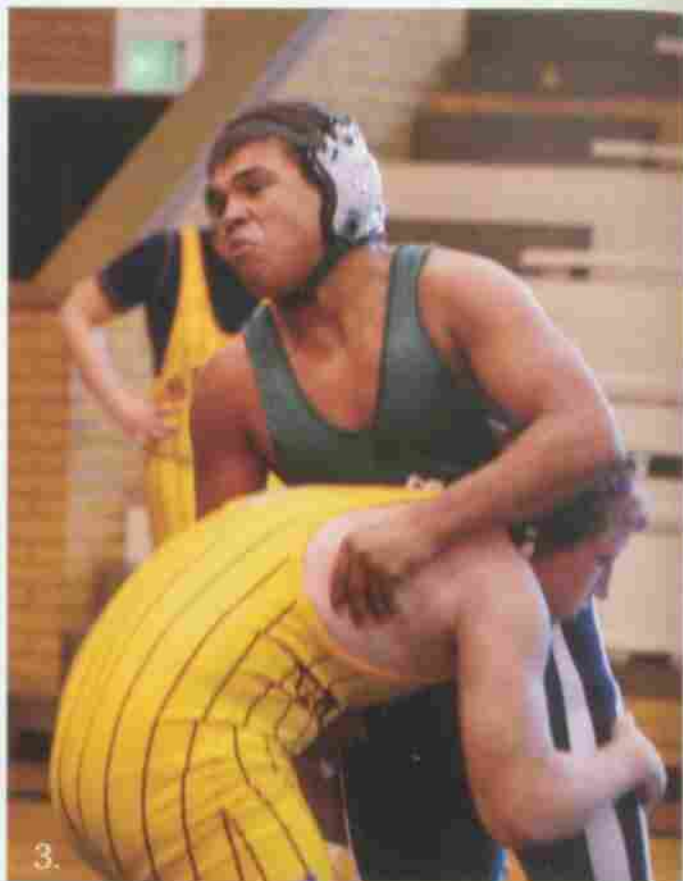

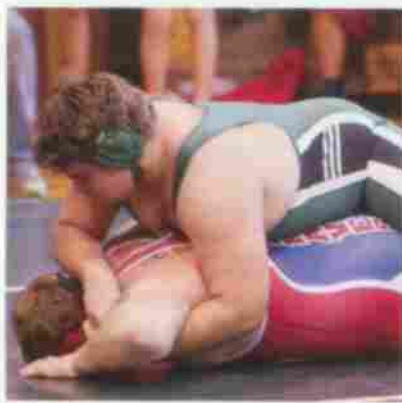

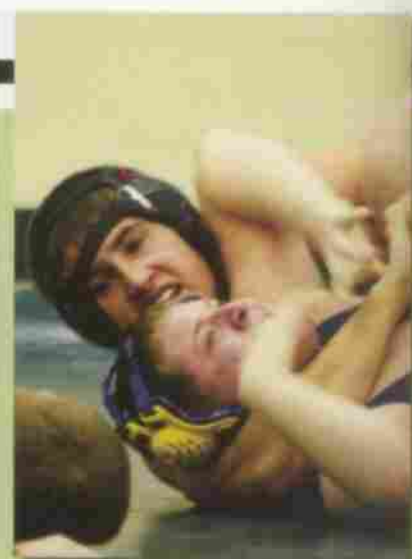

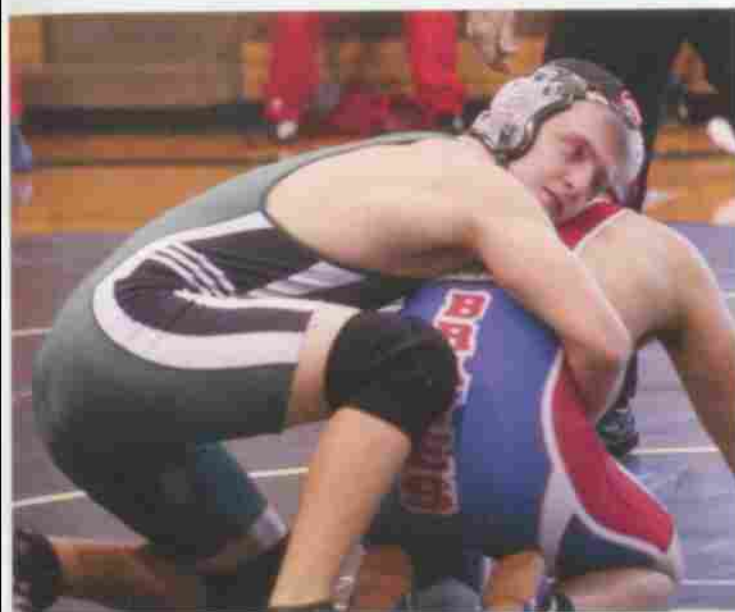

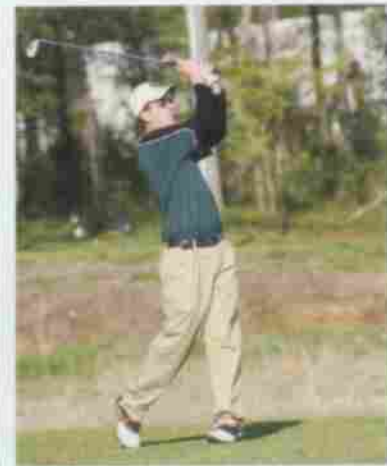

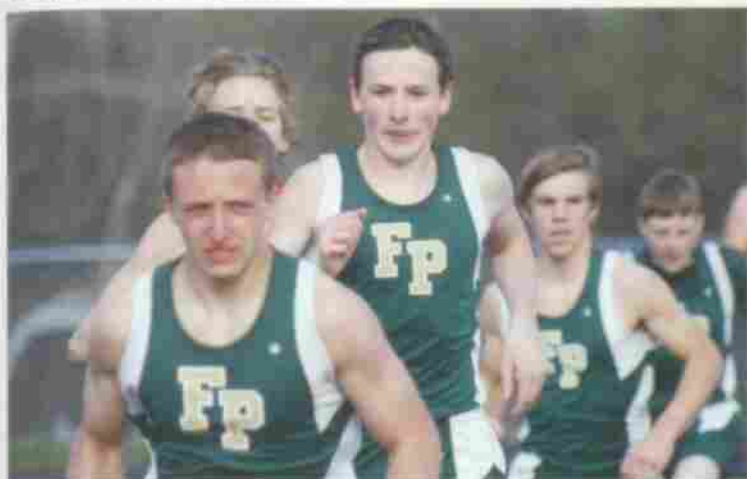

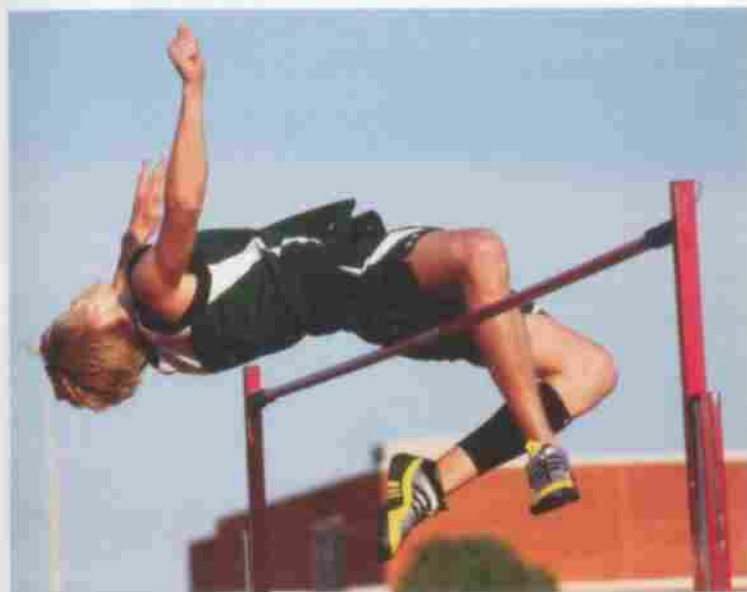

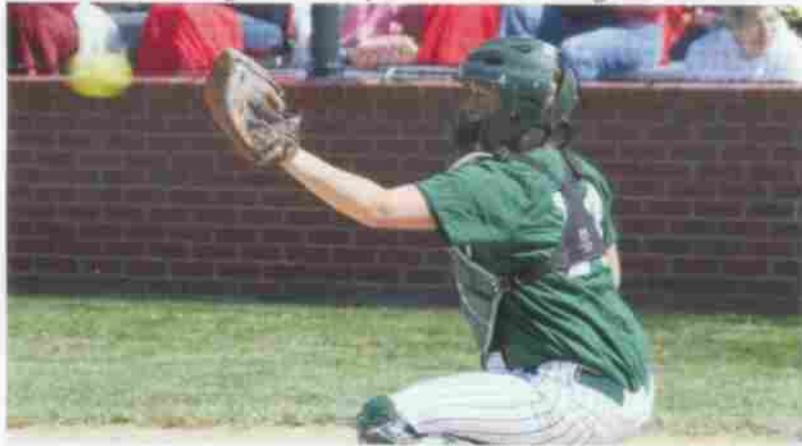
