


### Phillip Rogier





### **Nea Lund**






### Blooming Students




Business








# Color Guard






















#### Conquering Colonial America






#### The Power of Positive Influence










#### Encouraging Enthusiasm Each Day











### Making an Impact



























## Fall Festival




















### Post Prom






## Rebuilding Success









### We Kick It ...






# Casey Abell Takes down Sectional & Regional Title




#### Boys excelled through sectional with new coach








#### Records are Meant to be Broken


## The Ranger baseball team stepped up to the plate for a tough schedule




Coach Billy Harris commended his team in saying, "I am very proud of this group of young men. The jump from 8th grade basketball to high school basketball is challenging."


