




Destination Imagination


















Community Impact
































Boys' Basketball



Boys' Track

There was no shortage of gifted young men eager to run, jump, and throw. At each meet the boys showed just how conditioned and talented they really were. They came to every meet determined to do one thing -- win. The boys won PAC and came in second at sectional with fourteen individuals advancing to regional. First year runner, Aaron Schuler broke the 100 meter dash school record. Seniors Francis Bohnenkamper and Keith Hurst were nominated for Academic All-State.




