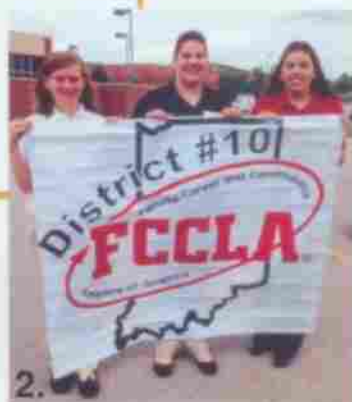

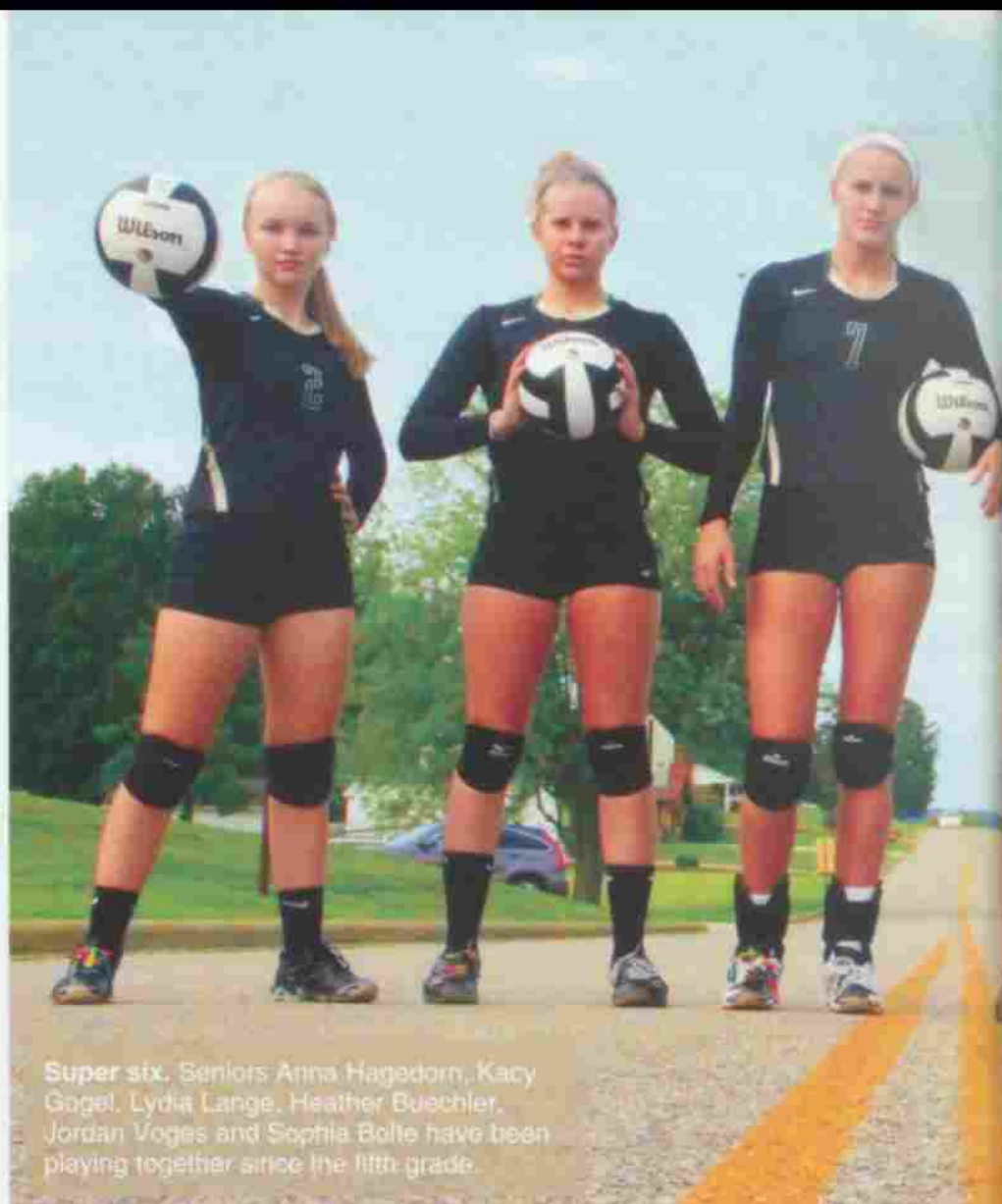
Digging Deep

Underclassmen step up to fill positions

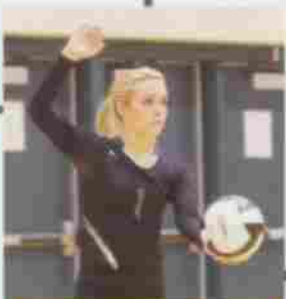
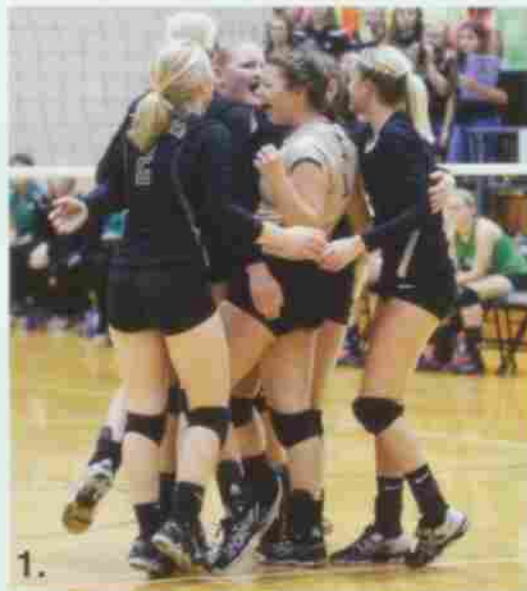

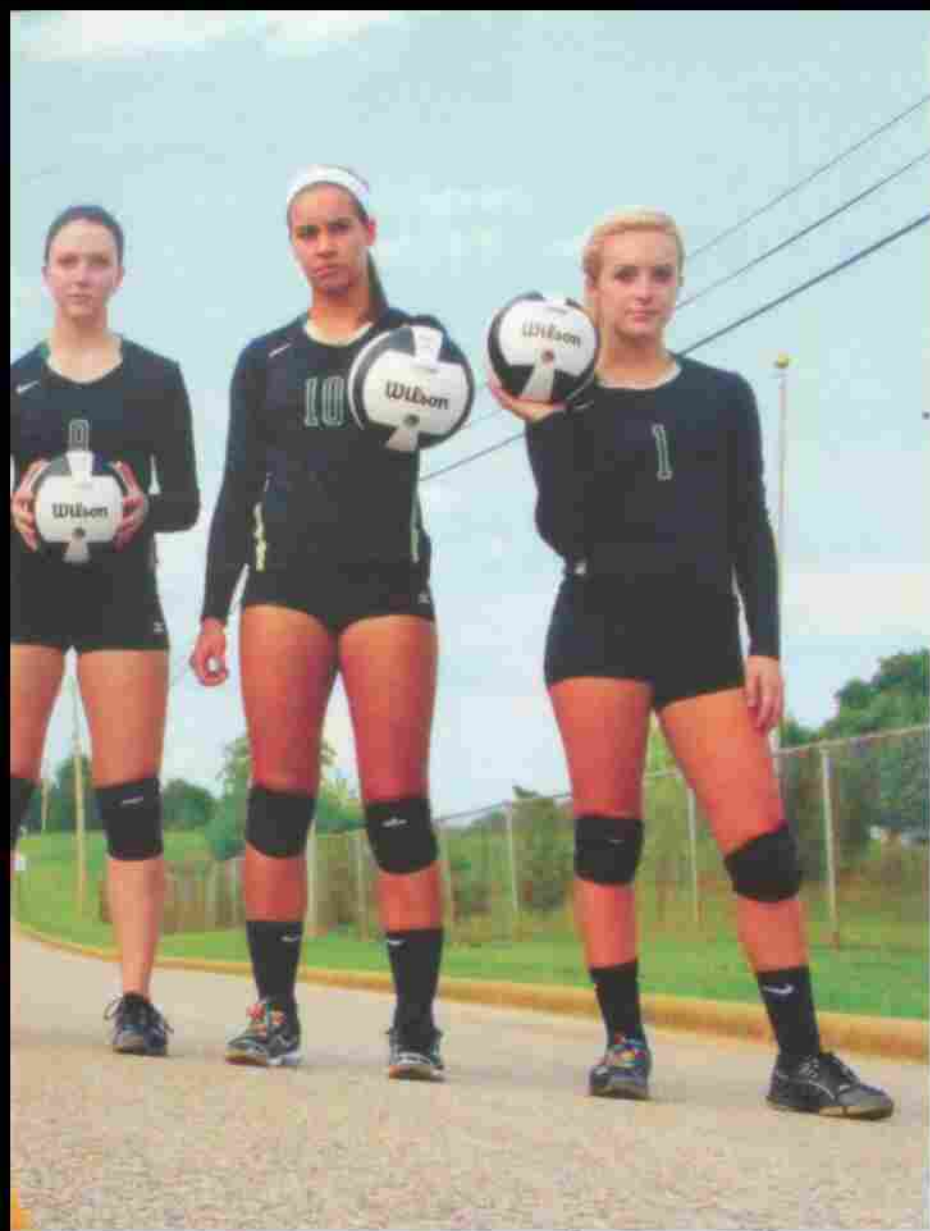

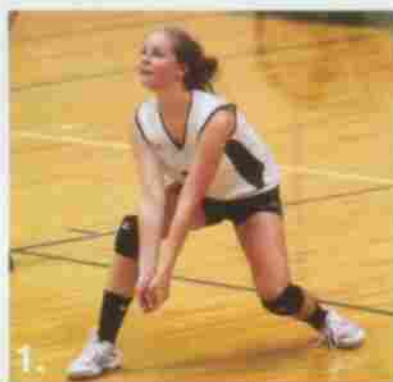
JV girls' have **Big Shoes to fill**

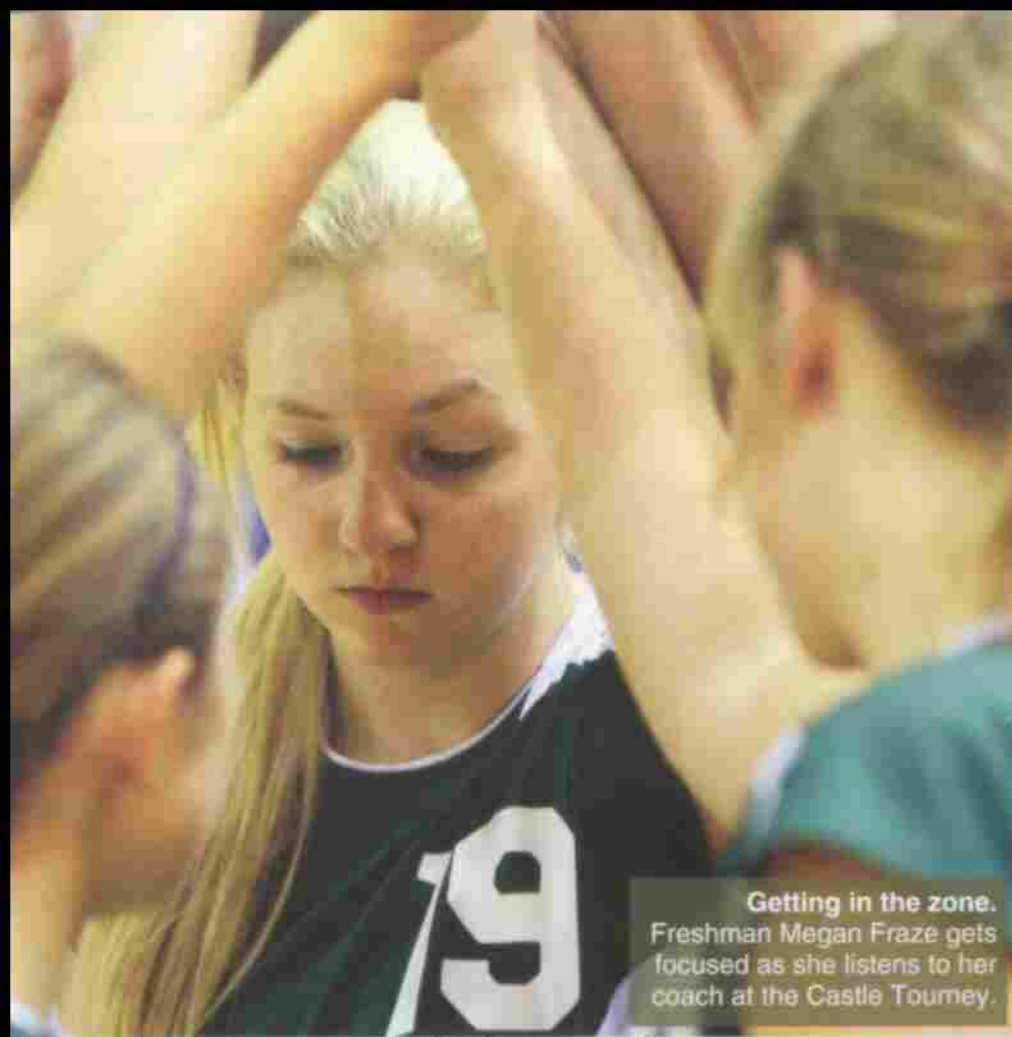

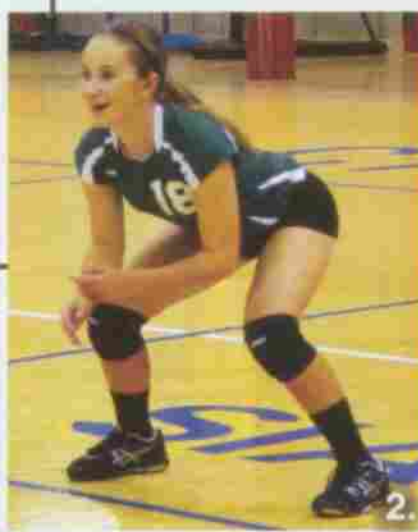

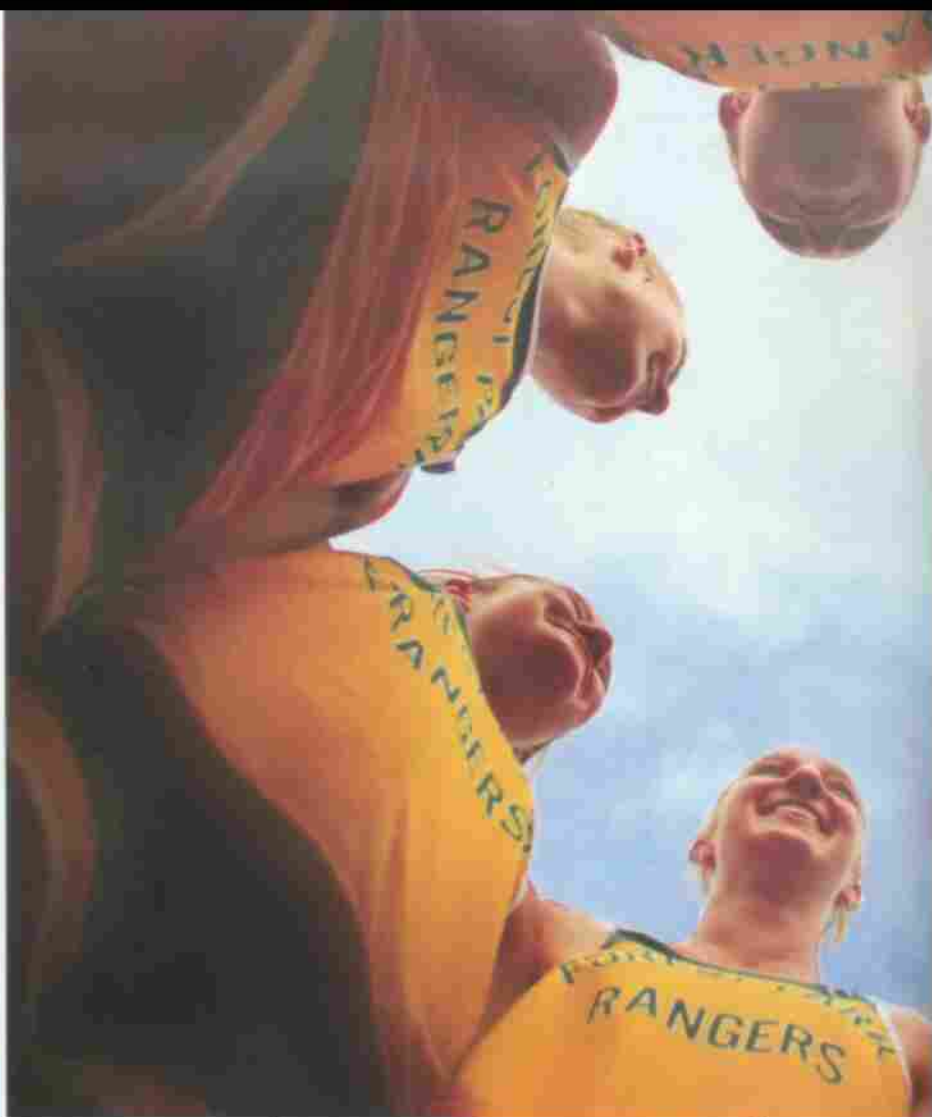
Cross Country sprints to Semi-State

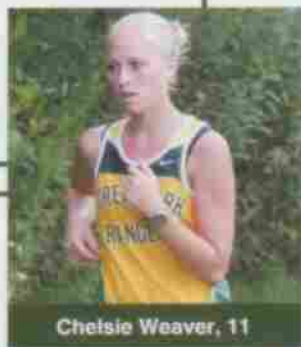

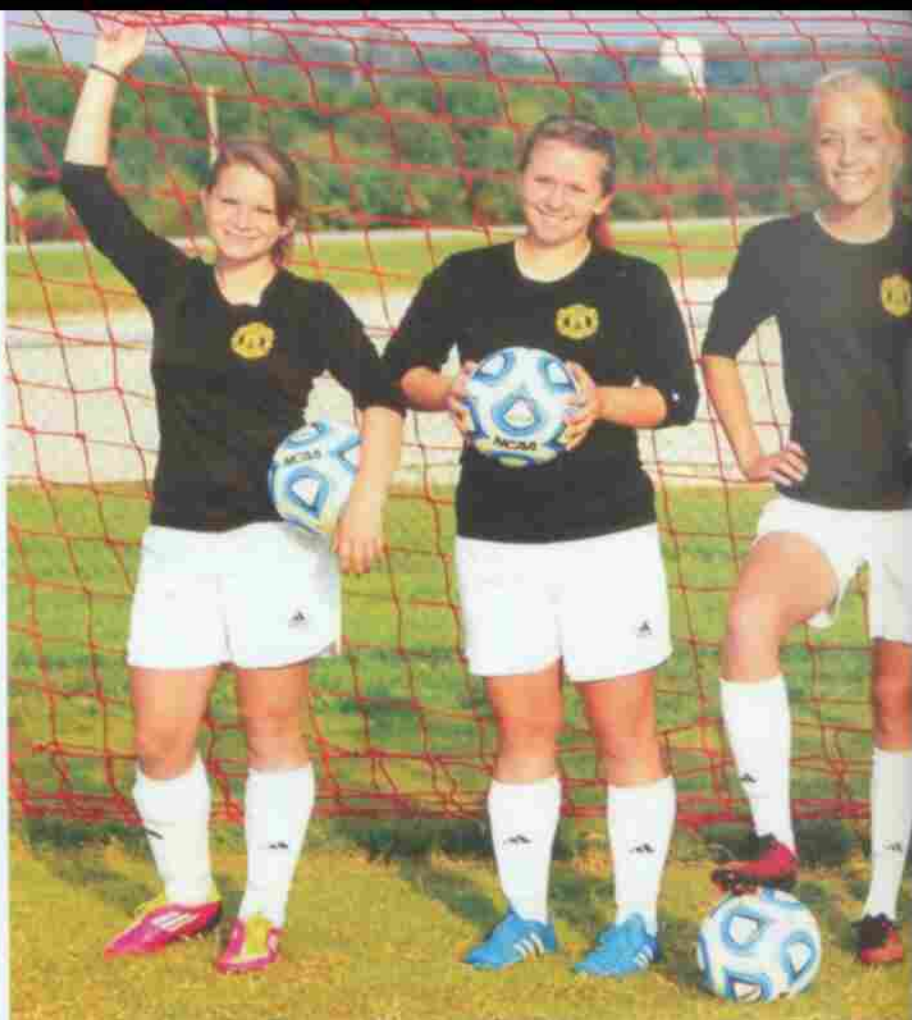
Girls fall short of repeating

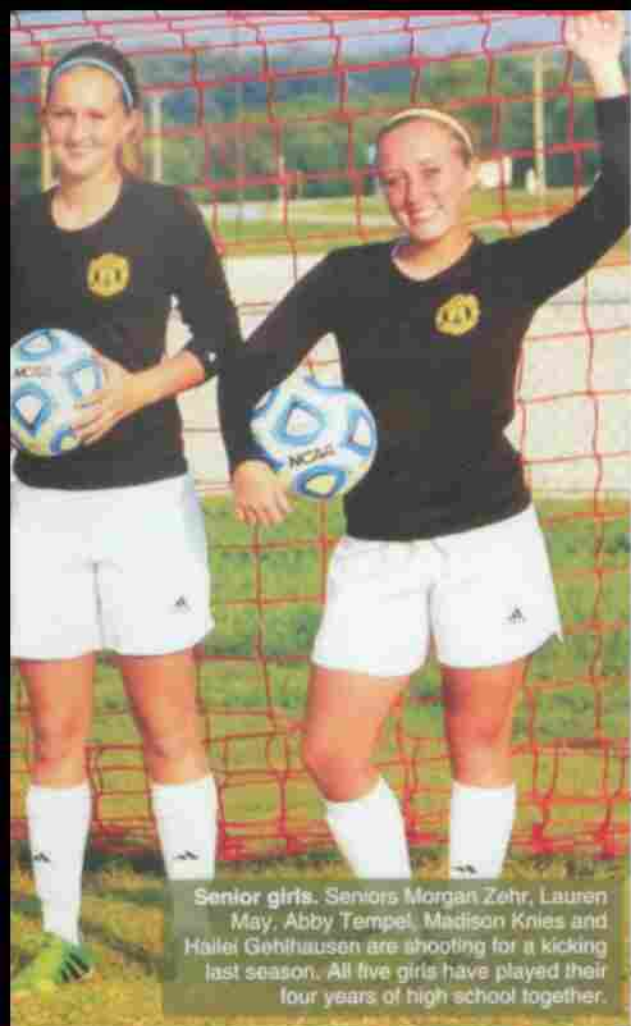

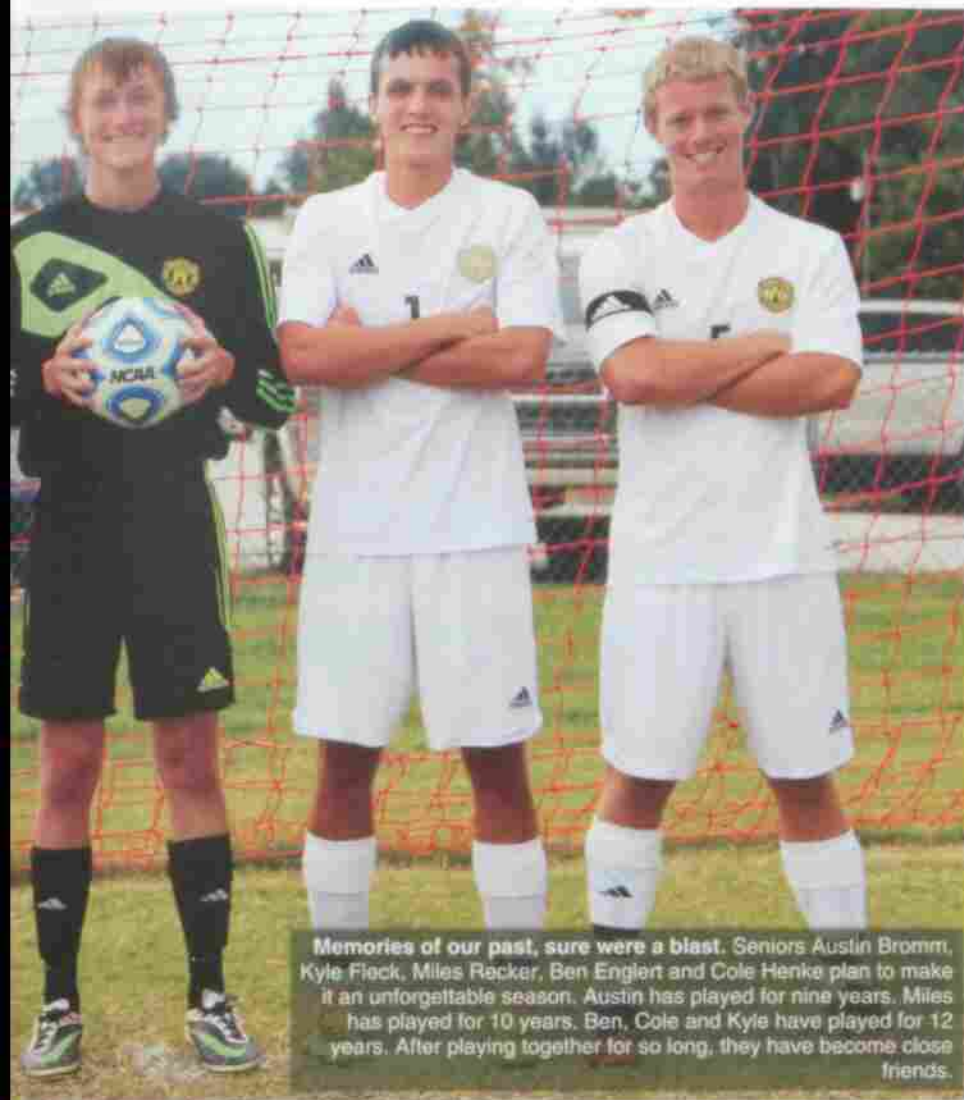
Coach Sicard relied on his returning veterans to lead the way.

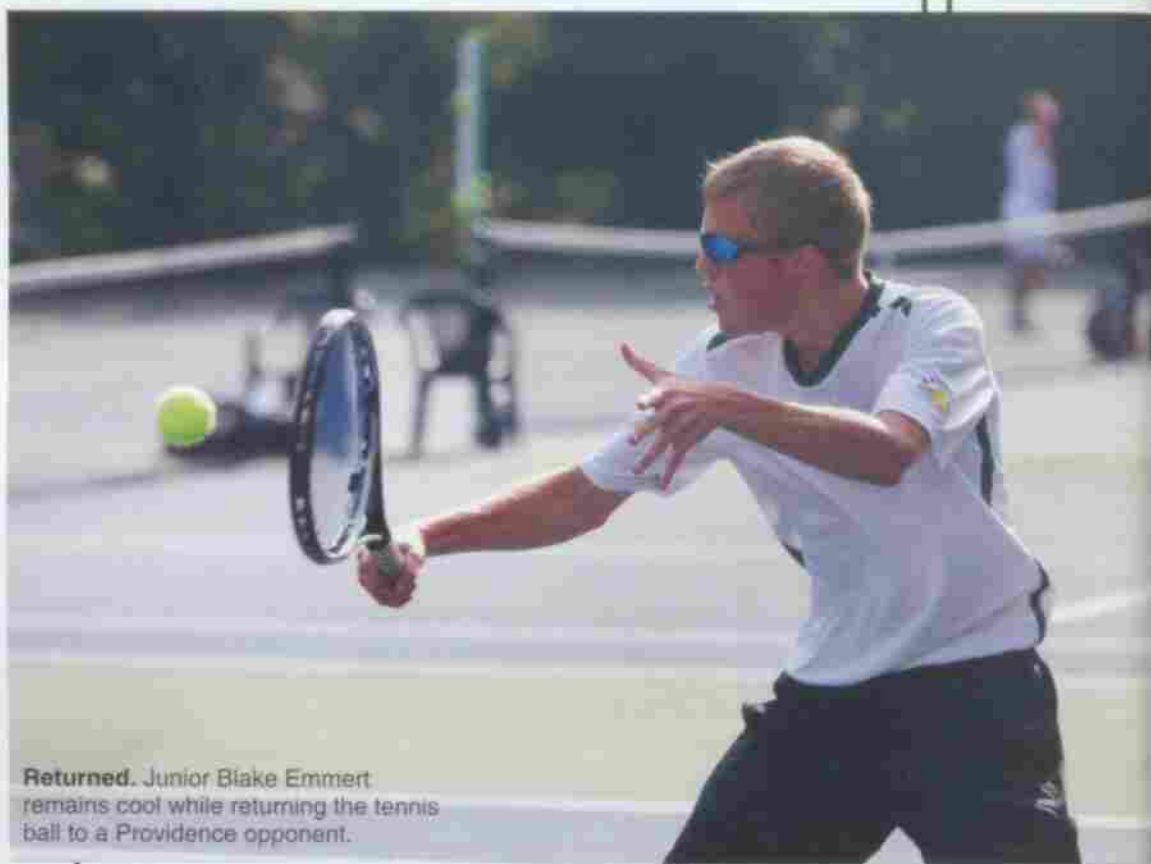

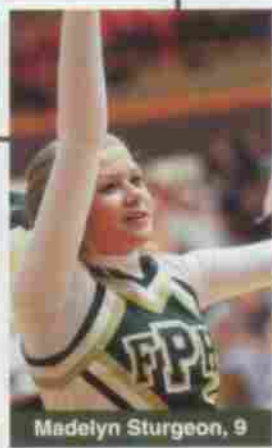

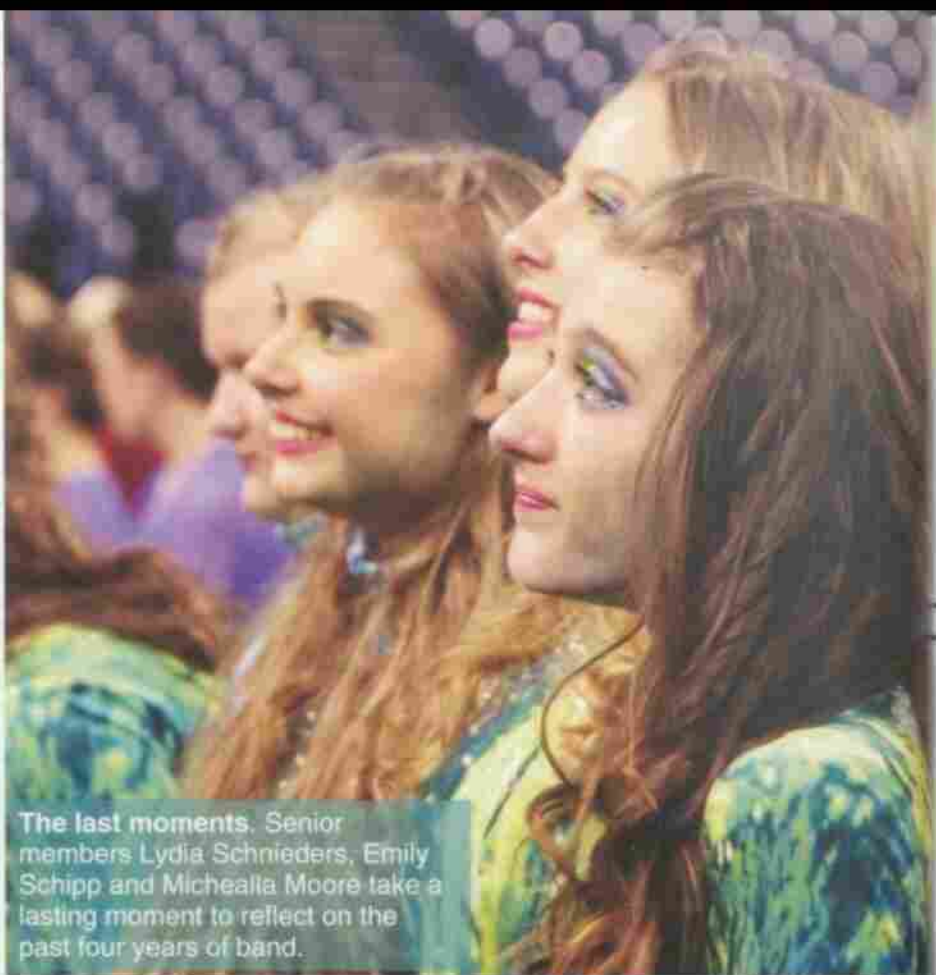

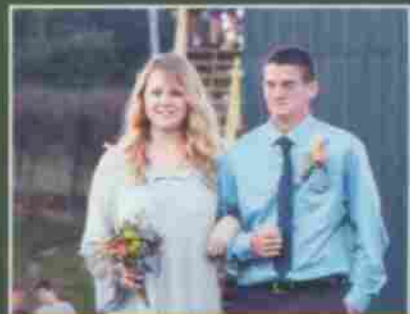
Football Homecoming

The Lady Rangers also participated in the Eastern Greene Holiday Tournament and advanced to the championship game against Brownstown.

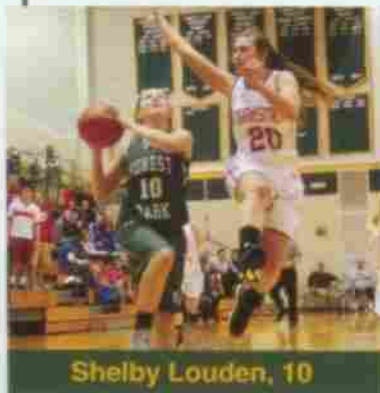
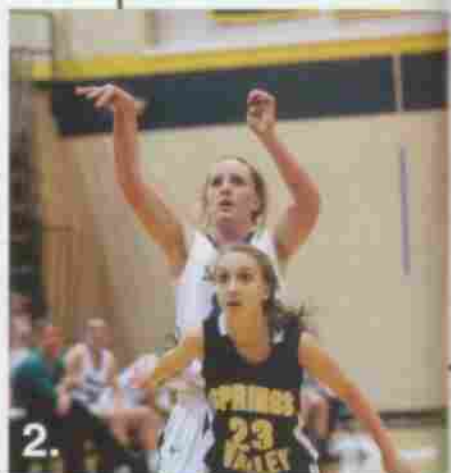
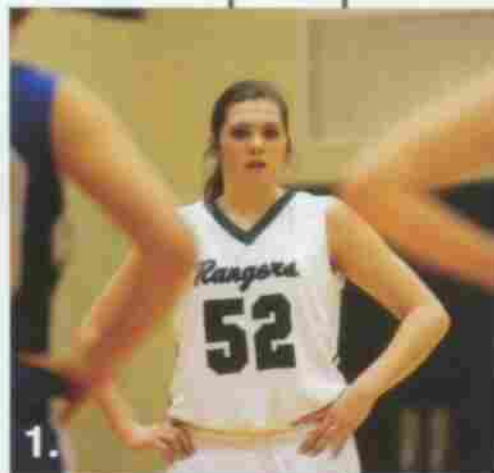

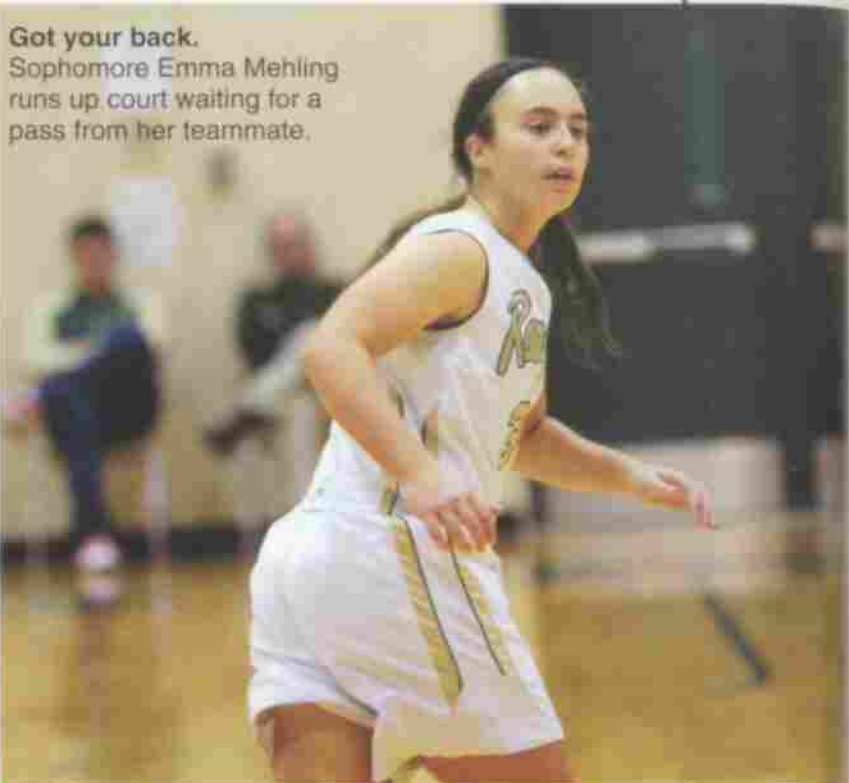
Lady Rangers end the season strong

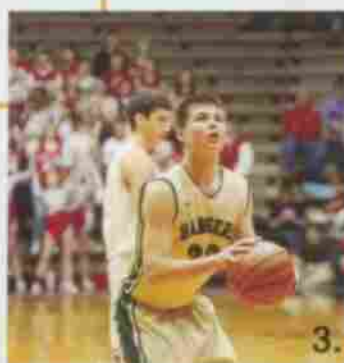
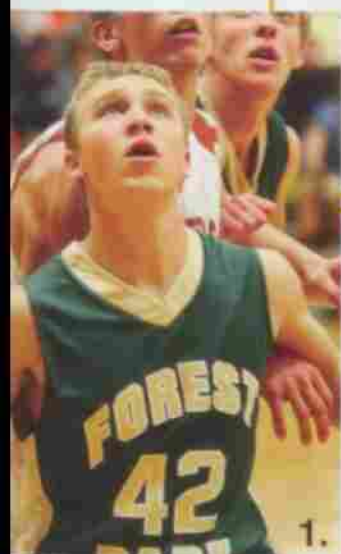
Rangers overcome rocky start to season

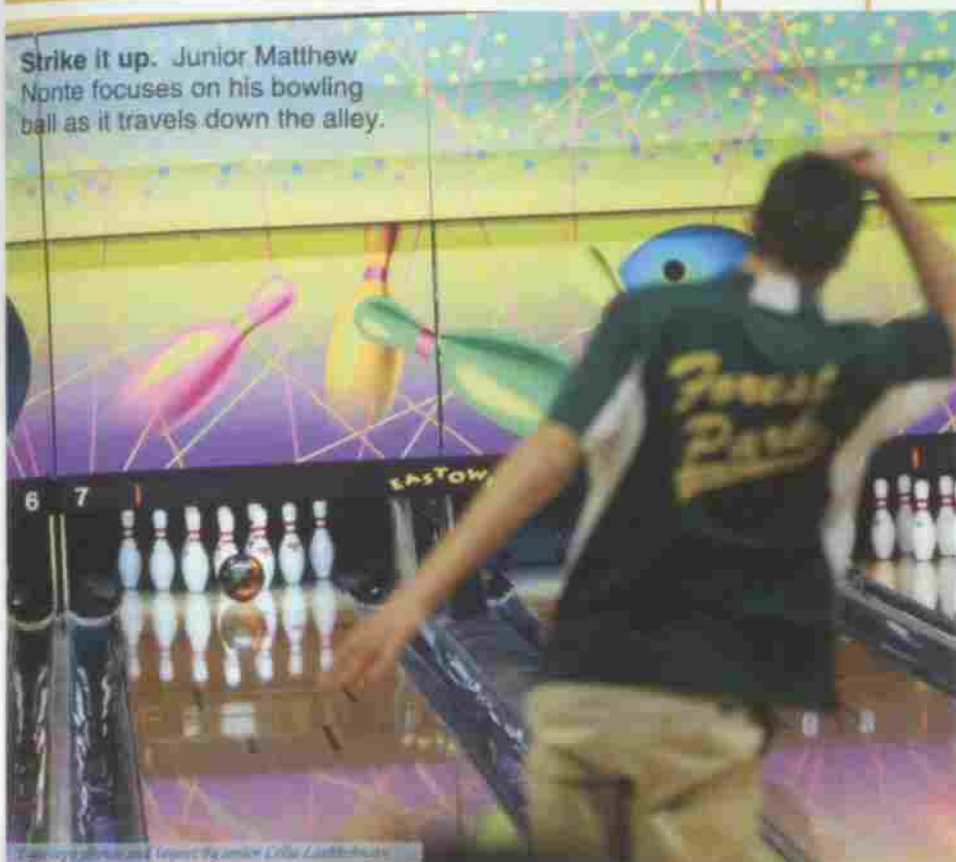

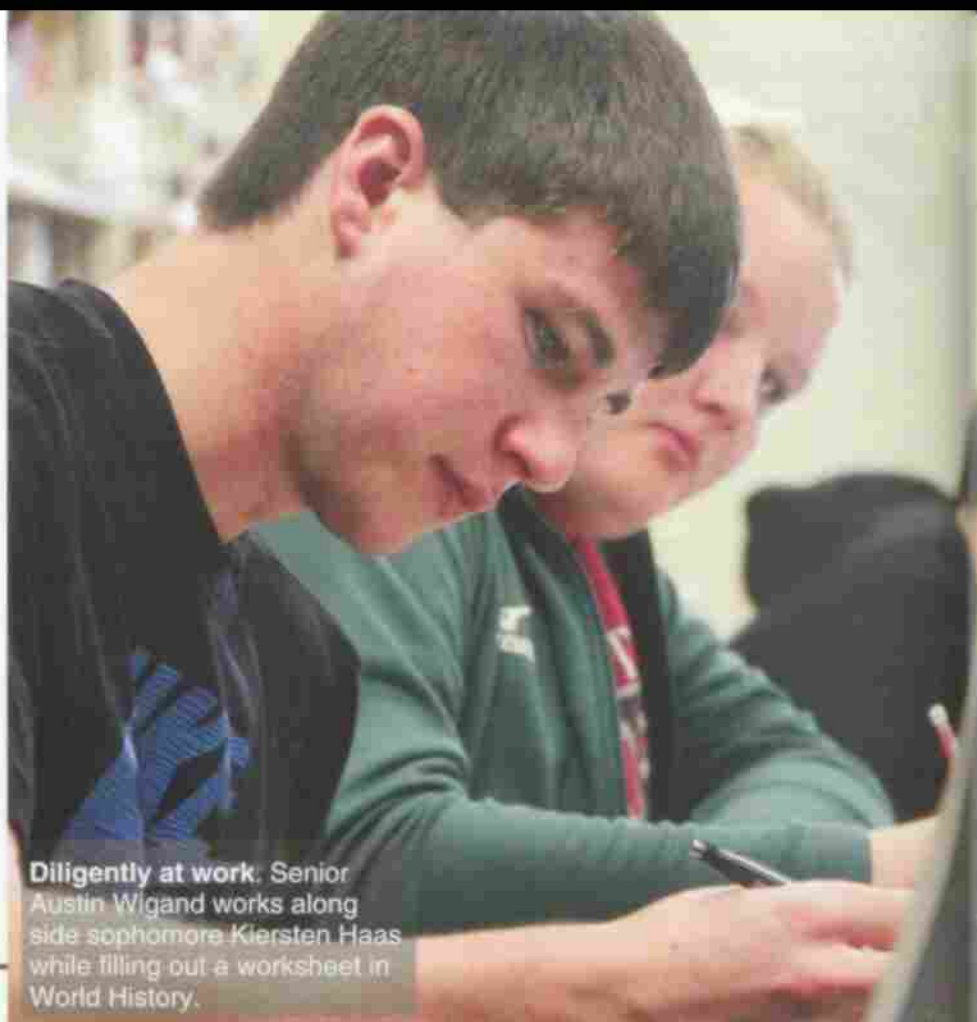

Soldering is in the Soul

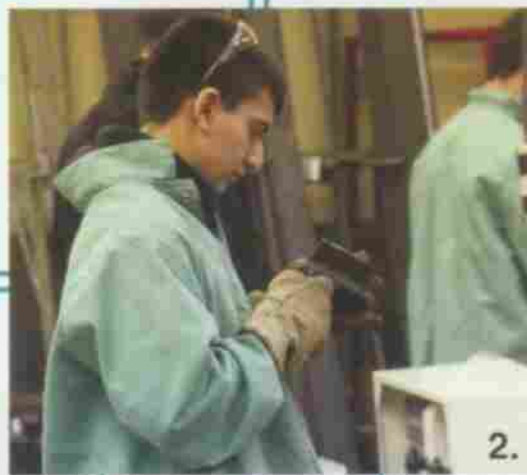

Artistic students finally have a club to express themselves

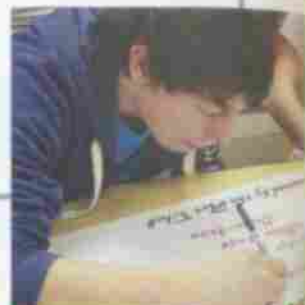

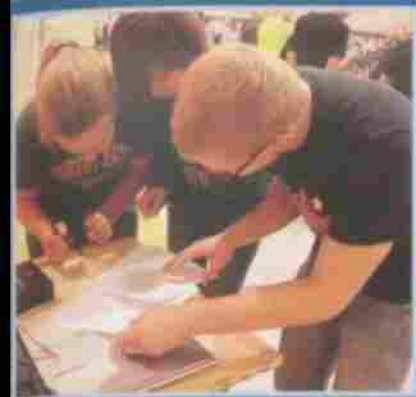

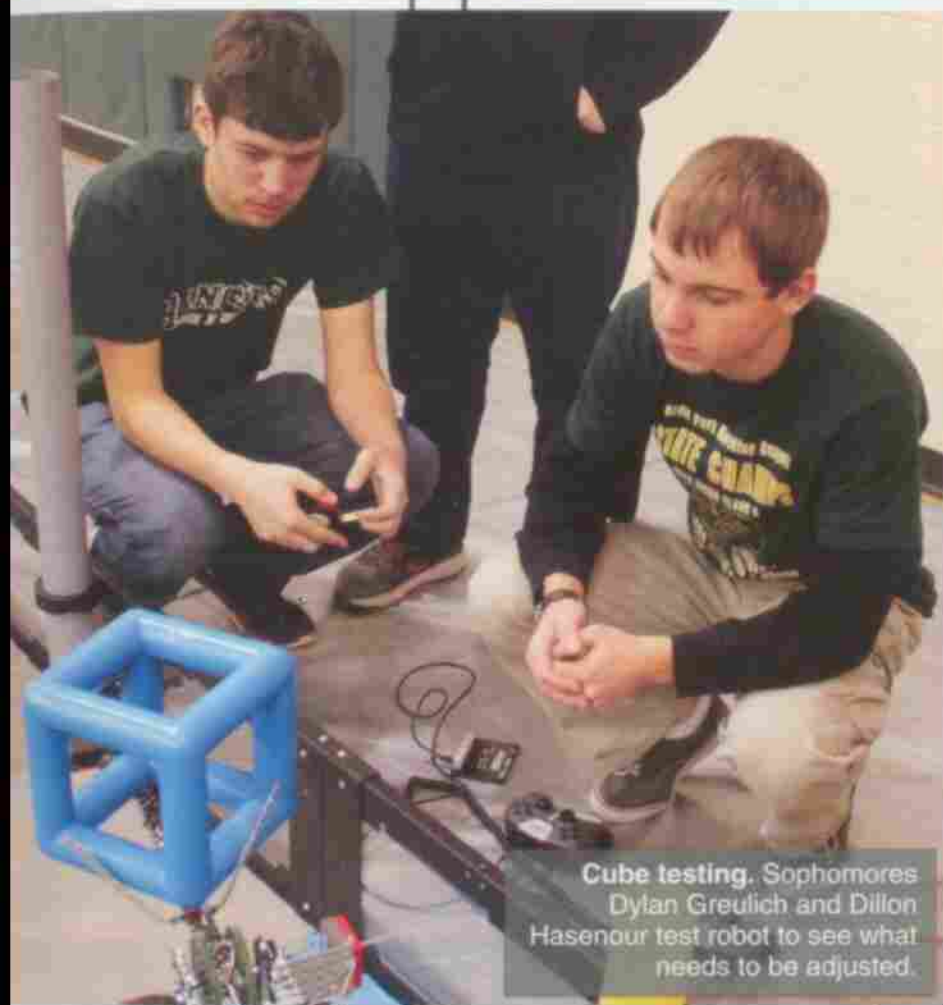
Competition Day

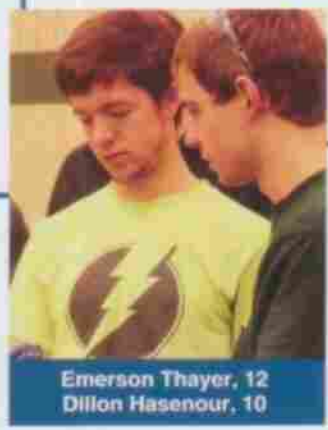
Hard work pays off for the Robotics Club

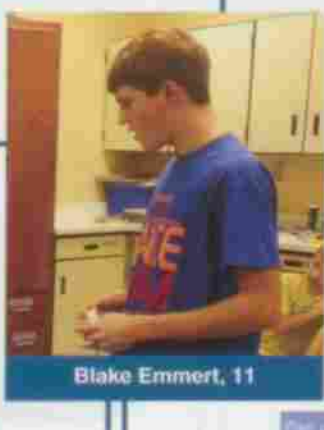

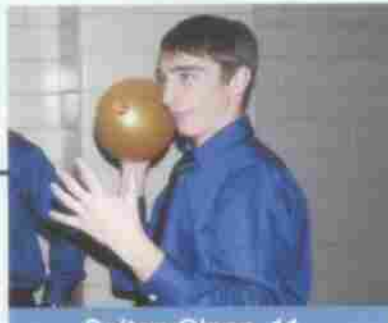

Dancing the Night Away

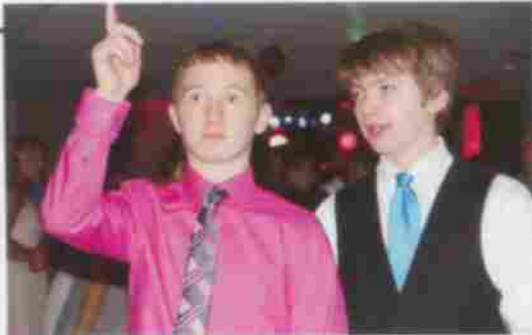
Students have fun whether it is their first Holiday Ball or their last.

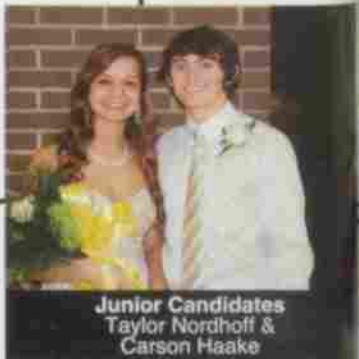

Through it all, the team never quit. The Lady Rangers pushed through the two-day rainy mess before dropping a 5-0 decision to the Wildcats.

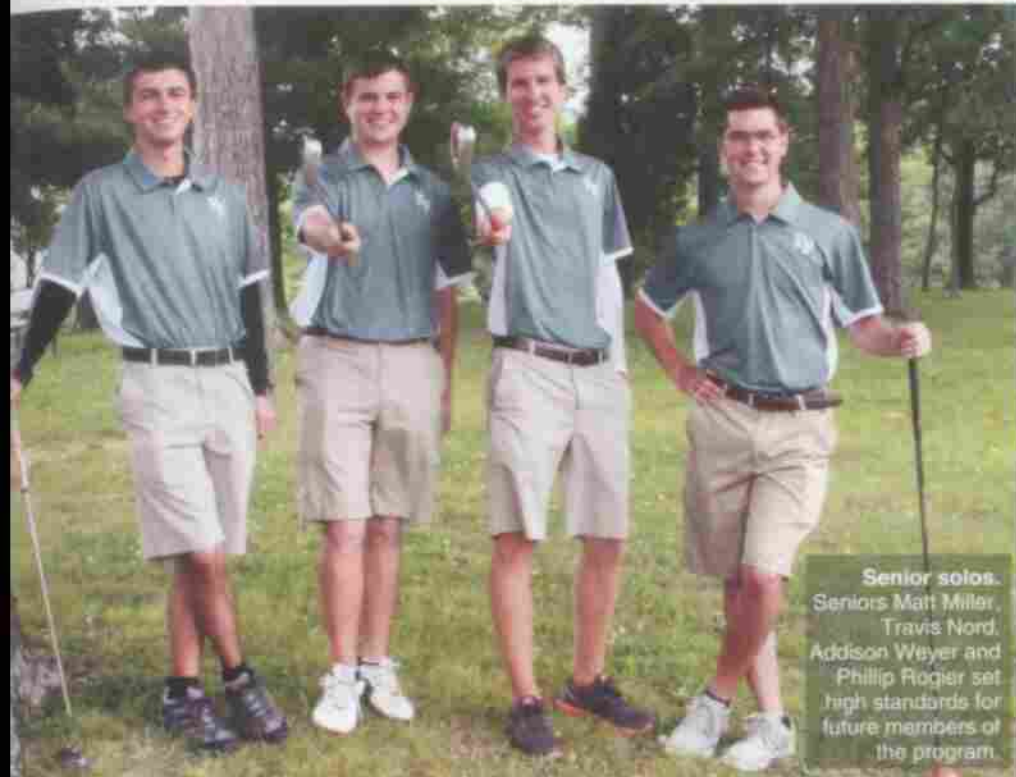

Boys' finish fourth at Sectional

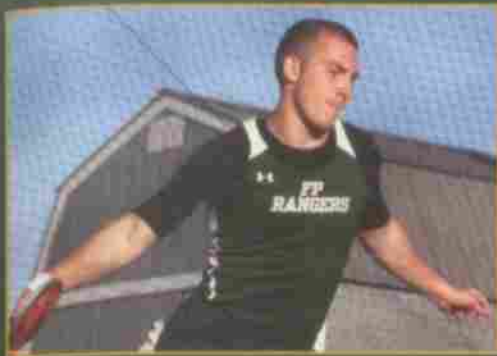

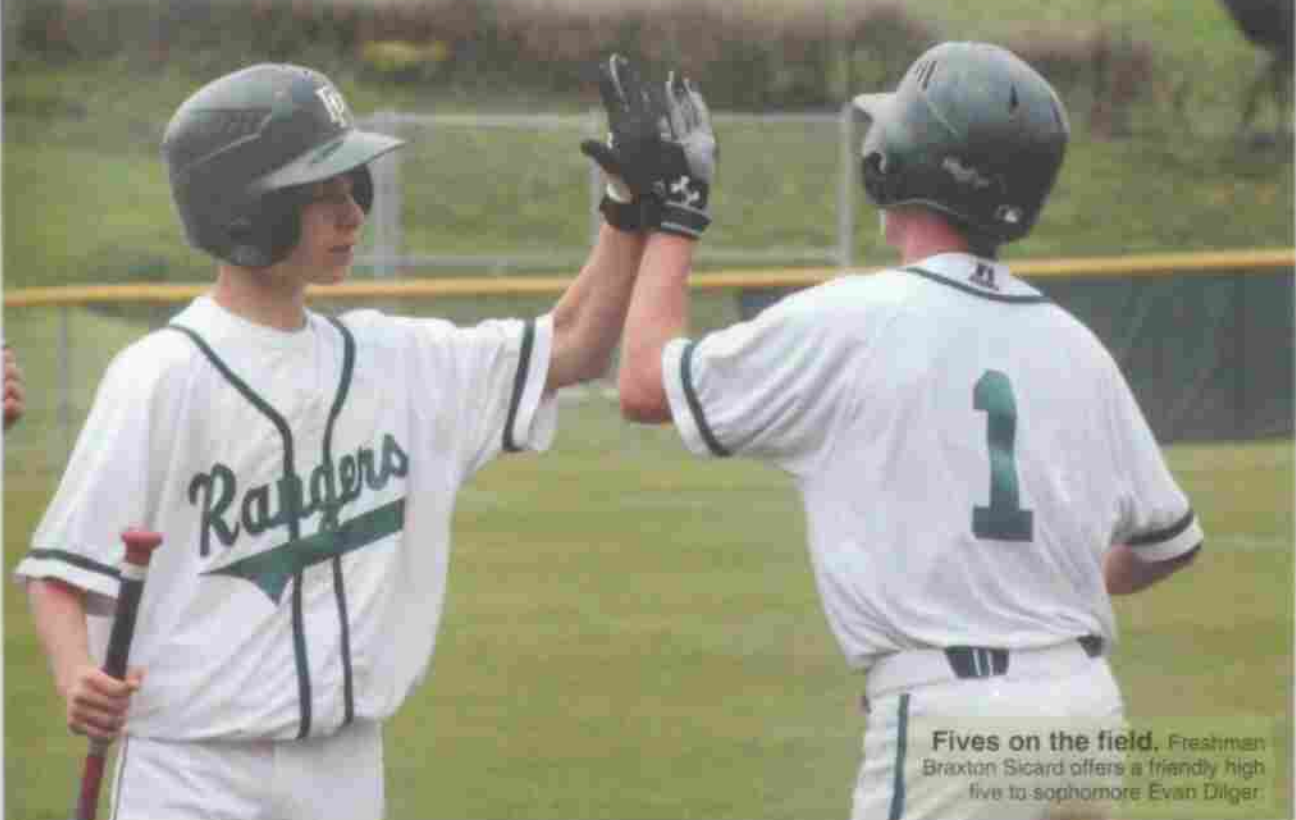

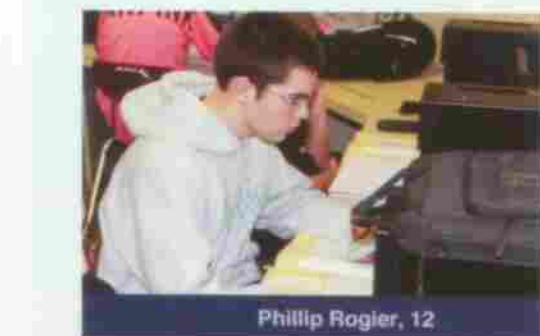
Preparing for the Future

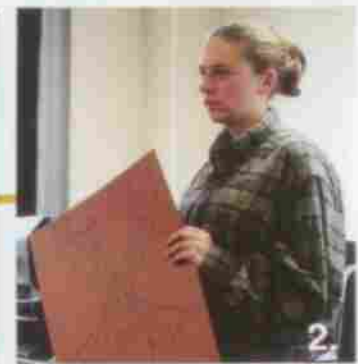
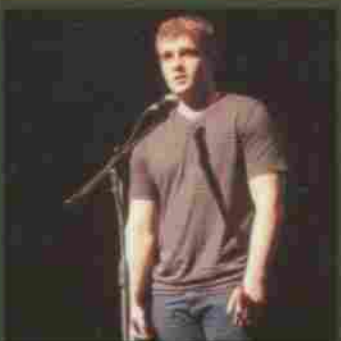
Students excel in Reading and Writing

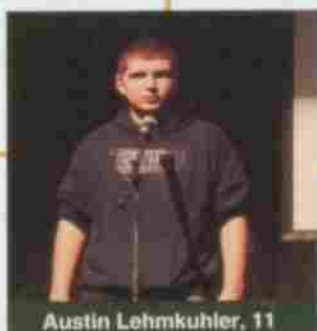

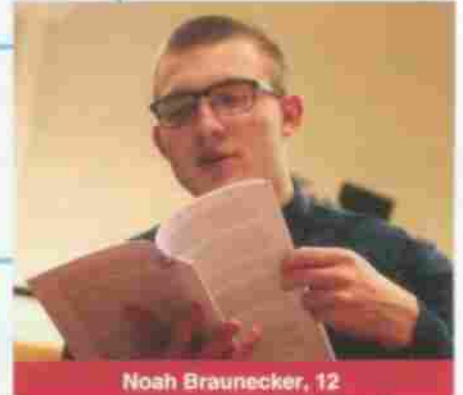
Math and Science teams place first in PAC competition

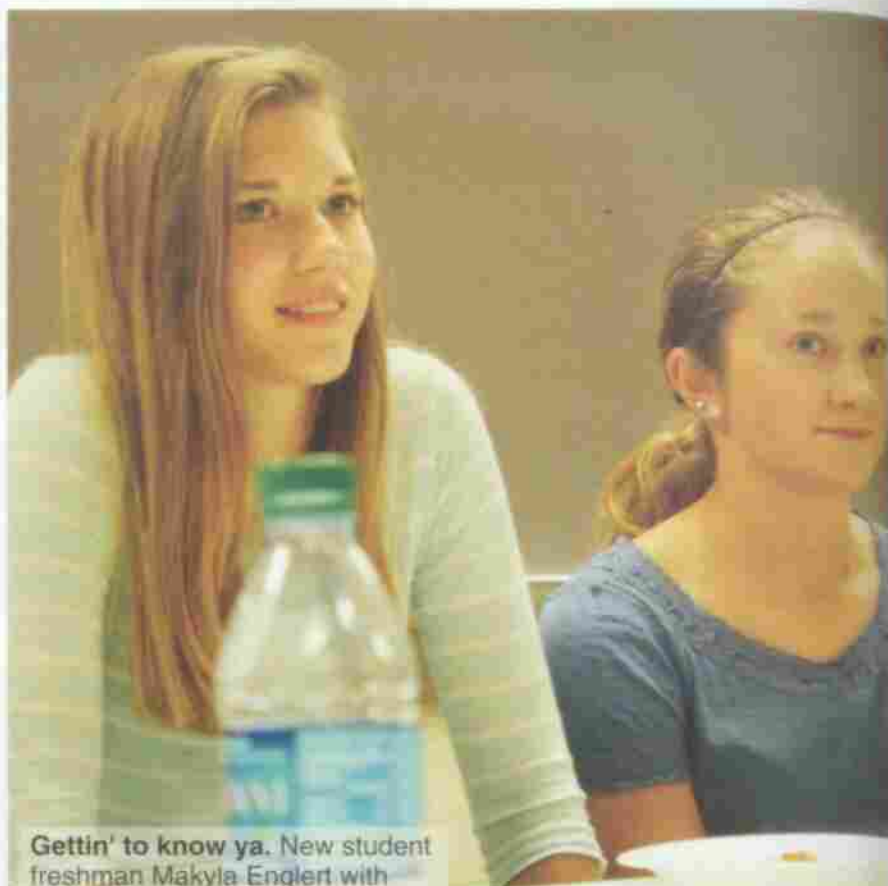

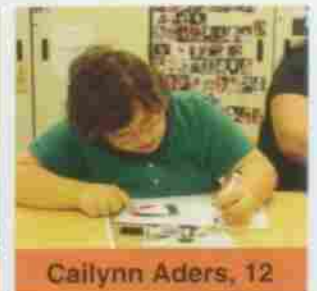

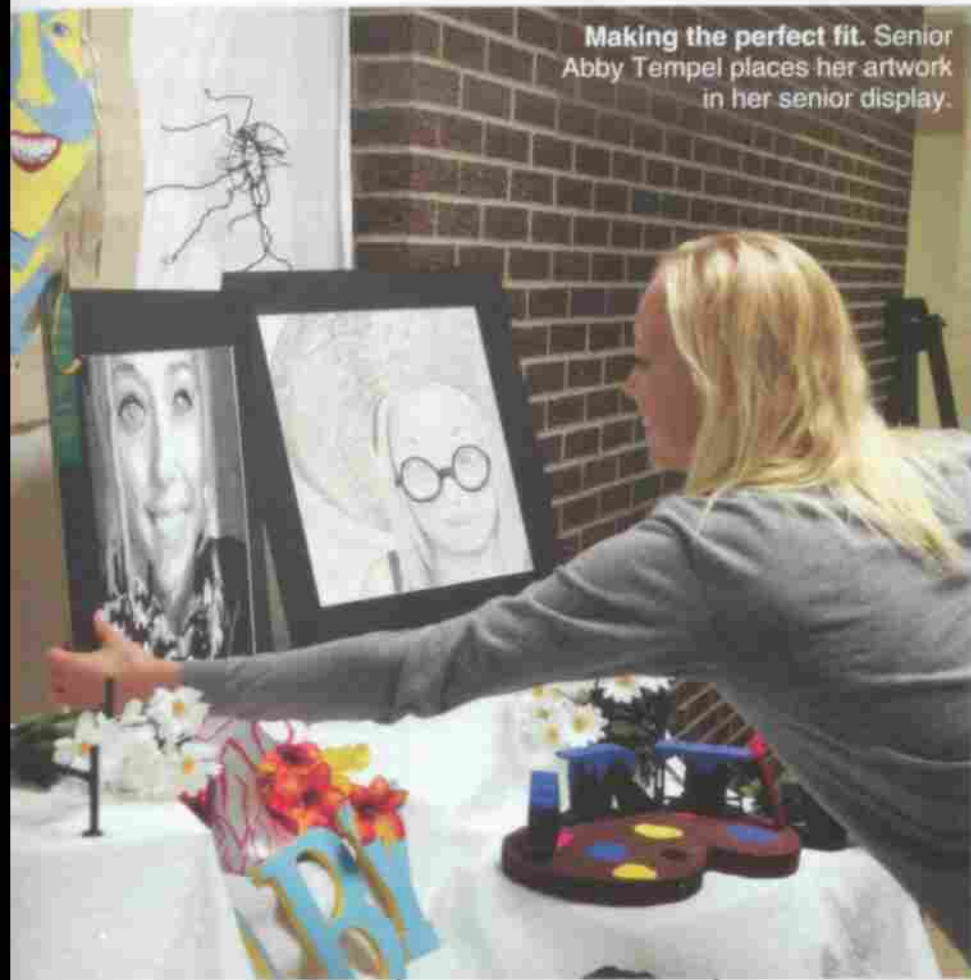

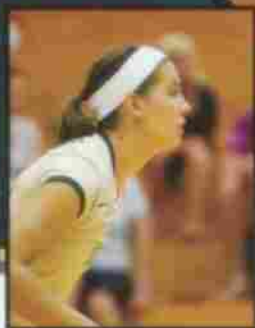


Jordan Voges
