


FCCLA in between.


#### Underclassmen step up to fill positions

year."




#### Mg Shoes to fill





## Cross Country sprints to Semi-State


#### Three runners advanced to semi-state










# Making a splash at Lucas Oil














# Preparing Tomorrow's Leaders today






Rangers overcome rocky start to season




# Time to Spare Girls' team win Back to Back Sectional Titles


## Tech a Look


#### Artistic students finally have a club to express themselves


Heritage Hills High School was the site for this years spell bowl competition held on November second. Forest Park placed a respectable second in their class, but were unable to advance the group to state completion.




With that in mind, coach Opell knew it would take some time for the Lady Rangers to adjust to the intensity of varsity competition.




## Run for Fun, Race for Place


# Getting Down to Business



# Once Upon a Mariness Forest Park students sing their way into the Sn










# Senior Outstanding Athletes
