
One of the most influential teachers at Forest Park High School, Ms. Leslie Shobe has definitely impacted on students' lives for many years by eparing her students for college and the workforce.


Cooking Up Life Lessons


Mr. Emmert retires after 34 years

At first, students were apprehensive about the changes, but eventually grew to accept it.



The only exit from the lot was the driveway near Buechler Arena, where students could only make a right turn.












Spring into the Arts




Pushing the Limits of Perfection


