Taylor Bayer

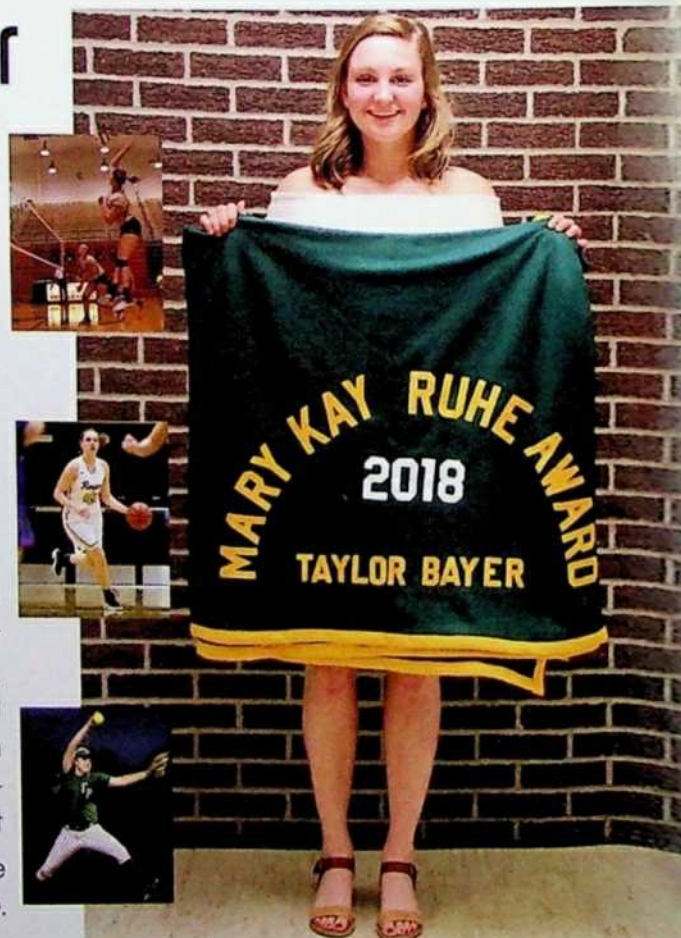
Taylor is the daughter of Brian and Kristy Bayer. She has been a big impact in sports for the past four years. She played volleyball, basketball, and softball.

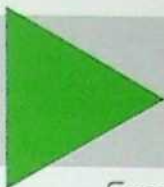

Since then, Miah has participated in the local 4H fair with her horse each summer, and has taken her skills to the next level at national competitions. Some highlights of her 4H fair career were winning 'Cleanest Stall' and placing first in both pole and barrel racing. At national competition, Miah performs well, often placing highly. She travels mostly to Kentucky to compete, but sometimes travels farther to places like Oklahoma City for the American Quarter Horse Youth Association World Championship show. In 2017, she attended 7 shows. At this year's AQHYA show, Miah did exceedingly well against the 815 other riders who made up 2,536 entries. She placed 1st in the Level 2 Stake Race, and ran a 8.830 that placed her 1st, and sent her to the finals where she placed 3rd in the Level 1. 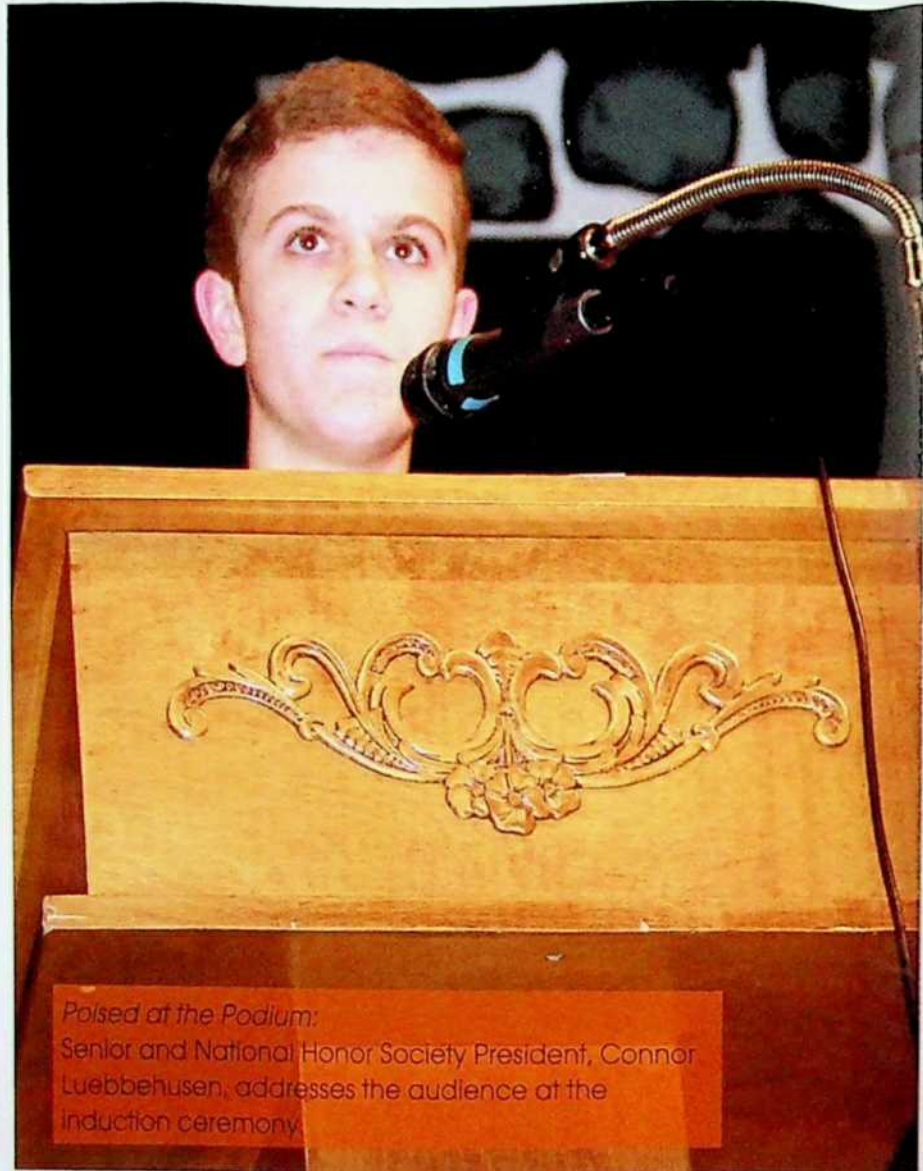

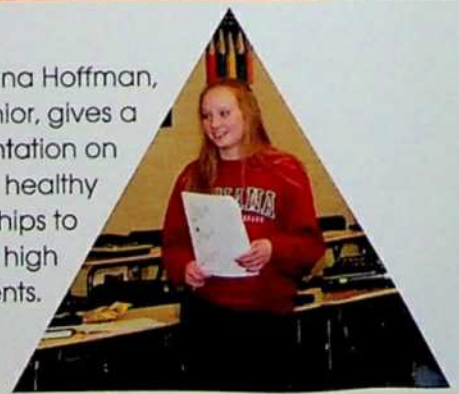

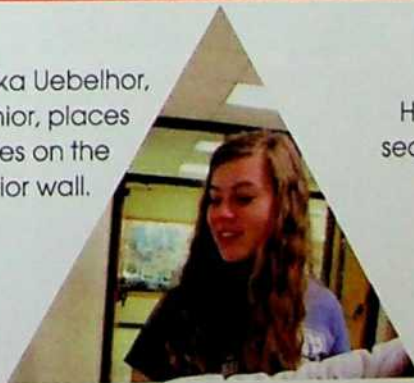

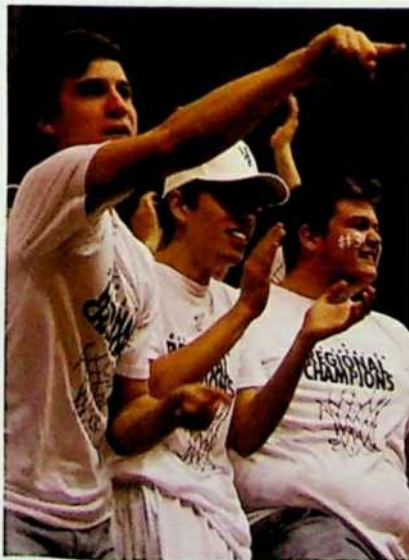

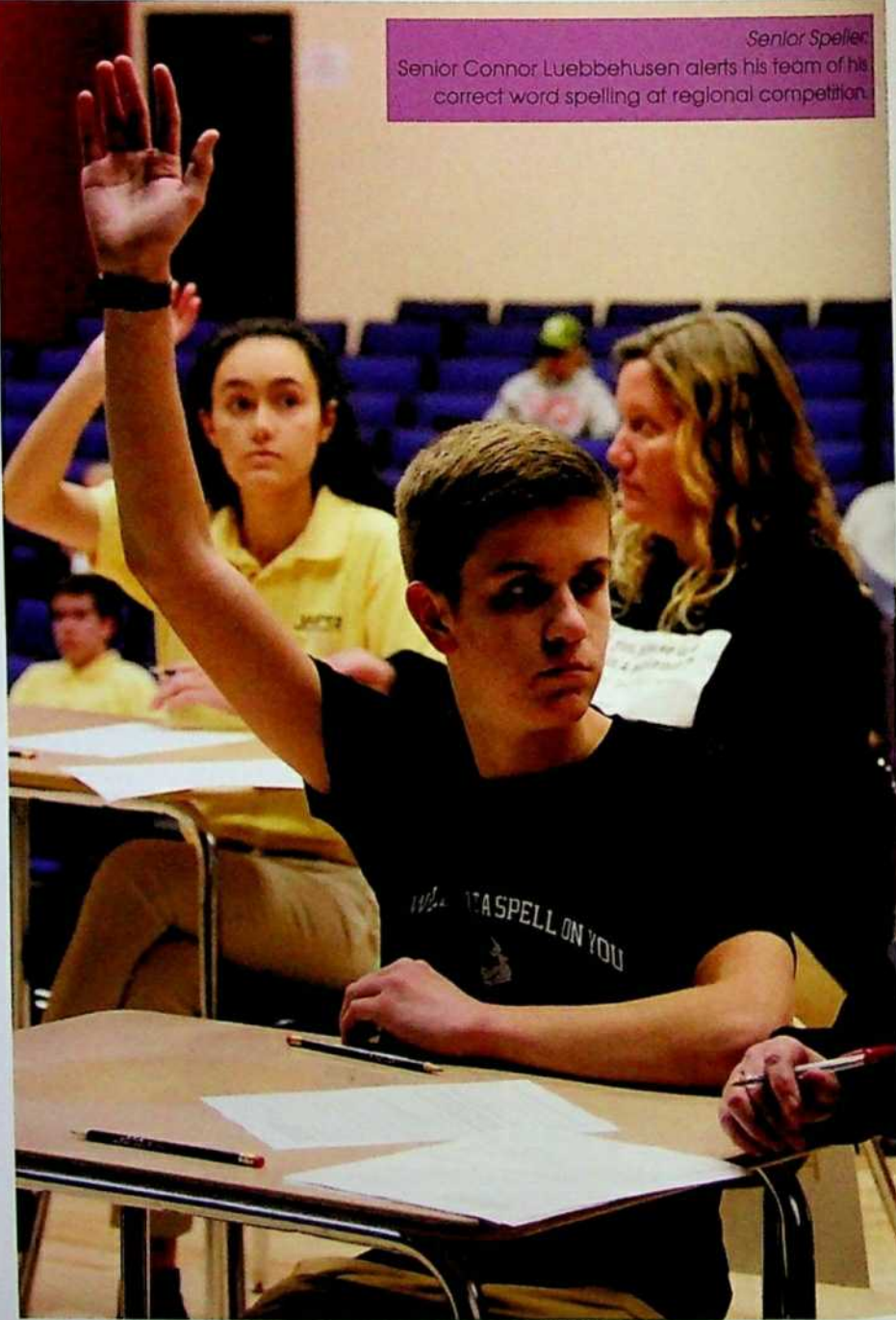

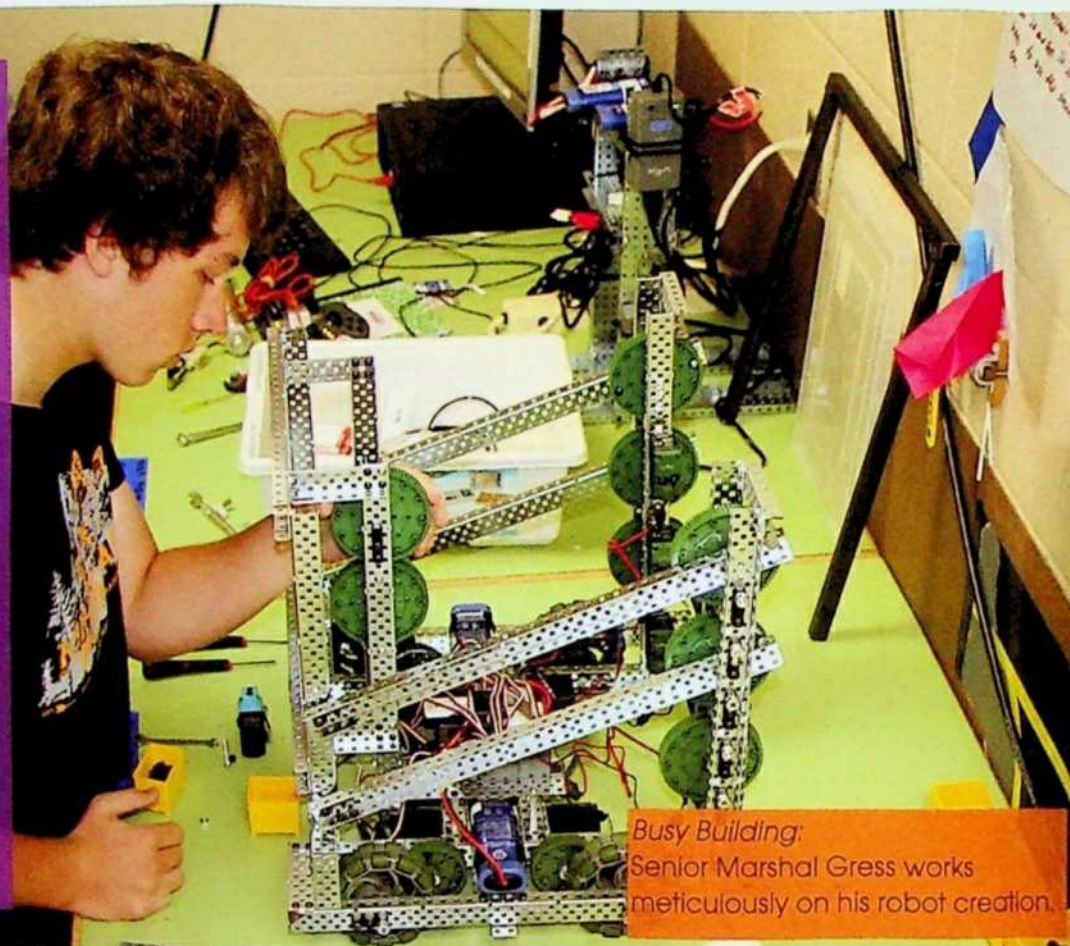

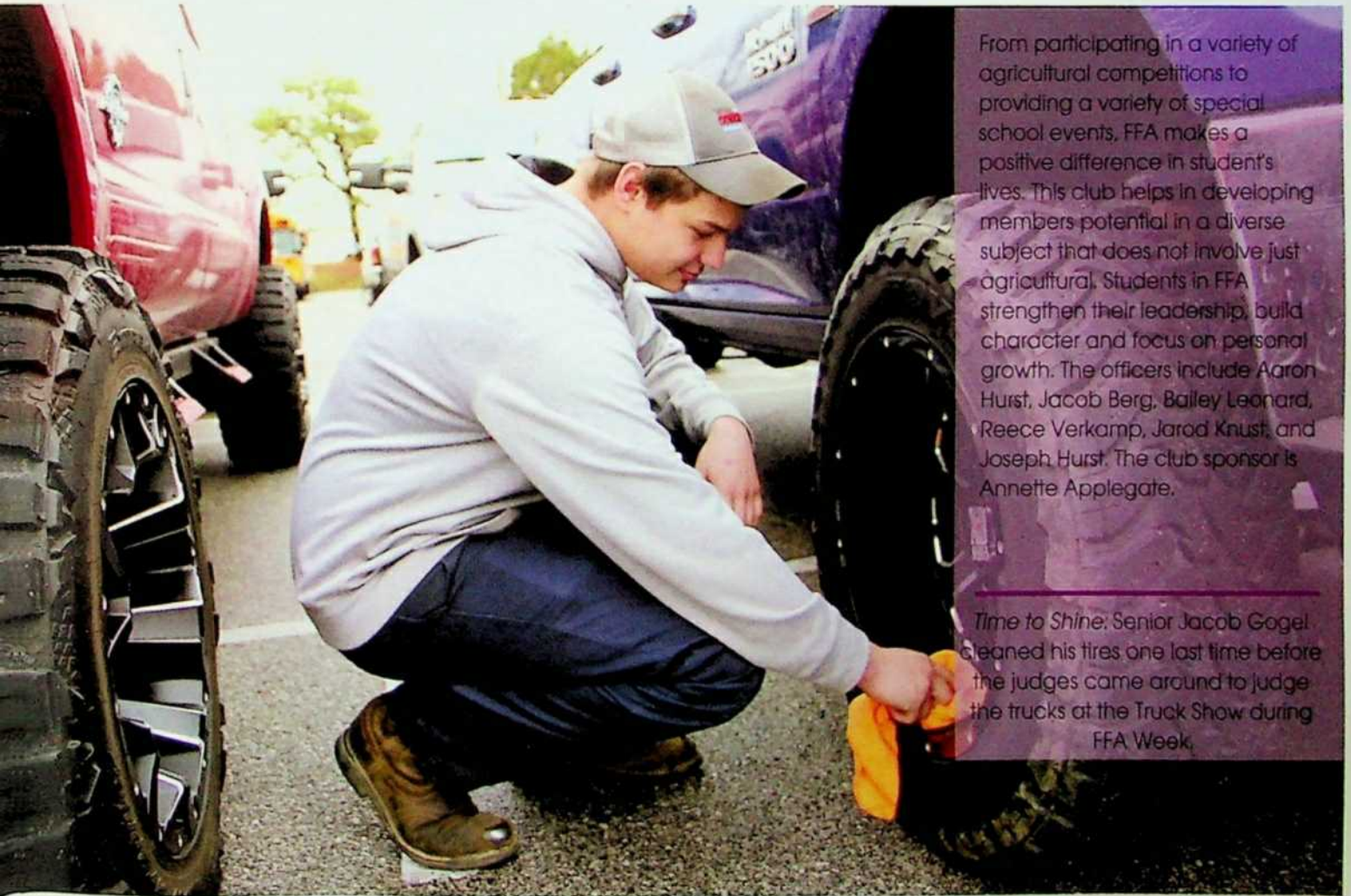

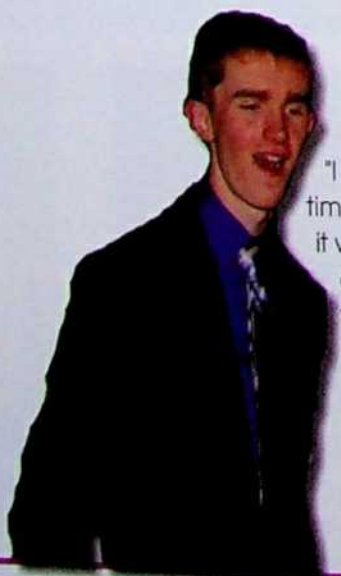

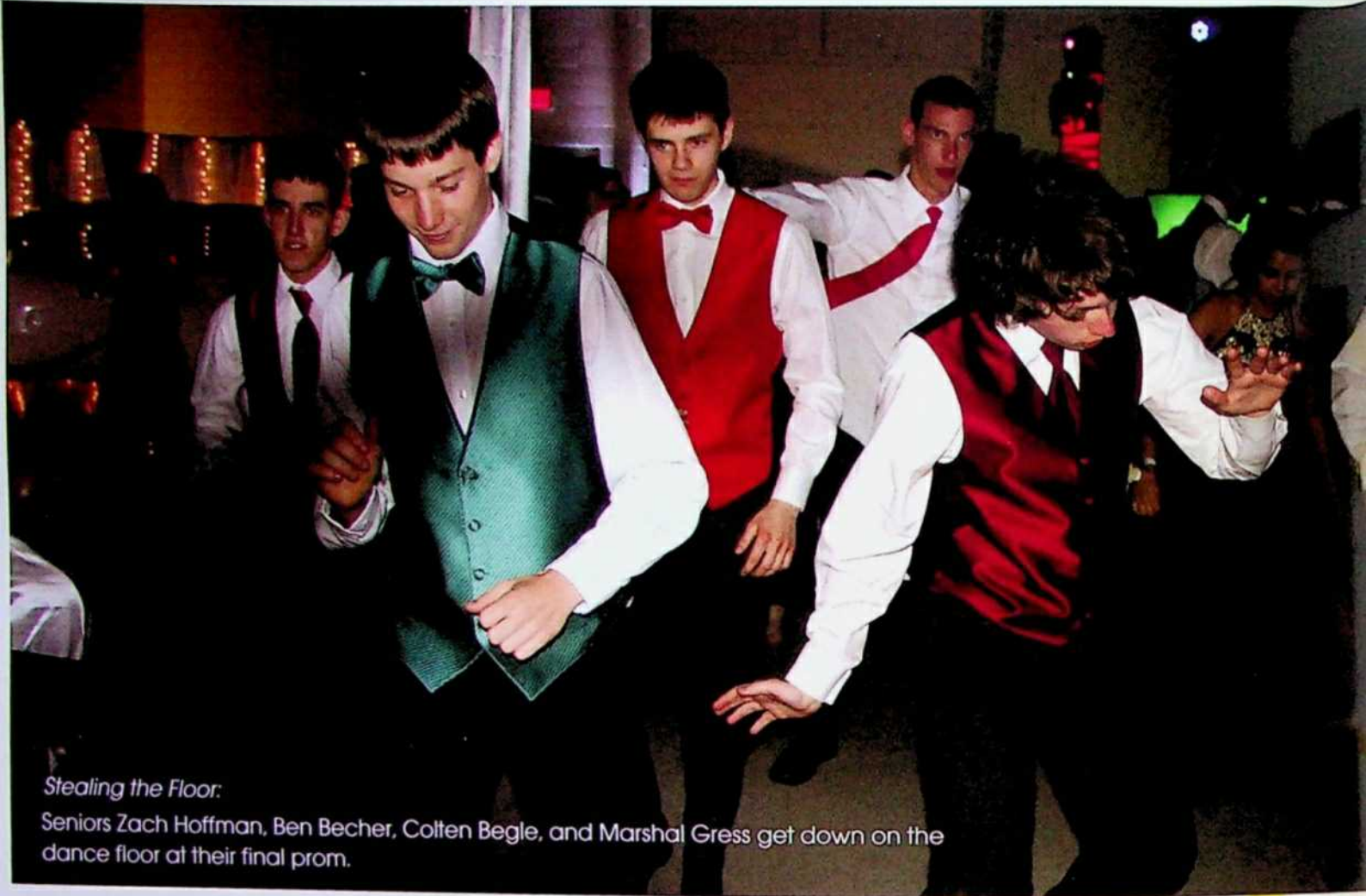

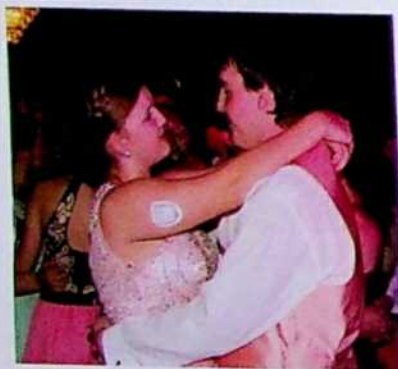

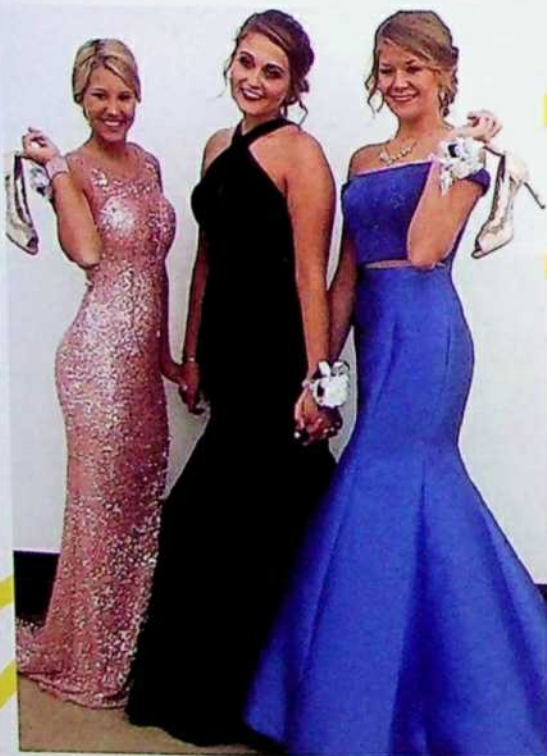

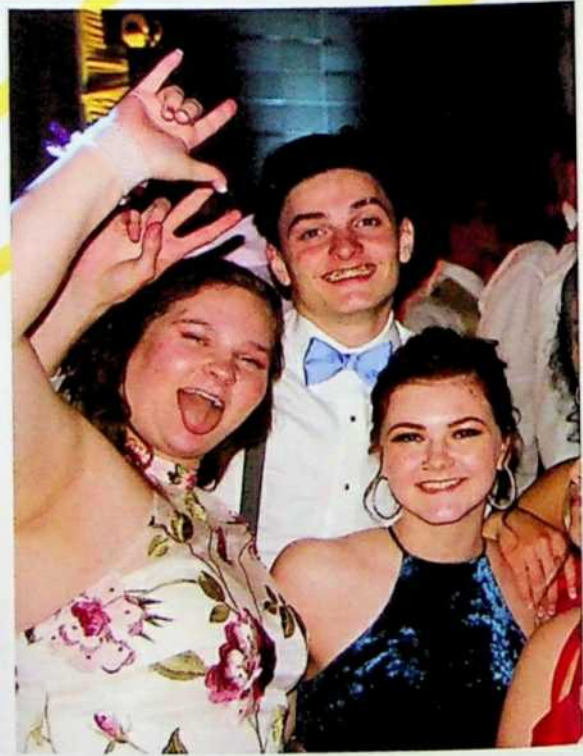

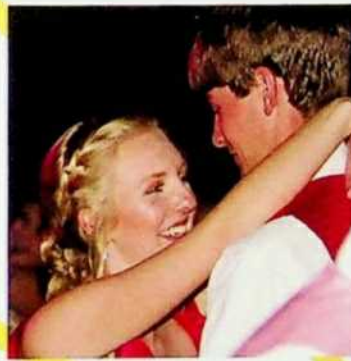

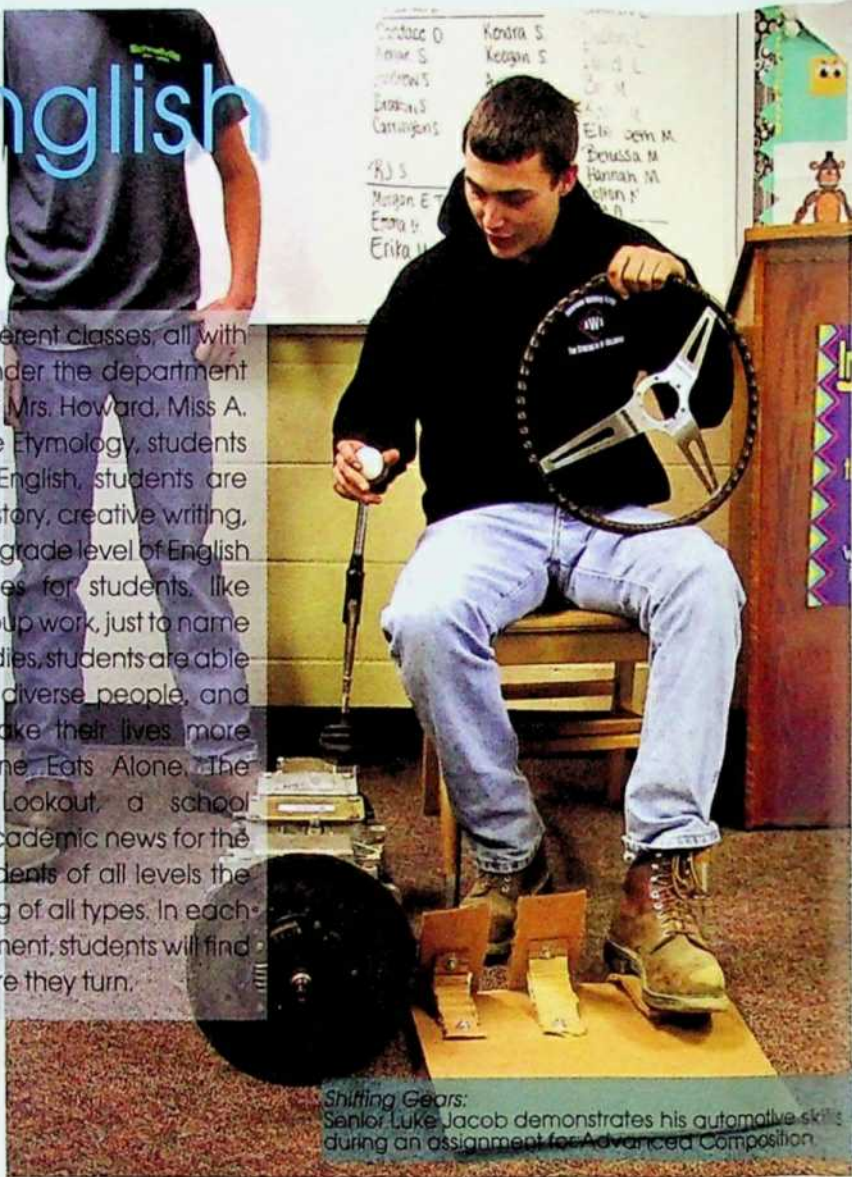

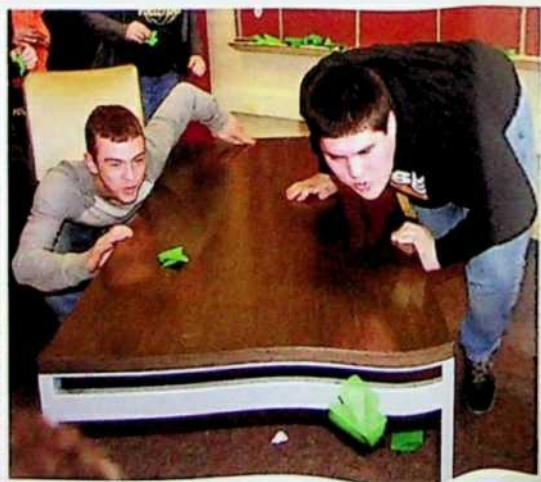

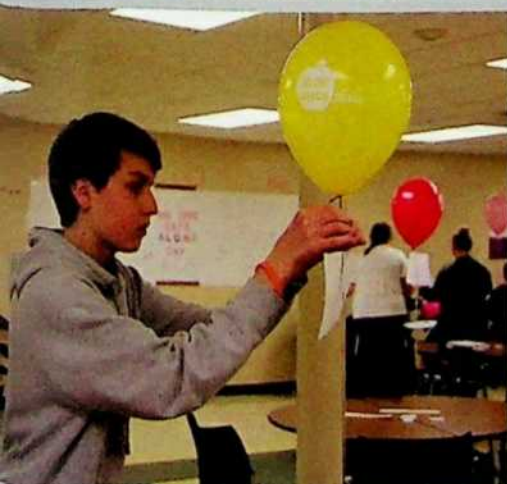

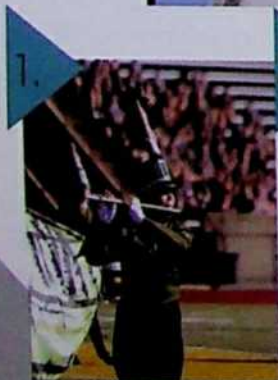

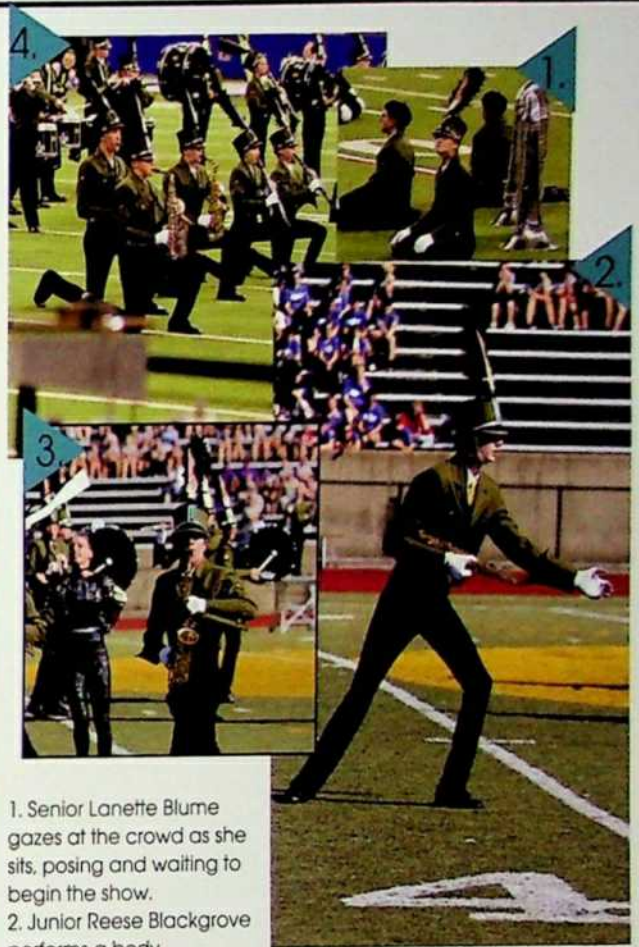

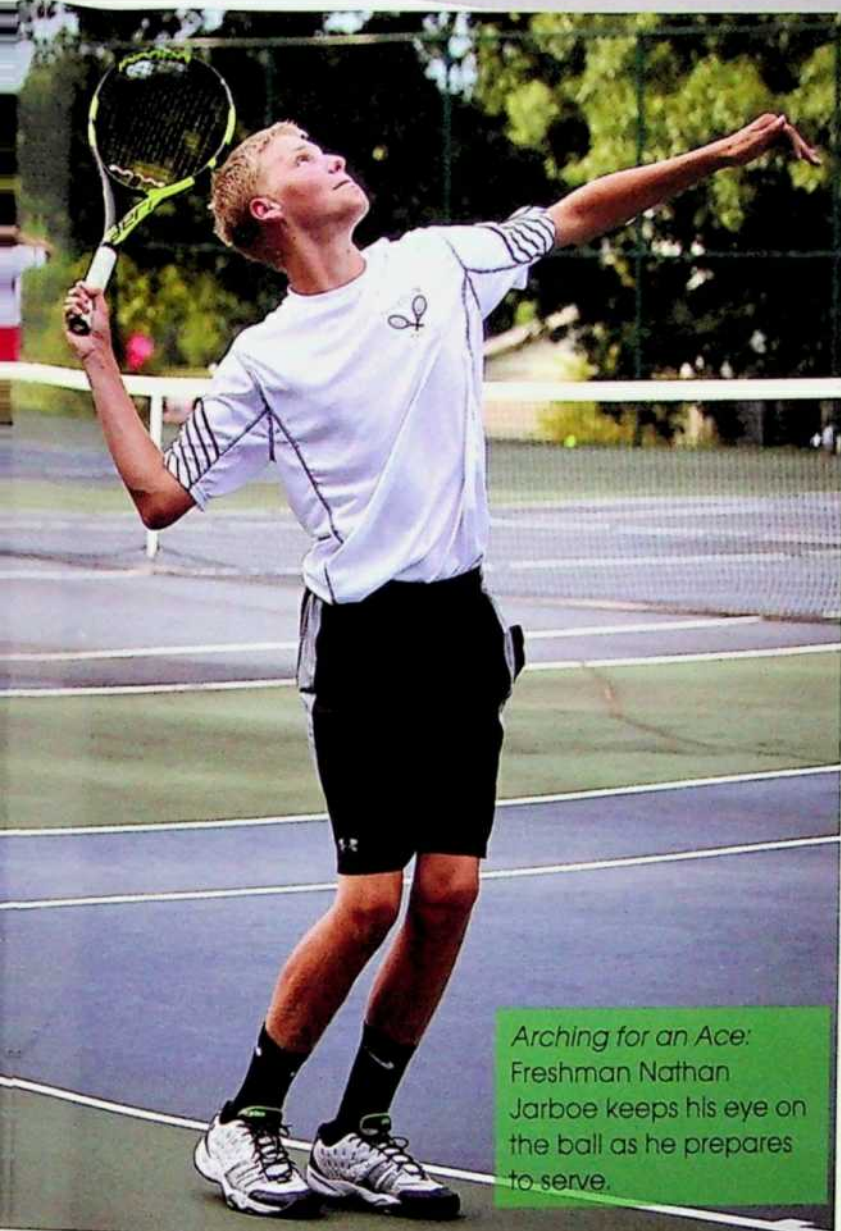

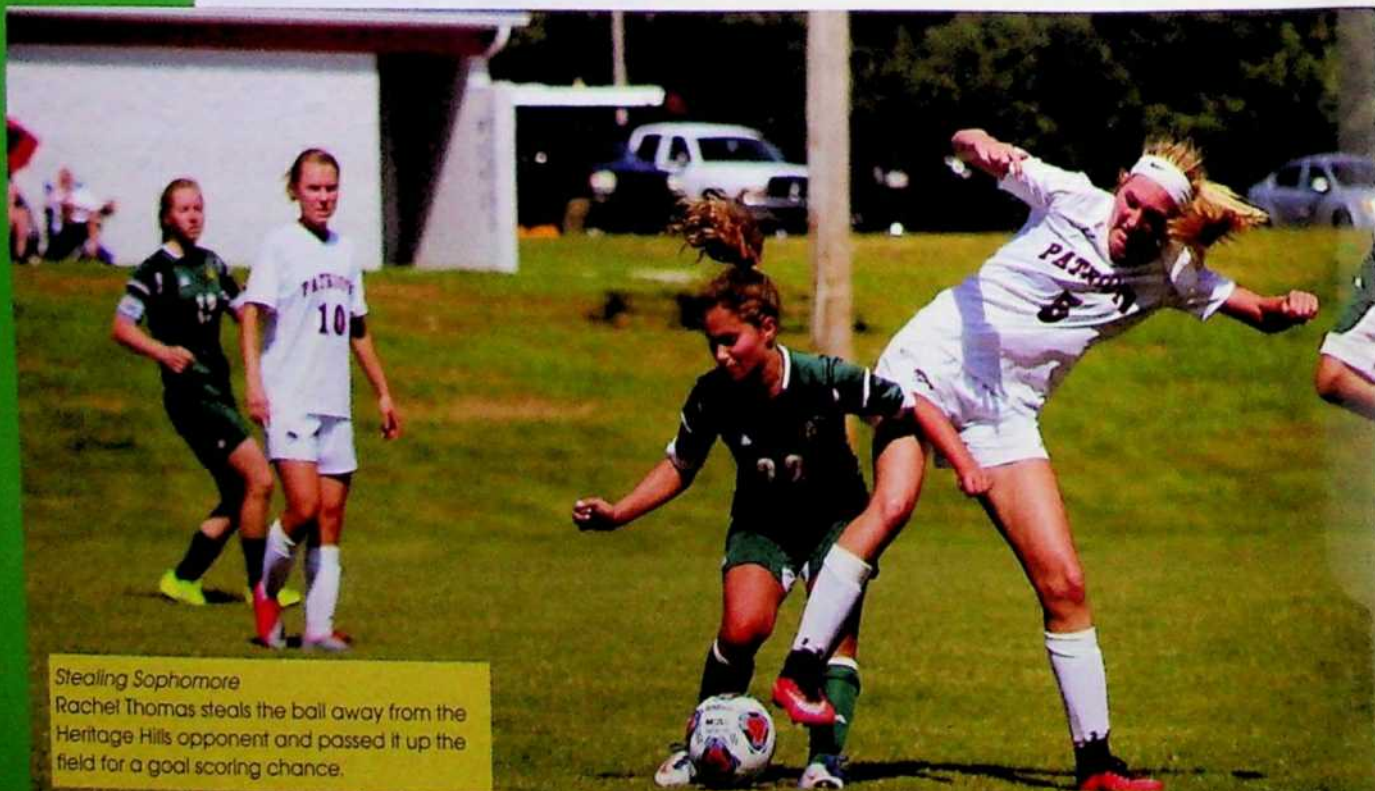

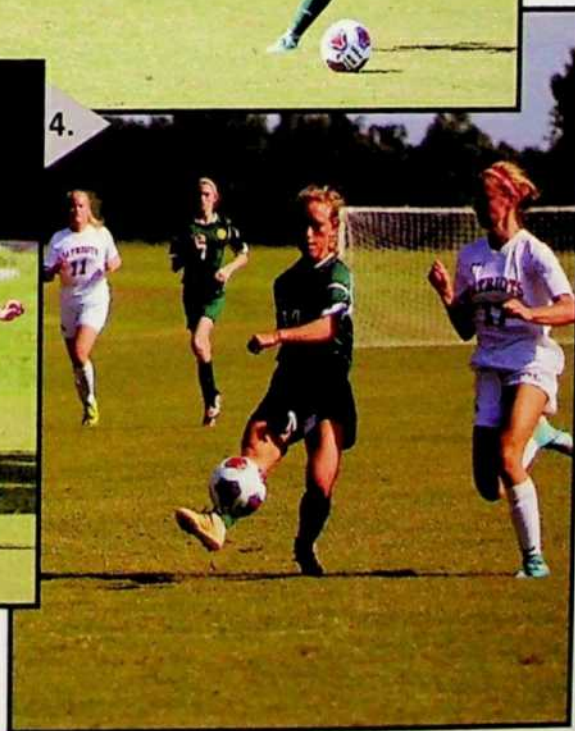

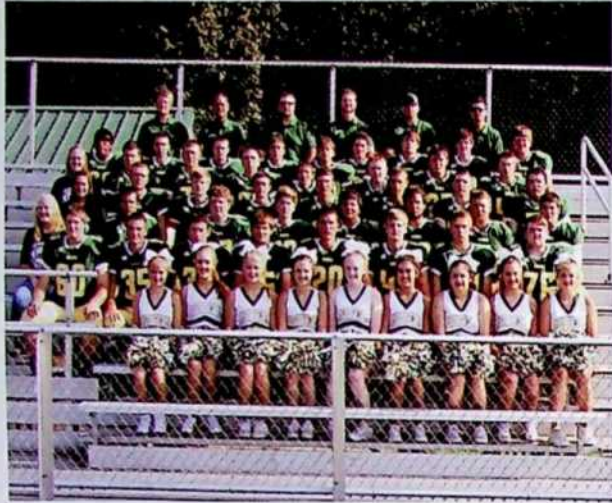

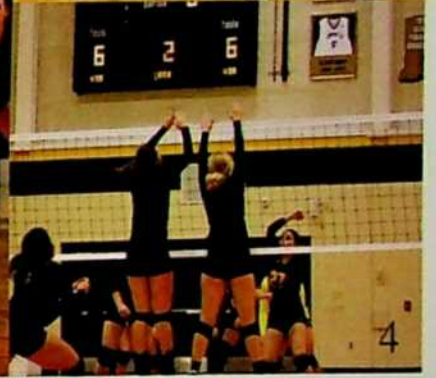

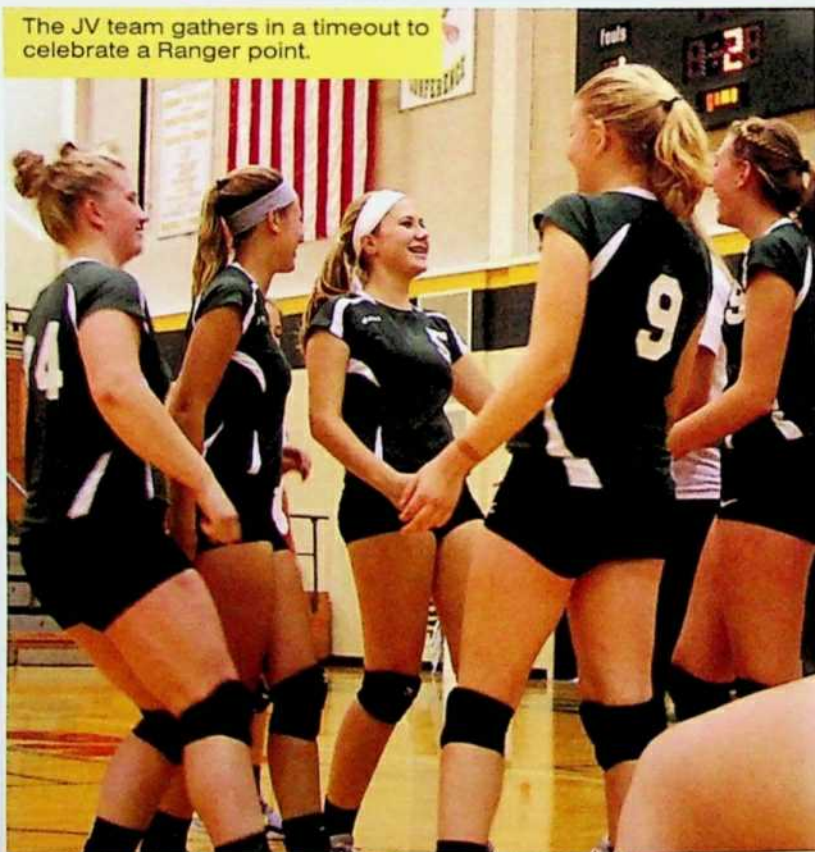

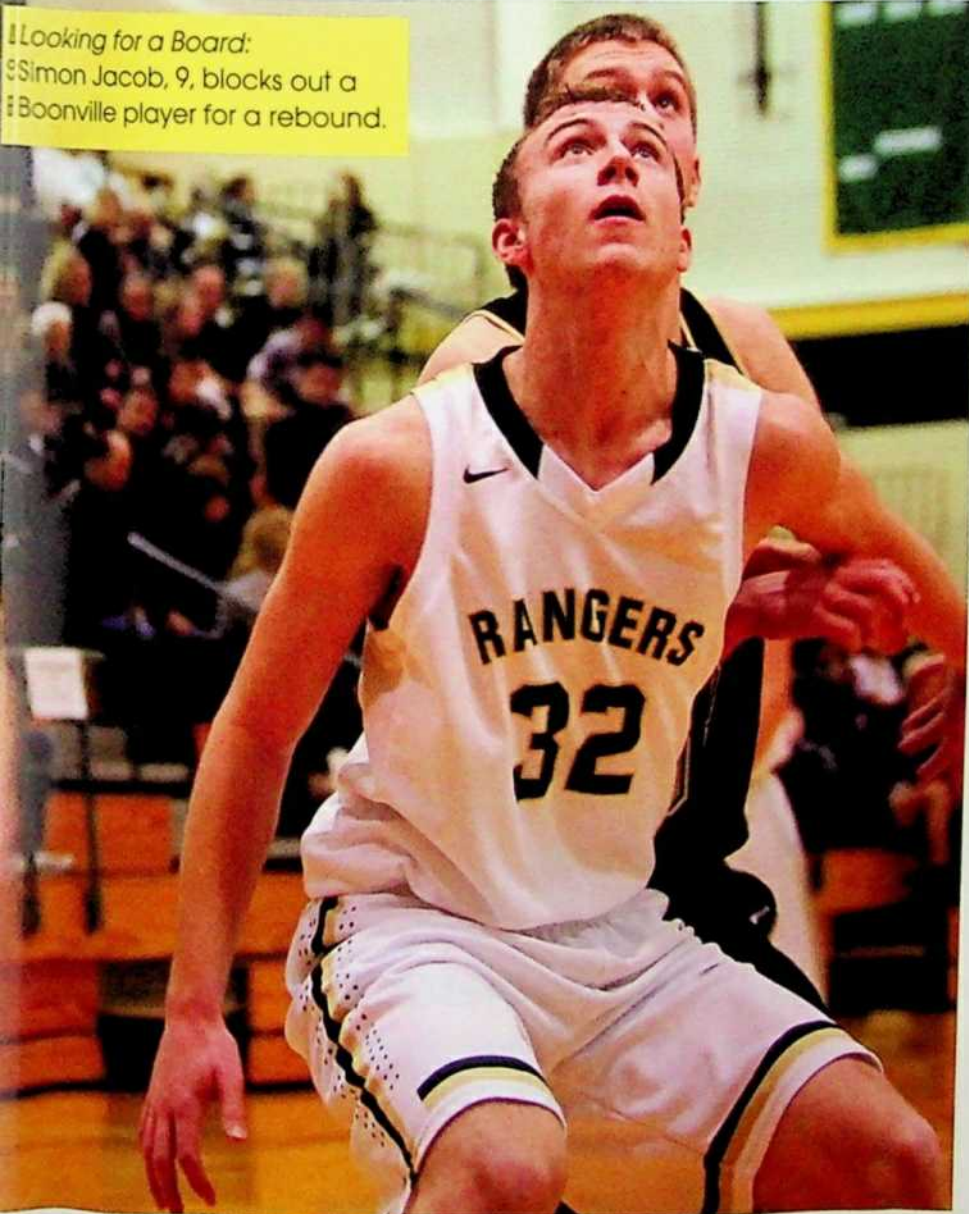

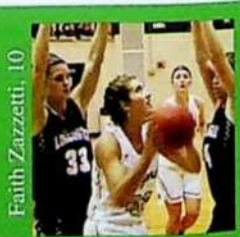

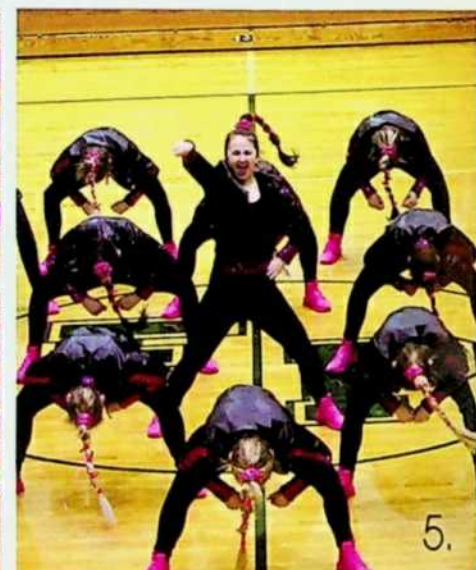

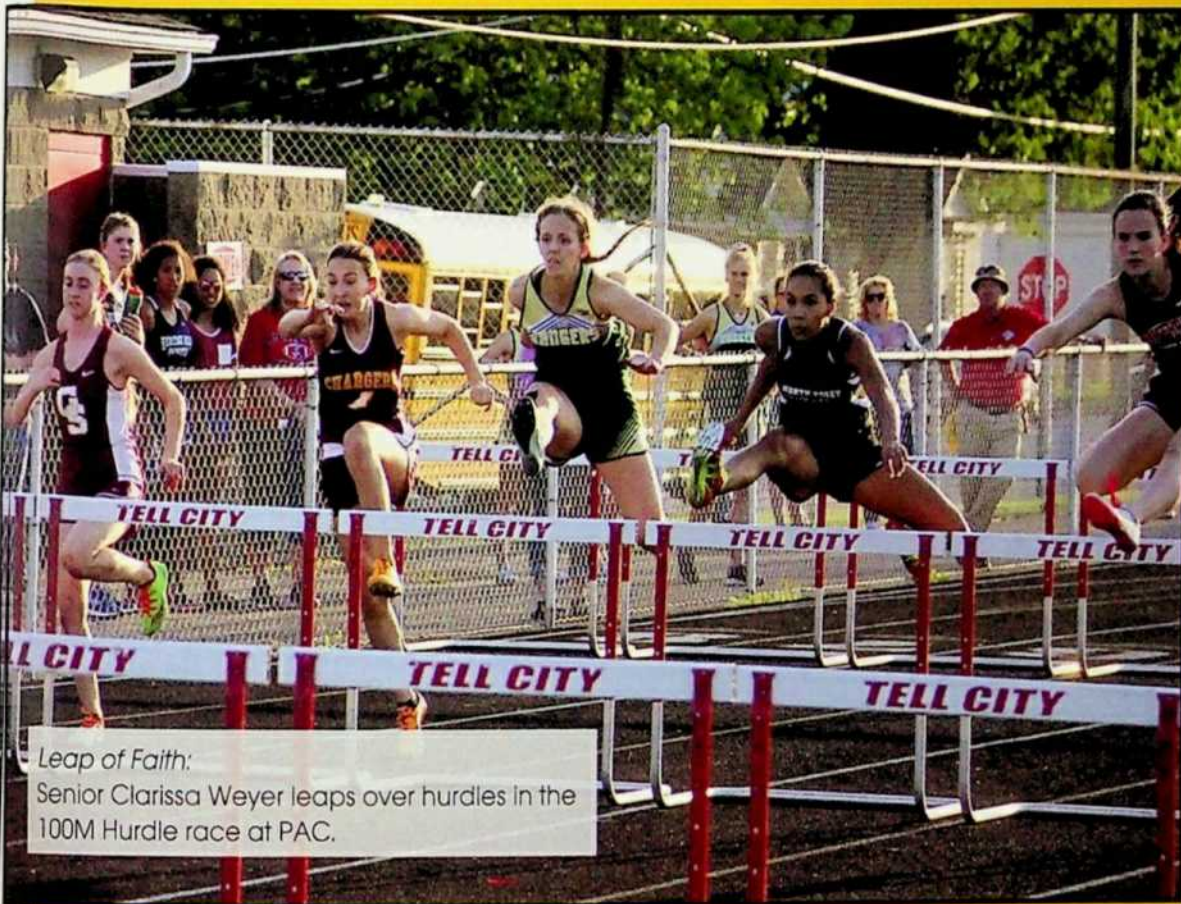

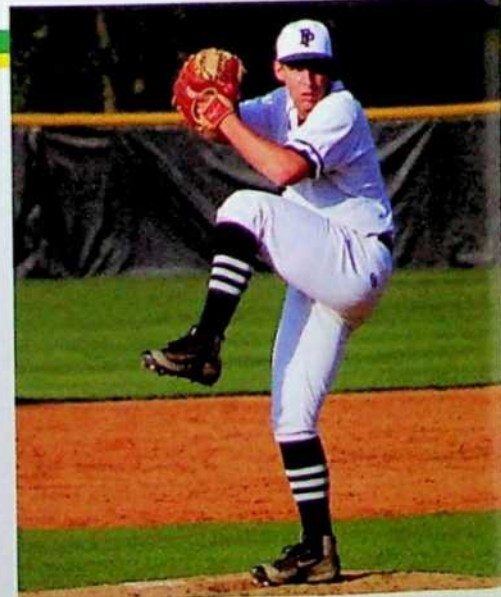

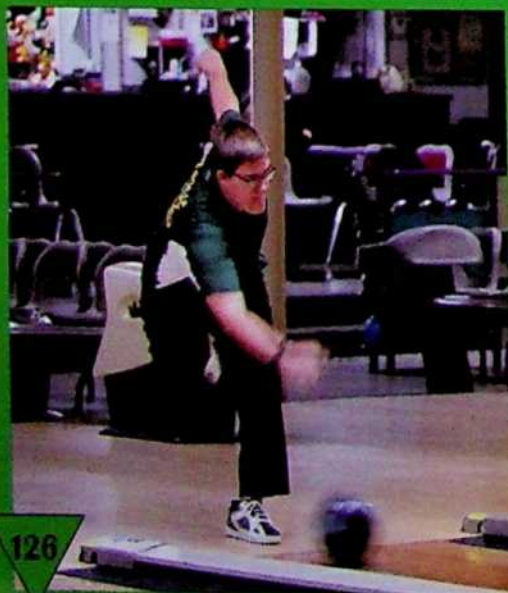

How does feel to be the only senior?

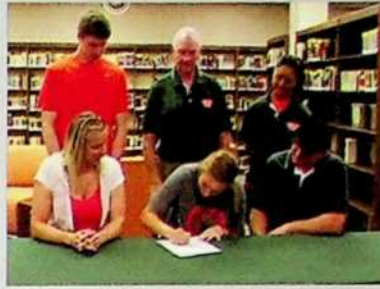
In the past years, I felt like a leader. But this year, I really had to step up, take charge, and help lead the underclassmen.

Lanette chose the Northern Indiana school to continue her basketball career.

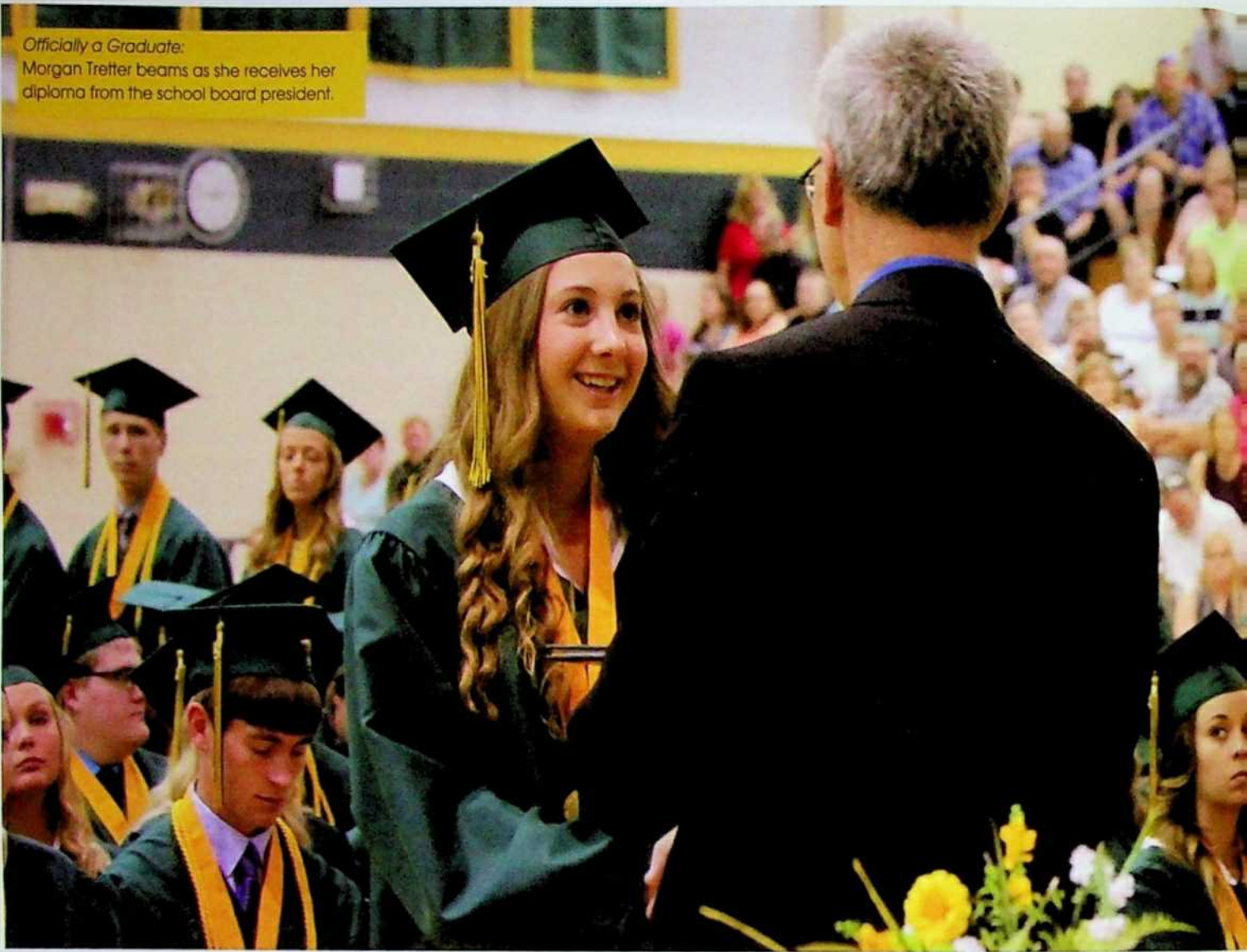
