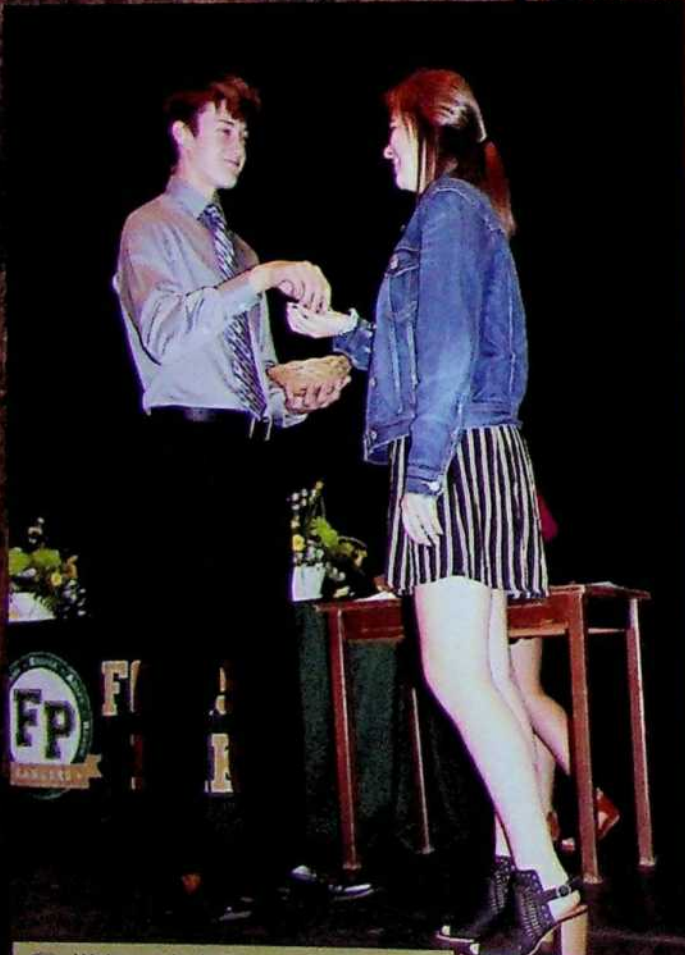

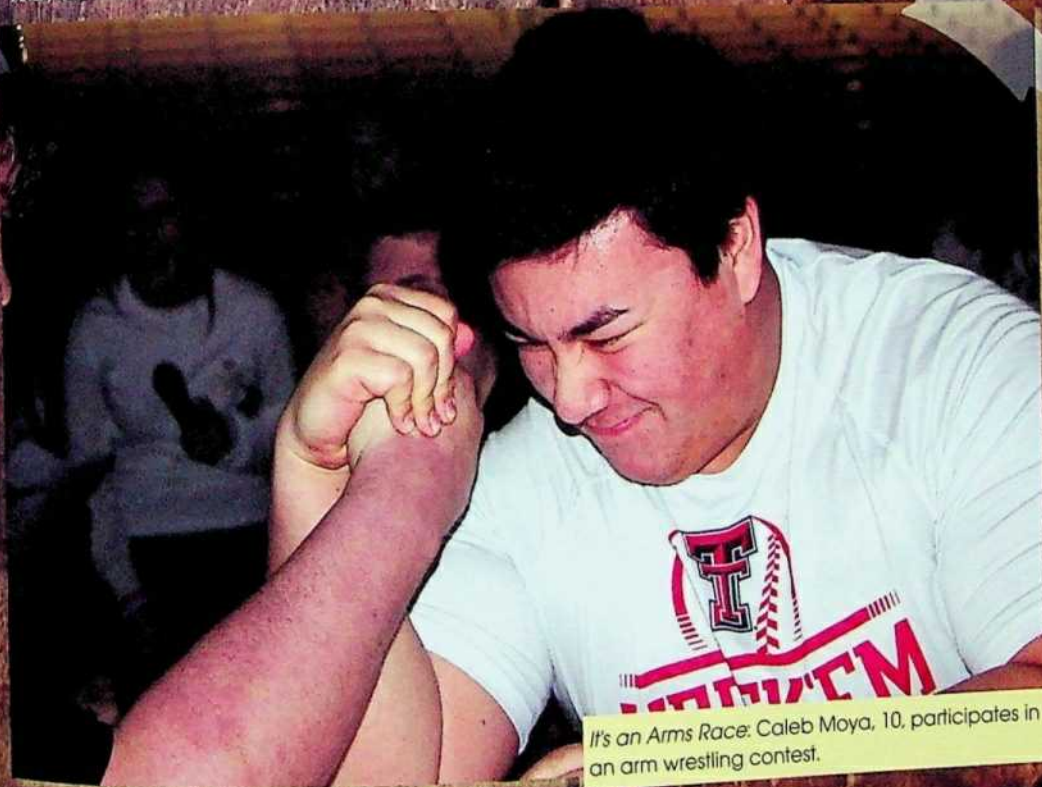

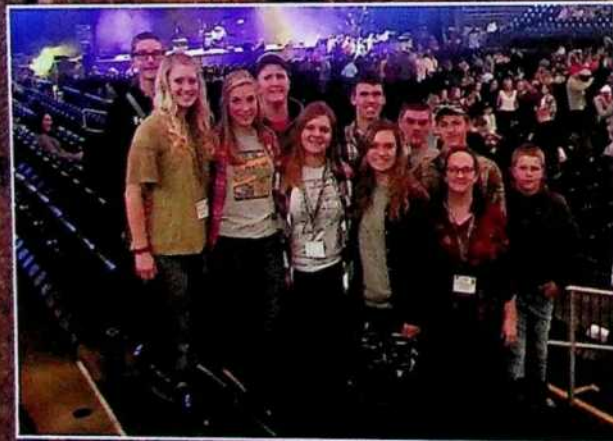

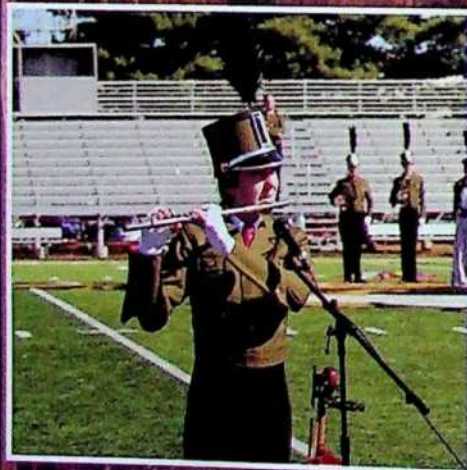

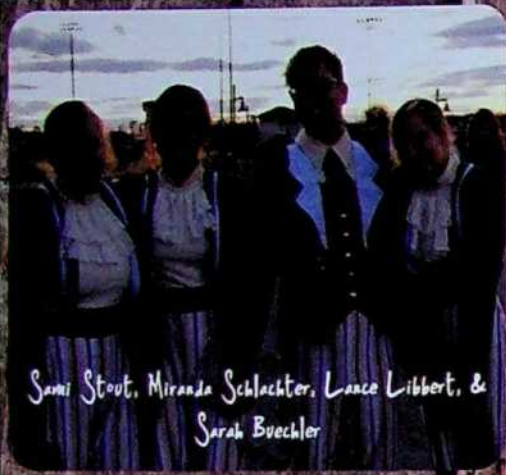

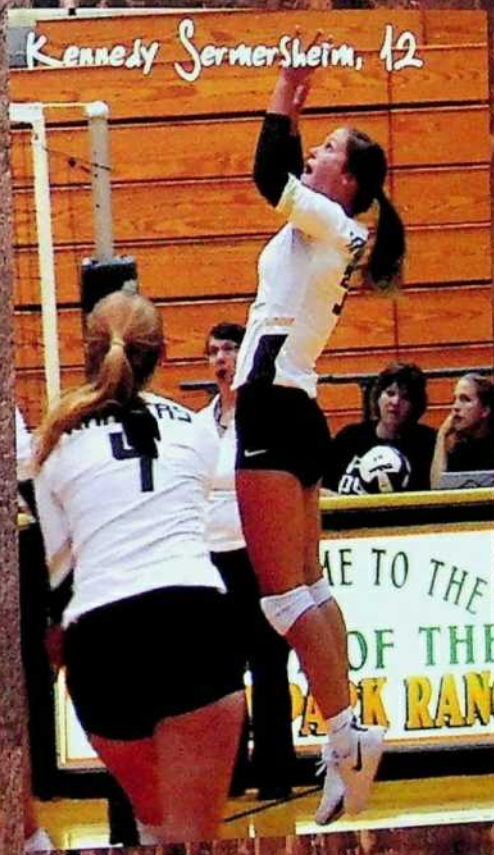

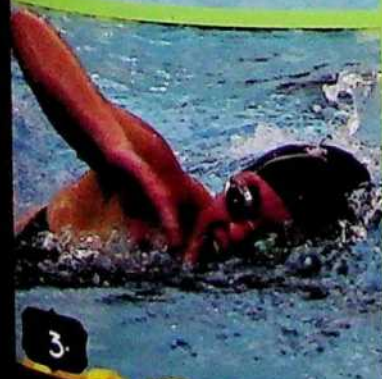


Staying Afloat
