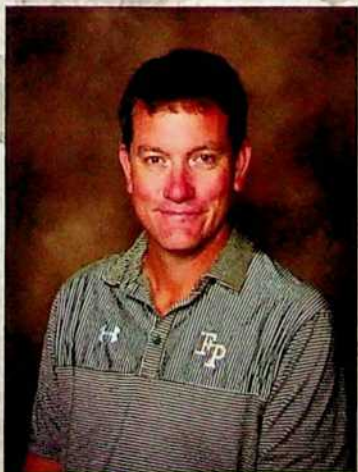

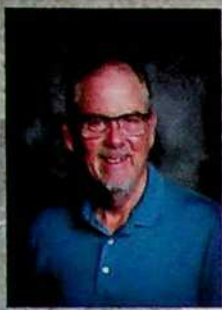

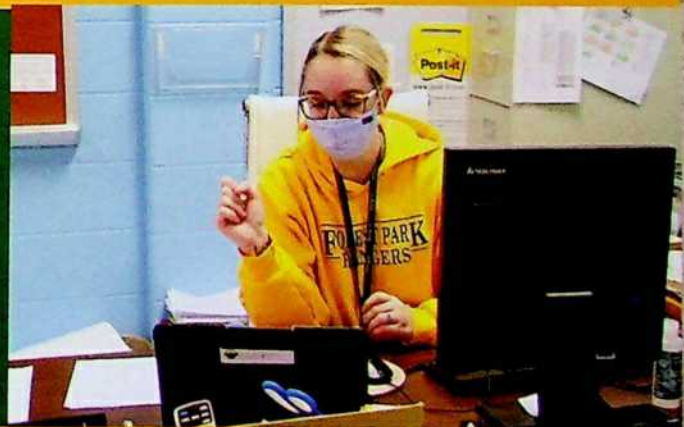


MR. WELP

MRS. GEHLHAUSEN

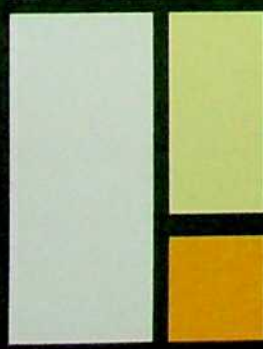
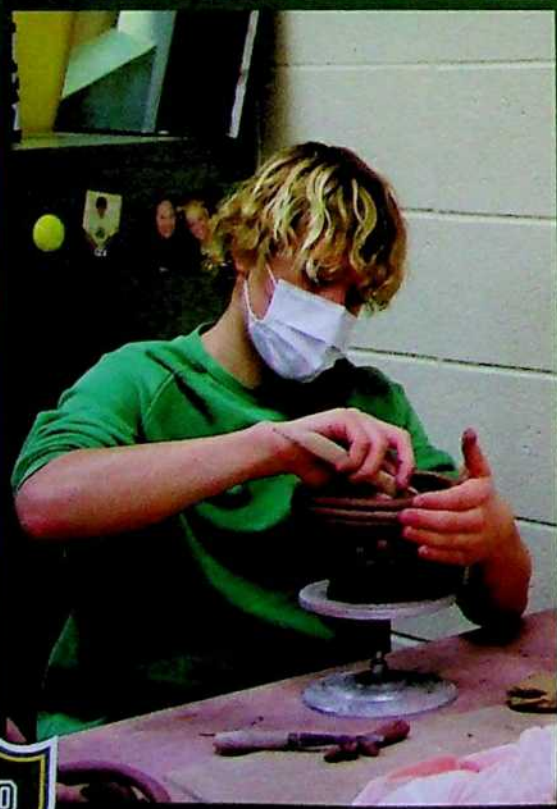

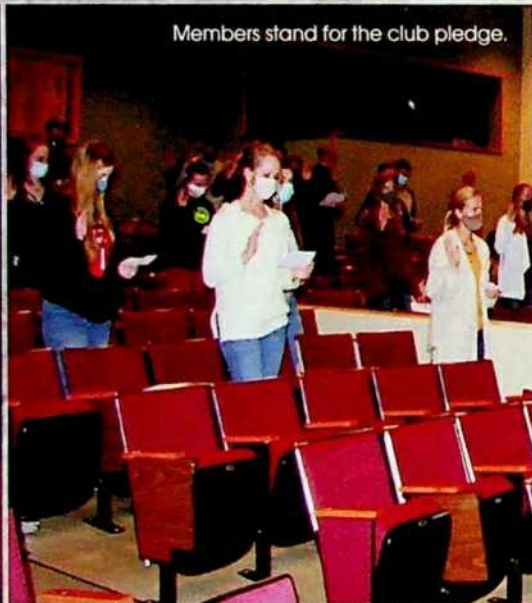

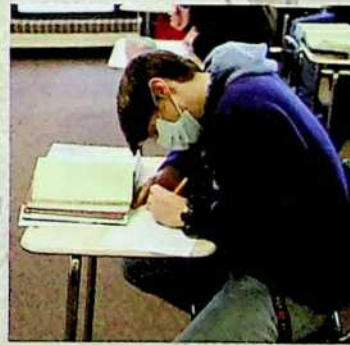
English Prepares students for Higher Education

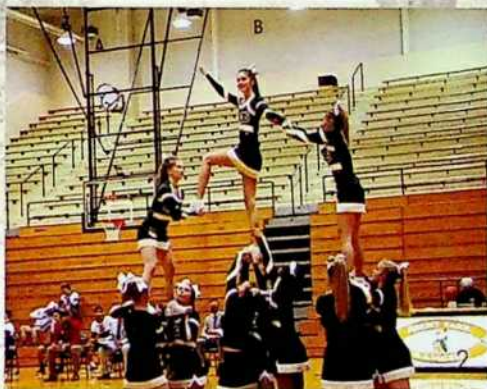
Forest Park Cheerleaders Keep Spirits High

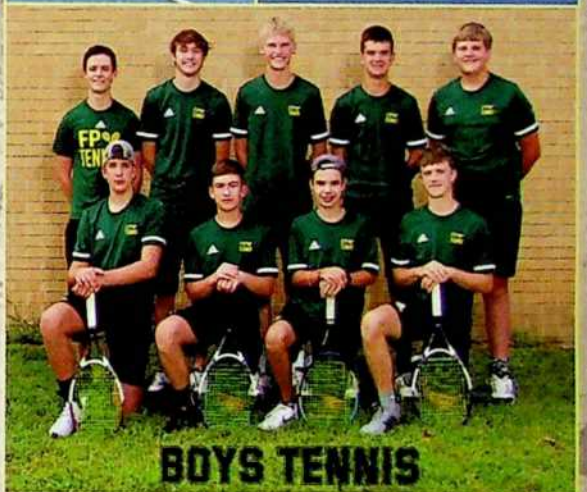

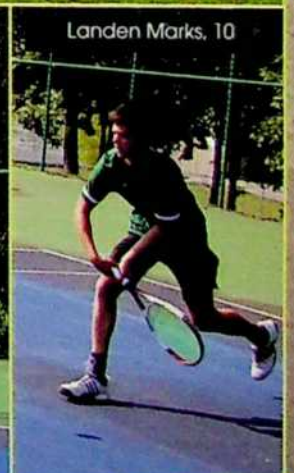

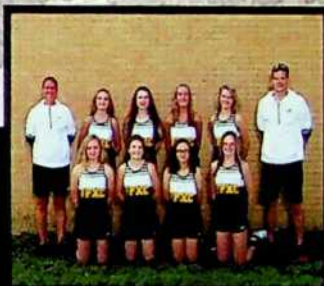
RUNNING TOWARDS A WIN

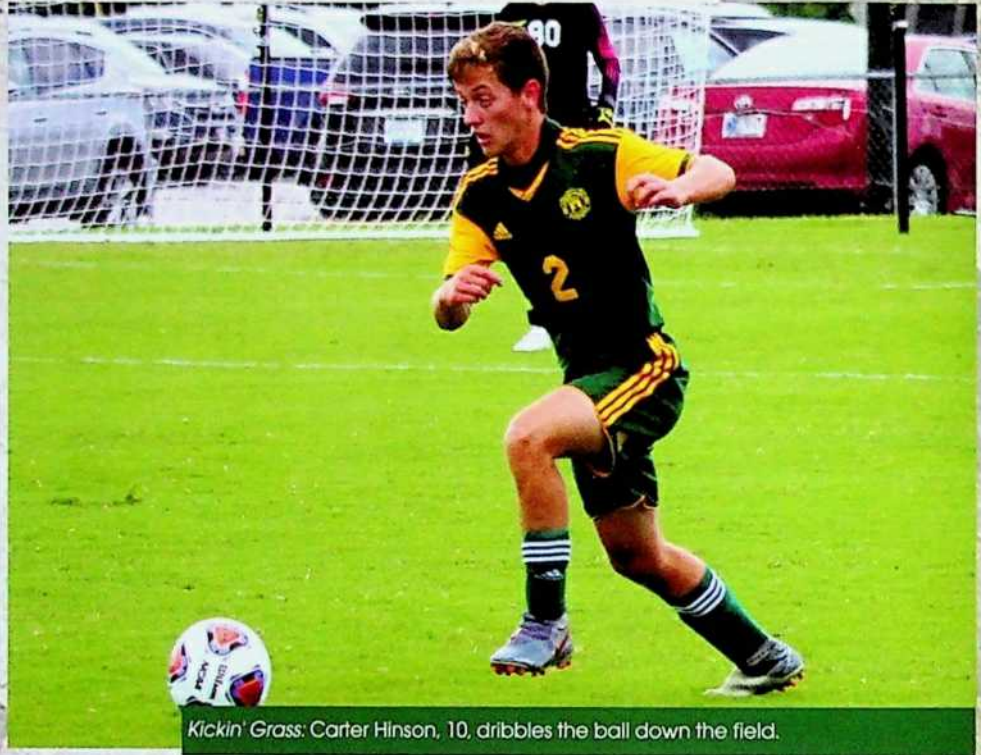

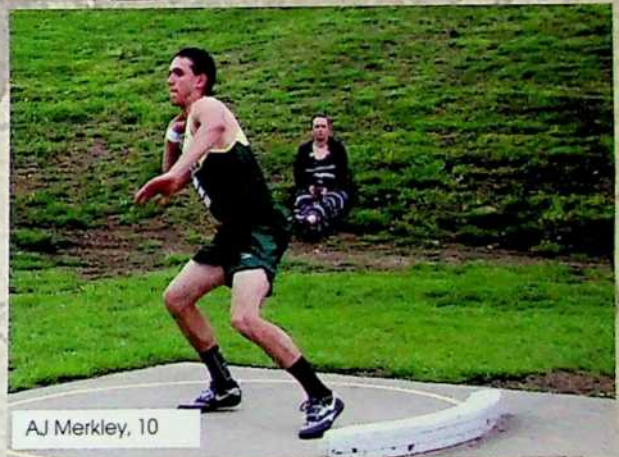

Molly Lusk

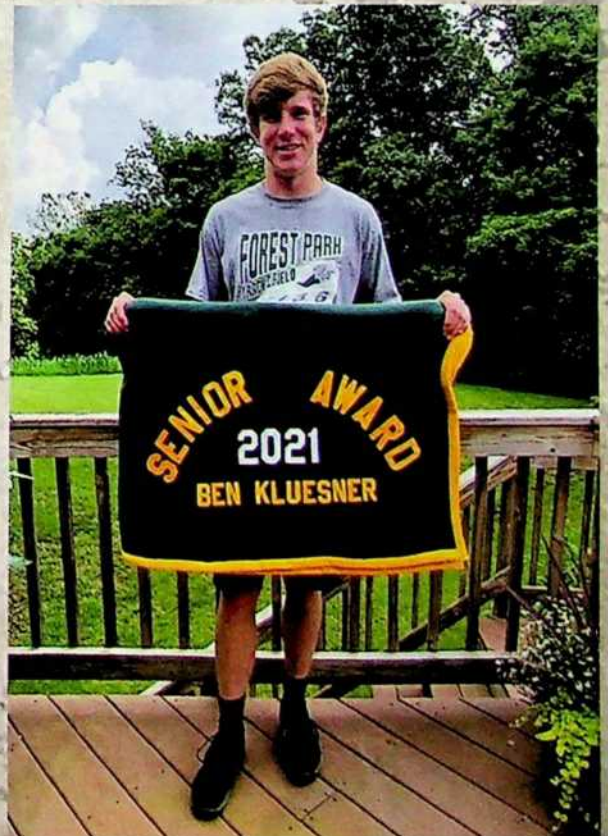
