



JANUARY — Back to school again . . . snow covered the ground and we enjoyed a month of winter sports . . . basketball continued and the Wildcats began their wondrous winning streak. Mr. Schneider came to J. H. S.

FEBRUARY — Solo band contests were held at Evansville . . . Jasper High School came home with many honors . . . in a fiery sectional, Jasper defeated the Spurgeon team to win from a team that had not been defeated during the season . . . how happy we were . . . how proud we were to go to the regional . . . how we screamed and how we cheered . . . Booster club buses were filled to capacity . . . and we prepared for the regional.

MARCH — Fighting, cheering, and backing . . . we followed the team to Vincennes where we defeated the Alices in the final game, and carried home another net . . . reporters doubtful during the season wrote that we were now a team to be watched . . . fans were hoarse . . . the team was grim with the determination to win . . . we fought on at the semi-finals . . . trounced the confident New Albany team in the afternoon, but were stopped in our path to Indianapolis by the Central Bears . . . we all hailed our Wildcats . . . in victory and defeat, they were our top team in the state.




The club met every two weeks, and at their meetings the students were instructed in the functions of the camera and in the art of developing and print-

Officers of the year were: LaVerne Hackman, president; Doriss Kremp, vice president; and Kenneth Krempp, secretary-treasurer.






"DATE BAIT"




BOOSTER CLUB








CHEER LEADERS
