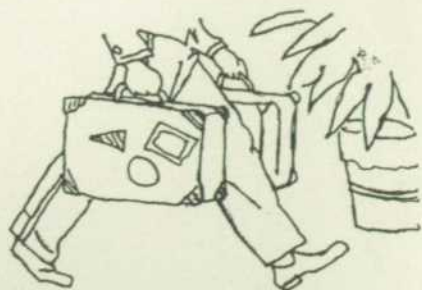


Out-Going Guests

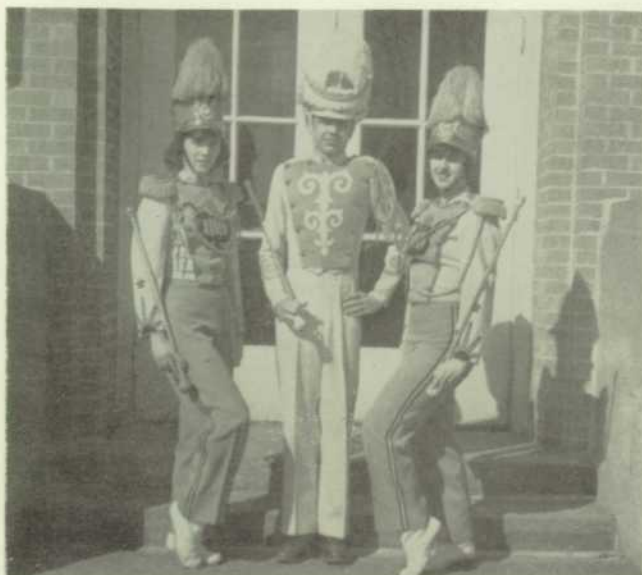
The Glee Club

Miss Mennona is to be commended for this club's excellent record. Her own beautiful voice inspired many of them to do their very best.

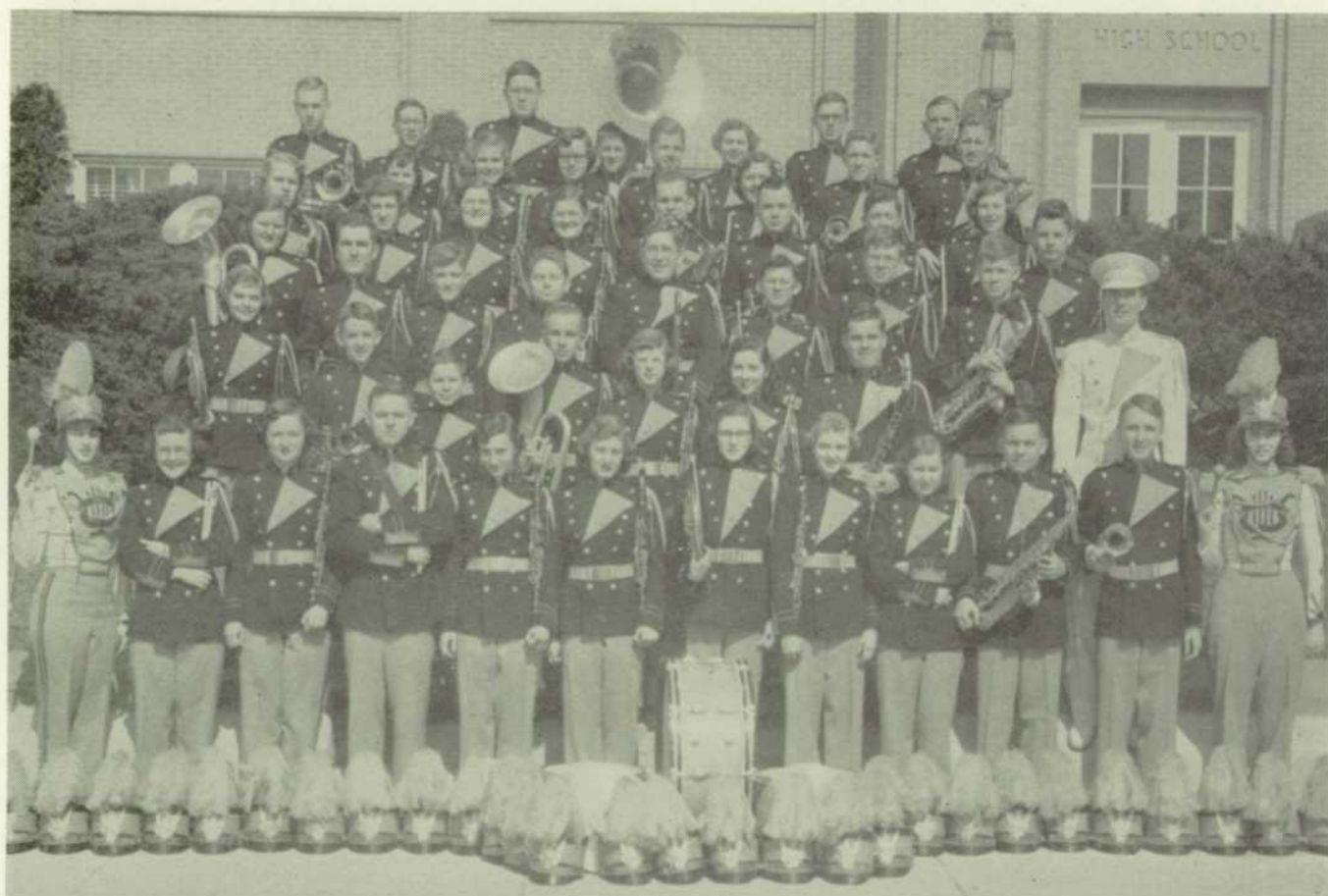

Drum major of the band was Ronald Thynn. Frieda Allen and Bernice Uebelhor were majorettes. Mr. Meuer was their director.

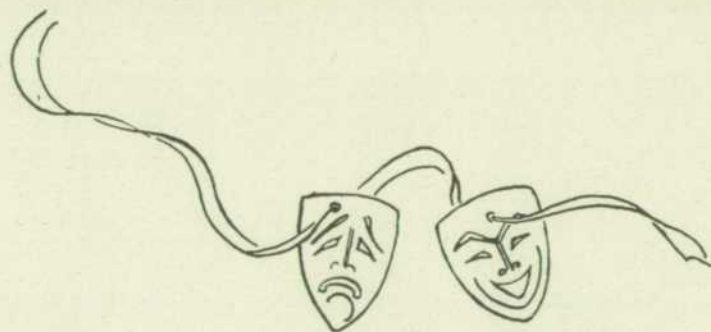

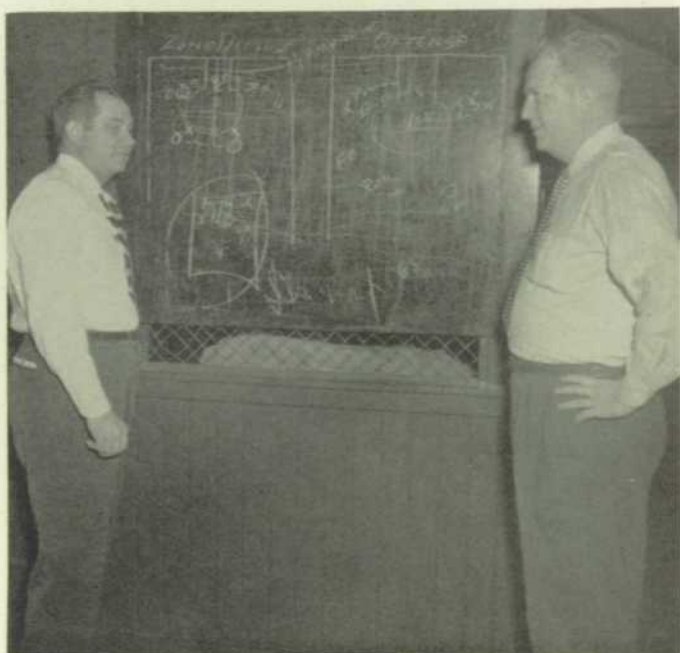

The boys all appreciated their student manager's efforts and kept him busy with rub-downs and heat-lamp treatments every fifth and sixth periods.

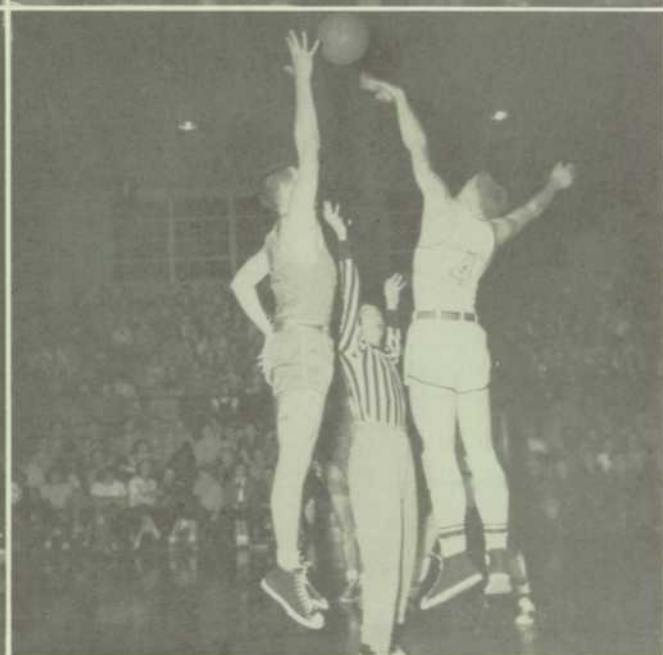

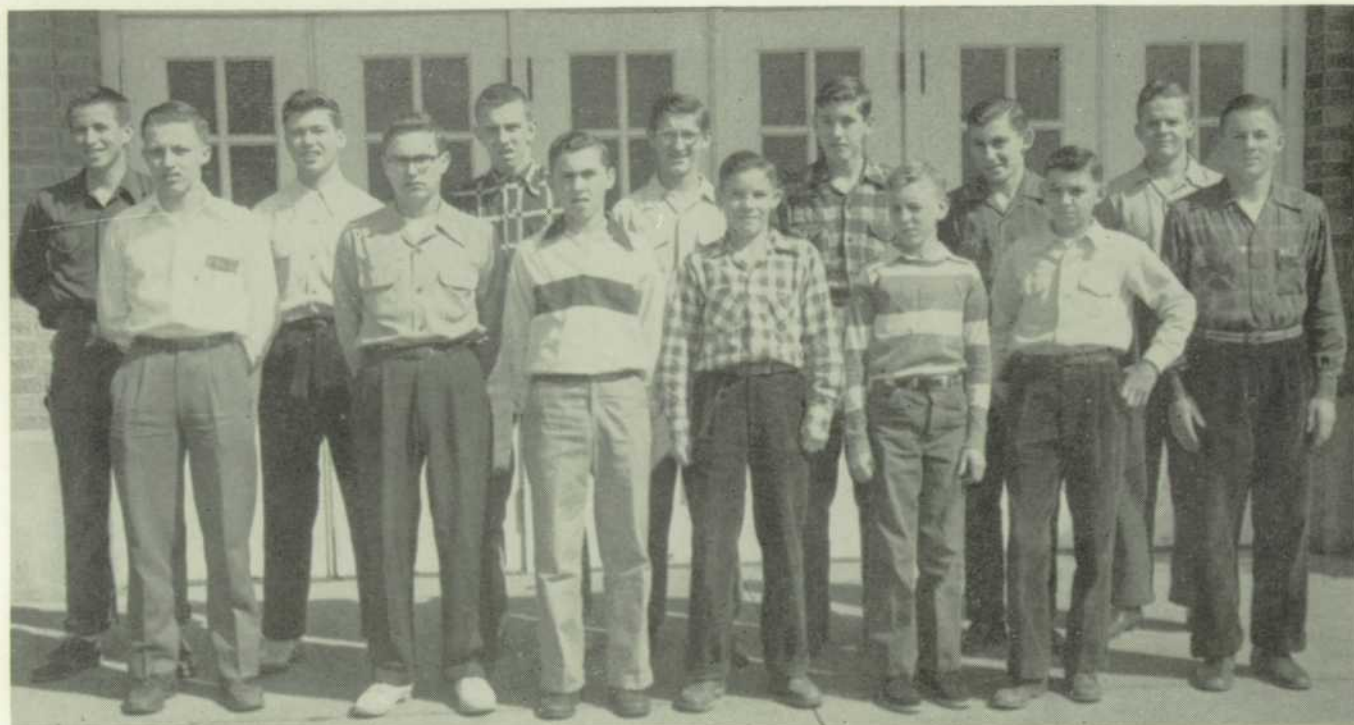


The rocks and rills of many landslides hold a challenge for these fleet-footed boys.

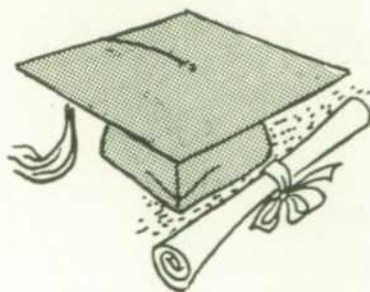
Thank You and Goodbye Dear Old J. H. S.
