


Let's look at the written record, and if you like, why not play the "Talking 'J." They portray—in pictures and song, the story of life at our school.

Pictured on the next six pages is the JHS Hit Parade—as determined by your interest. Based on a year of activities rather than a week's, this hit parade is different from the one we watch on Saturday nights. It covers every field of interest: classwork, sports, journalism, pep sessions, drama, clubs, honors, music, and contests. All of these typify life at our school.

These top ten activities are not listed in the order of their importance, but as they occurred during the school year. Some take place during school hours, some are extracurricular, and others are scheduled for after school. Together, they represent a record-breaking number of hours of planning and service.





We came to school for "readin', 'ritin', and 'rithmetic," and, of course, the more advanced subjects, like lit, government, and trig. It's a known fact that sometimes we daydreamed about the game that night, whom we were going to the dance with, or which dress Joe likes best on me. When we came back to reality, we firmly reminded ourselves that schoolwork is all-important, and buckled down to hard work and concentration!







"End, center, tackle, guard—hit 'em, hit 'em, hit 'em hard!" We really yelled as our fighting football squad came through with a 7-1 record. Everybody got on the band wagon to see the most outstanding team in the history of JHS football. Mr. Stokes, the new head football coach, and Mr. Settle, the assistant coach, received the full support of the team and the fans. Every game became a gridiron classic.

After ball games everybody danced—or stood around and held up the walls—at the Teenage Canteen. There were as many different kinds of dancing as couples. The moon-struck lovers practically stood still, while the more energetic couples did the bop. Quite often the girls could be seen teaching their slightly unwilling dates the latest jitterbug. 



OUR ADMINISTRATION

They Set Policy for School

Managing the affairs of Jasper High School is the duty of Principal Claude Miller and his faculty of twenty-three, Mr. Bernard Gallagher, the Superintendent of City Schools, and the three-member School Board, composed of Mr. Claude Gramelspacher, Mr. O. Leo Beckman, and Mr. Casper Elliott. They must all work together for the benefit of the student and the betterment of the school.

It is the responsibility of these people to see that there is a direct faculty-student relationship. Mr. Miller keeps a complete record of each student, conducts teachers' meetings, and supervises student organizations and activities. He and other members of the faculty also sponsor many extracurricular student functions.

Mr. Gallagher and the School Board have many administrative offices to attend. They select teachers, approve all school expenditures, provide all the necessary equipment for the school, and compile an annual budget and financial report. Last year the board purchased property for a new elementary school. Construction on the new building in the southwest part of Jasper is now well under way. It has been estimated that the school will be ready for use by next fall.

At JHS students are offered four courses of study: academic, a college preparatory course; commercial, for tuture secretaries; vocational, for students interested in agriculture, woodworking, or home economics; and general, a course setting no limits on the selection of subjects. A Wide Range of Subjects Is Offered


There is a course of study for every taste and ability at JHS. Each student has an opportunity to select the subjects in which he is interested and which he will need to help him choose a furture career.

For the more serious students who are planning to further their education at some college or university, there is the academic course, with Latin or Spanish, chemistry, advanced math, and English Comp. Those whose ambitions lie in the field of secretarial or office work follow the commercial course. One of the three vocational courses is for students who have already chosen their vocation.

If you are undecided about the future, your best bet is to follow the general course. In this branch of study you are able to choose any combination of subjects, with only English and history required.




Using the power lathe in the woodworking shop, senior Dave Buehler turns out a part for a project which is required of all shop students.

Honor-winning students have attained heir success by continuous hard work, not by merely turning a wheel of fortune. Years from now their awards will bring them "Moments to Remember." At impressive ceremonies each year, students with scholarship, leadership, character, and service receive the highest honor JHS can bestowmembership in the National Honor Society. Fifteen percent of the senior class may be inducted into the organization; one-third of this number may be juniors. All students achieving scholastic and extracurricular distinction are honored at a special awards program each May. Recognized are the honor roll students, the Achievement Test winners, the Boys' and Girls' Staters, the "Democracy" winner...

STUDENT HONORS

These Outstanding Students Won Honors in Many and Varied Fields of Endeavor

Each year deserving students are selected to receive the highest honor JHS can bestow—membership in the Sapiens Chapter of the National Honor Society. The number of students inducted into the society may not exceed fifteen per cent of the senior class; one third of this number may be juniors. A faculty selection committee judges applicants on the four-point program of the society: scholarship, leadership, character, and service.

At a Recognition and Awards Program held each May, honor students of all fields are recognized and presented with the awards which they have achieved during the school year. Awards are presented by faculty members in charge of that particular division; Principal Claude Miller recognizes all students achieving a special honor.

Awards are given in scholarship, music, journalism, agriculture, sports, and business. Also recognized are the Boys' Staters and the Girls' Staters, the queens and cheerleaders, and the winners of the Regional Achievement Tests, the Interclass Discussion, the Spelling Bee, the "I Speak For Democracy" Contest, the D.A.R. "Good Citizen" Contest, and the Legion Oratorical Contest.











Coach Nip Wuchner and his Jasper Wildcats won the respect and admiration of the crowd of 11,234 fans at the semi-state at Roberts Municipal Stadium in Evansville. Sparked by the five J's: Jerry Birge, Jim Eckerle, Jody Giesler, John Hoffman, and Junie Schnarr, the courageous Wildcats battled their hearts out against the tall and talented Black Cats of Terre Haute Gerstmeyer before bowing 75-66 in the final game. That afternoon they had edged the highly-rated Lincoln Lions 69-67 in a sudden death overtime.

At Evansville Jody Giesler established three records and tied three other semi-state records. He became the highest scorer in southern semi-state history by scoring 45 points in two games, and his 19 field goals in both games set a new record for the most field goals made in semi-state play in two games by an individual.

The Wildcats' second straight Huntingburg regional title gave them a berth in the "Sweet Sixteen" semi-finalists. After winning over the Washington Hatchets 59-51 in the afternoon, the Cats captured the Sandborn Bluejays 47-37 to become regional champs.

In the Huntingburg sectional Jasper beat Ireland 58-44, Spurgeon 85-33, and West Baden 77-63.




GRIDDERS WIN SIX STRAIGHT GAMES






