The Story Of The Year

On these pages we would like to present scenes of typical student activities of the school year of 1958-59 at Jasper High School. We hope that twenty years from now we can point with pride to our '59 "J" and say to our high school age children and say "This is what it was like when I was in high school." We hope that this section of the annual will bring back many fond memories.



Studies were the dominant part of our school life. Many times we put them off until the last minute during the whirl of dances, parties, and ball games, but we always came back to them. The Cats gladdened the hearts of their fans by smashing a highly rated Huntingburg team to gain first possession of the new football trophy "The Goal Posts."



The band topped a year of outstanding concerts, tours, and performances with a trip to Delphi and Elkhart, Indiana, and a tour of the Conn Music Factory in Elkhart. At ball games, pep rallies, convocations, parades, and finally at the commencement exercises the band provided us with wonderful music and color.





The year was filled with dances and parties topped by the biggest and best Junior-Senior Prom ever. Dan Friedman and Marilyn Siebert reigned as king and queen in a gaily decorated fantasy land as the beautifully gowned girls and the formally attired boys danced to the music of Willie Bartley and his orchestra at the American Legion Club.



The arrival of the long awaited yearbooks was a signal for excited "oh's" and "ah's", the searching for one's picture in the book, and the comments on the various sections and the comparisons with past annuals. Then came the seemingly endless rounds of collecting the autographs of all our friends and the remembering of all the little and big things of the year.

DEPARTMENTS

A new medium of instruction has been introduced into Jasper High's departments--television. Every morning between 8 a.m. and 12 a.m., WTVW Evansville broadcasts educational programs in freshmen English, plane geometry, United States history, and American government.

After the 25-minute television period taught by the studio teacher, the classroom teacher takes over and leads the class in further discussion of the day's lesson.

Although this type of education has been tried in such places as Miami and Philadelphia, the Evansville area is the first to use it in Indiana.

ADMINISTRATION

Managing the affairs of Jasper High School is the duty of JHS principal Claude Miller and Mr. Bernard Gallagher, the superintendent of city schools. The three member school board composed of Mr. O. Leo Beckman, Mr. Casper Elliott, and Dr. Edward Ploetner work with the superintendent in selecting teachers, approving school expenditures, providing all the necessary equipment and supplies for the school, and compile an annual budget and financial report.

As principal Mr. Miller keeps an accurate record of each student's progress, conducts teachers' meetings, and supervises teachers and student extracurricular activities and functions. He also coordinates the day to day routine of the school and serves as a link between the parents, the teachers and the students.

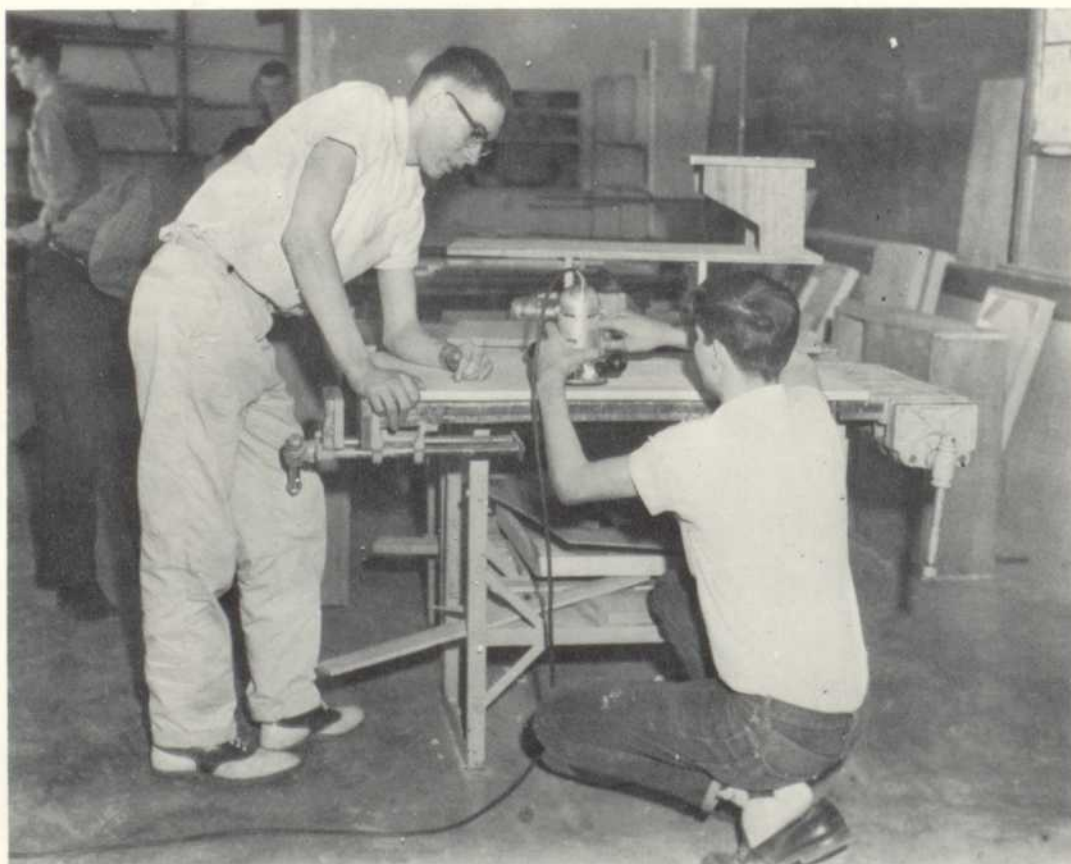

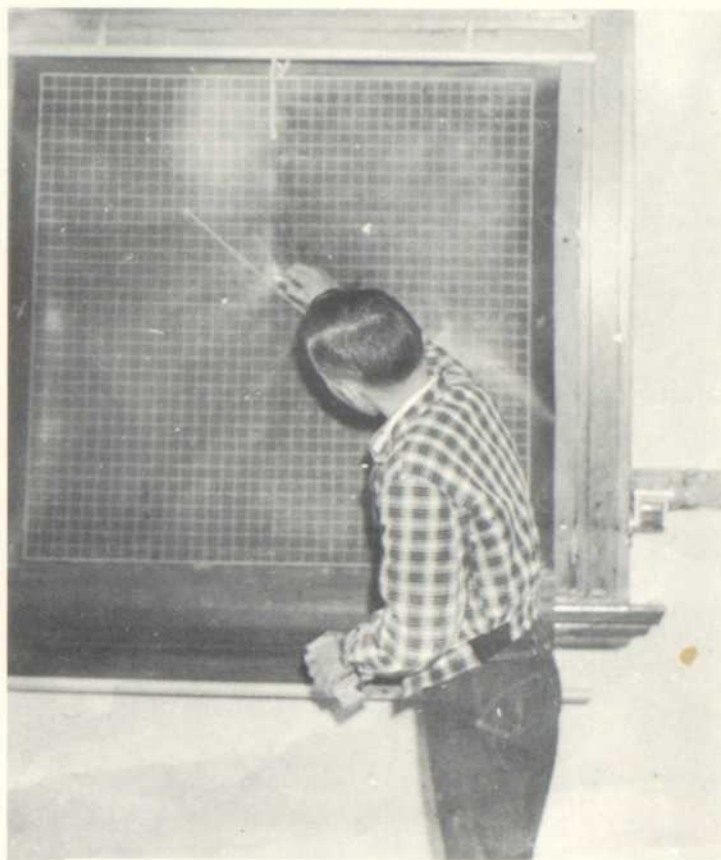

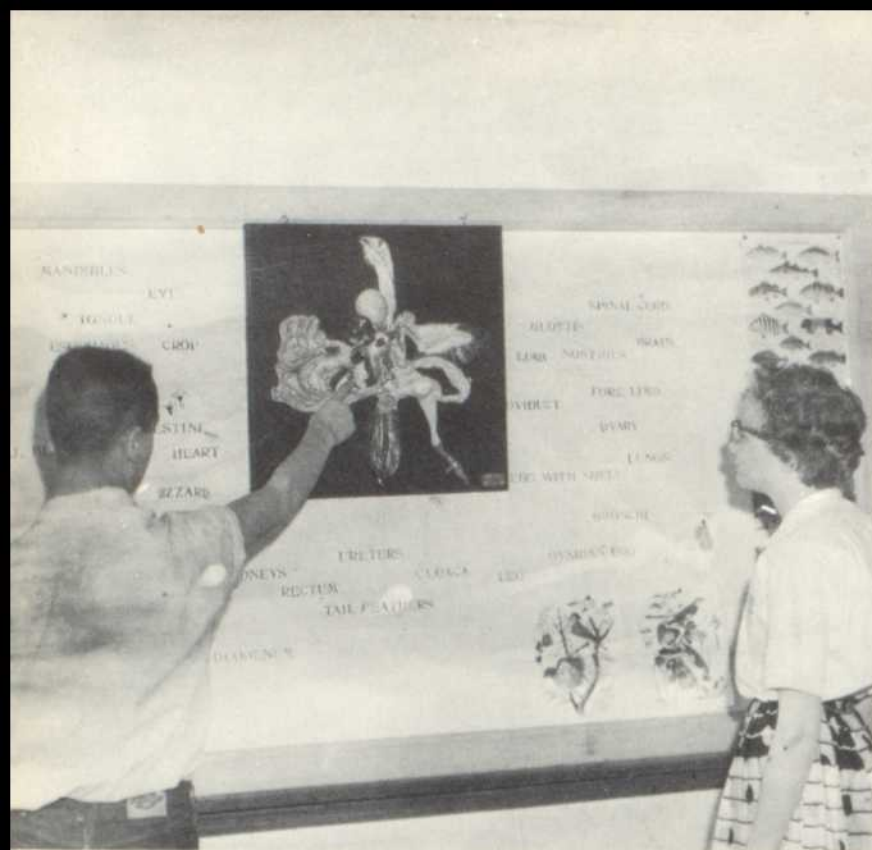

The awards cover a wide range of activities all the way up to membership in the National Honor Society, which is the highest honor that a student of JHS can receive.

STUDENT HONORS

These Outstanding Students Won Honors in Many and Varied Fields of Endeavor

Each year deserving students are selected to receive the highest honor JHS can bestow--membership in the Sapiens Chapter of the National Honor Society. The number of students inducted into the society may not exceed fifteen per cent of the senior class; one third of this number may be juniors. A faculty selection committee judges applicants on the four-point program of the society: scholarship, leadership, character, and service.

At a Recognition and Awards Program held each May, honor students of all fields are recognized and presented with the awards which they have achieved during the school year. Awards are presented by faculty members in charge of the particular division; Principal Claude Miller recognizes all students achieving a special honor.

Awards are given in scholarship, music, journalism, agriculture, sports, and business. Also recognized are the Boys' Staters and the Girls' Staters, the queens and cheerleaders, and the winners of the Regional Achievement Tests, the Interclass Discussion, the Spelling Bee, The "I Speak for Democracy" Contest, the D.A.R. "Good Citizen" Contest, and the Legion Oratorical Contest.

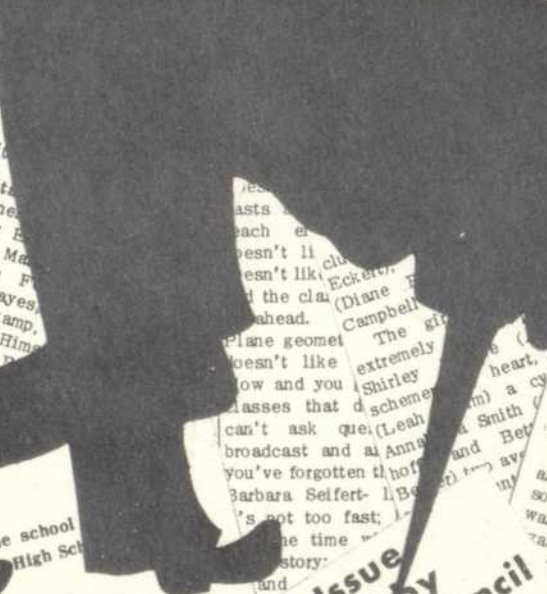

THE JHS BAND

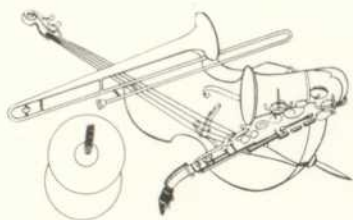
The band with its eighty-four members is the largest organization in Jasper High School.

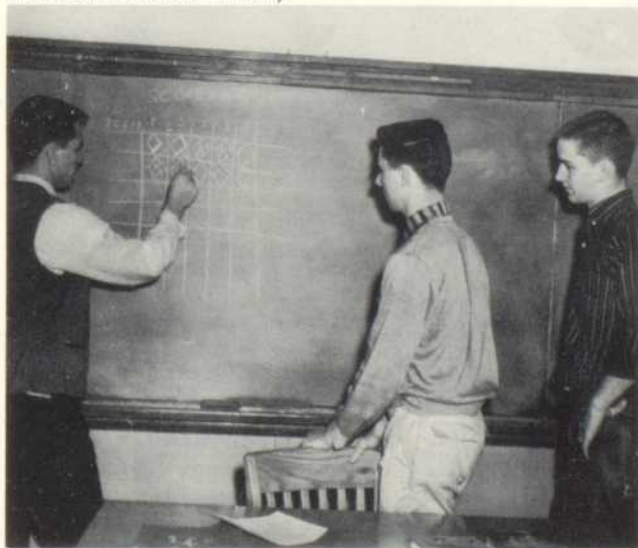

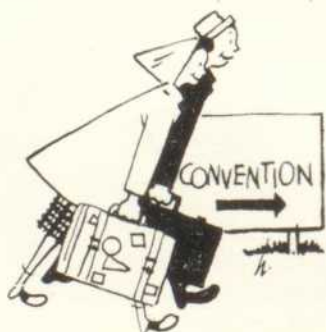

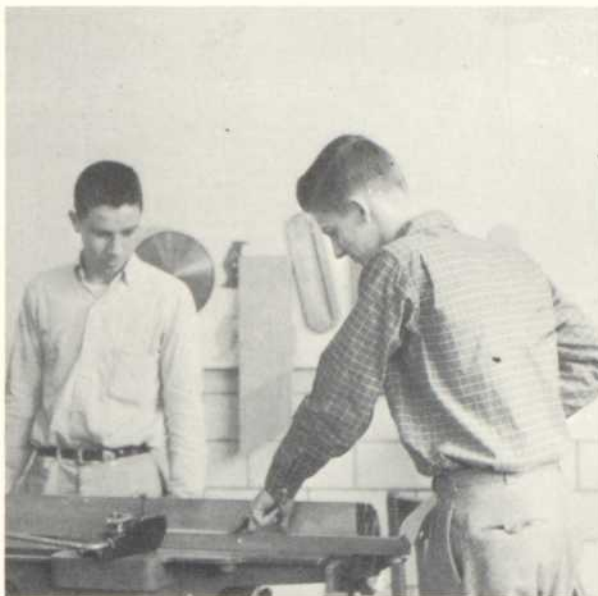

WILDCAT BASKETBALL

Barney Scott, making his debut as coach of the Jasper Wildcats, guided the Black and Gold to an 11-11 record. The Cats were one of the highest scoring teams in Southern Indiana with a per game average of 63.7 points and with 1401 total points for the year. Jasper's high for the season came against Stendal in the Sectional when the Cats scored 87 points. While the Cats were one of the best offensive teams, they were also a very poor defensive team. Jasper gave up 1329 points for the year for a per game average of 60.4 points.

Throughout most of the season, Jasper was hampered by errors, resulting from poor ball handling and bad passes.

The leading scorer for the Wildcats was Senior guard John Sheffield with 331 points for the season. Closely behind Sheffield in scoring was 6-6½ Junior center Bob Luegers with 321 points. Other consistent scorers for the Black and Gold were Larry Carnes, Dan Friedman, and Bob Kreilein.

Perhaps the most exciting victory of the season for the Cats and the fans was the 56-51 win over arch-rival Huntingburg. This victory returned the "Little Brown Jug" to Jasper for the first time since the January game of 1957.

Tom Stokes in his third year as Jasper's football coach guided the Wildcats to an outstanding 7-1-1 record.

The Wildcats were in the thick of the SIAC conference race until they were downed in the last game of the season by Boonville. This cost the Wildcats from being the first unbeaten team in the history of JHS. Even though they didn't accomplish this they still became the highest scoring team in the school's history. They wound up scoring 210 points for the season while holding their opposition to 88 points. This squad perhaps was the most balanced team in the school's history. This is certainly indicated in the scoring department where seven players had a hand in scoring touchdowns. The Wildcats' offense was a real crown pleaser. It was geared to where the fans didn't know what to expect next, as the Cats had a high gear running and passing game. This is evident from the cumulative statistics compiled on the team this season.

The highlight of the season was the Cats' 37-14 romp of arch-rival Huntingburg.

The Hunters took the lead at 7-0 when Huntingburg's fullback Gooch scored from the one and their star halfback Rademacher added the extra point. A Friedman to Sheffield pass made it 7-6.

Then the roof fell in on the Hunters--Denny Otto added a pair of quick TD's on short runs and John Sheffield got the third of the second quarter on a pass play from Otto with only 18 seconds to play in the first half.

The Black and Gold scored in the third period on a plunge by Dan Friedman and again in the final stanza as Otto went over for his third of the night. Huntingburg closed the scoring on a touchdown by halfback Jim Braunecker with Mike Gooch adding the extra point.

The game ended with the very decisive score of 37-14 and the new trophy "The Goal Posts" inaugurated for the Huntingburg-Jasper series made its first home in the Jasper trophy case.

USING THE OFFSET PROCESS

Since our yearbook has been produced by the offset process for the past six years, and the "Comet" this year has been produced by this process, we have decided to include in our yearbook a section showing some of the steps in producing a newspaper or yearbook by this process. We hope that this little explanation will help you to better understand some of the problems of the staff in putting out a student publication. The main reason for the switch to the offset process was the amount of money we could save by doing much of the work ourselves. Of course this put a greater burden on the staff. The staff is purchasing a Vari-Typer this year on a rental-purchase basis. The work that the staff can do on this machine will mean substantial savings to our readers in years to come.

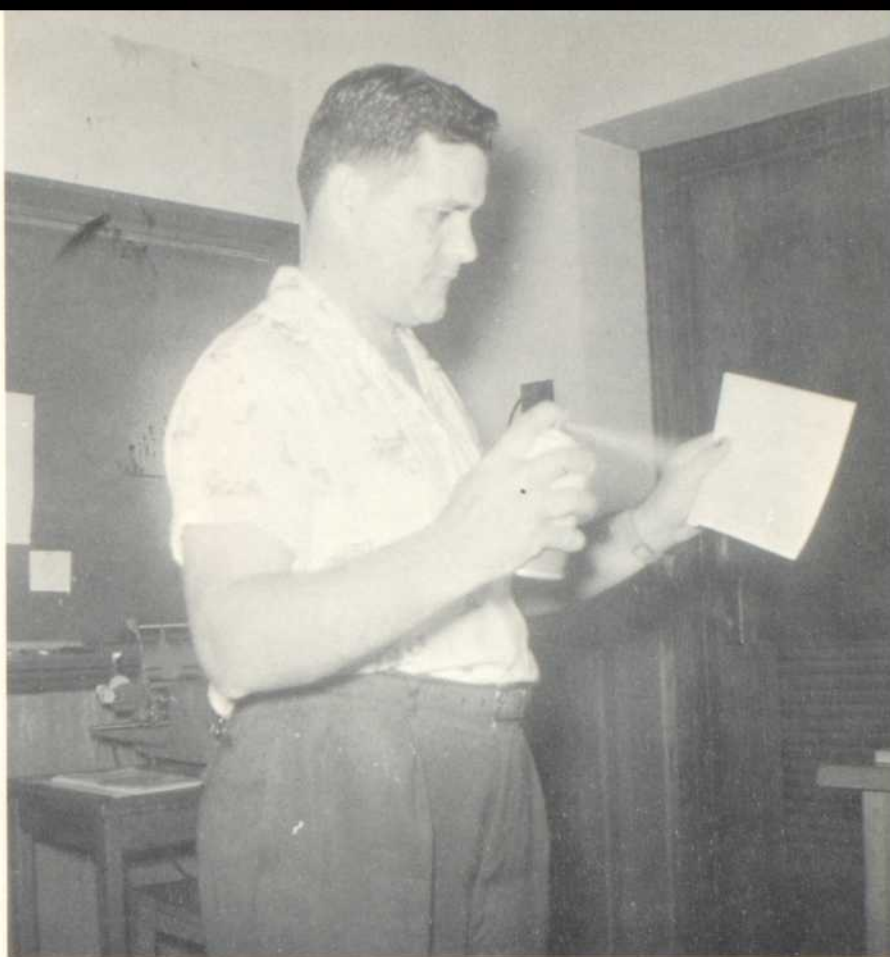


COPY for the offset process refers to the materials, art, pictures, set type, etc., which is ready for shooting—that is, making into negatives.



The first step is the preparation of the copy. After the stories are written and corrected, they are typed up in the proper column width on the Vari-Typer. The copy is typed twice and during the second typing the Vari-Typer automatically justifies (makes even) the right hand margin.

After the copy has been typed in the correct column width on the Vari-Typer, it is taken from the machine and sprayed with a plastic film spray to prevent smearing of the type during handling and the paste-up process. It is then trimmed in preparation for pasteing up on the layout forms.




The photographs that are being used in the layout are then cropped and trimmed to fit into the space allotted to them on the layout. The photos can be enlarged or reduced by the process camera if this is necessary. The pictures must be of a glossy type with good tone values or they will not reproduce properly in the final printing process.





The headlines are then set using Foto-Type, which is letters of the alphabet printed on individual slips of cardboard. The individual letters are assembled into the proper headlines in a composing stick, taped together with a tape that is gummed on both sides, and trimmed to the proper size for pasteing up.

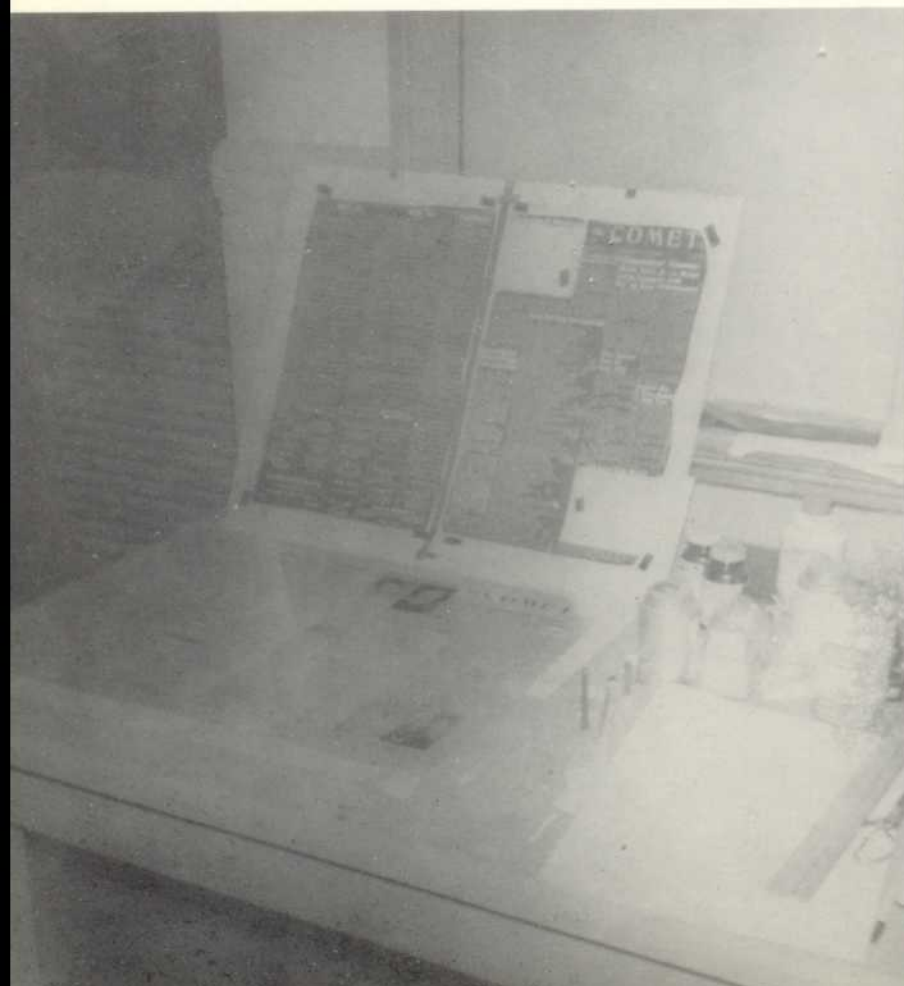
The layouts are then completed by drawing in the column rules with india ink and a ruling pen, and the completed layout is then cleaned of all dirt, smudges, and excess rubber cement in preparation for masking and photographing.

The copy, the pictures, and the headlines are then assembled and pasted up in their proper positions on the layout forms. Any artwork that is used, such as cartoons or drawings, are also trimmed to size and pasted up.





The layouts are then photographed by with the special process camera. The type proofs, headlines, and drawings may all be photographed at the same time. Pictures are handled separately. After developing, the negatives are dried, trimmed, and laid out on an imposition sheet, properly positioned, and tabbed down. This is known as stripping. After the stripping is completed, an artist opaques or paints out imperfections and stripping lines to produce a completely clean and clear offset plate.



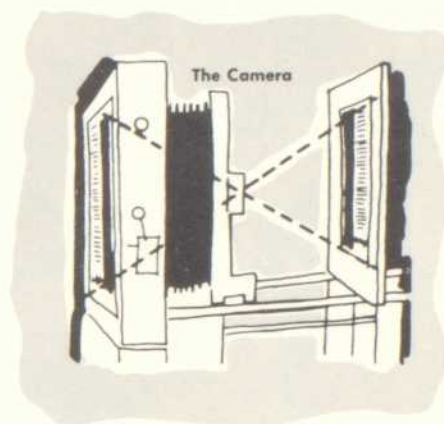
The flat (imposition sheet) is then ready for transfer onto a sensitized zinc or aluminum offset plate. The sensitized plate and the negative are locked in a vacuum printing frame where suction is applied and the resulting vacuum provides perfect contact between the plate and the negative. A strong arc light then burns the image into the plate, which is then ready for development. The plate is then removed from the frame and rubbed with developing ink which adheres to the exposed portion of the plate, thus revealing the image. After the plate has been properly washed-out and etched, it is ready for the presses.

NEGATIVES are dried and put together (stripped) on the page pattern outlined by your dummy. After touching up or "opaquing" the negative, lithographer makes a zinc or aluminum plate.

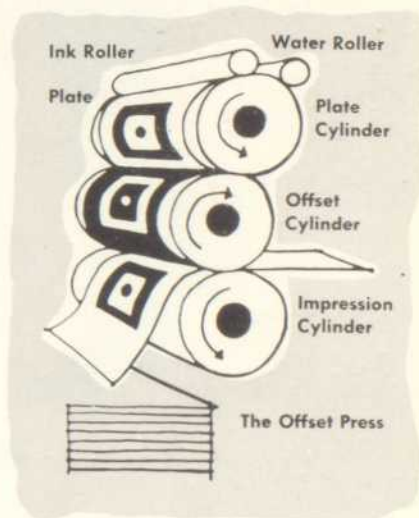

The Camera

CAMERA similar to home box camera is used in lithography. Type and line art are "shot" together for line negatives.

The final step in the process is the press run. The "Comet" is printed locally by the Jasper Herald Printing Company, while the yearbook is printed by a company in Missouri that specializes in printing yearbooks by the offset method.

LAST STEP: Now the plate is prepared for printing and attached to its press. The drawing shows how ink is "offset" onto rubber roller, and thence, once more positive, to the paper sheet.
