

DEPARTMENTS







Each May, Honor Day is held at Jasper High School. All students that achieved scholastic or extracurricular distinction during the year are honored that day. The awards cover a wide range of activities all the way up to membership in the National Honor Society, which is the highest honor that a student of JHS can receive.

STUDENT HONORS

These Outstanding Students Won Honors in Many and Varied Fields of Endeavor

Each year deserving students are selected to receive the highest honor JHS can bestow--membership in the Sapiens Chapter of the National Honor Society. The number of students inducted into the society may not exceed fifteen per cent of the senior class; one third of this number may be juniors. A faculty selection committee judges applicants on the four-point program of the society: scholarship, leadership, character, and service.

At a Recognition and Awards Program held each May, honor students of all fields are recognized and presented with the awards which they have achieved during the school year. Awards are presented by faculty members in charge of the particular division; Principal Claude Miller recognizes all students achieved.

BASKETBALL QUEEN






Mary Ellen Schneider was chosen by the students to represent Jasper High School in the annual Fall Festival at Huntingburg.

The queens received many beautiful gifts from the Huntingburg merchants and were guests of honor at a noon luncheon and later at a program in the gym.










SENIORS

THE JHS BAND


The band with its eighty-four members is the largest organization in Jasper High School.



WILDCAT BASKETBALL

Barney Scott, making his debut as coach of the Jasper Wildcats, guided the Black and Gold to an 11-11 record. The Cats were one of the highest scoring teams in Southern Indiana with a per game average of 63.7 points and with 1401 total points for the year. Jasper's high for the season came against Stendal in the Sectional when the Cats scored 87 points. While the Cats were one of the best offensive teams, they were also a very poor defensive team. Jasper gave up 1329 points for the year for a per game average of 60.4 points.

Throughout most of the season, Jasper was hampered by errors, resulting from poor ball handling and bad passes.

The leading scorer for the Wildcats was Senior guard John Sheffield with 331 points for the season. Closely behind Sheffield in scoring was 6-6½ Junior center Bob Luegers with 321 points. Other consistent scorers for the Black and Gold were Larry Carnes, Dan Friedman, and Bob Kreilein.

Perhaps the most exciting victory of the season for the Cats and the fans was the 56-51 win over arch-rival Huntingburg. This victory returned the "Little Brown Jug" to Jasper for the first time since the January game of 1957.






CROSS-COUNTRY

The local harriers gave a good account of themselves in all the meets and they emerged with a team victory in several.


















USING THE OFFSET PROCESS

Since our yearbook has been produced by the offset process for the past six years, and the "Comet" this year has been produced by this process, we have decided to include in our yearbook a section showing some of the steps in producing a newspaper or yearbook by this process. We hope that this little expalnation will help you to better understand some of the problems of the staff in putting out a student publication. The main reason for the switch to the offset process was the amount of money we could save by doing much of the work ourselves. Of course this put a greater burden on the staff. The staff is purchasing a Vari-Typer this year on a rental-purchase basis. The work that the staff can do on this machine will mean substancial savings to our readers in years to come.




COPY for the offset process refers to the materials, art, pictures, set type, etc., which is ready for shooting—that is, making into negatives.

The first step is the preparation of the copy. After the stories are written and corrected, they are typed up in the proper column width on the Vari-Typer. The copy is typed twice and during the second typing the Vari-Typer automatically justifies (makes even) the right hand margin.

After the copy has been typed in the correct column width on the Vari-Typer, it is taken from the machine and sprayed with a plastic film spray to prevent smearing of the type during handling and the paste-up process. It is then trimmed in preparation for pasteing up on the layout forms.



The photographs that are being used in the layout are then cropped and trimmed to fit into the space allotted to them on the layout. The photos can be enlarged or reduced by the process camera if this is necessary. The pictures must be of a glossy type with good tone values or they will not reproduce properly in the final printing process.





The headlines are then set using Foto-Type, which is letters of the alphabet printed on individual slips of cardboard. The individual letters are assembled into the proper headlines in a composing stick, taped together with a tape that is gummed on both sides, and trimmed to the proper size for pasteing up.







The layouts are then completed by drawing in the column rules with india ink and a ruling pen, and the completed layout is then cleaned of all dirt, smudges, and excess rubber cement in preparation for masking and photographing.

The copy, the pictures, and the headlines are then assembled and pasted up in their proper positions on the layout forms. Amy artwork that is used, such as cartoons or drawings, are also trimmed to size and pasted up.





The layouts are then photographed by with the special process camera. The type proofs, headlines, and drawings may all be photographed at the same time. Pictures are handled separately. After developing, the negatives are dried, trimmed, and laid out on an imposition sheet, properly positioned, and tabbed down. This is known as stripping. After the stripping is completed, an artist opaques or paints out imperfections and stripping lines to produce a completely clean and clear offset plate.




The flat (imposition sheet) is then ready for transfer onto a sensitized zinc or aluminum offset plate. The sensitized plate and the negative are locked in a vacuum printing frame where suction is applied and the resulting vacuum provides perfect contact between the plate and the negative. A strong arc light then burns the image into the plate, which is then ready for development. The plate is then removed from the frame and rubbed with developing ink which adheres to the exposed portion of the plate, thus revealing the image. After the plate has been properly washed-out and etched, it is ready for the presses.




NEGATIVES are dried and put together (stripped) on the page pattern outlined by your dummy. After touching up or "opaquing" the negative, lithographer makes a zinc or aluminum plate.


PHOTOLITH

LAST STEP: Now the plate is prepared for printing and attached to its press. The drawing shows how ink is "offset" onto rubber roller, and thence, once more positive, to the paper sheet.
