A summer course in modern math is offered to JHS students who are considering a further study of math. This year a new course in Modern Introductory Analysis was offered to senior math students. A course in the use of a slide rule is available to any interested upperclassmen. Other classes include algebra, advanced algebra, plane geometry, and trigonometry



In History Of Jasper High

Tough defensive play together with a hard-running offense helped the 1965 Jasper High School football team post a brilliant 9-1 record. This is the best record ever earned by any football team at JHS and will give future teams something at which to shoot. The Cats averaged 23 points per game while limiting their opponents to 5.8 points per game. This was also the only season in which the Felines won five games at home.

Coach Brewer commented that this was the best defensive team in the history of the school. The team shut out five foes while never once being held scoreless themselves.

Senior Jim Schmidt, the team captain, led the Wildcat scoring this year by chalking up 115 points from 17 touchdowns, 1 field goal, and 10 points after touchdown. Jim also led in rushing with 107 carries gaining 763 yards for an average of 7.1 yards per carry.

The Cats lost their opening game to Bedford, this year's eventual conference champs, in a close defensive battle, 13-6. The Felines came back to beat arch-rival Tell City in the home opener at Alumni Stadium, 21-20. Gaining incentive from their victory over Tell City, the Cats whitewashed Washington, 37-0, although they played the last half in darkness because of a power failure at Hatchet Hollow. The Wildcats put forth one of their best efforts of the season in beating a good Evansville Rex Mundi team, 14-6. They went on to blank Boonville, 7-0, and in the Homecoming game they shut out Mitchell, 31-0. In a hard-fought game the Cats nipped Princeton, 21-13. Jasper, in a great display of offensive power, stunned Castle, 56-9. The Wildcats then ruined Mt. Vernon's chances for the conference championship by winning their eighth consecutive game, 28-6. The Cats fought a tough defensive battle with Huntingburg to win their last game, 7-0. By virtue of their victory over Huntingburg the Cats regained possession of the prized "goal posts" and closed a sparkling 9-1 season.

In the words of Coach Brewer, "This is the finest football team in the history of Jasper High School."





The scrappy Jasper Wildcats posted a 12-11 record for the 1965-66 season. Guided by Coach George Perry, the Cats enjoyed their first winning season in four years. Jasper also won its own holiday tourney by beating Rex Mundi, 74-65, in the championship game. It marked the first time in four years that a JHS Basketball Team had won a trophy.
