
SENIOR OFFICERS

This must be what he wanted, For he missed his dad so dear; He made the decision that he'd be with him in heaven Since they couldn't be together here.







But now we're breaking away from each other, and now we're on our own; however, the memories will be with us forever, and with those memories, we'll never be alone.


All the friends we've made, which we wouldn't have been able to survive without; will always be by our sides, no matter where we are, what we're doing, or what our ideas are about.




FOOTBALL PEP SESSIONS




SECTIONAL SPIRIT WEEK


COACH BREWER WINS BIG








TEAM ACES WAY TO TOP






























HOMEMAKING


Band

The Year According to Mr. Hayes

Assistant Principal, Mr. Hayes shared his views on the school year. "I think that the discipline was about the same as last year," said Hayes. "The detention halls were full most of the year. Most of the cases were petty, such as tardies and indiscretion in behavior or language. Suspension was an occurrence. The main causes for it were skipping school, fights, and smoking violations. Next year there will be a possible \$500 fine and expulsion from school if the School Board bans smoking from school property."

"To some extent the students were lacking motivation," said Hayes about students' classroom work. "Students were not willing to learn and this made teachers frustrated because they sometimes did not turn in their work." However, Hayes continued, "In ISTEP results, Jasper was number one in the county and ranked in the top ten percent in the state." Mr. Haves noted that he was proud of that accomplishment.

Mr. Hayes concluded by saying that it was a tough year, but "there were no major automobile accidents, thanks to the policeman on duty before and after school in the parking lot."
