



During her study hall, senior Kim Hoffman works hard on redecorating a vase. The vase was for an auction the Art Club held to raise money.







"Hey, why are you taking a picture of me? I dress like this everyday!," jokes sophomore Kristen Johanning. Actually she's dressed up for Halloween
















RIDDING FAREWELL . . . NORLITT RETIRES


Mr. Don Noblitt was involved with the Greater Jasper School Corporation for thirty-one years, following teaching/coaching careers at Parker and Middlebury High Schools. He taught elementary school from 1964 to 1968, and coached baseball from 1964 to 1973. In 1970, he served as athletic director for Jasper High School until 1975. He then moved on to be the high school's assistant principal in 1974, a position he held until 1989. In 1990, Noblitt became Superintendent of the Greater Jasper Consolidated School district, and remained there until

his retirement in 1995.

Noblitt liked being the high school principal best because he had the most contact with the kids. "They kept me young and fired-up!" he said. He also quoted that the most rewarding aspect of his career was "seeing little skinny freshmen turn into adults and become valuable to the community."

After retirement, Noblitt plans to travel with his wife, spending six months on the road and six months in Jasper. He said he has a motor home that's "ready to roll."














REWRITING THE RECORD BOOKS




VARSITY BASKETBALL REACHING NEW HEIGHTS














