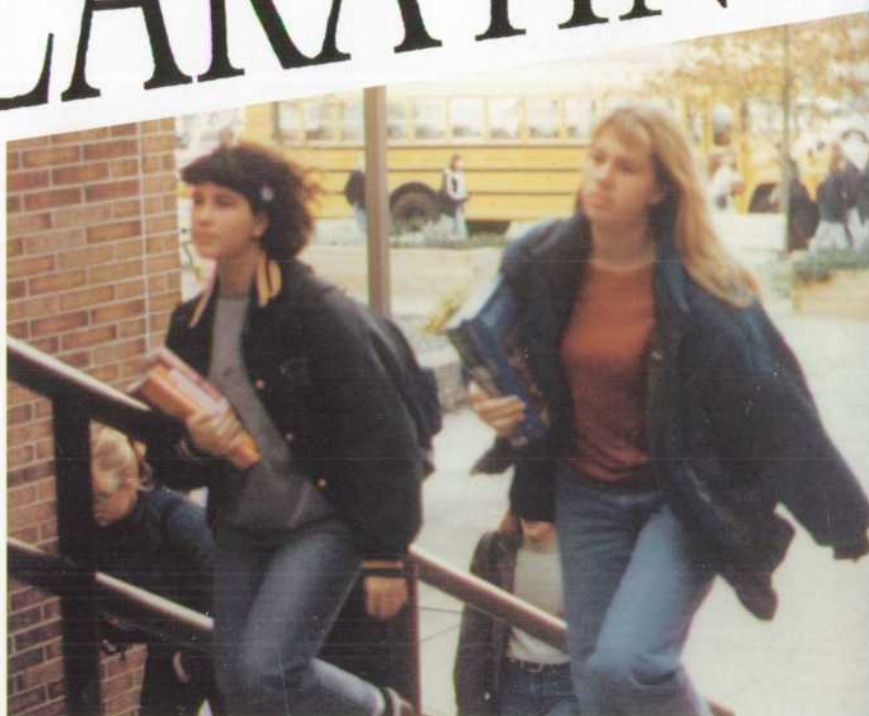

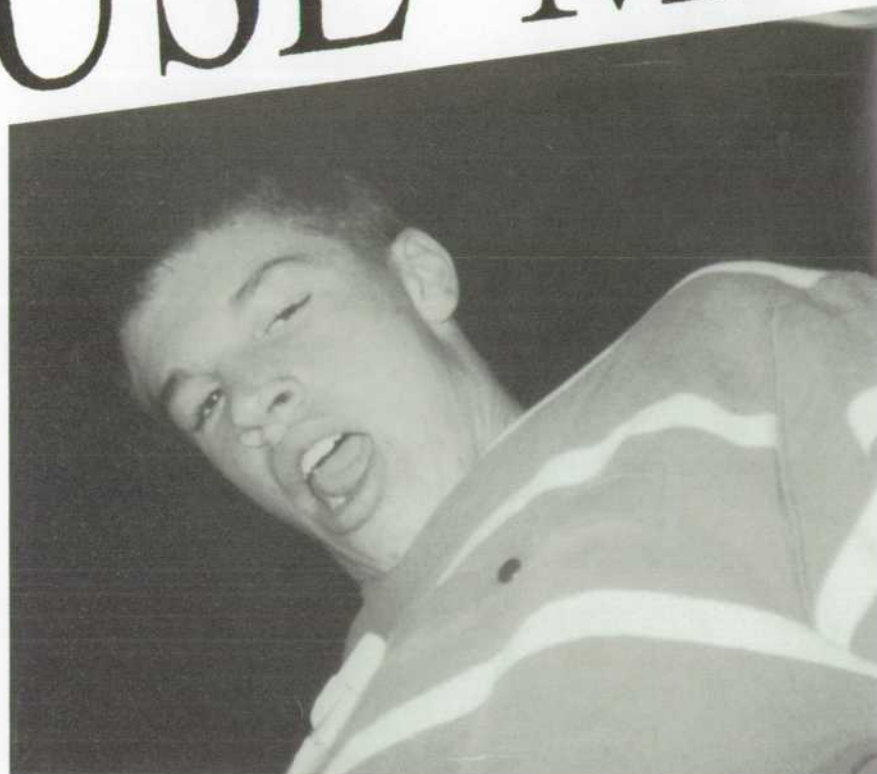

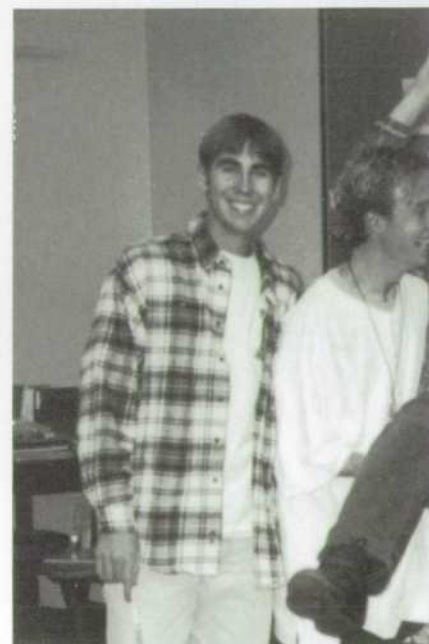
X-CUSE ME

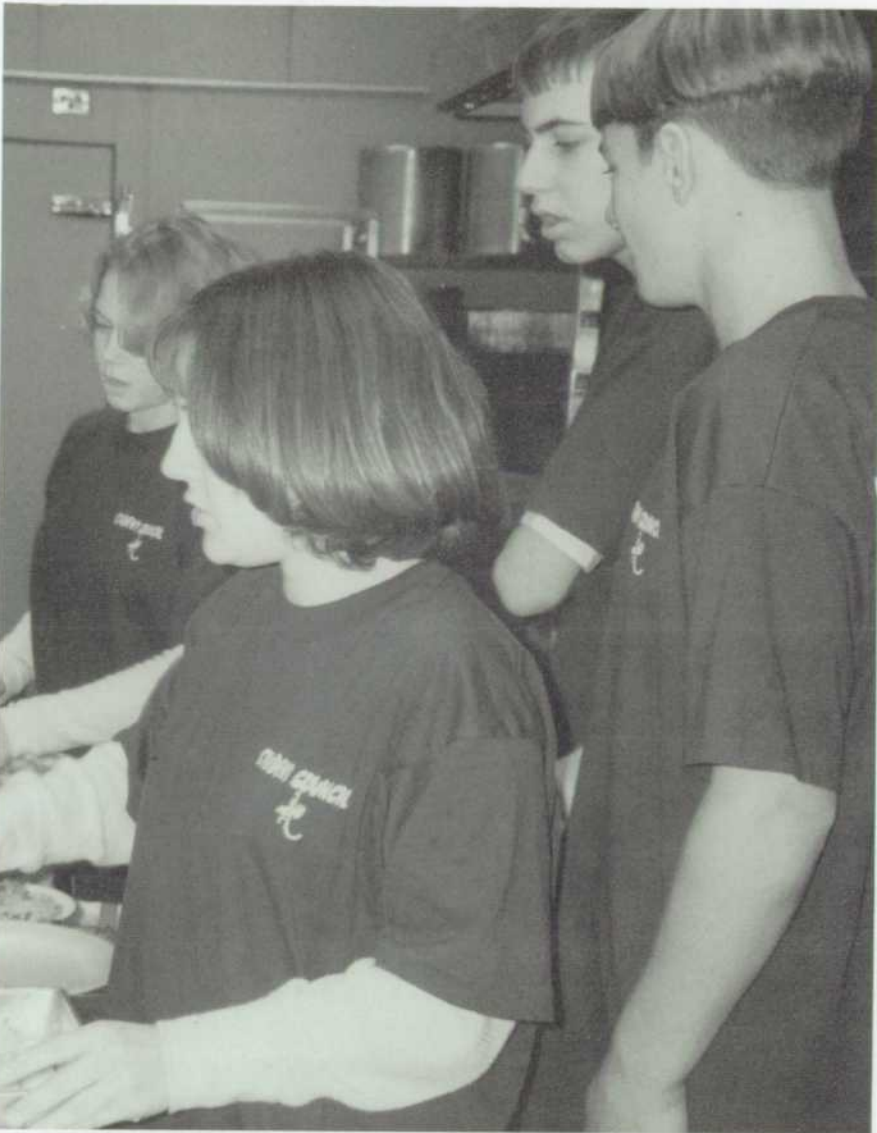

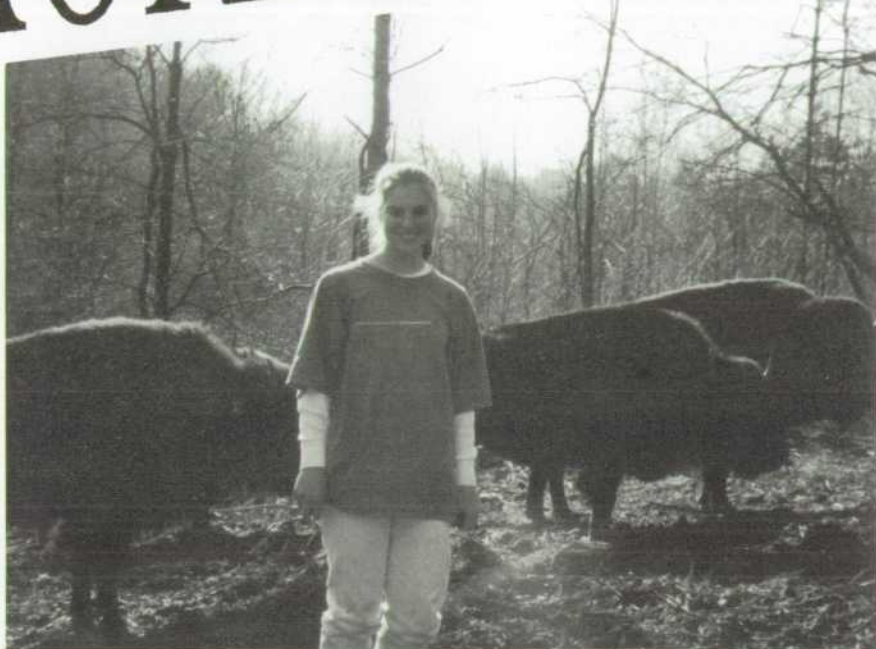


X-TRAORDINARY

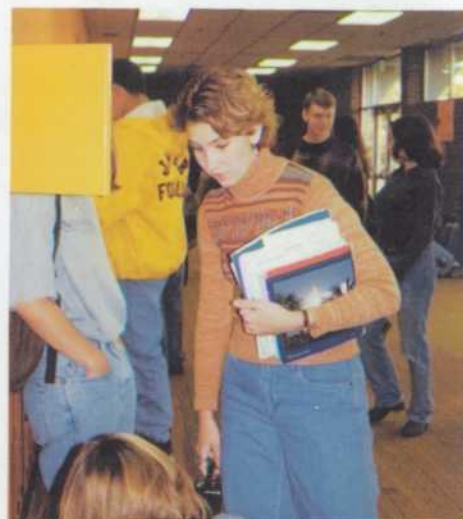

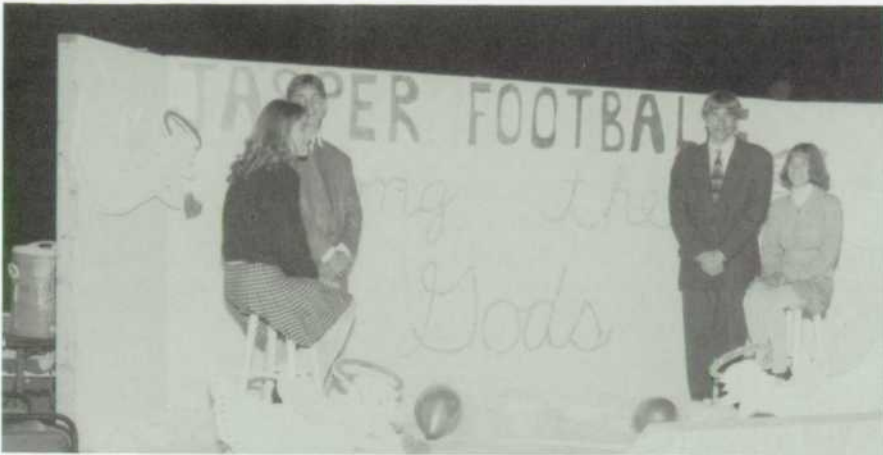

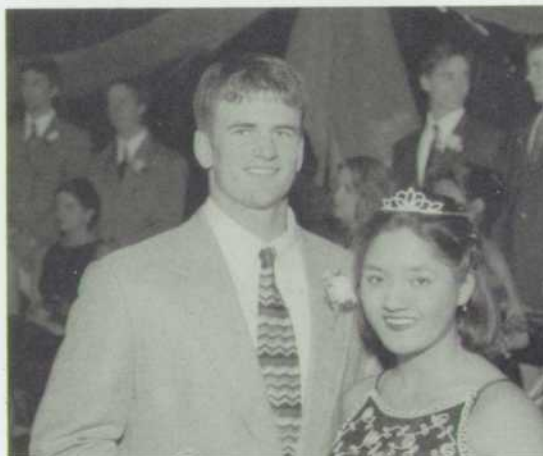

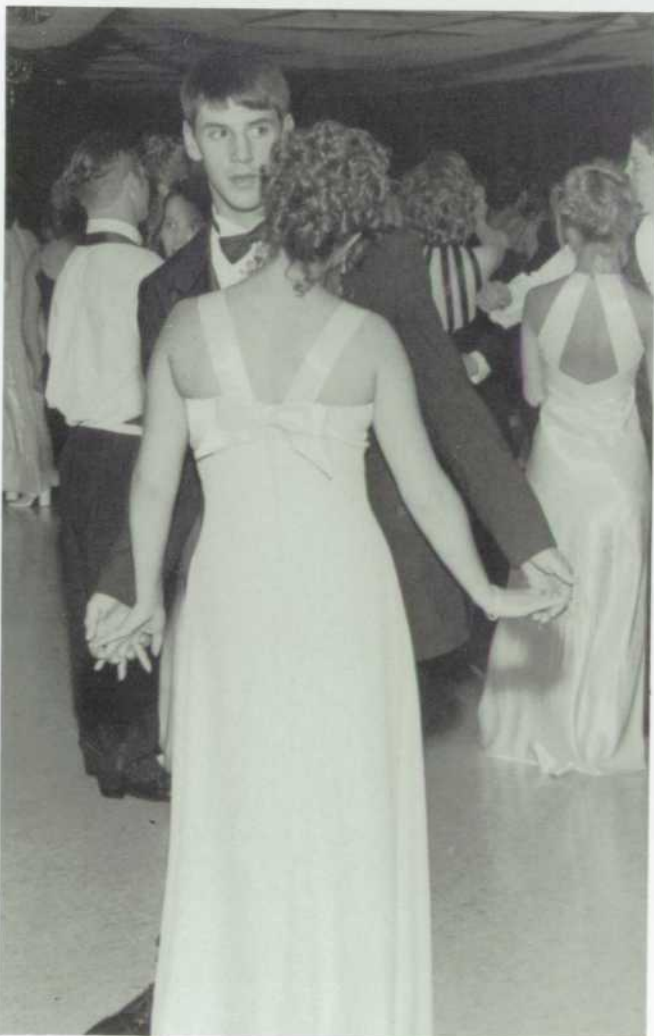

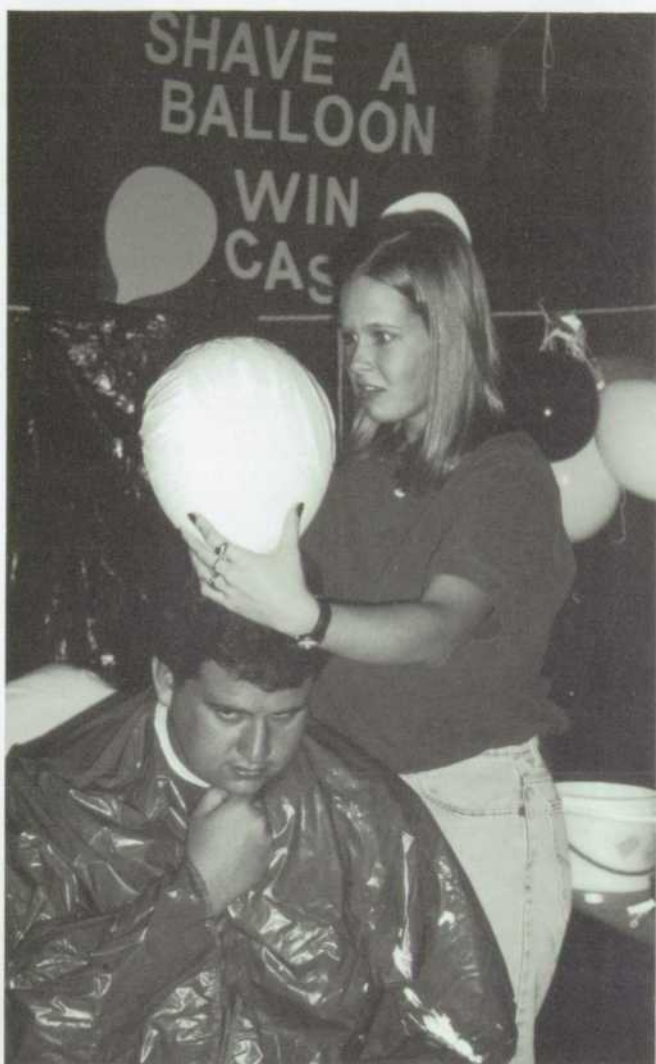

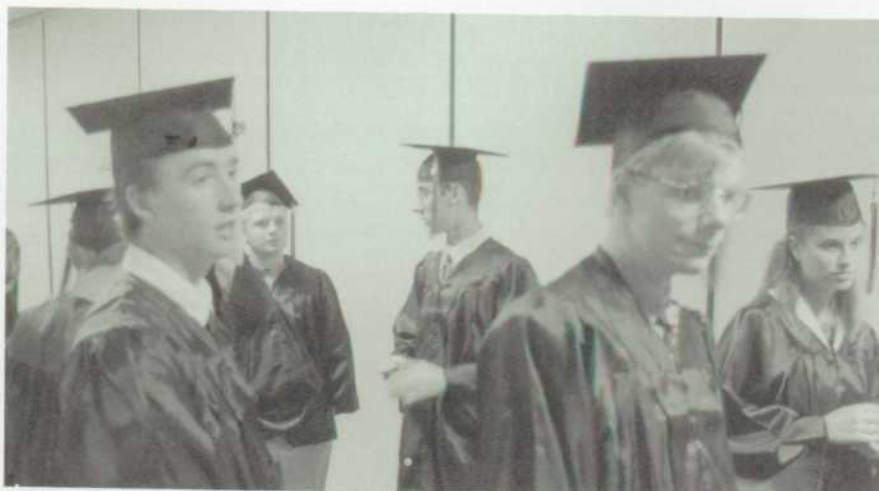

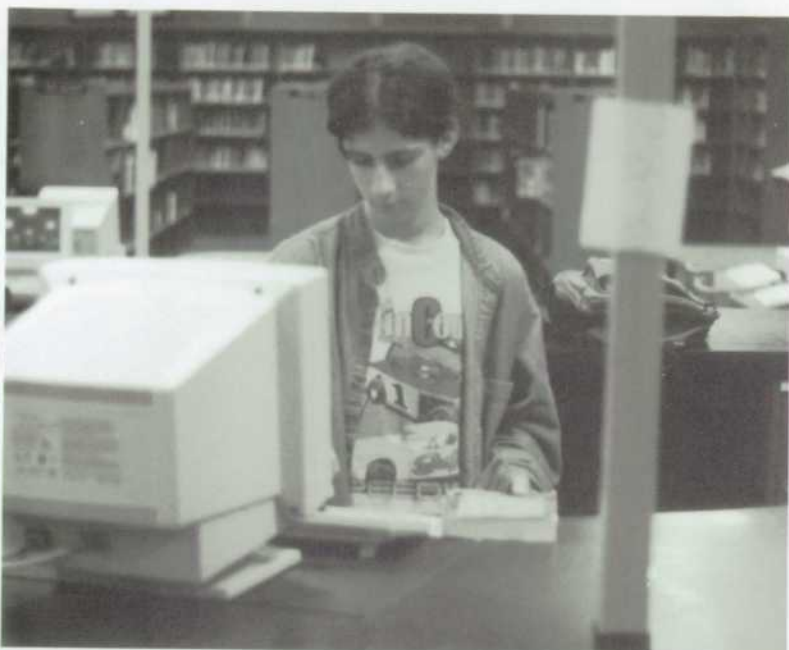

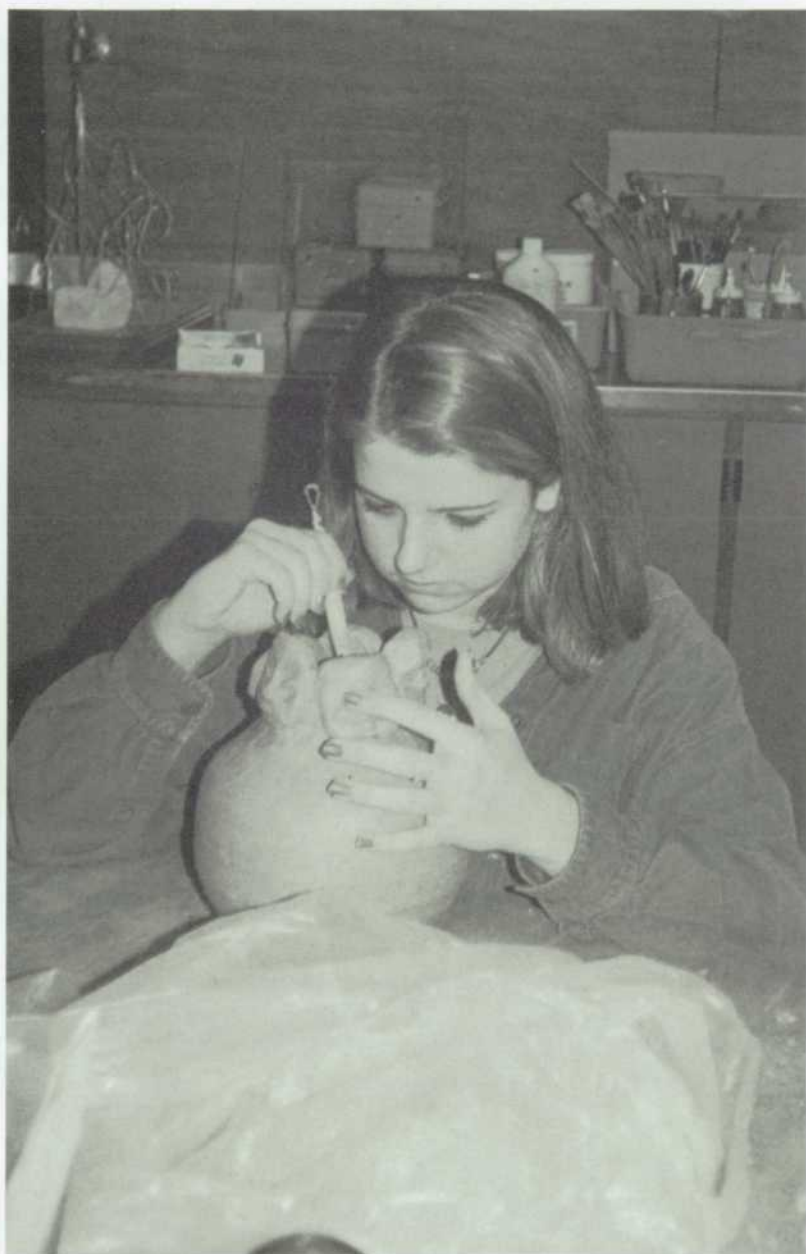

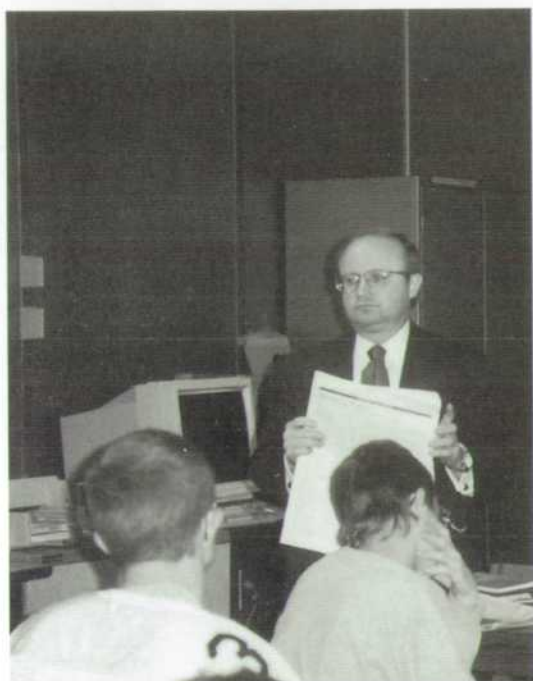

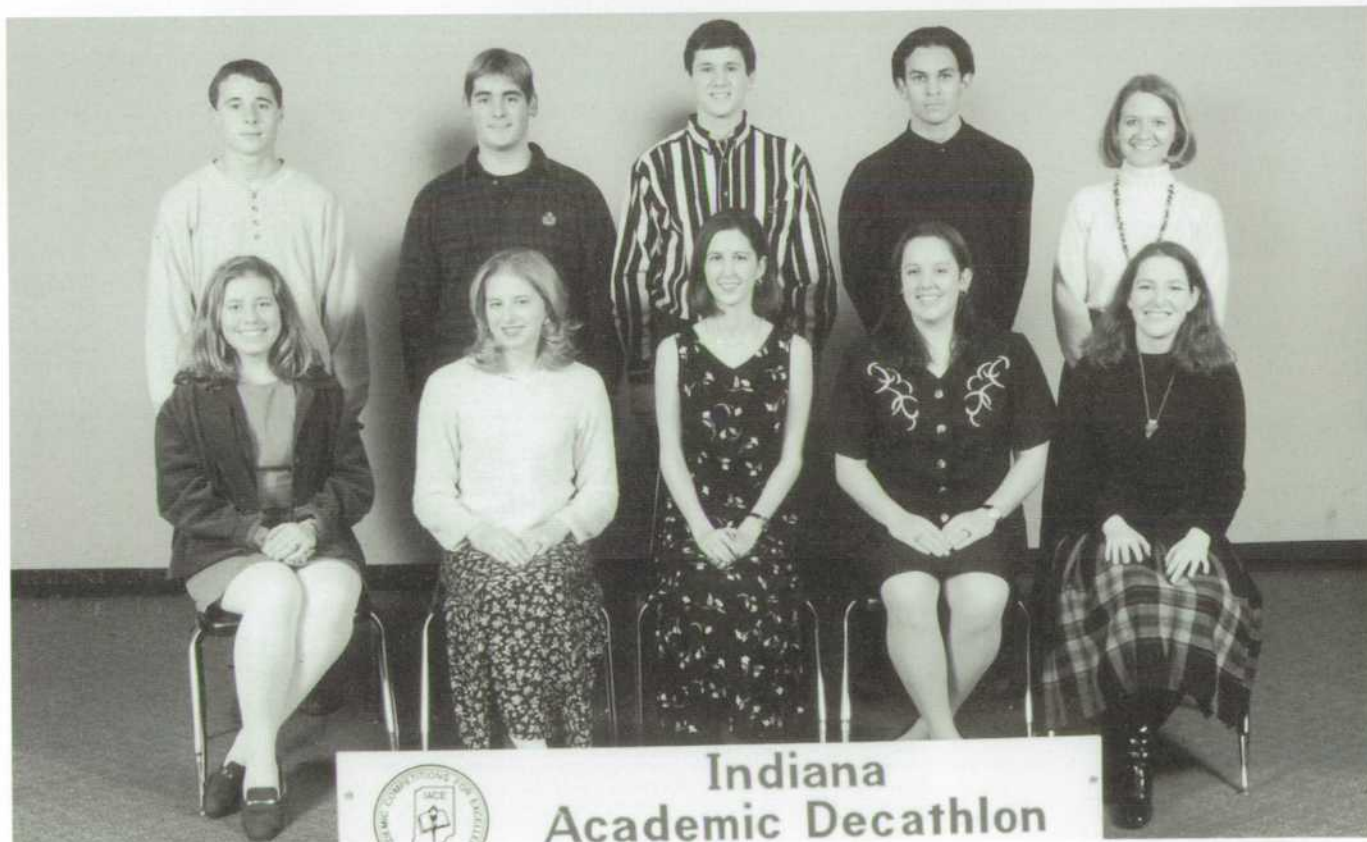

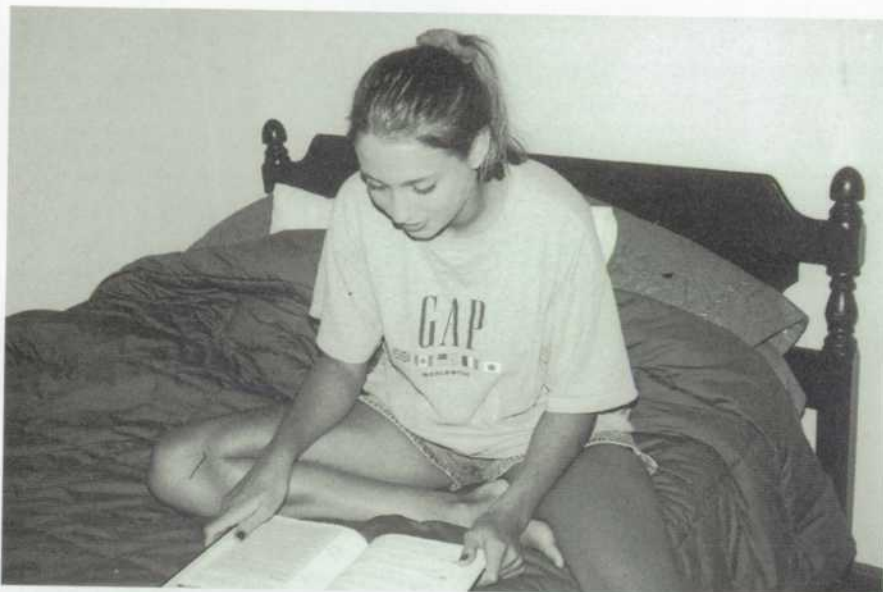

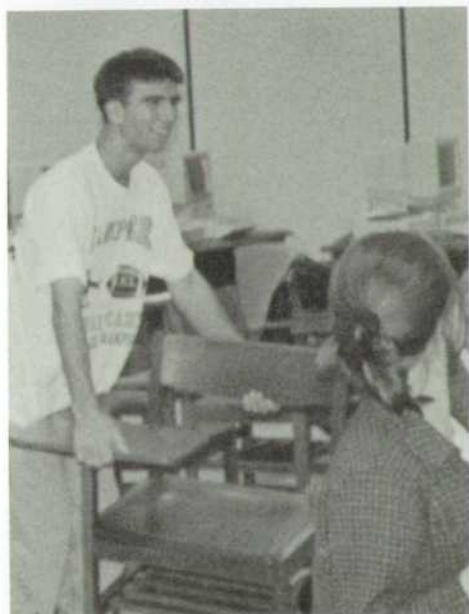
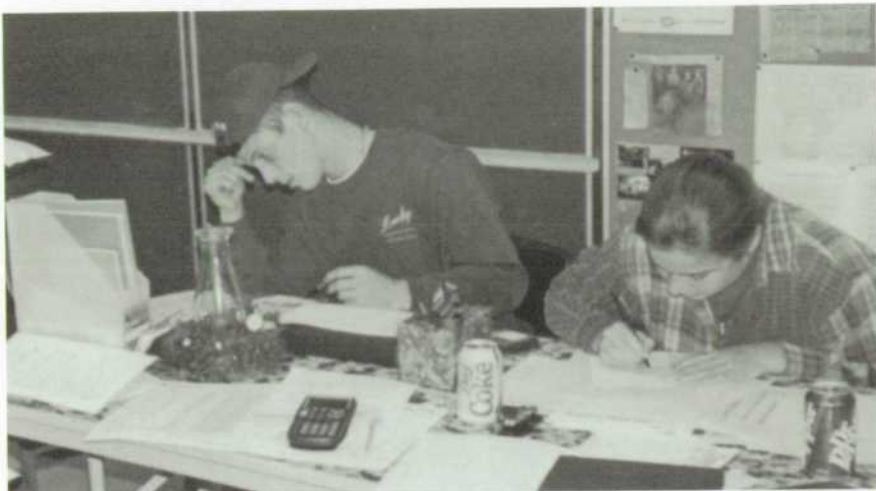
Dollar Sense

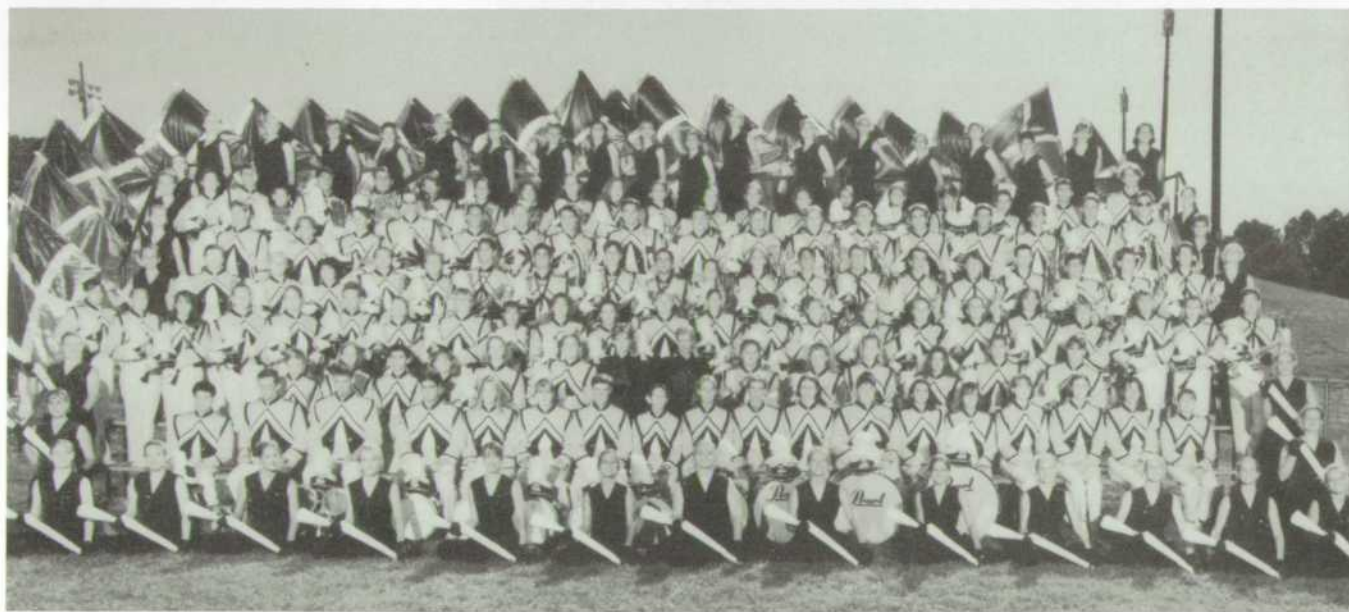
Circus

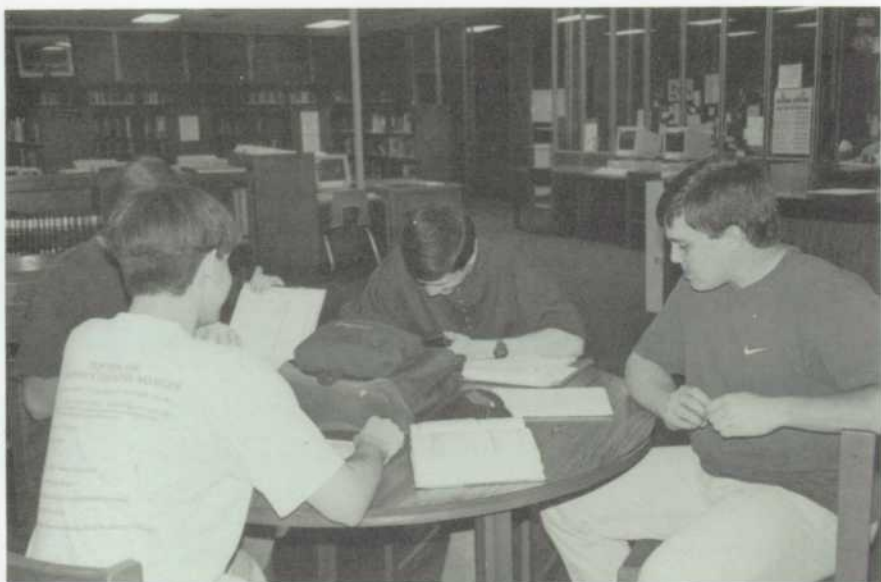

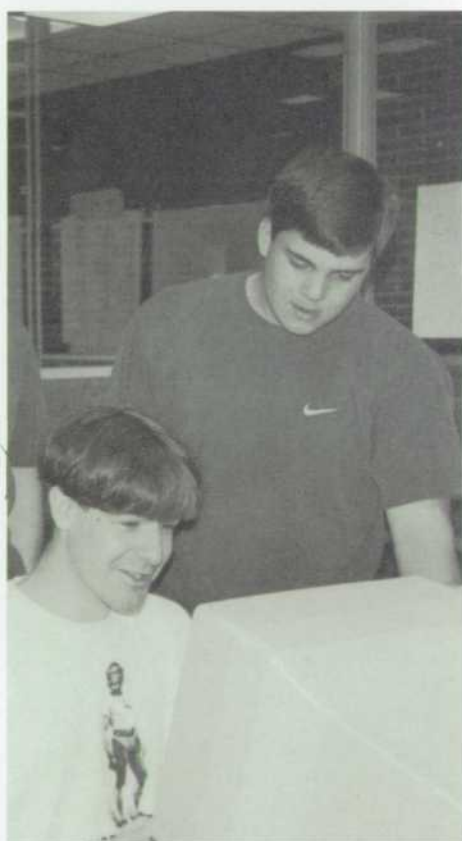

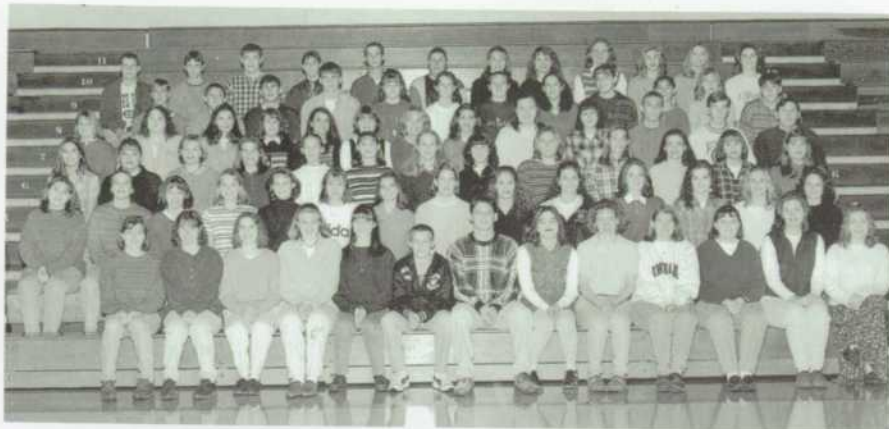

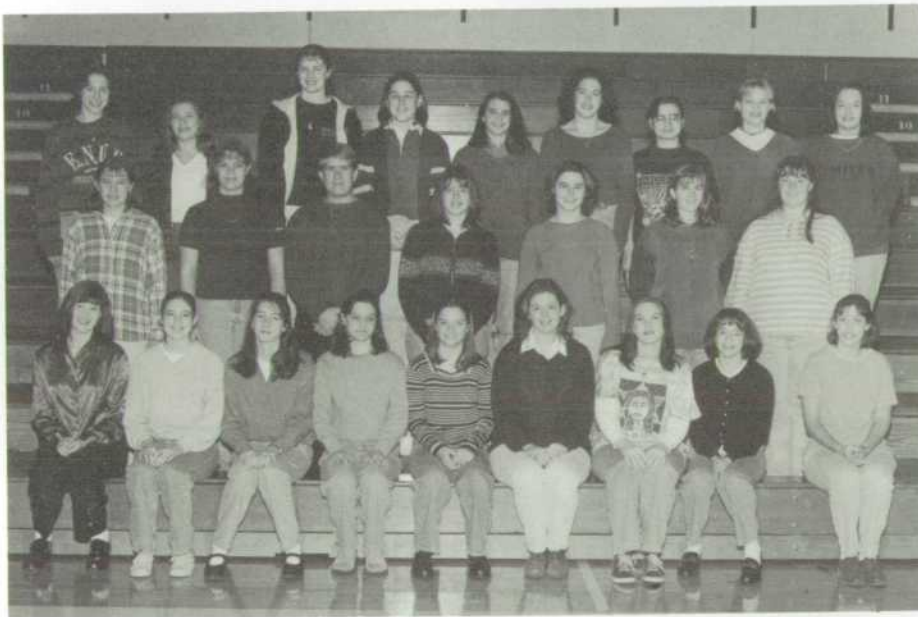

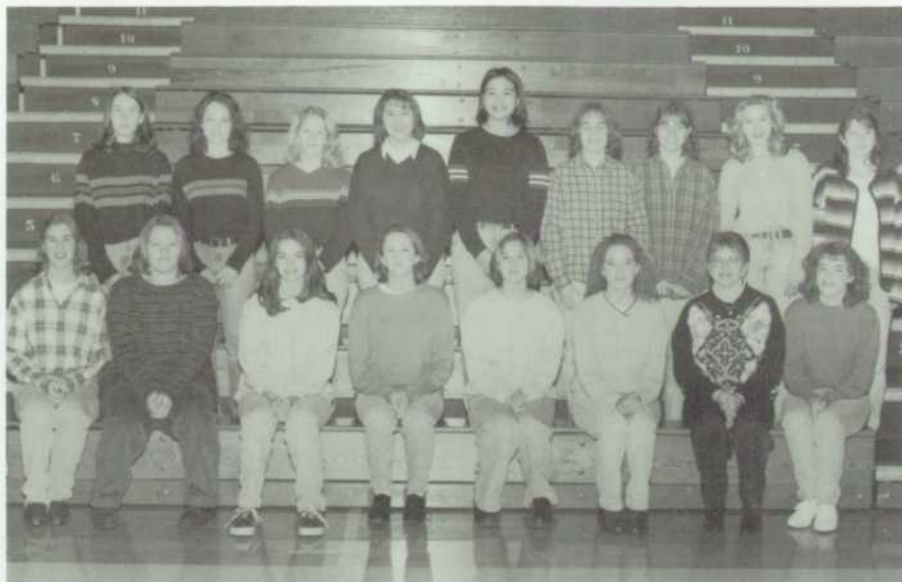

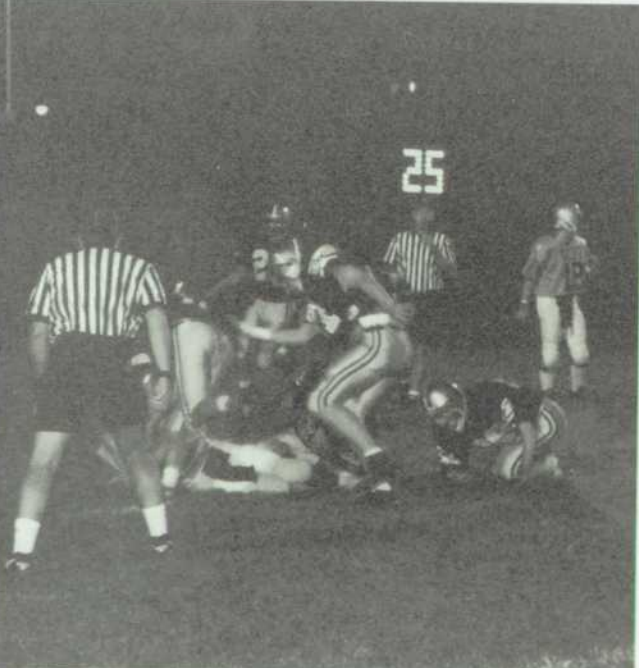

The excellent season ended when the Cats fell short to Heritage Hills during the Sectional.

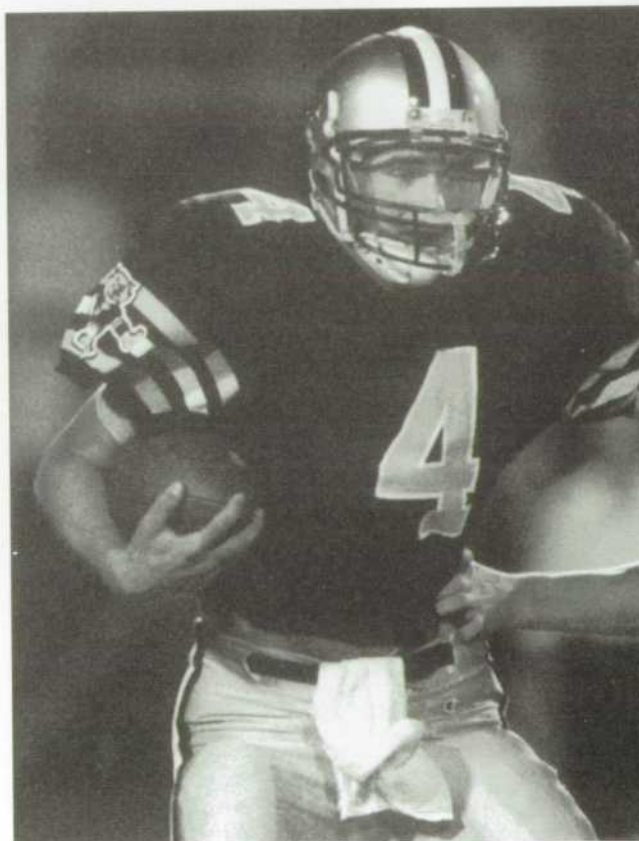


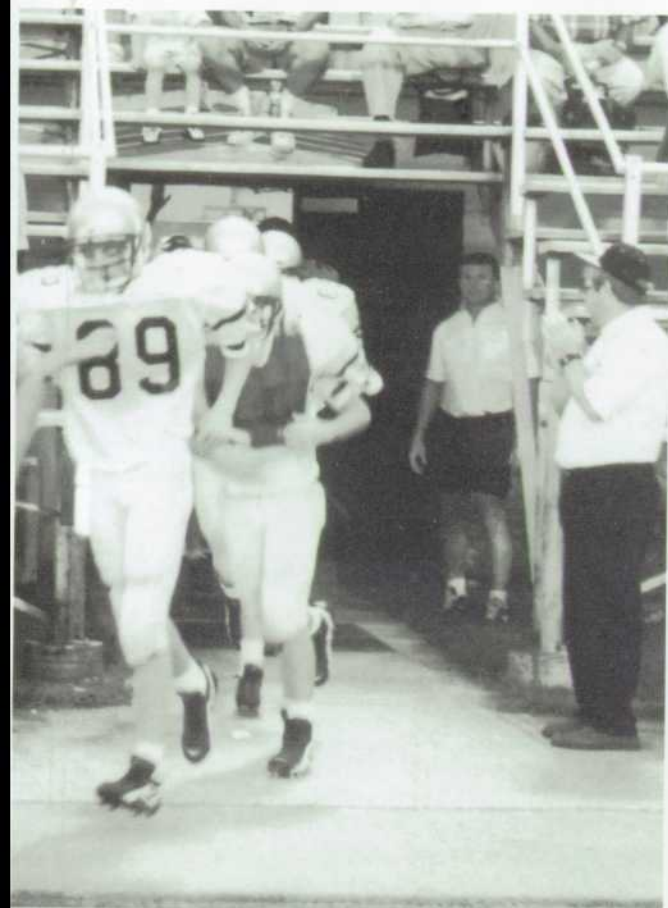

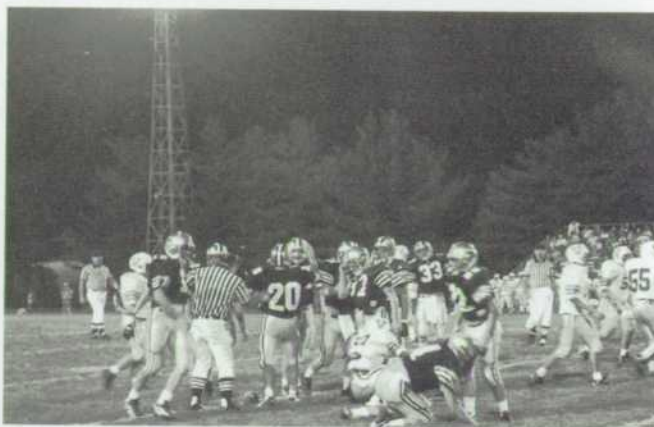

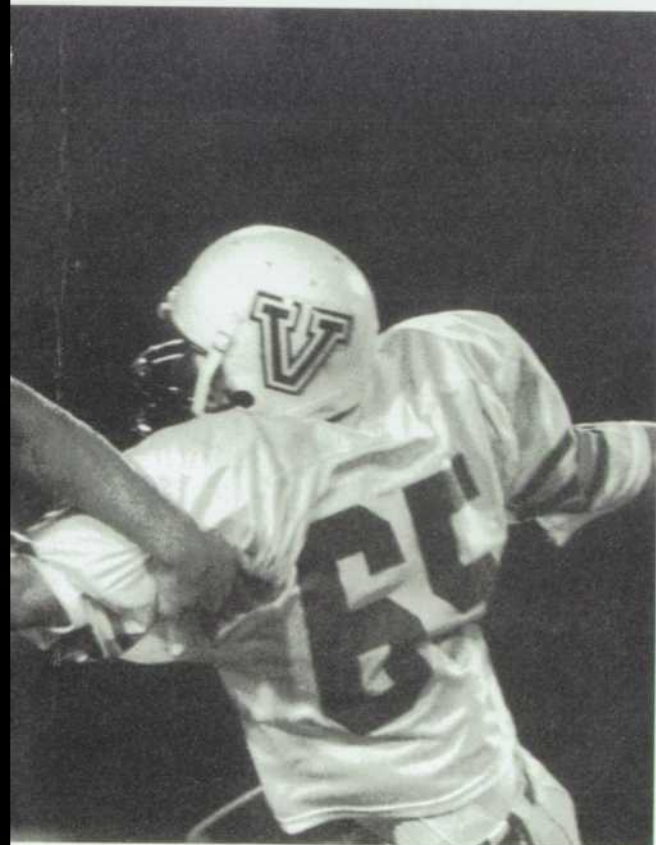

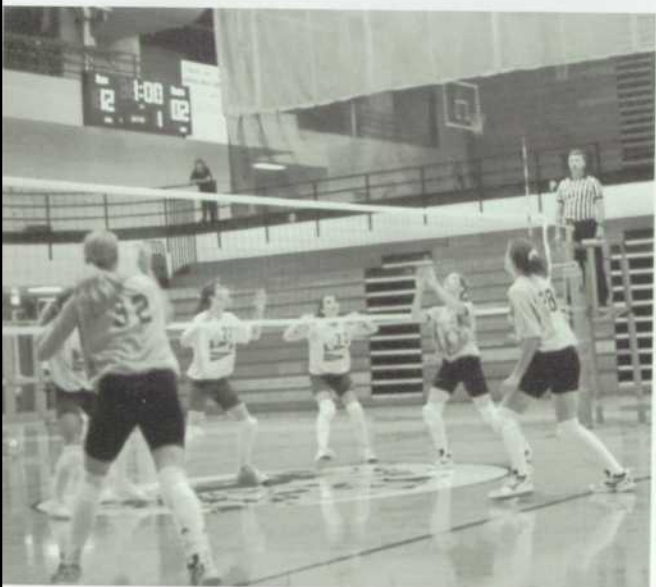

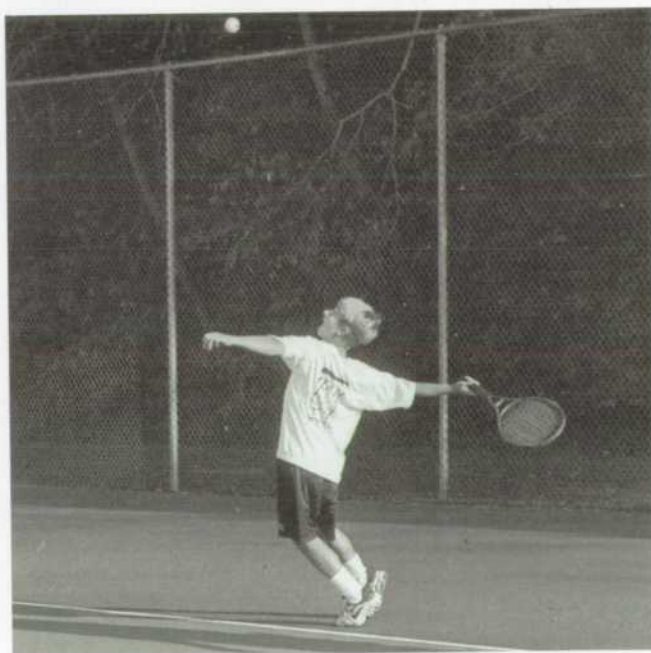

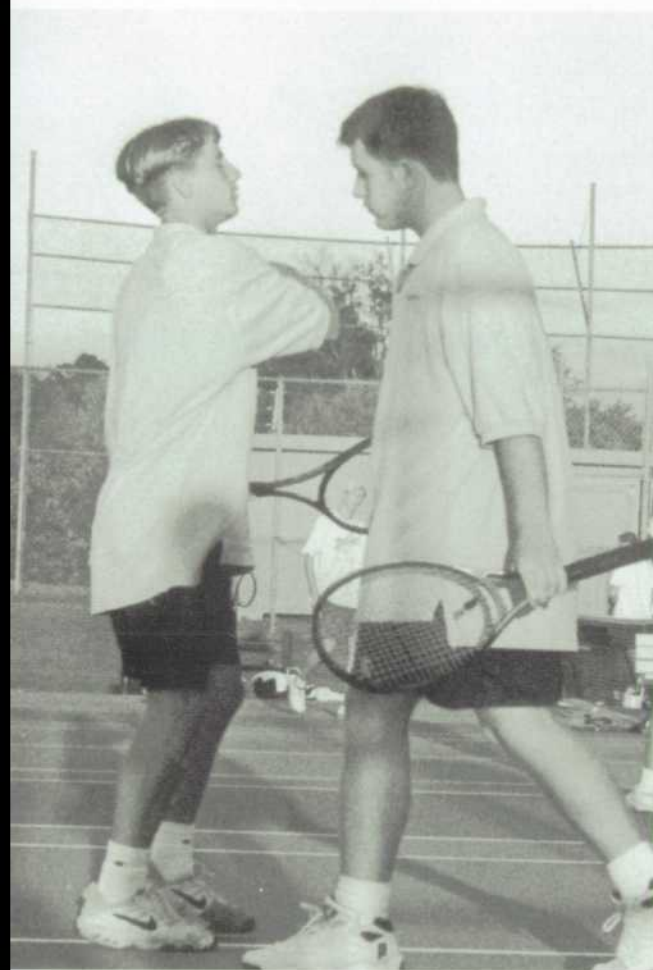

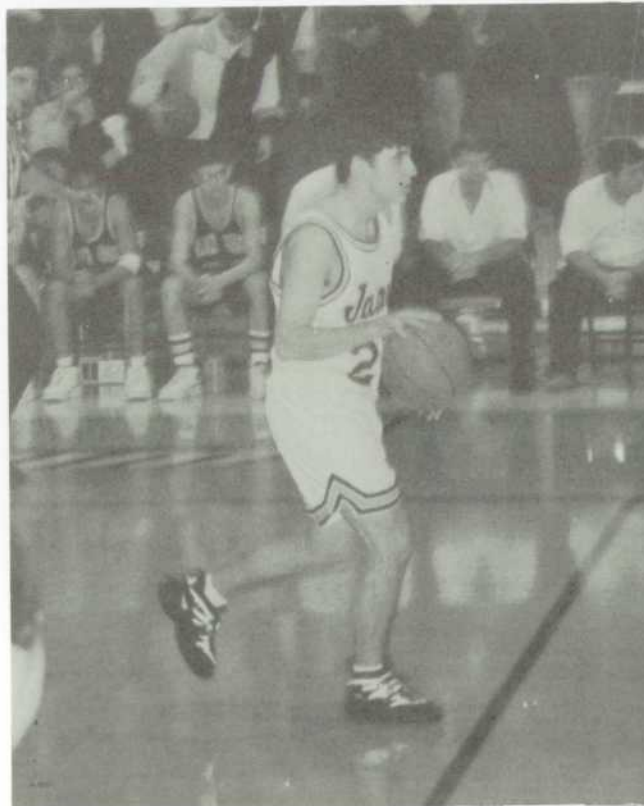

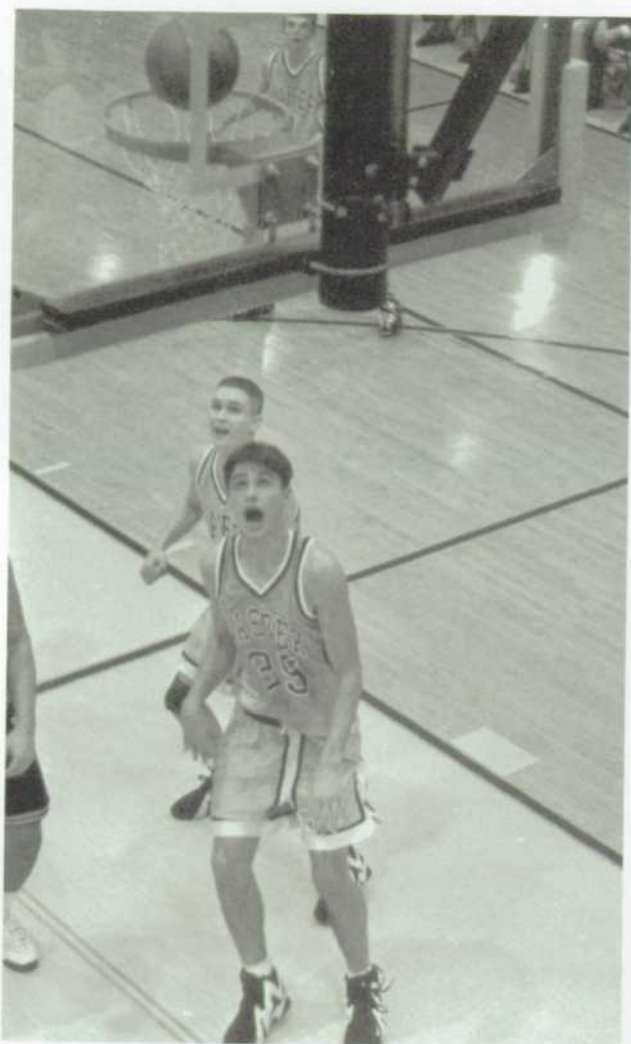

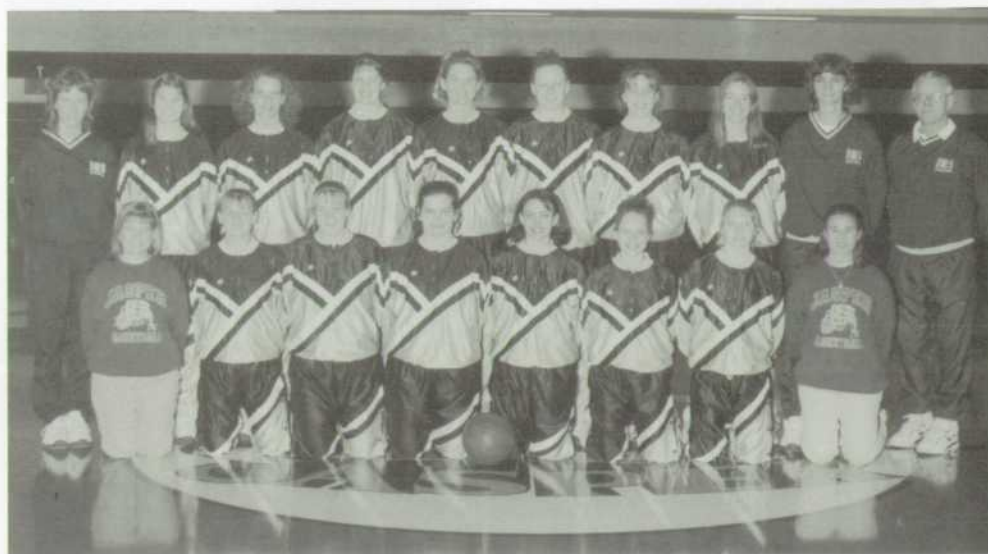

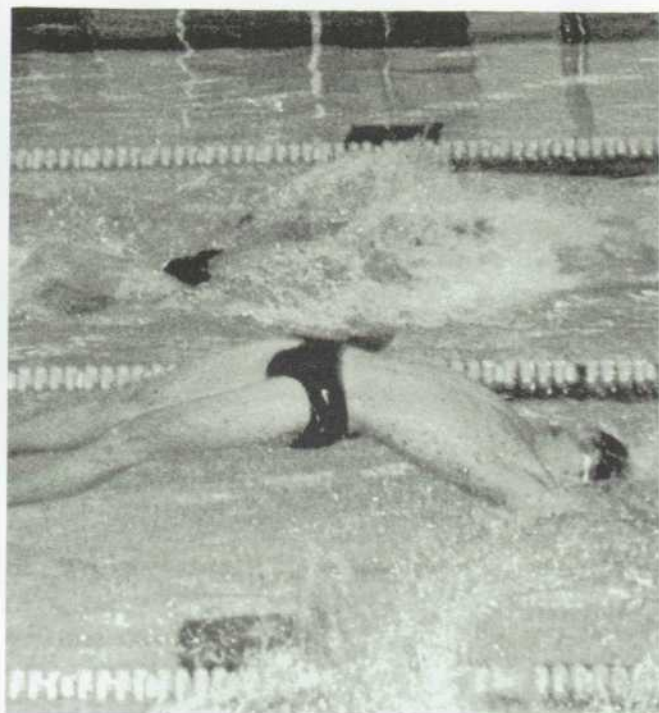

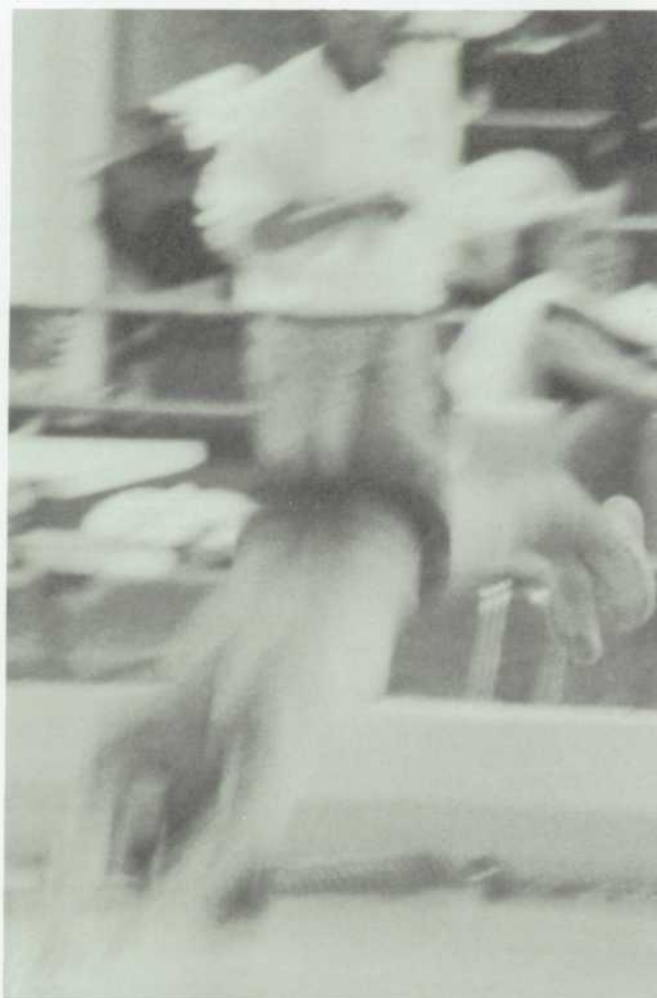

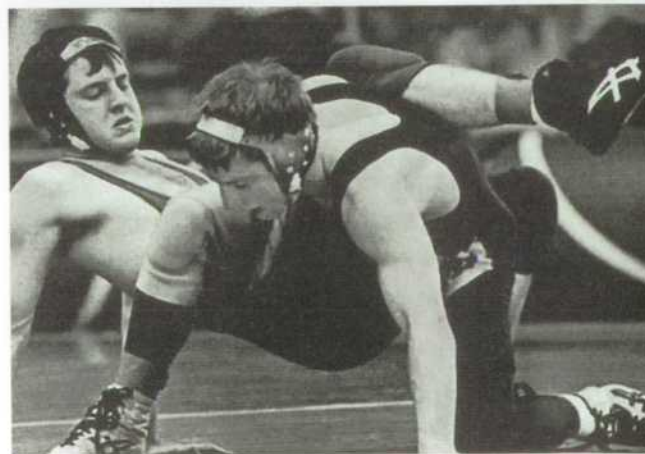

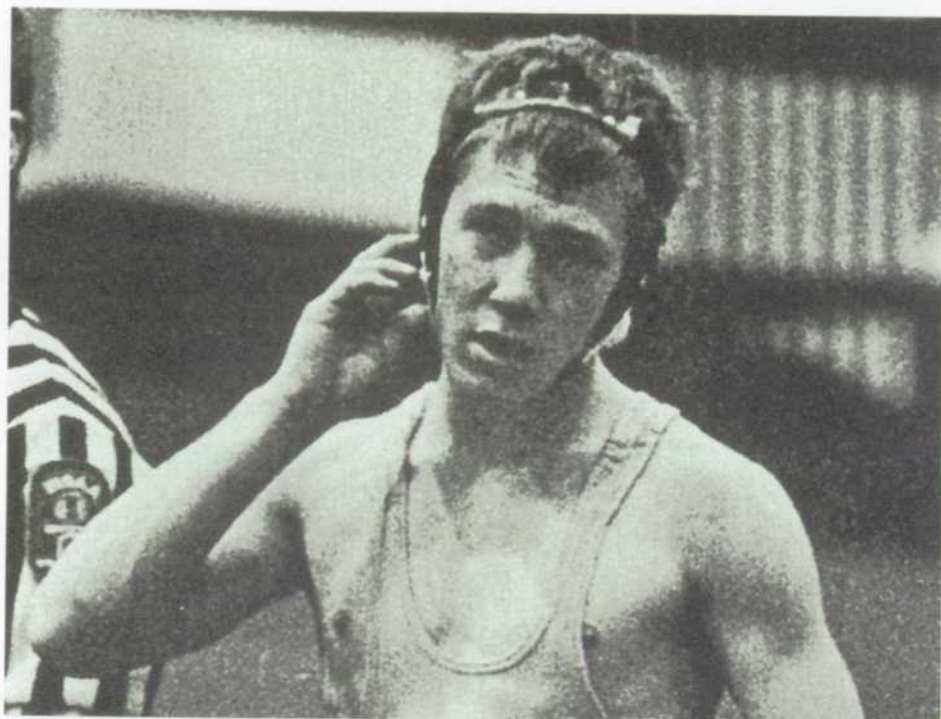


Todd Wigand shows his patience and determination as he waits to make his move on his Castle opponent.

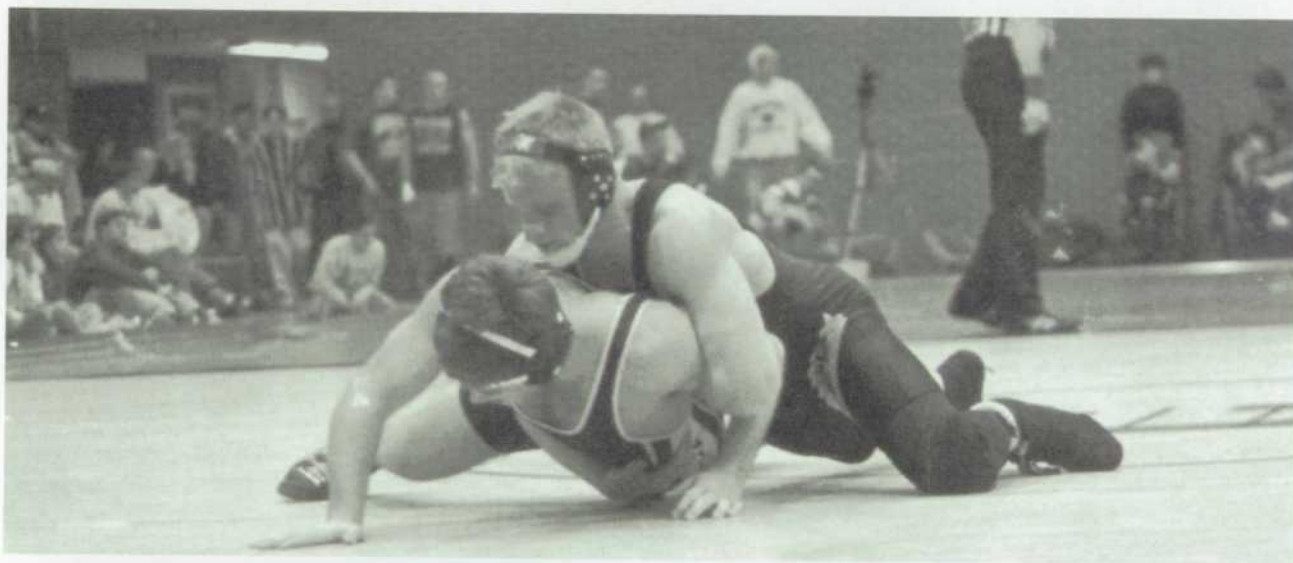

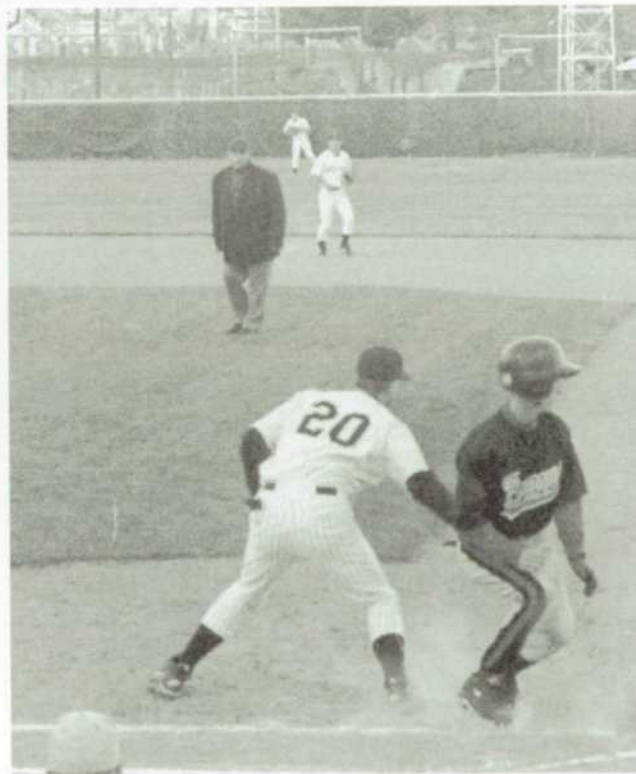

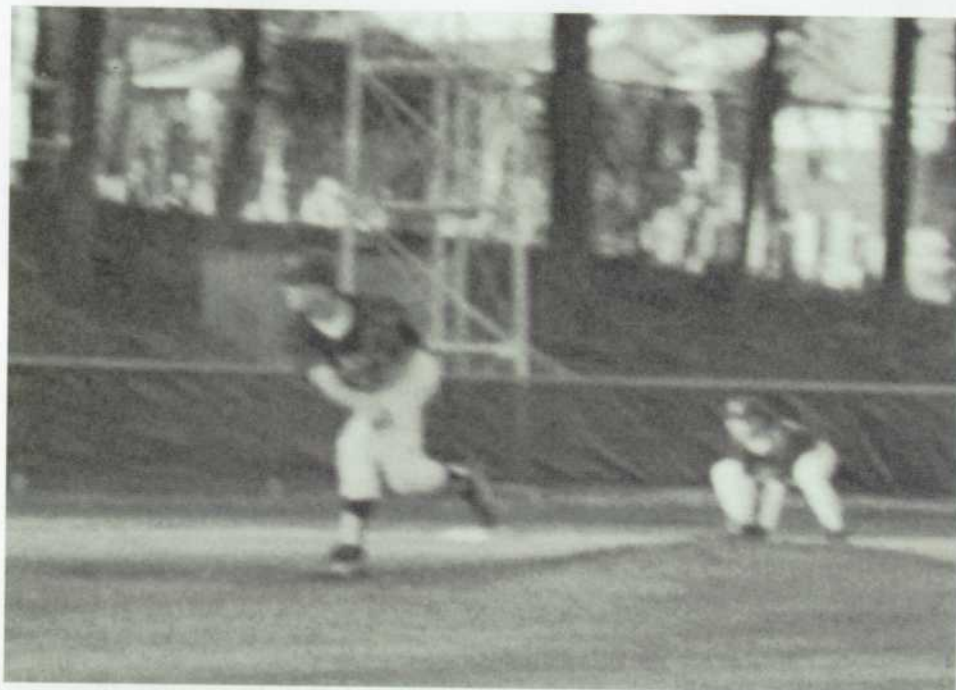

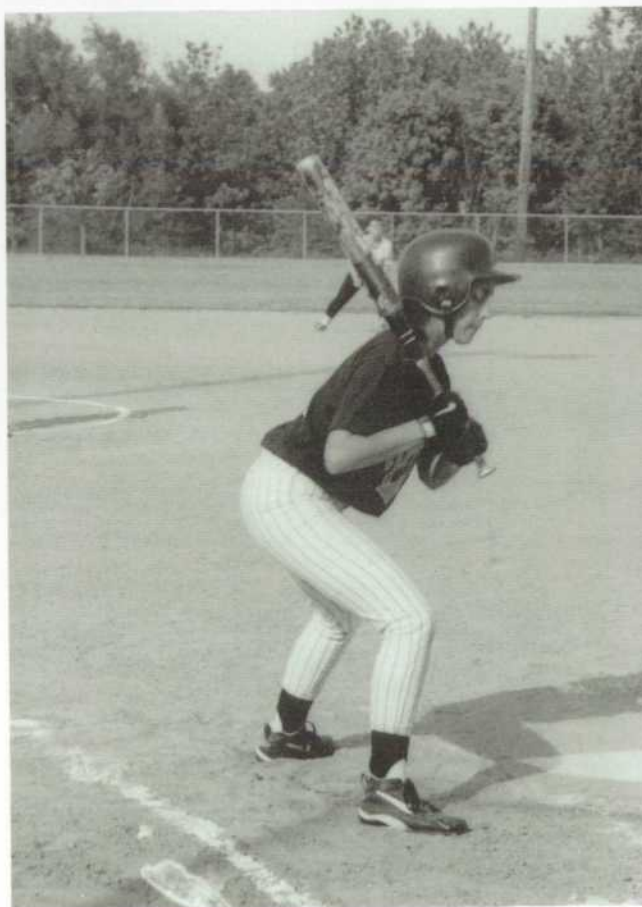

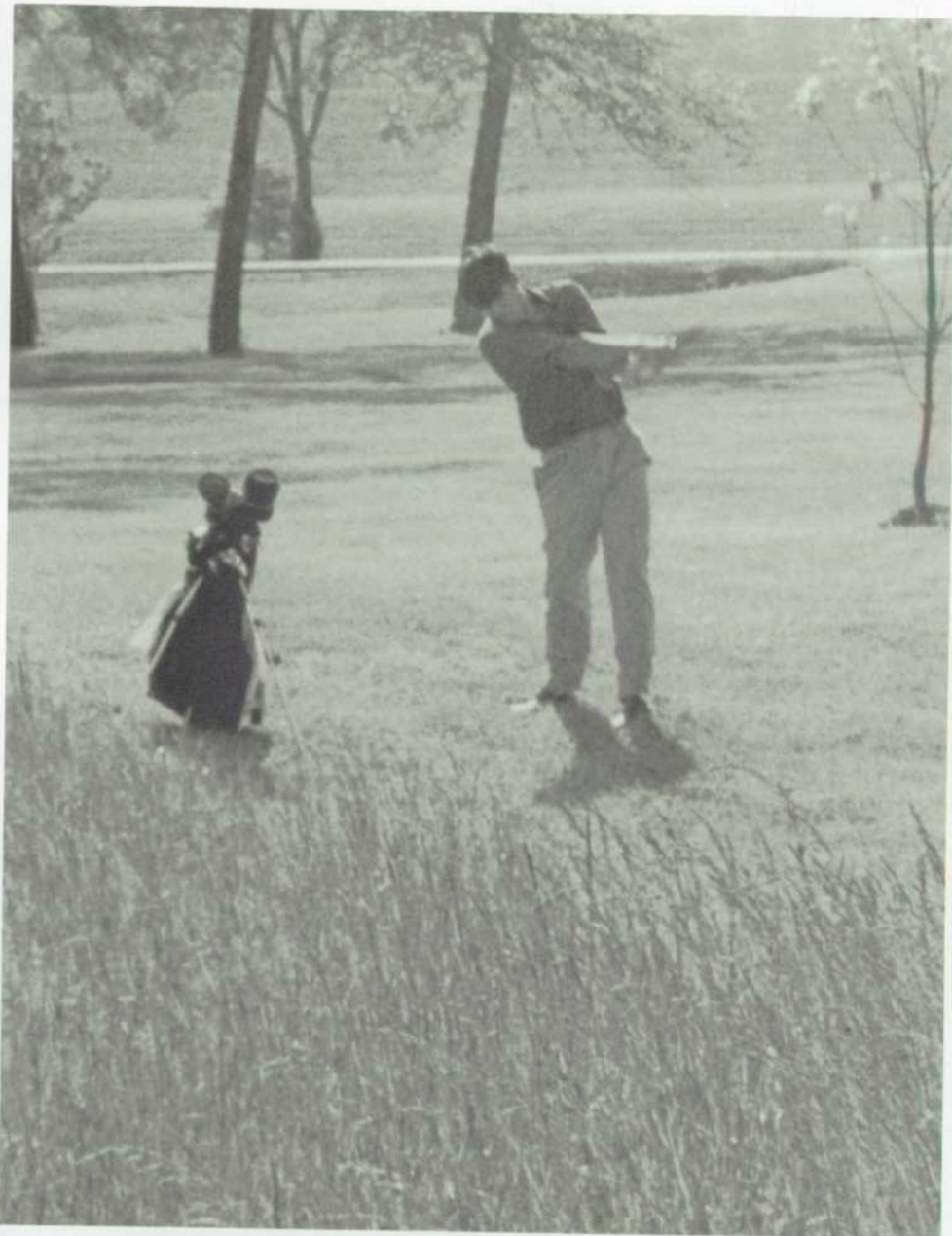
