





JHS was rough, tough, and ready to proceed through the school year with big smiles, happy faces, and lots of school spirit. Class competition was an incentive for


students to enthusiastically support the Wildcats. The seniors led the way by receiving the most spirit points in competitions that











The fashion at the turn of the millennium proved to be a combination of old styles and new. A casual look took to the


hallways of JHS: everything from tech vests and pocket khakis to three-quarter length sleeves and bandanas. Some students

By demonstrating their own styles, students emphasized JHS diversity.





the Snowball. Jill Dittmer and Dustin Mehringer were crowned King and Queen. All the dances proved to be memborable experiences.









their convent so they could bury their dead sisters. Both of the productions proved to be a huge success.



Wild West. Some games and contests that were held were volleyball, sumo wrestling, tug-of-war, burping, and name that tune. At the end of Post Prom, prizes were


given away. The two major prizes were a computer system awarded to Bob Alexander, and \$1,000.00 won by David Nealy.




### Class of






# Class of 2001





Seeing students grasp concepts and watching them grow were just a couple of Mrs. Hurm's favorite things about working in the classroom. Sponsoring the Octagon Club and the National Honor Society helped her reach students in a way she couldn't have in the classroom. She said that during extracurricular activities teachers were able to see students at a more natural state.

Recently, Mrs. Hurm accepted the job and responsibilities of State President of Alpha Delta Kappa International Honorary Sorority for Women Educators for the 2000 through 2002 biennium. Therefore after her retirement from JHS, she will be traveling around the state to fulfill the duties of this honor.

Her grandmother always taught her that she should, "Enjoy what you do, and do what you enjoy." This would be one thought that she would like to be able to leave with the future students at JHS. She said, "Everyone should choose a career that they are interested in, and never forget to put your heart into whatever you do."




































