WEEKENDS

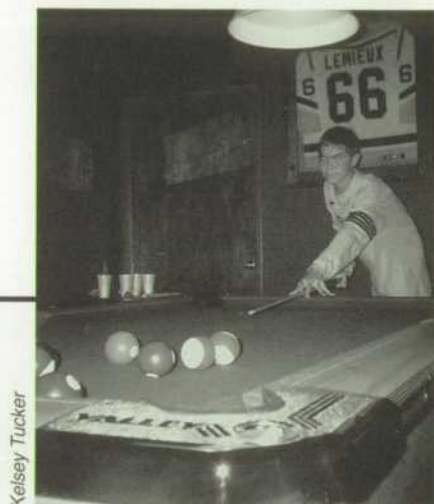
"So, what's going on this weekend?"

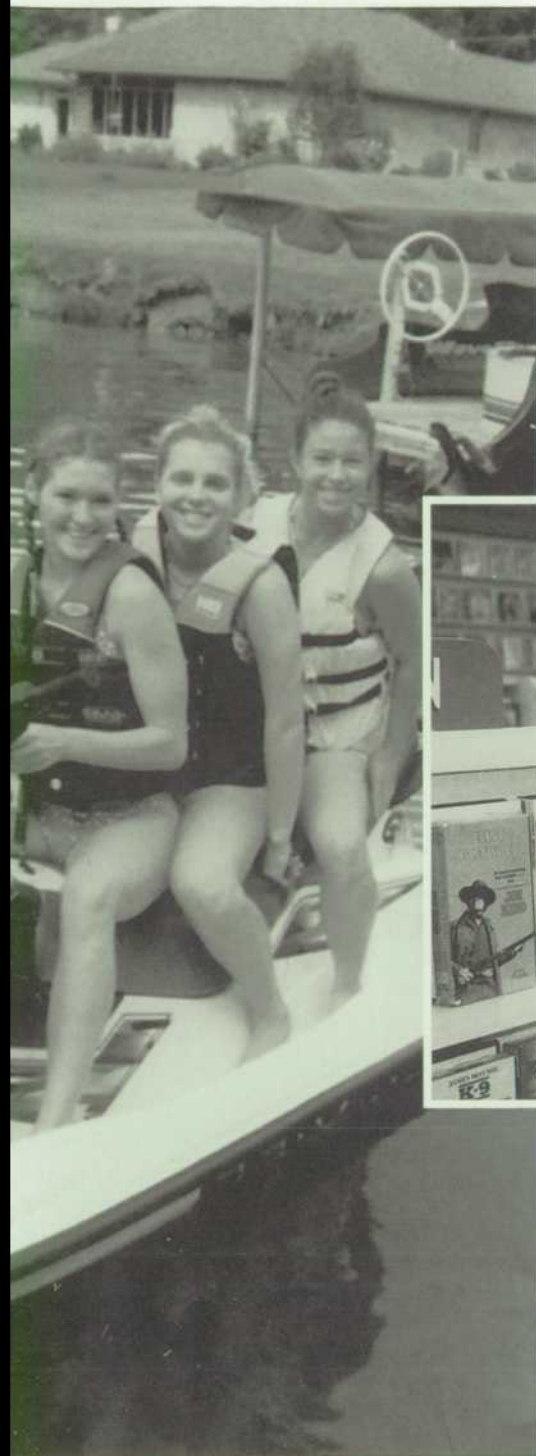

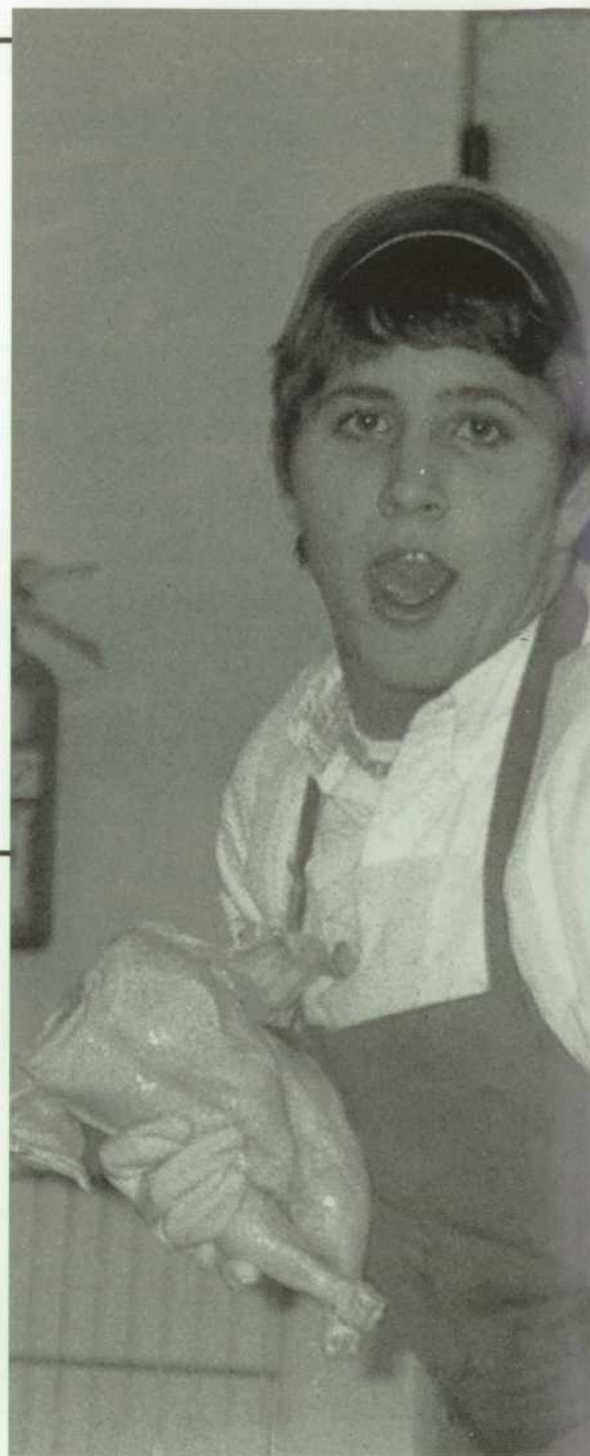

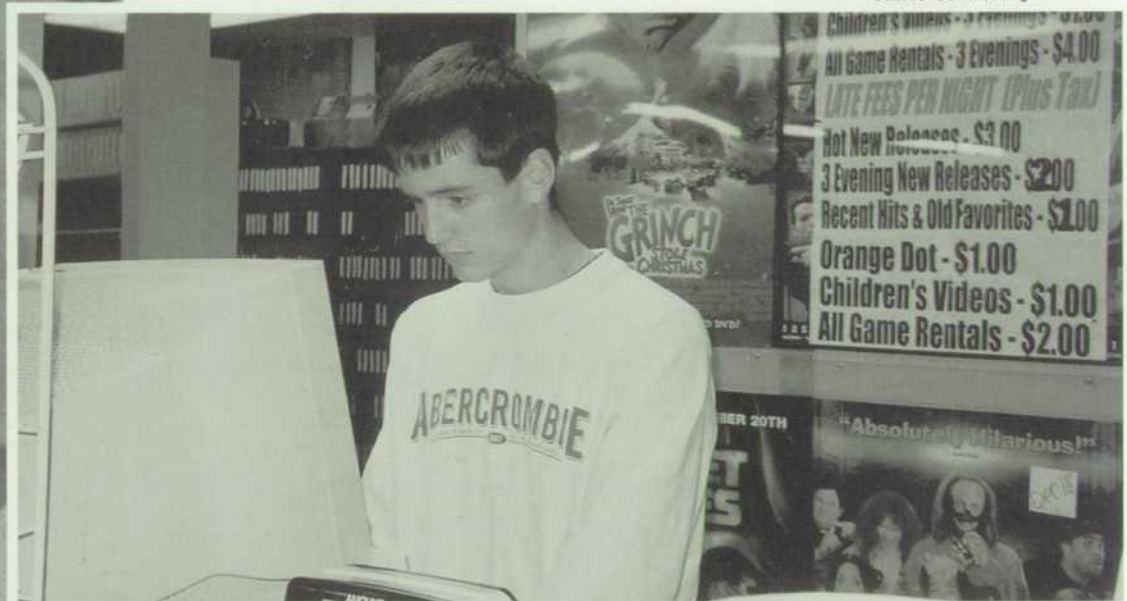

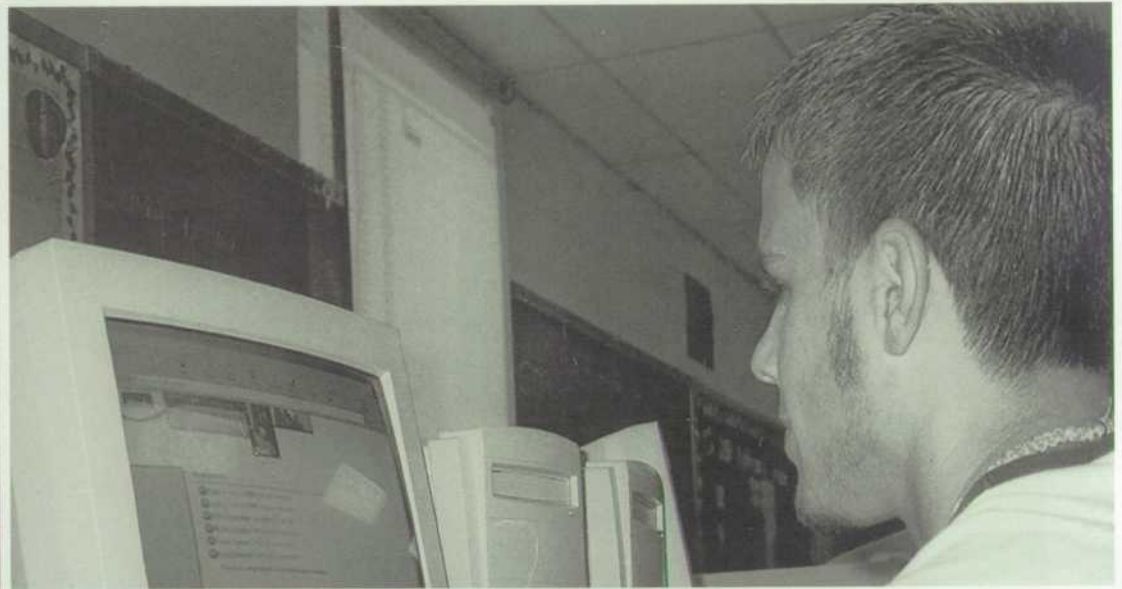

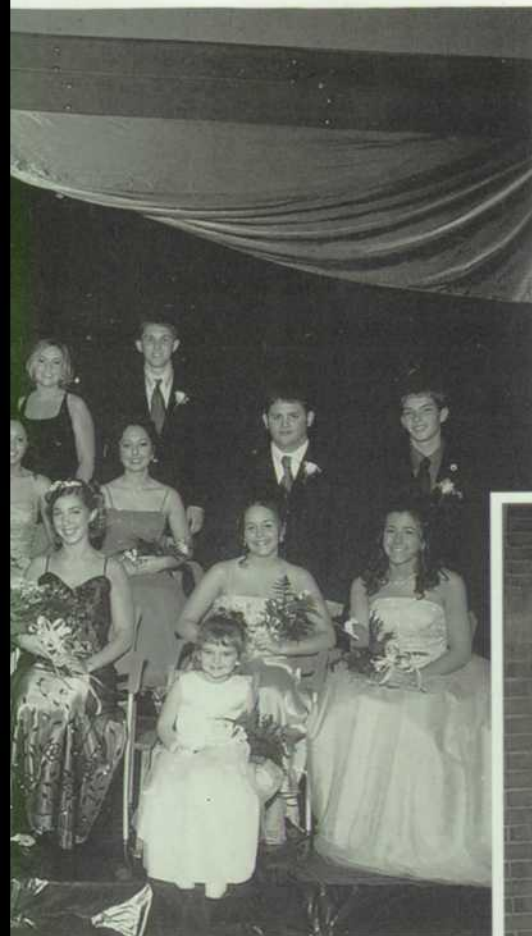

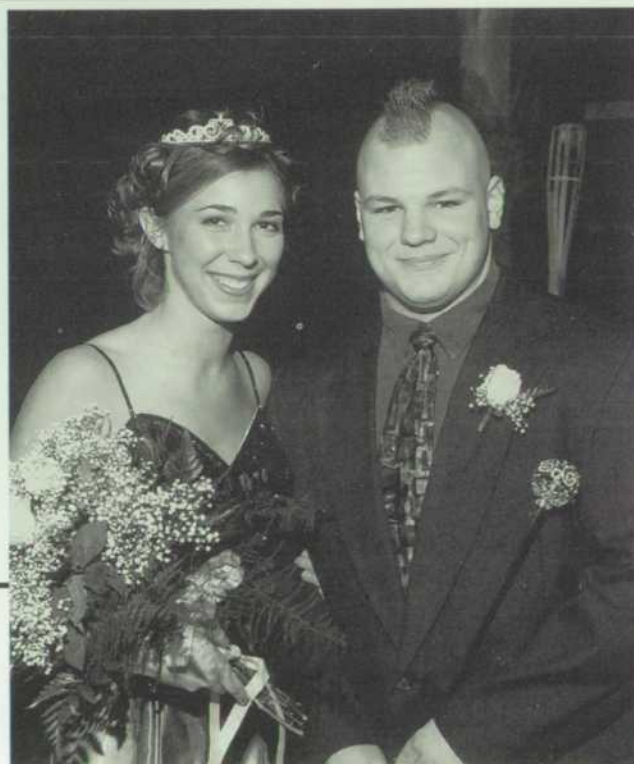

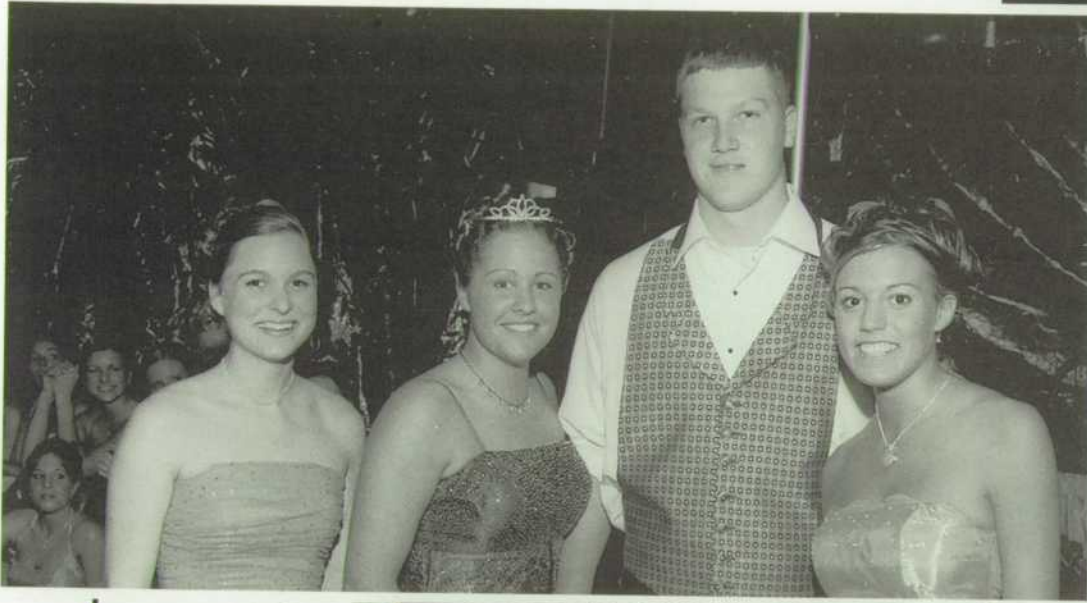

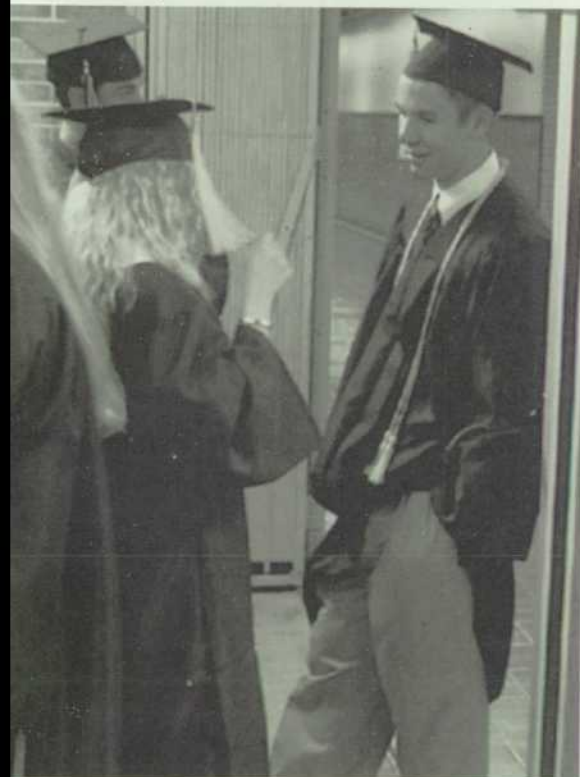

from JHS were Joseph Seger, Grade 12, and Nick Hopf, Grade 10.

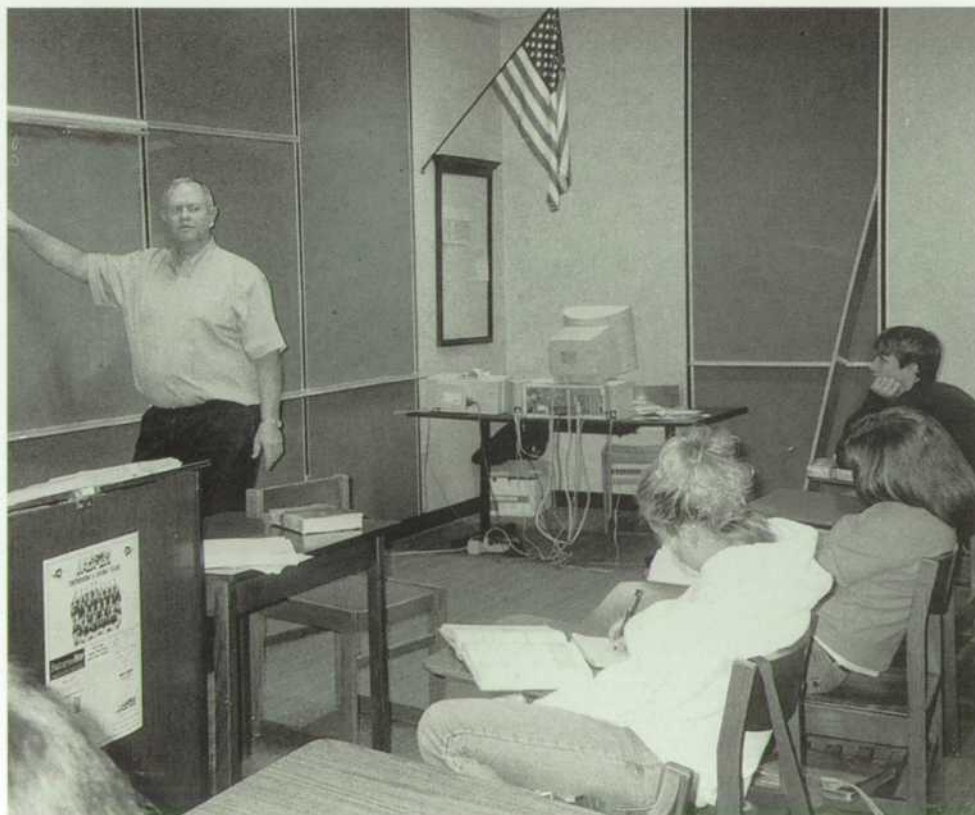

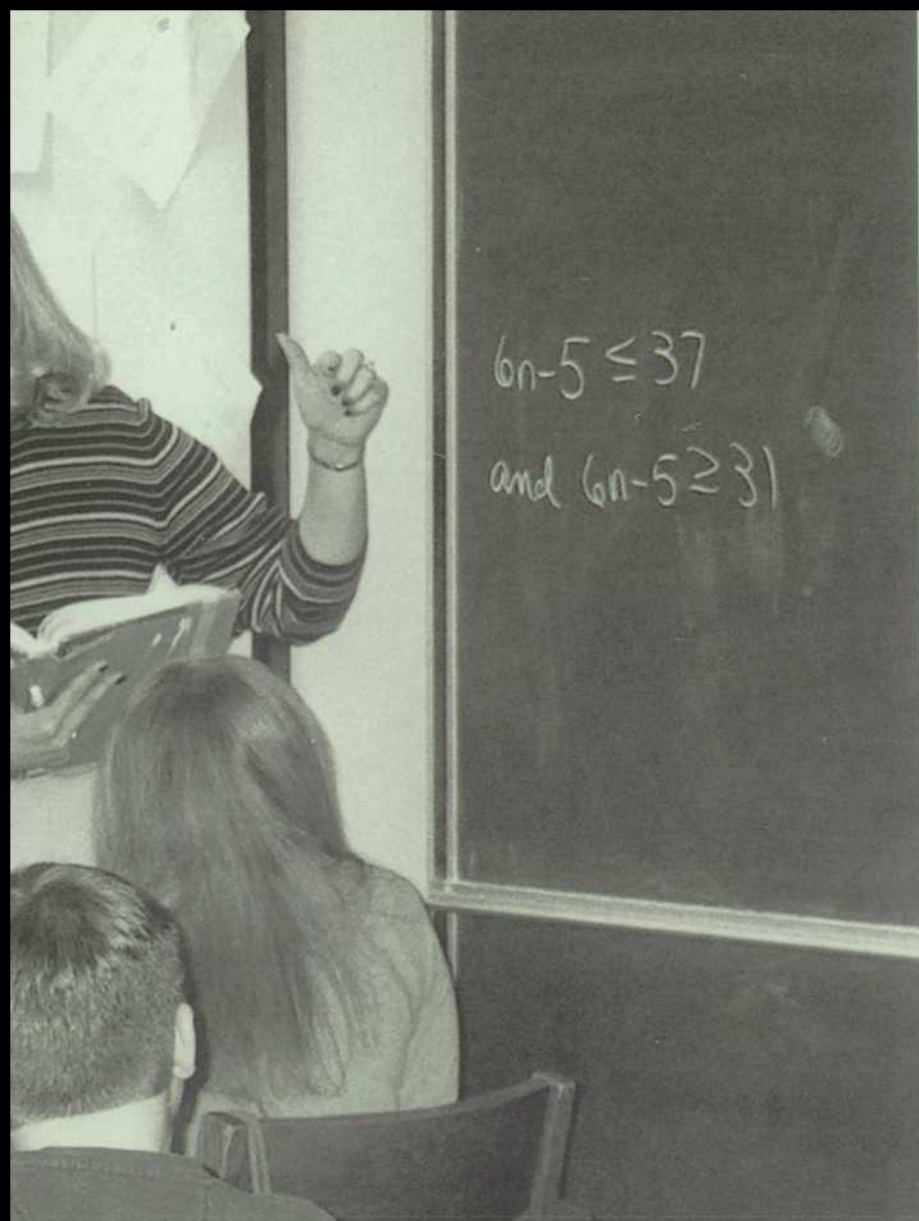

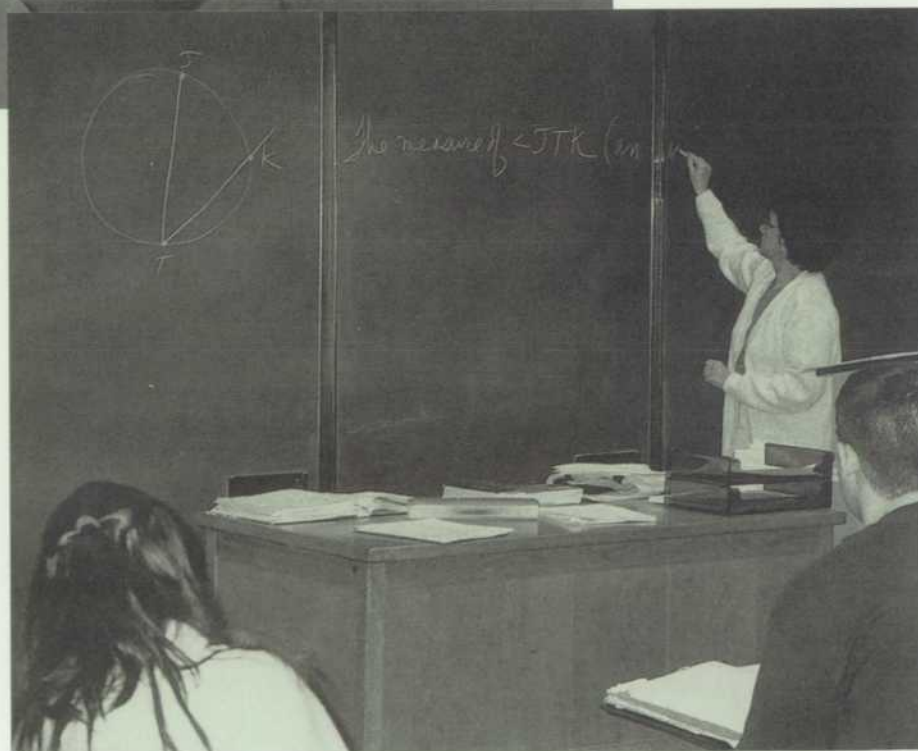

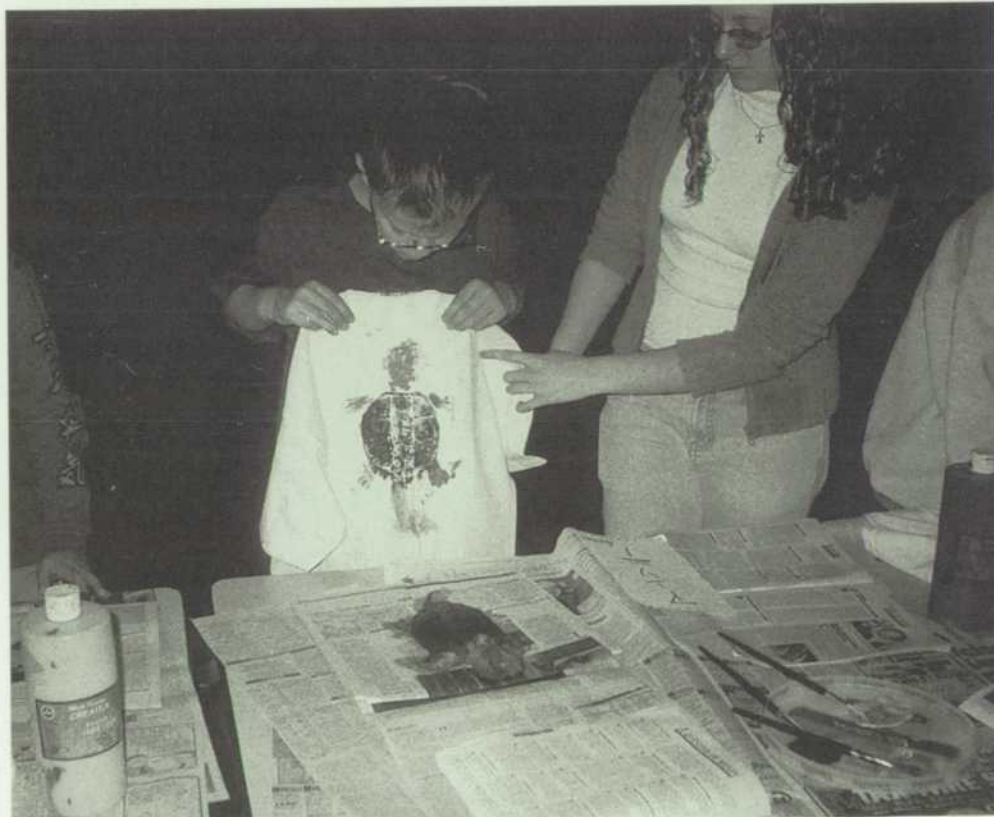

With their new found knowledge, students will be sure to **compute success** in their future endeavors.

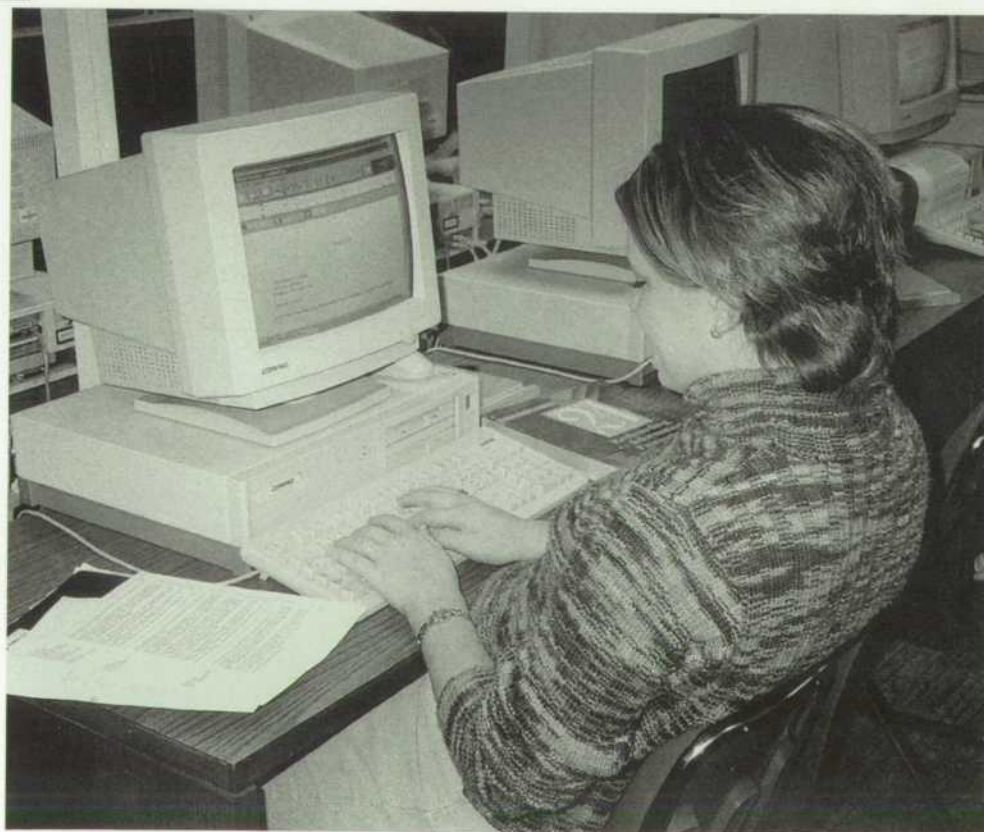

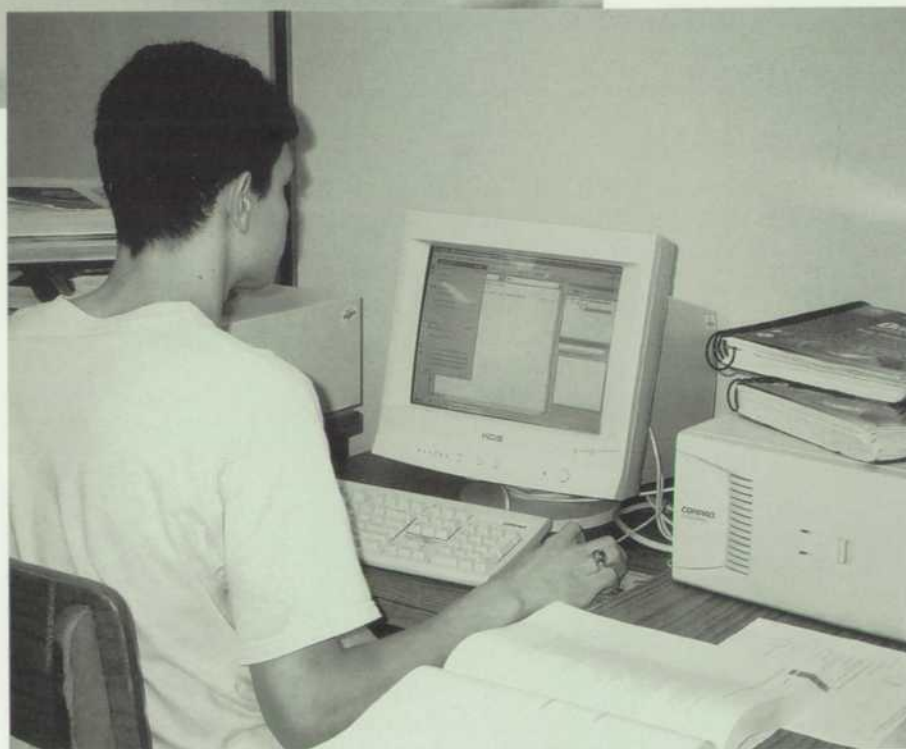

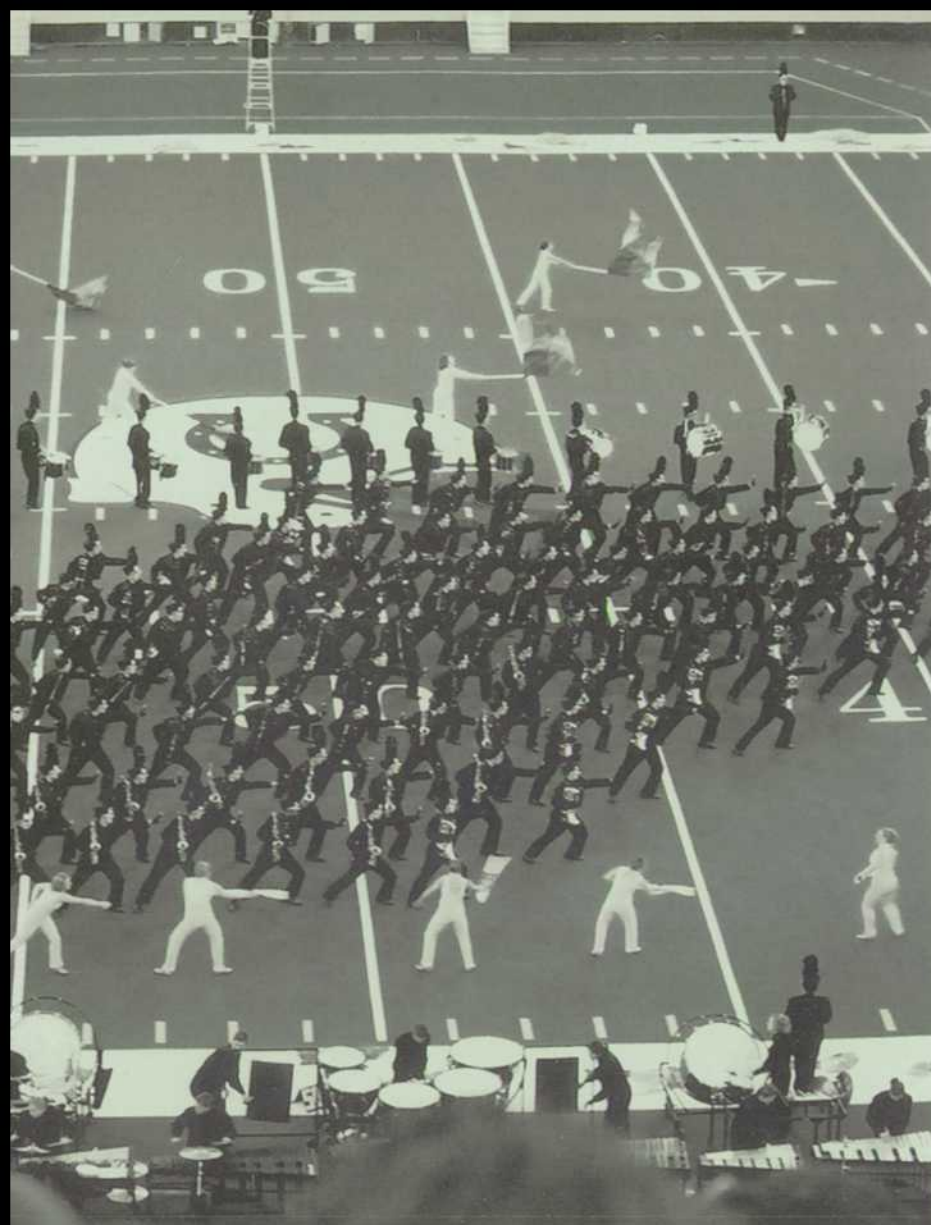

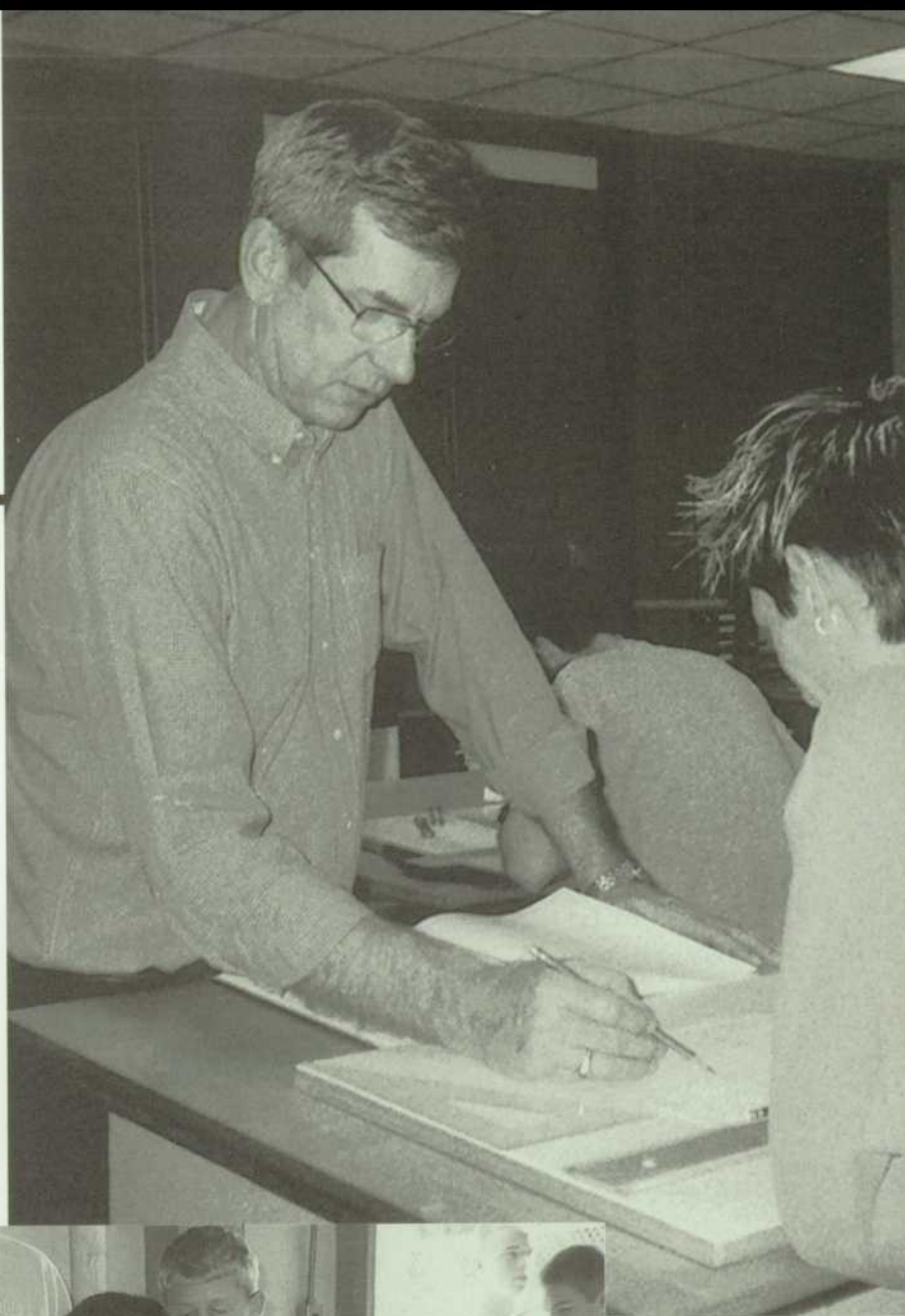

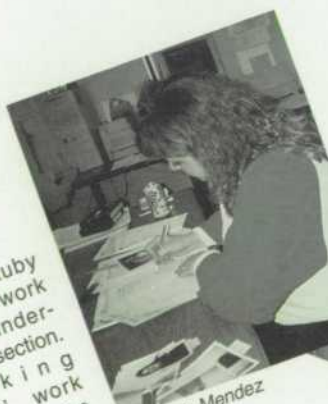

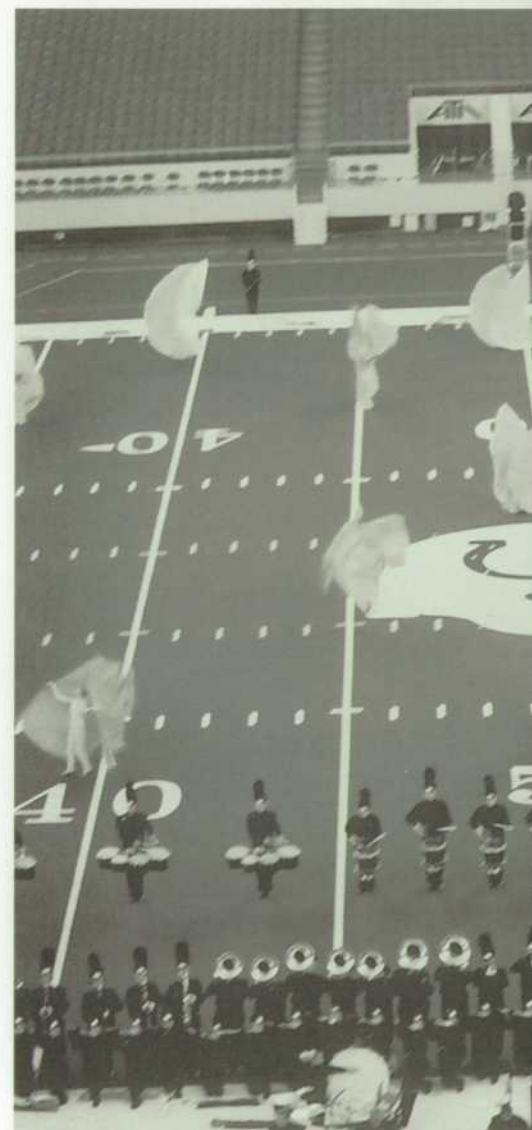

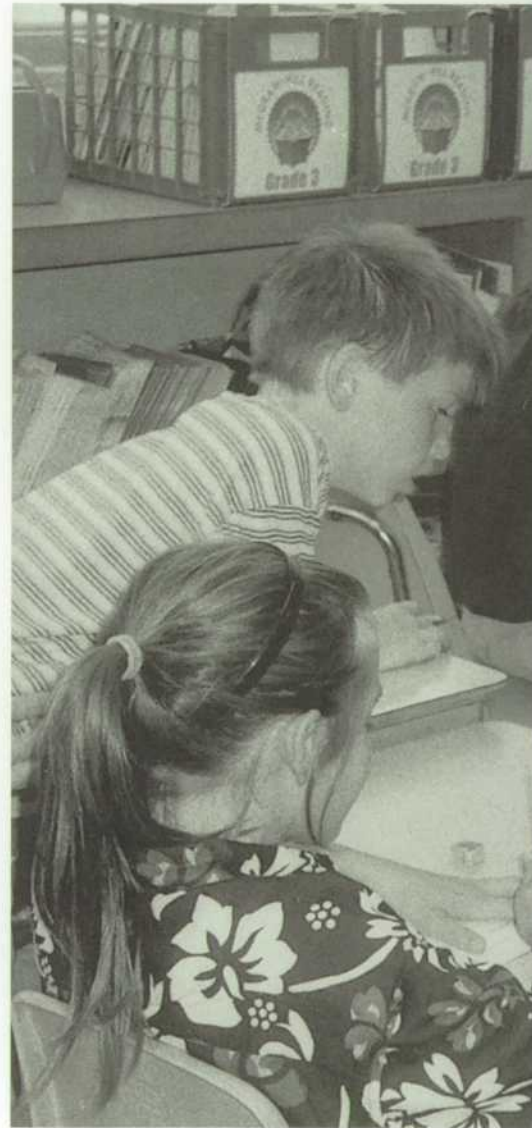

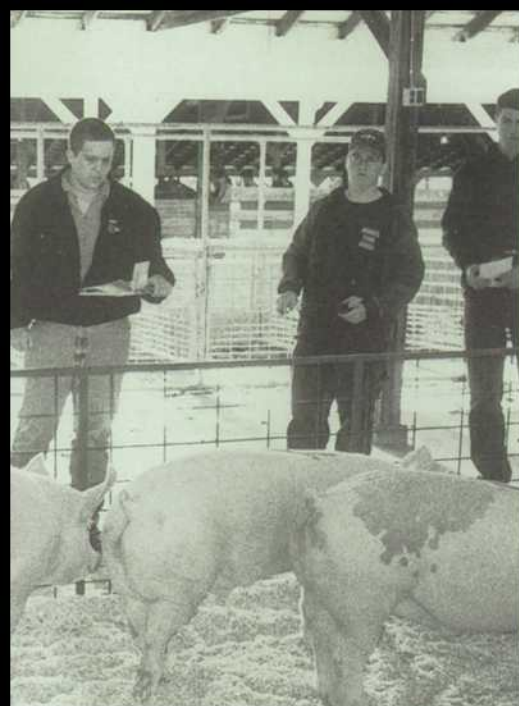

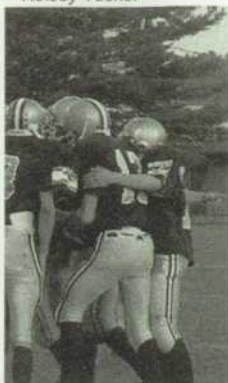

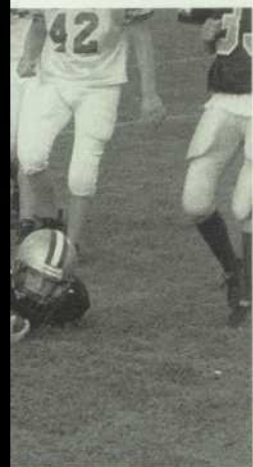

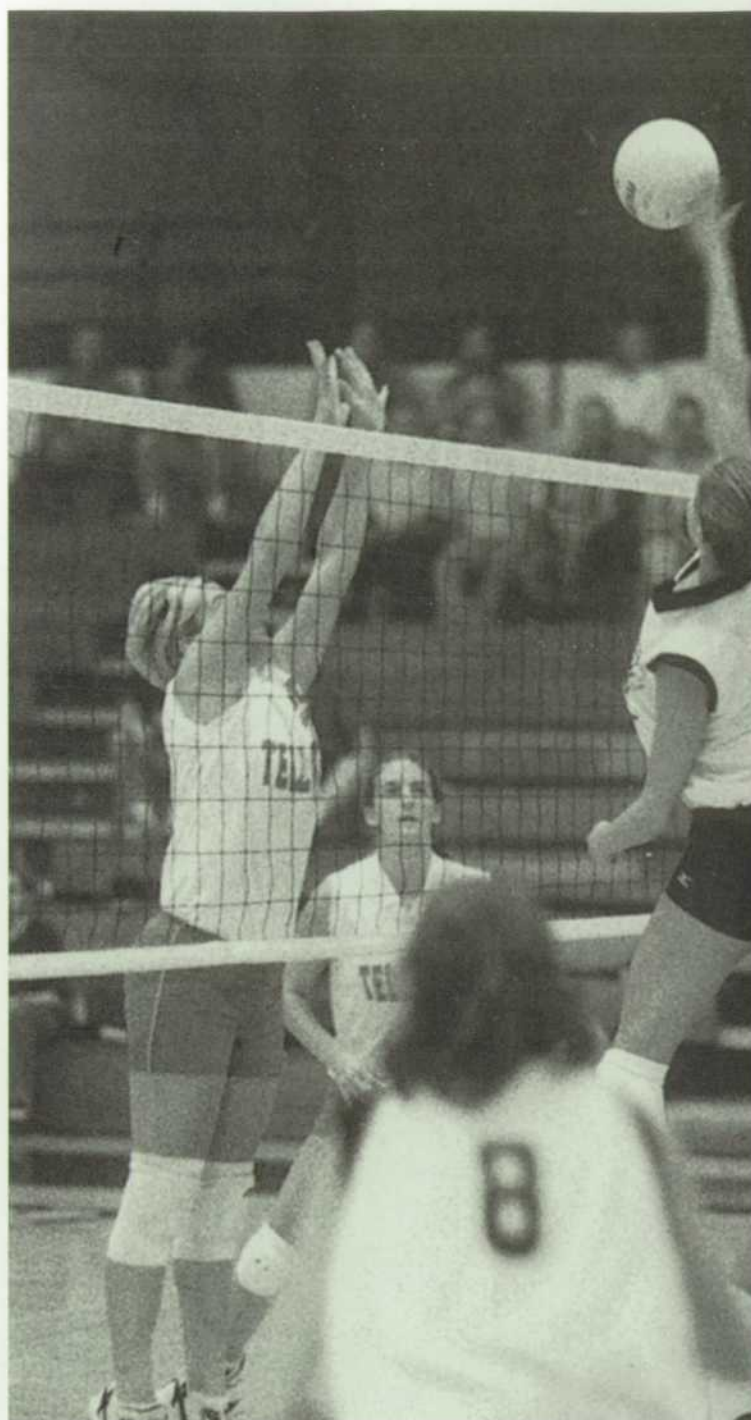

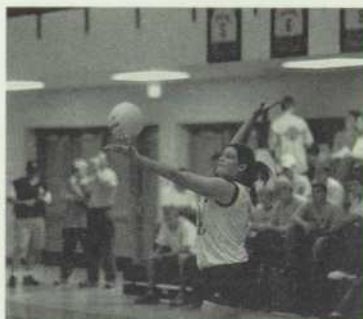

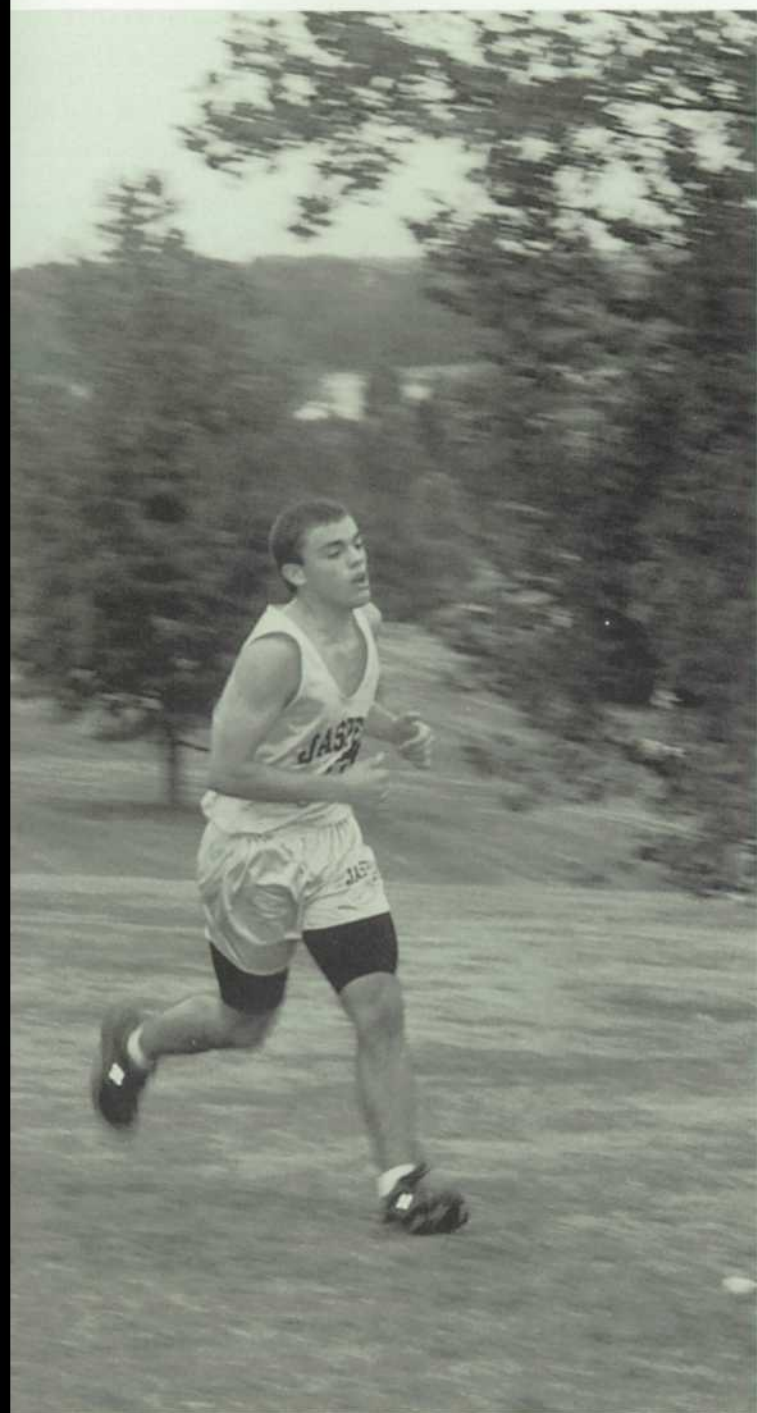

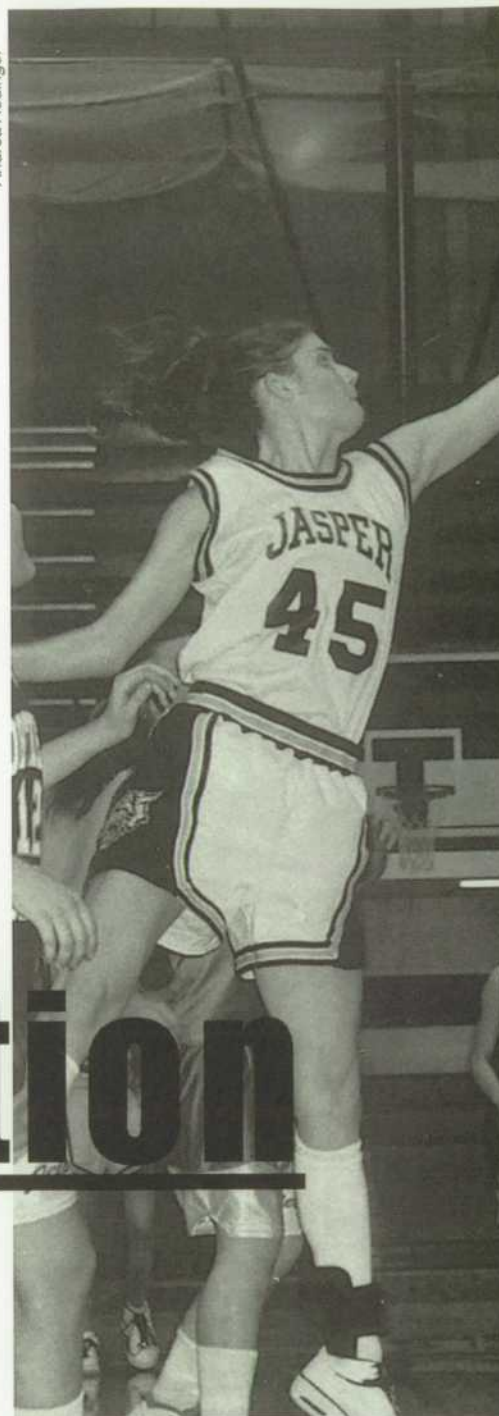

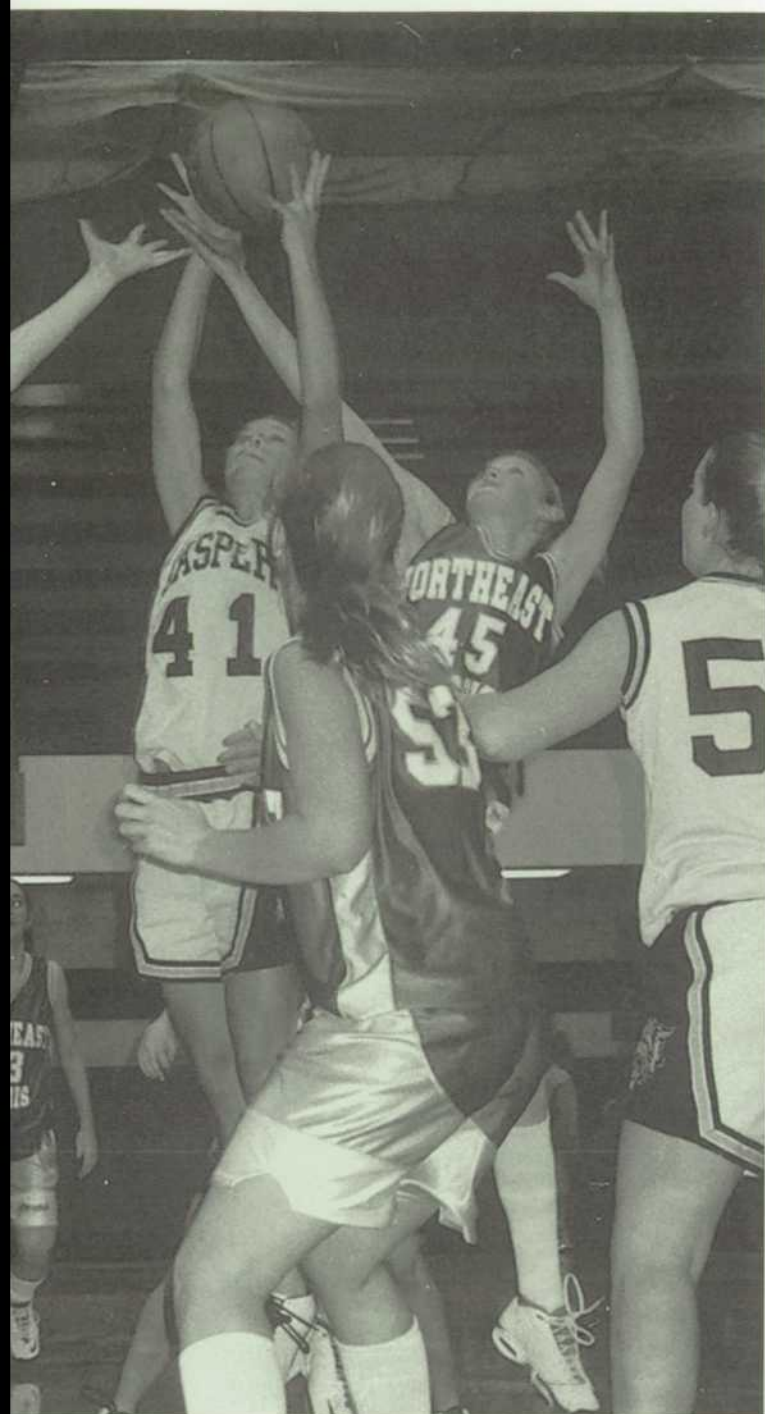
Determination

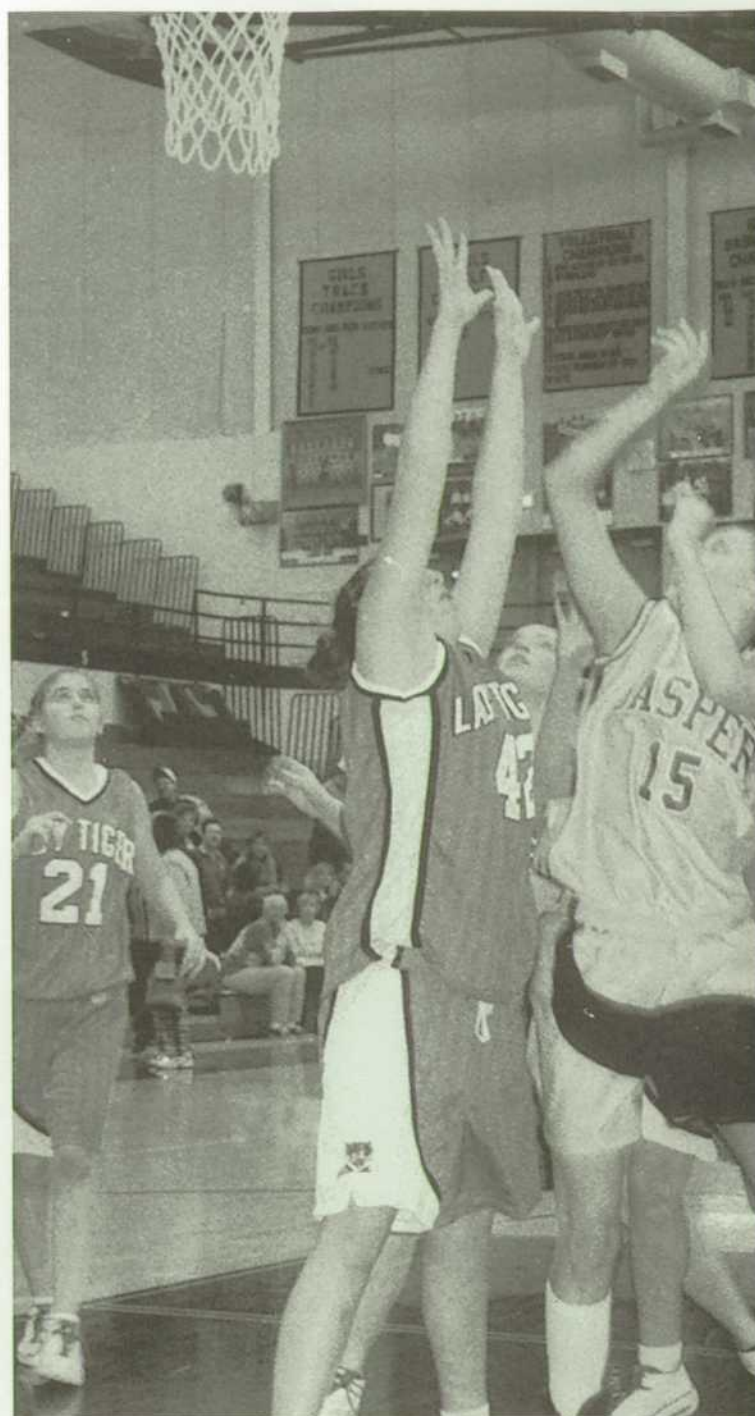

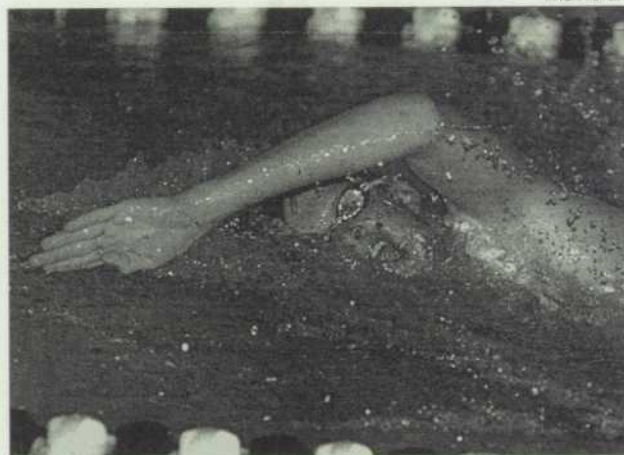

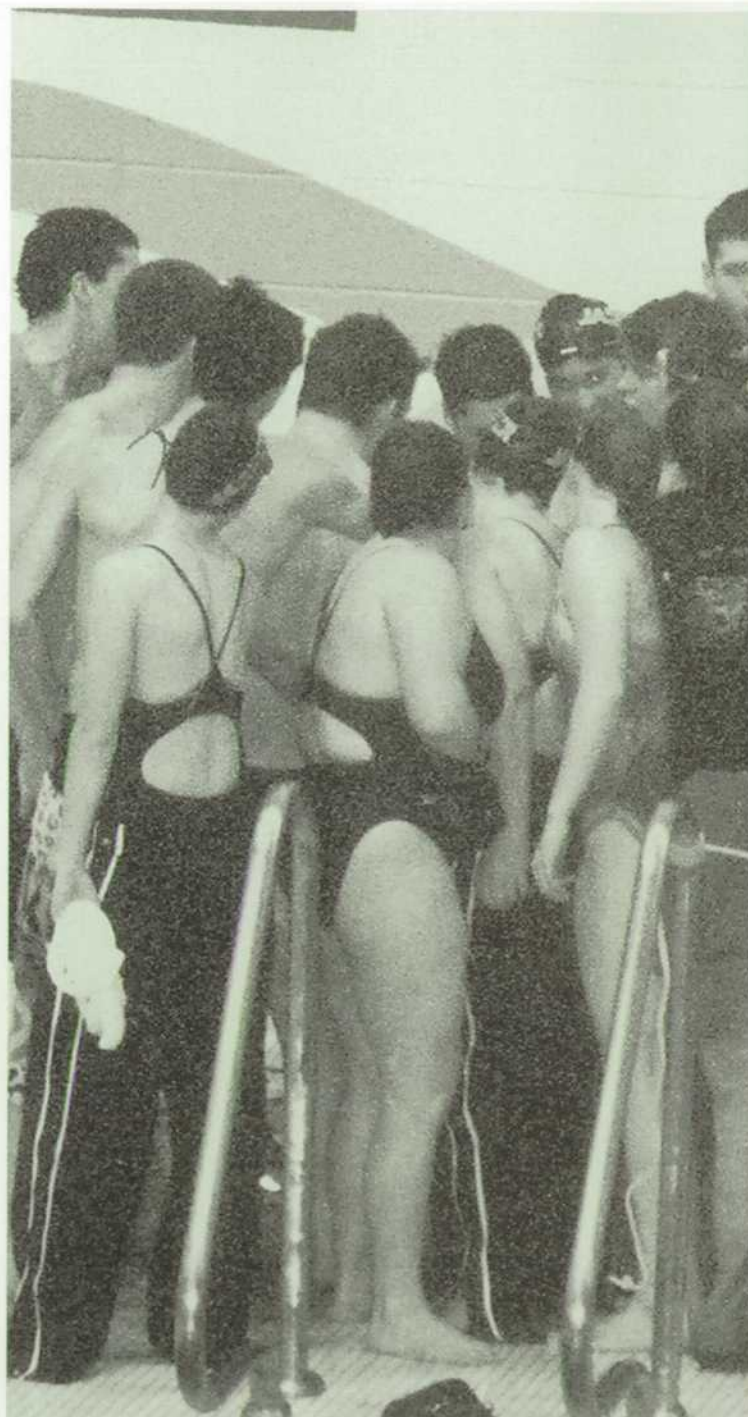

Starting off a good season and finishing with a great season is what the girls' swimming and diving teams did.

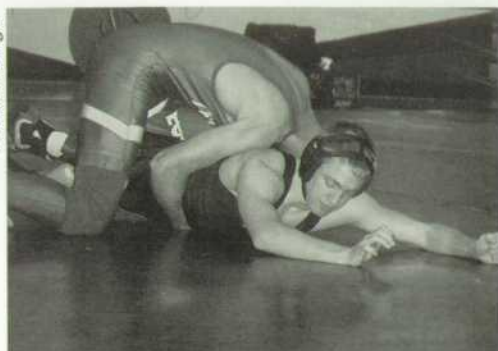

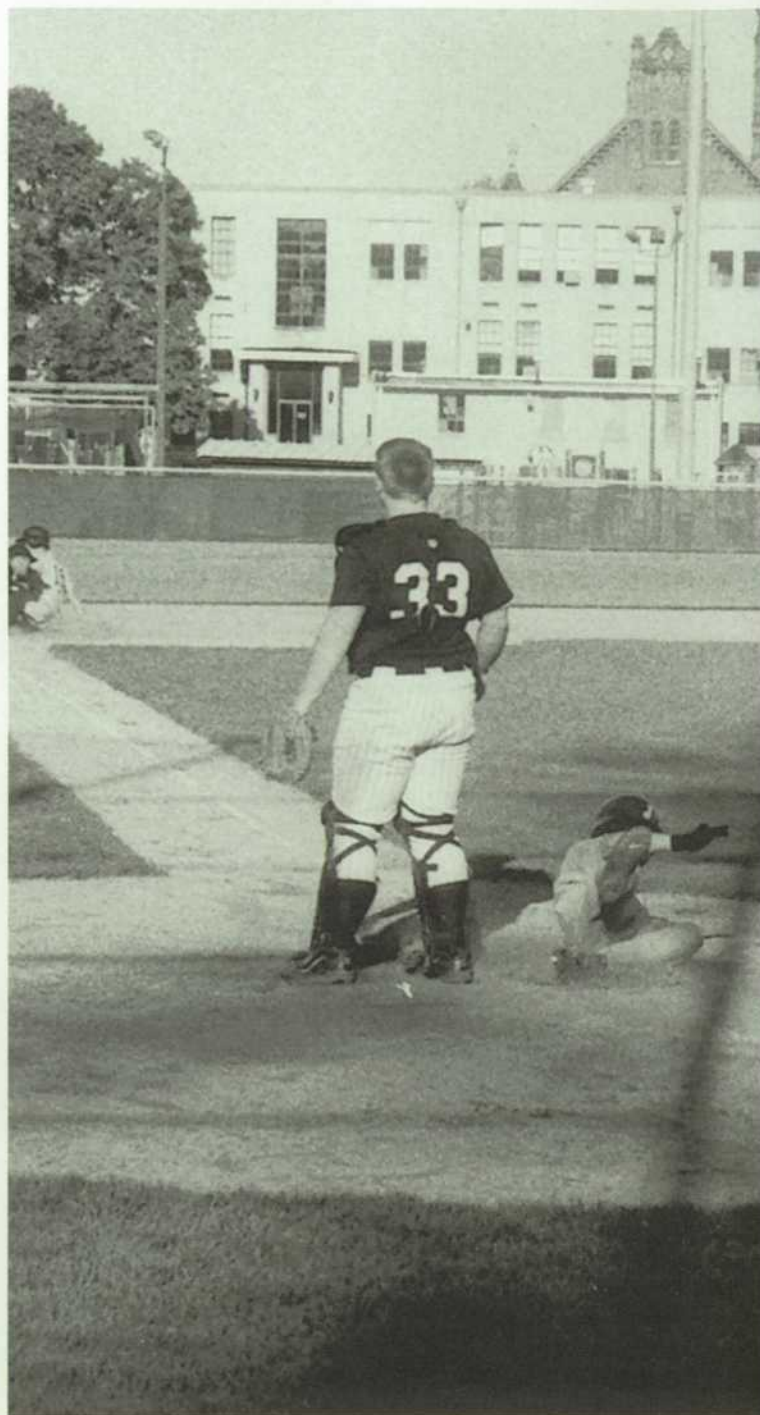

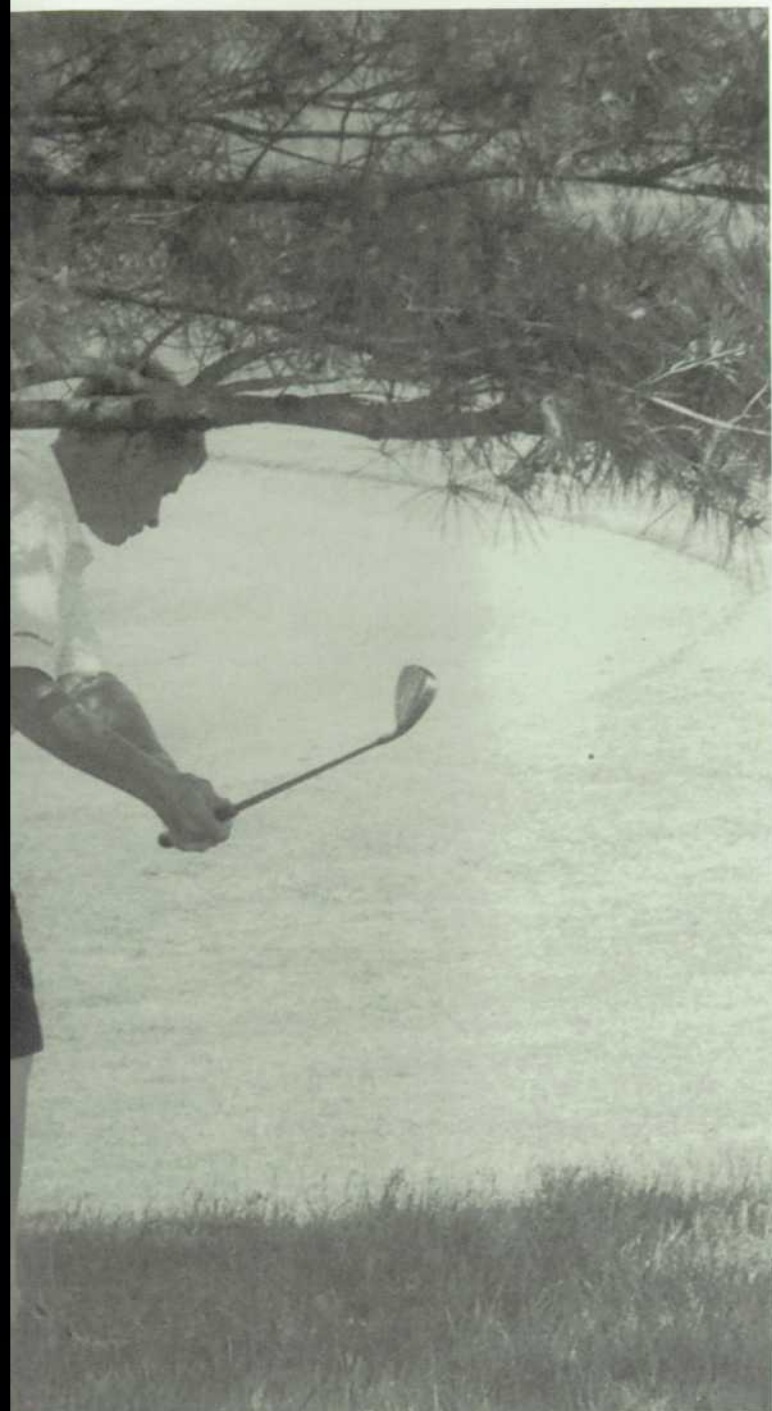

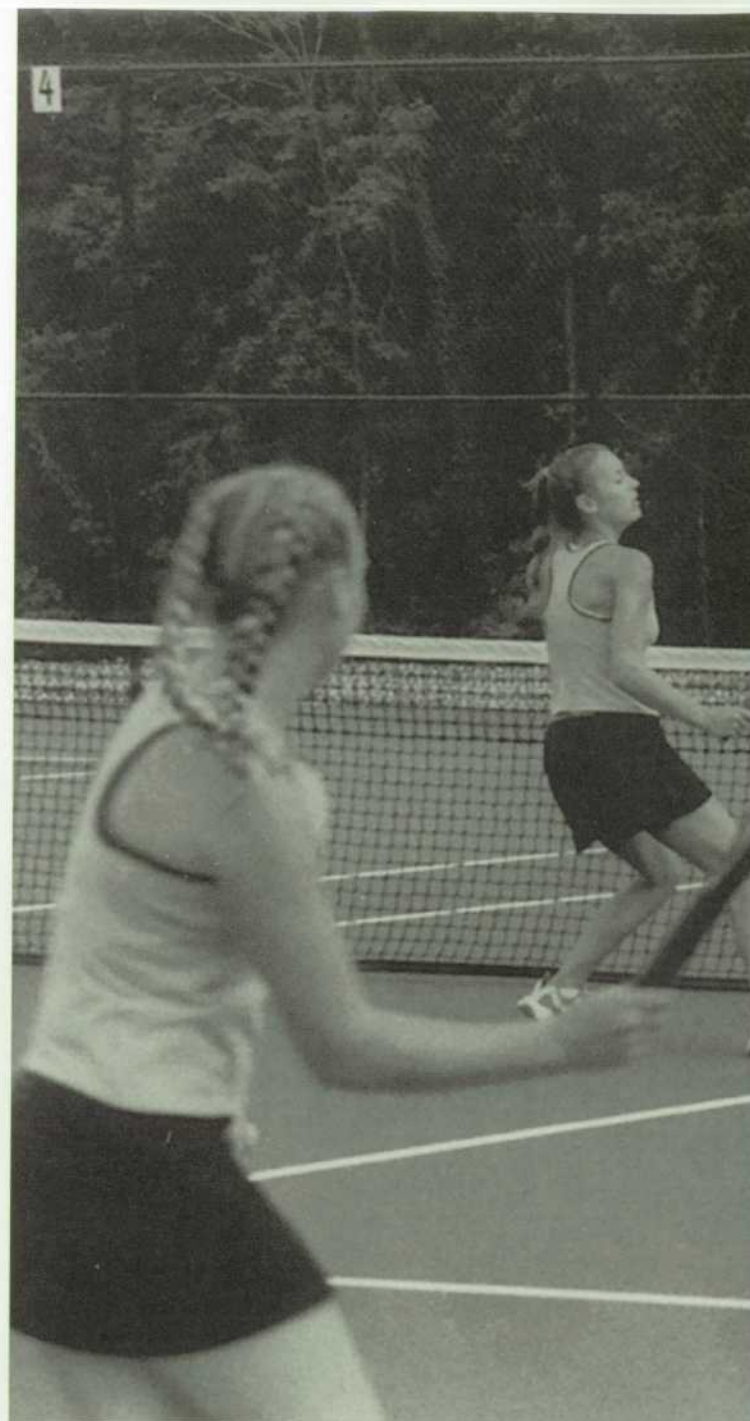

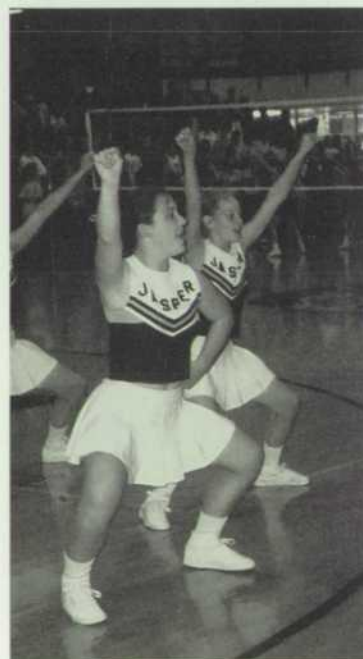
