


As time goes on, the tastes and trends of JHS will continue to morph and change. One can only imagine what new styles will cruise through the cat walks that are school hallways in the years to come.







Owning a car had the potential of making life easier or more difficult for the average student. Some were given a "hand-me-down" car that was passed on from a parent or an


older sibling. Still others took on part-time jobs to be able to make loan and insurance payments on their vehicle.




Prom is the most important event a class participates in, and the Class of 2004 made the night of prom, May 10, unforgettable.


At the beginning of this year, we started from scratch, having to prove we belonged here. We were given many responsibilities, and it seemed impossible to uphold the Jasper name.



#### Gayle Jochum

#### Rich Abell

Rich Abell graduated from Birdseye High School and then attended Oakland City College (now Oakland City University) for his B.S. and ISU for his M.S. degree in math and physics. He taught at Ireland High School for five years and followed that experience with 33 years at Jasper High School. His children, Greg, Gina, and Natalie, all graduated from JHS.

Many factors influenced him to become a teacher. He liked math and enjoyed solving problems and did not want to spend his life toiling in a factory or working on construction. Since Oakland City College, basically a teacher preparatory school, was relatively near his home, it was easy for him to commute.

What Mr. Abell likes best about teaching is interacting with students. He feels the JHS student body has always been outstanding, and "the majority of students are eager to do well and are willing to work at it." He adds, "I find a lot of satisfaction in helping them whenever I can."




To learn these skills students watched videos, performed skits, listened to CDs and














## Get Set for Life



A new addition to the corporation, Law Enforcement,































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
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
#### Basketball Fever




#### Out With the Old




#### Acting in Style
