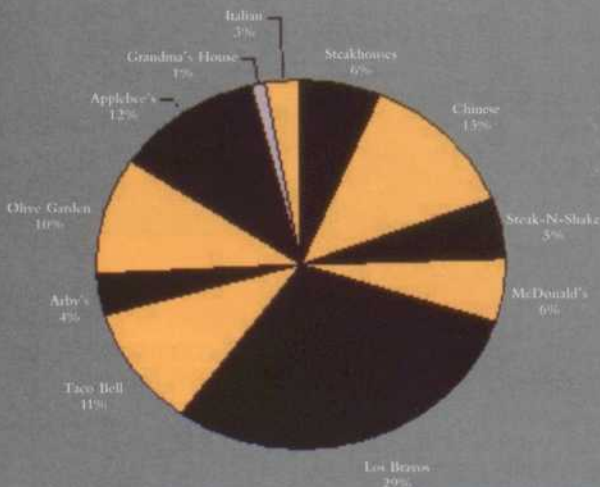

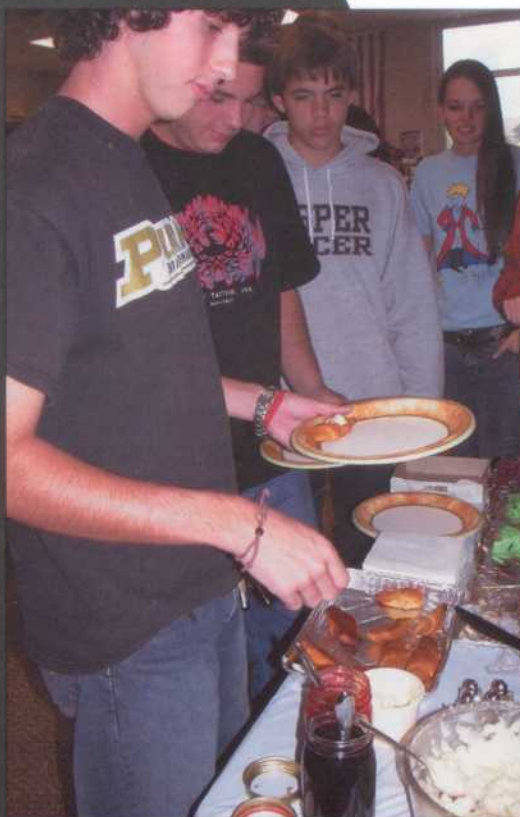

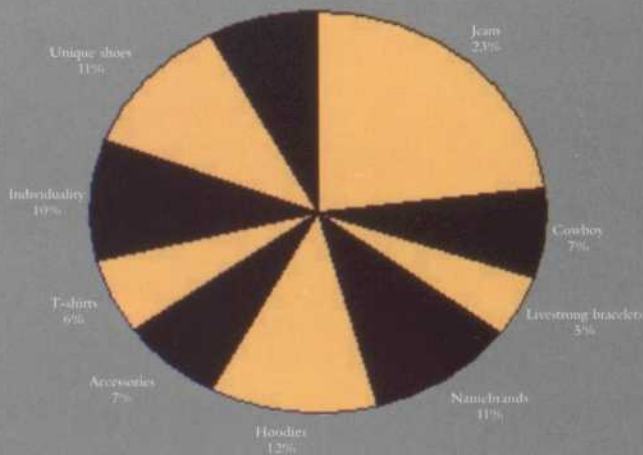

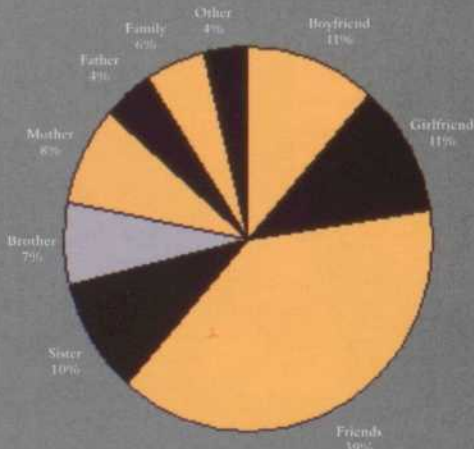

DRIVING... NEVER *speed*

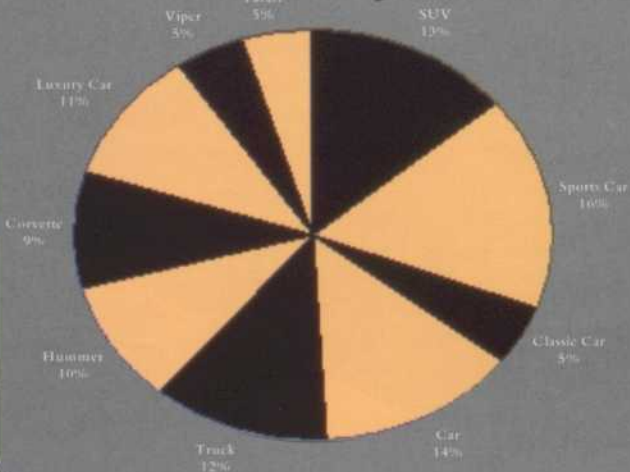

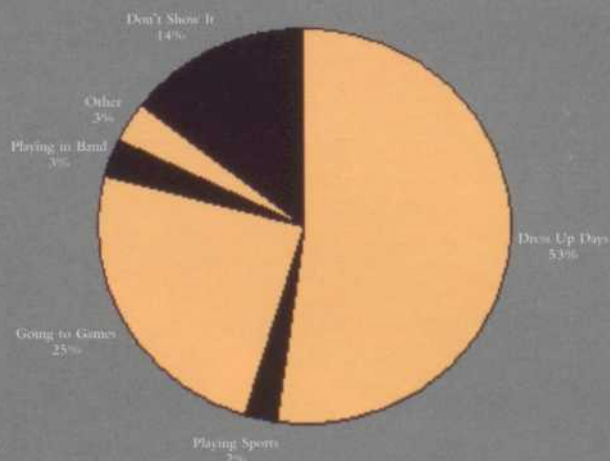

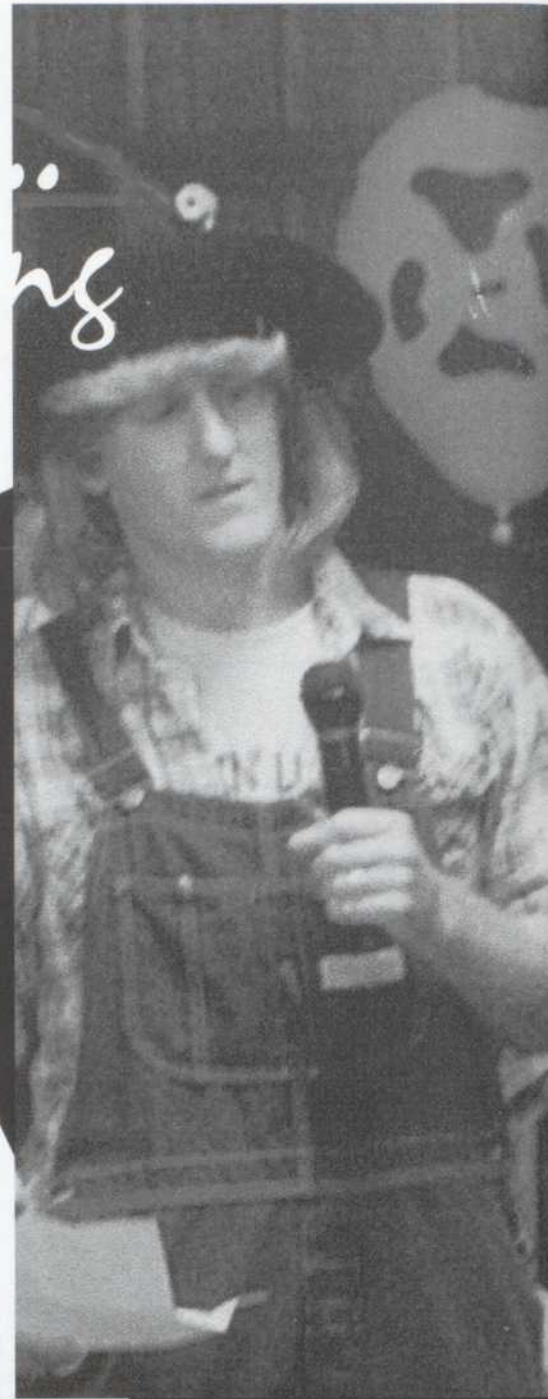
YOUTH GROUPS. NEVER boring

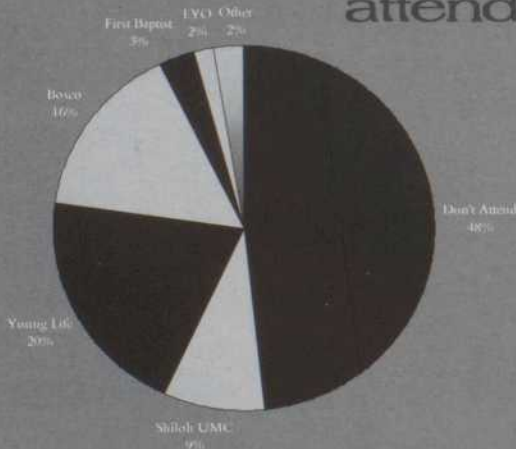

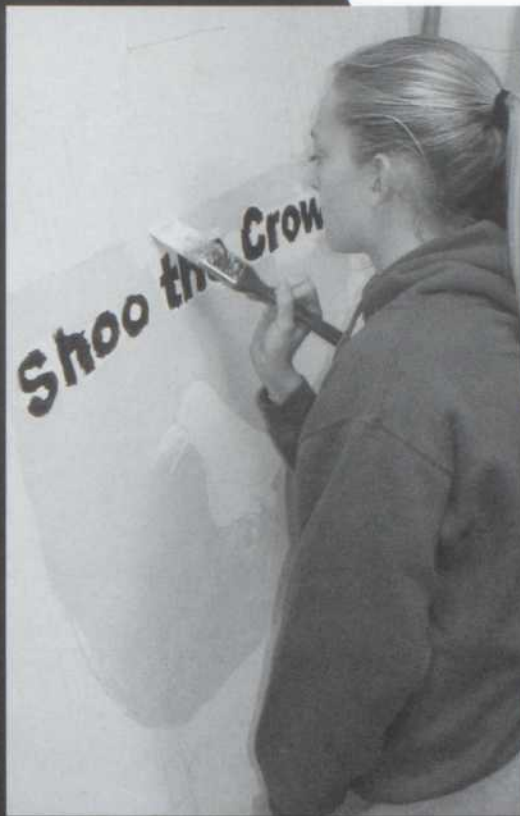

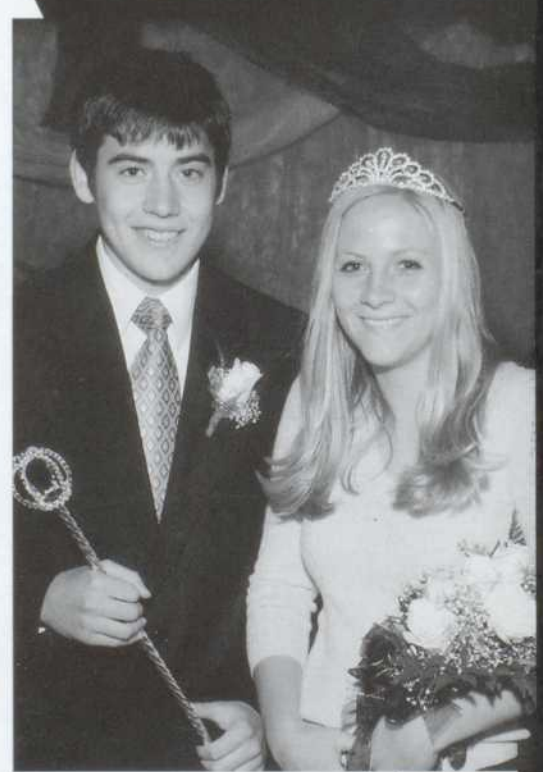
ROYALTY... NEVER *falters*

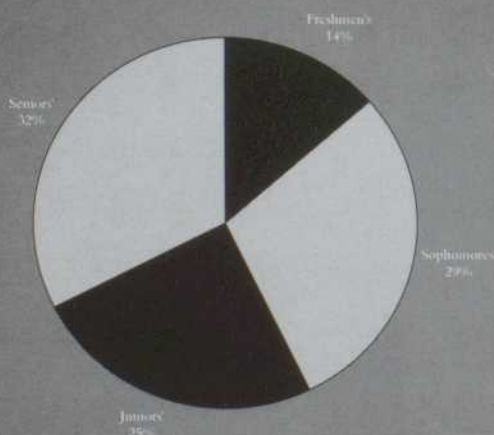

Violinist Janice Martin entertains the audience with her beautiful music. Not only did Ms. Martin play violin, she also sang and played piano.

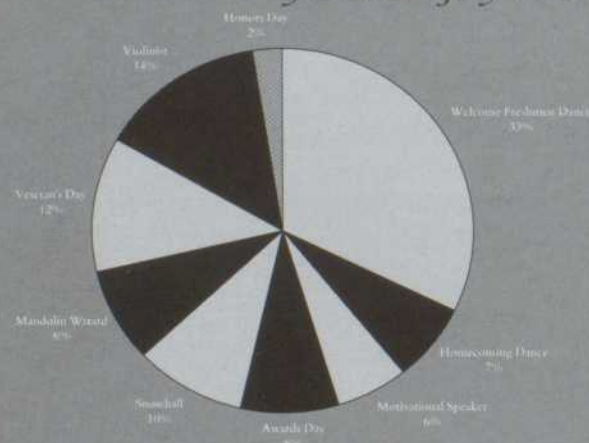

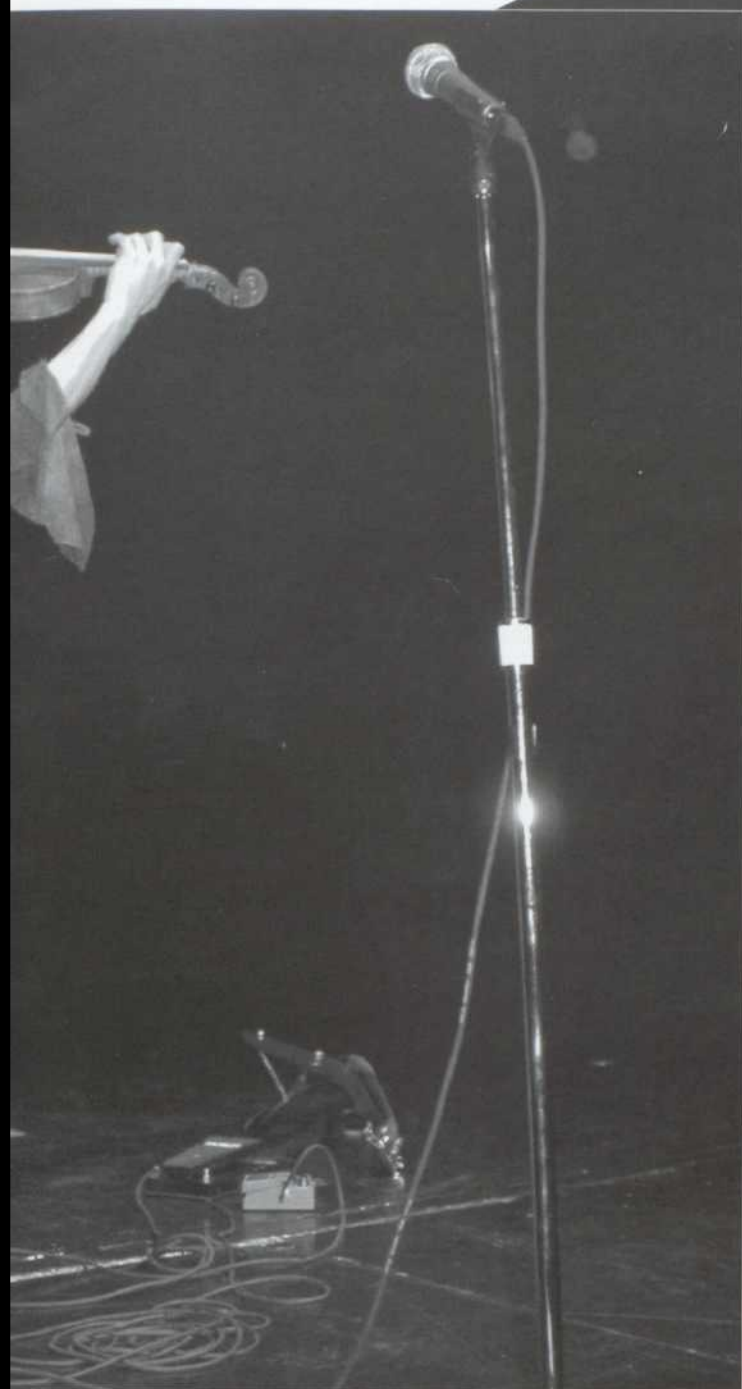

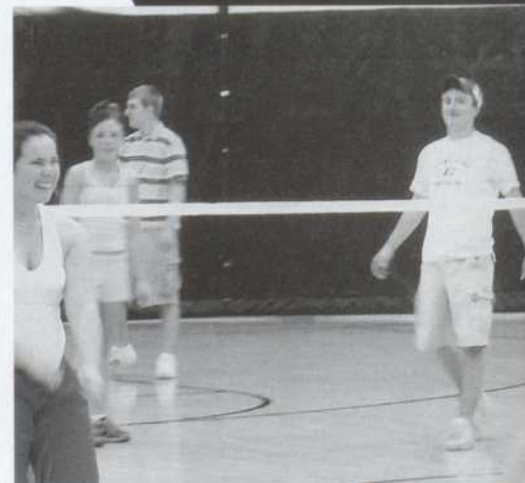
POST PROM... NEVER gets old

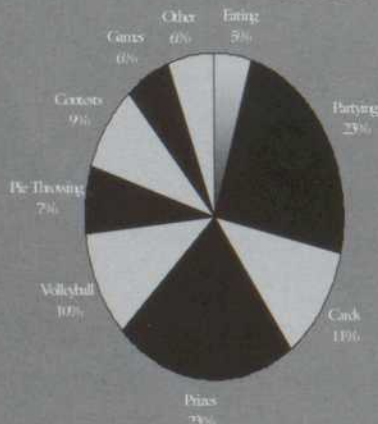

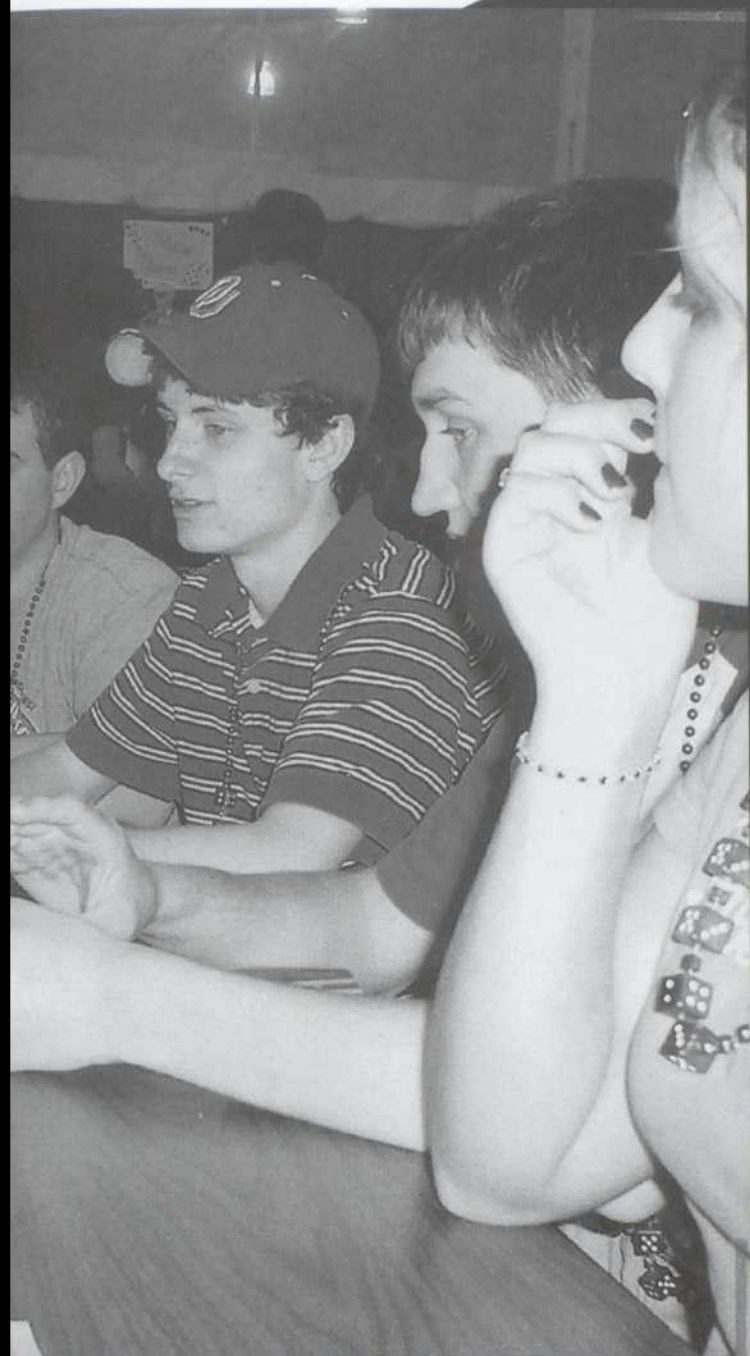

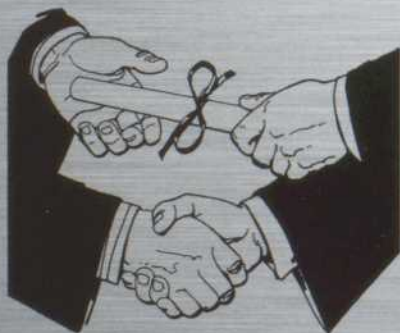

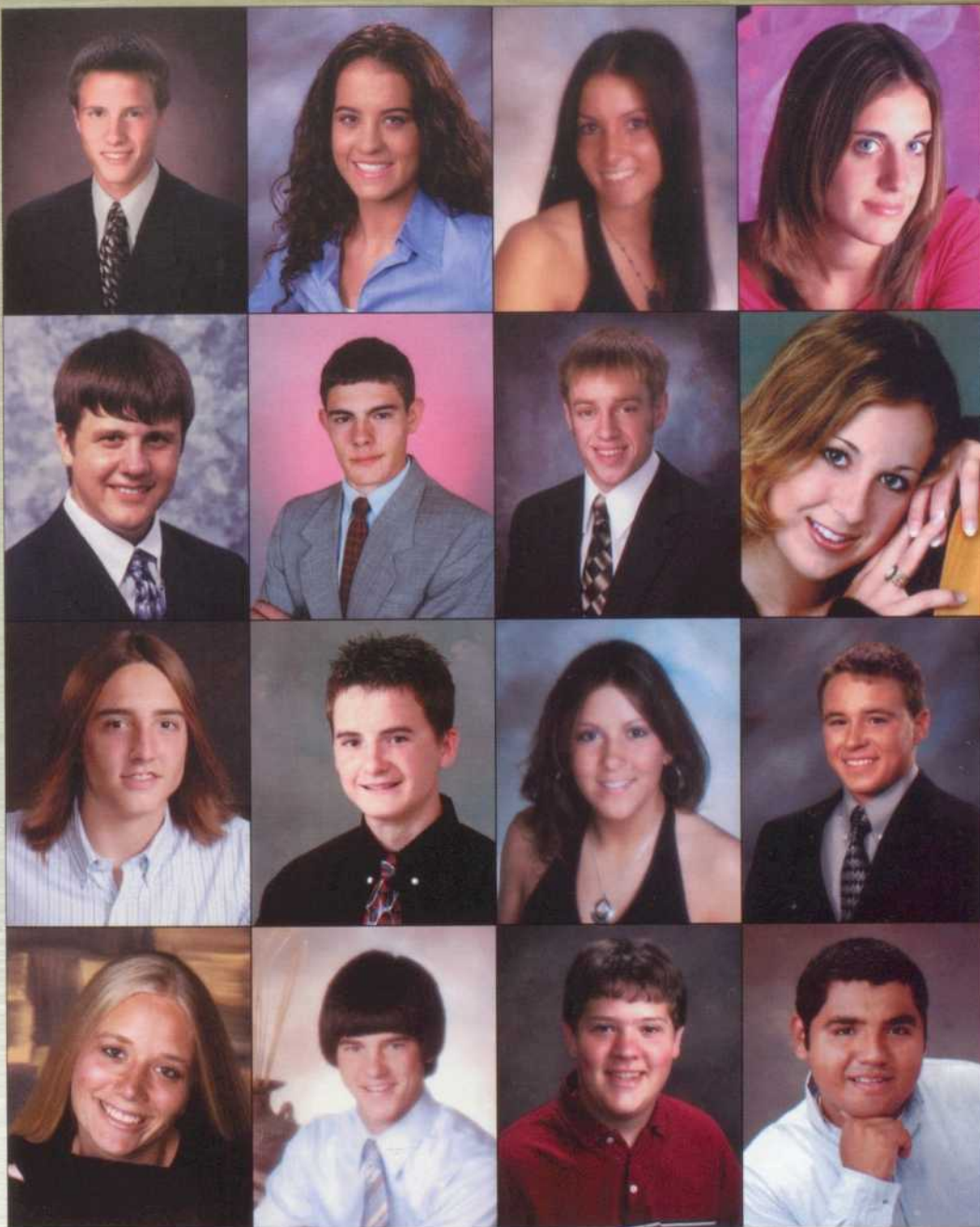

After 39 years of service at Jasper High School, Mr. Ralph Mauder decides to retire. He taught in the technology department.



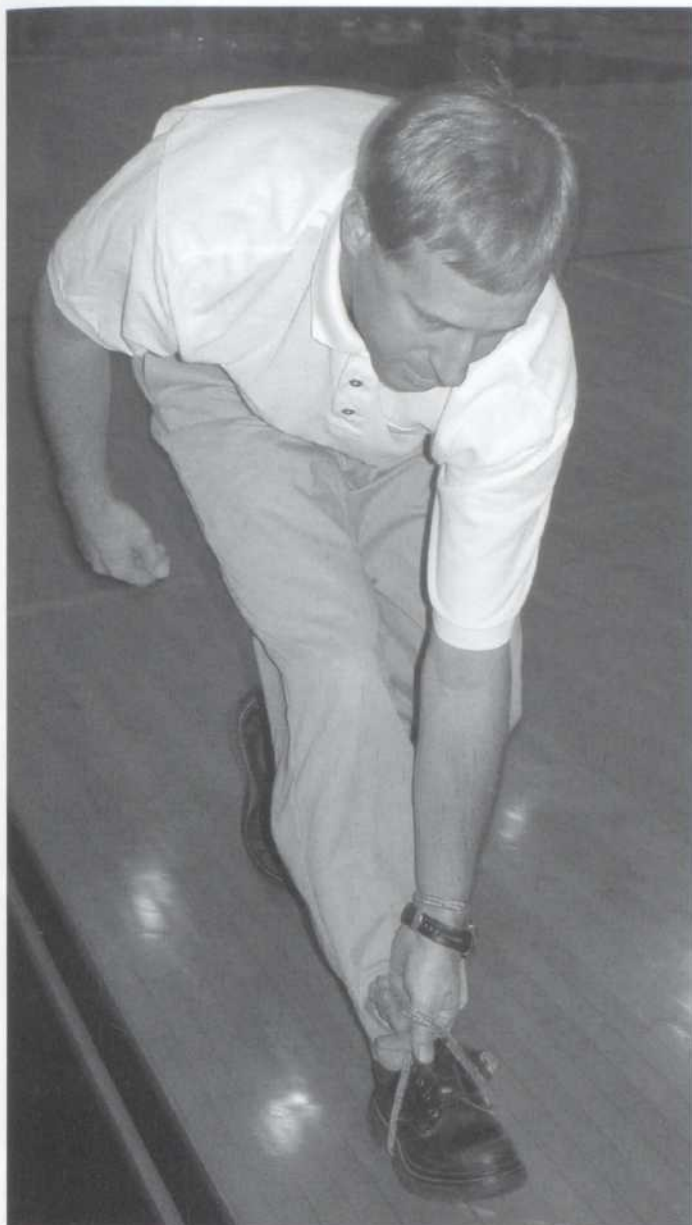
After graduating from Loogootee High School, Mr. Mauder attended Indiana State University where he earned BS and MS degrees. He then began his career at JHS in 1966.

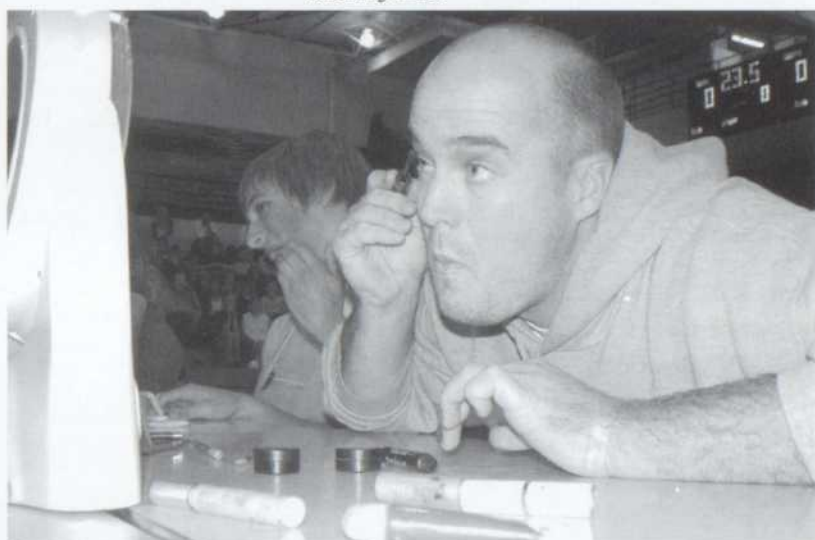

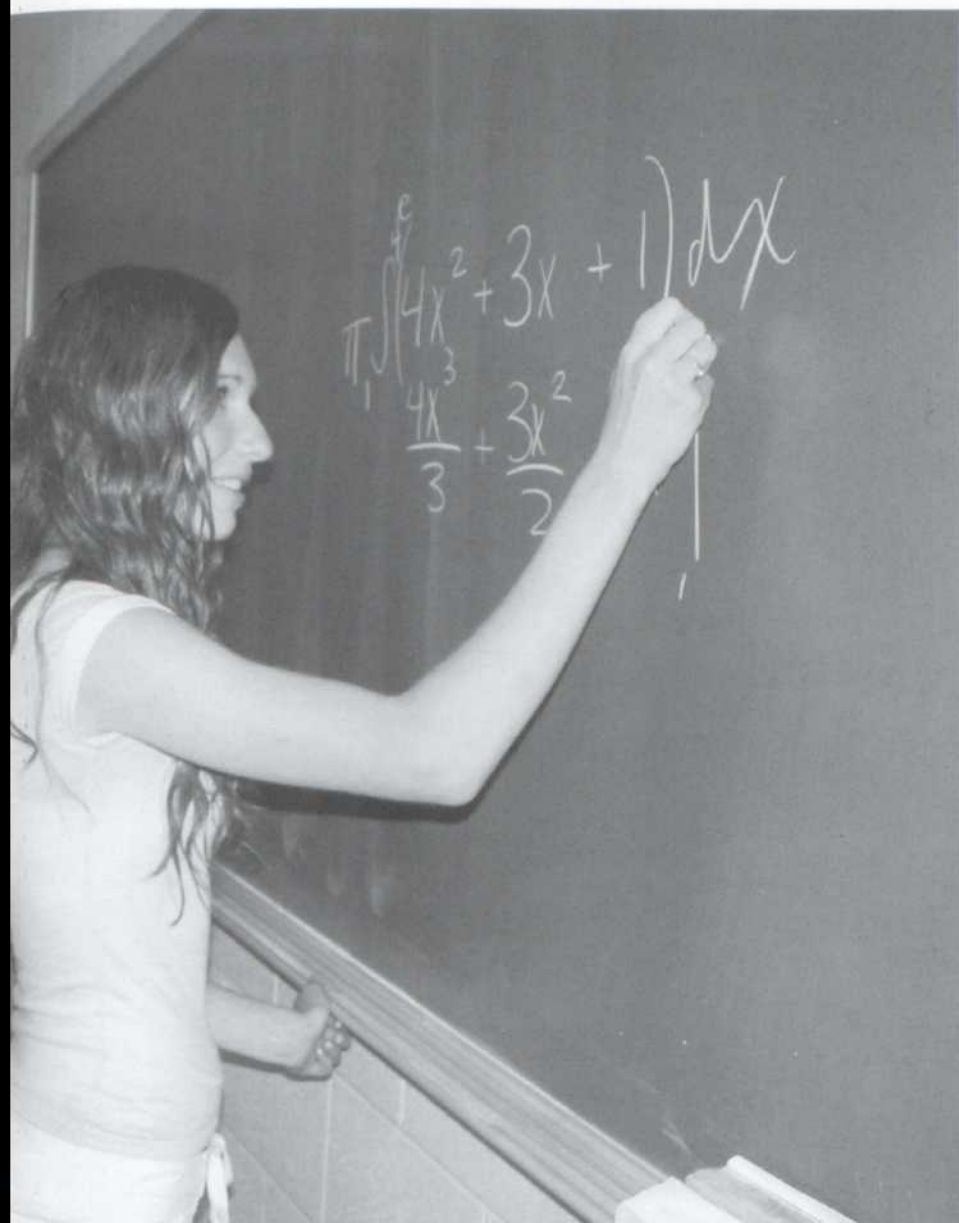

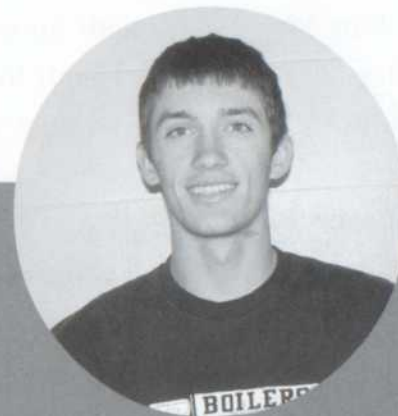

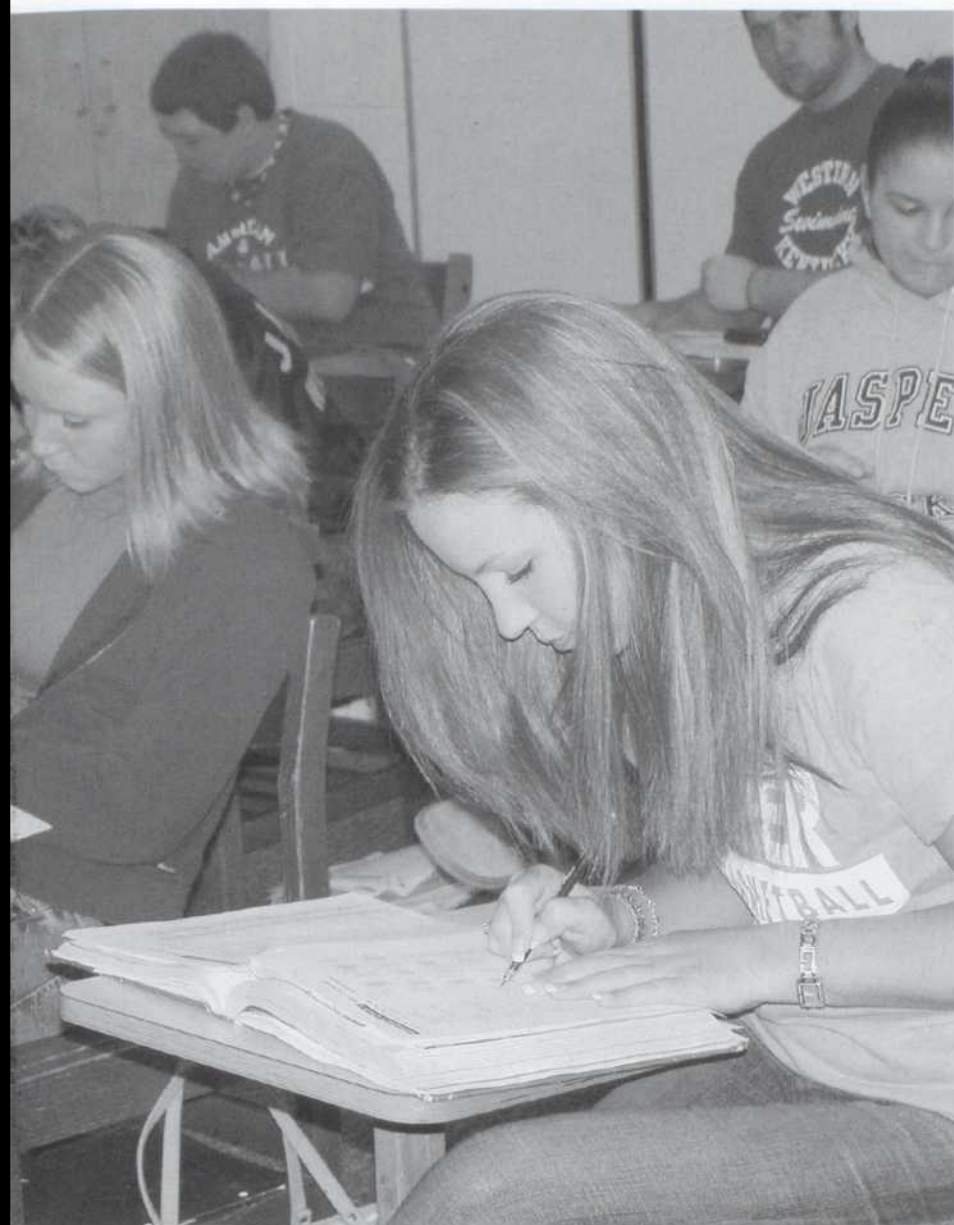

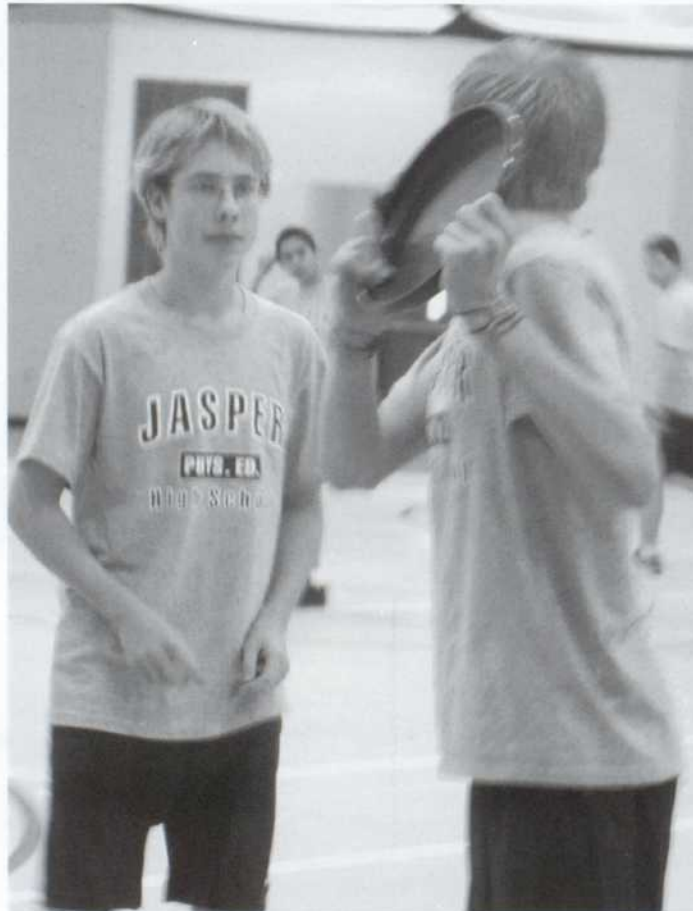
No matter which class they chose, students had many opportunities to improve their fitness levels. It is now up to them to continue being active and maintain a strong, healthy lifestyle.

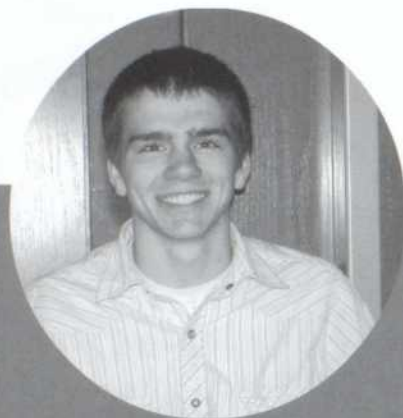

Nathan Humbert (11) works diligently on his marble sorting machine. Students used computers to program the machines.

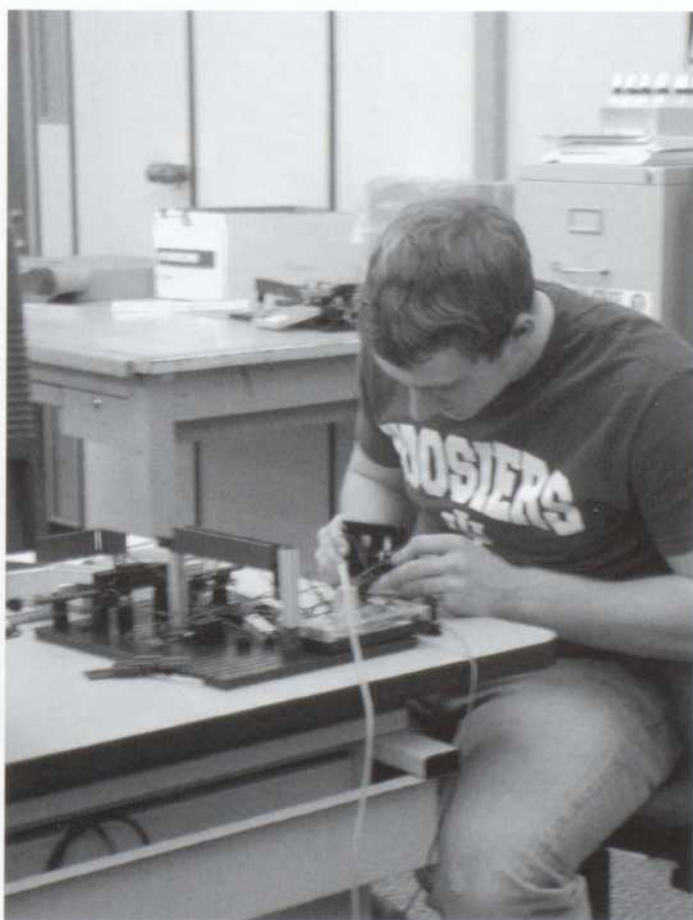

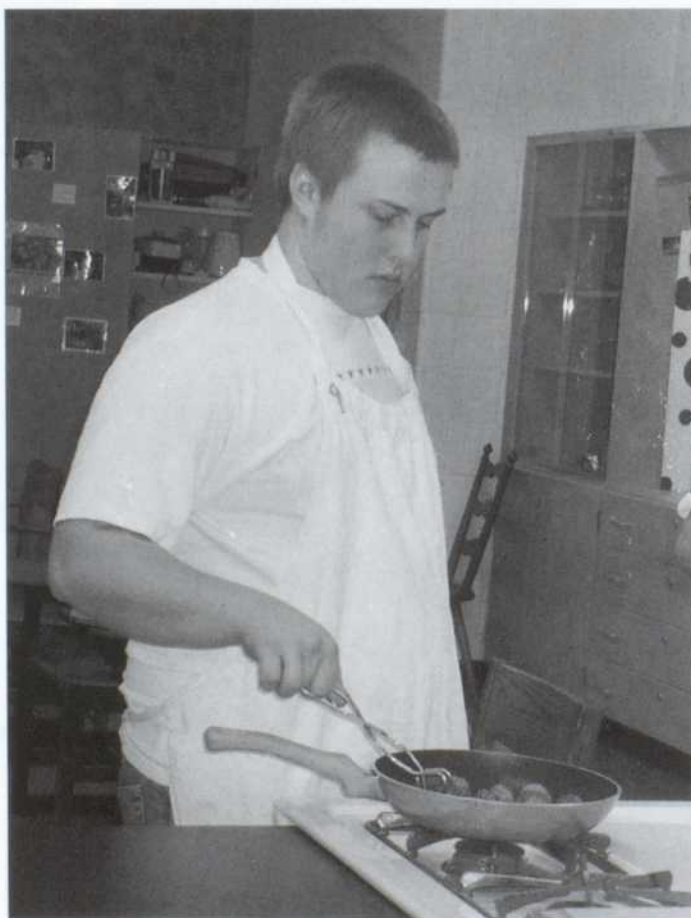

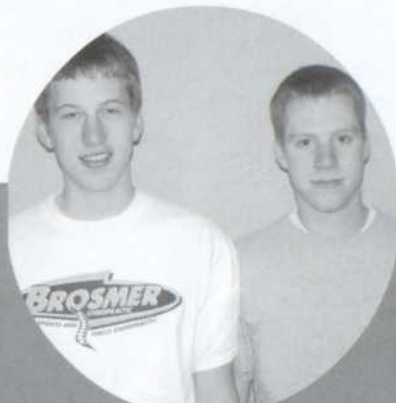

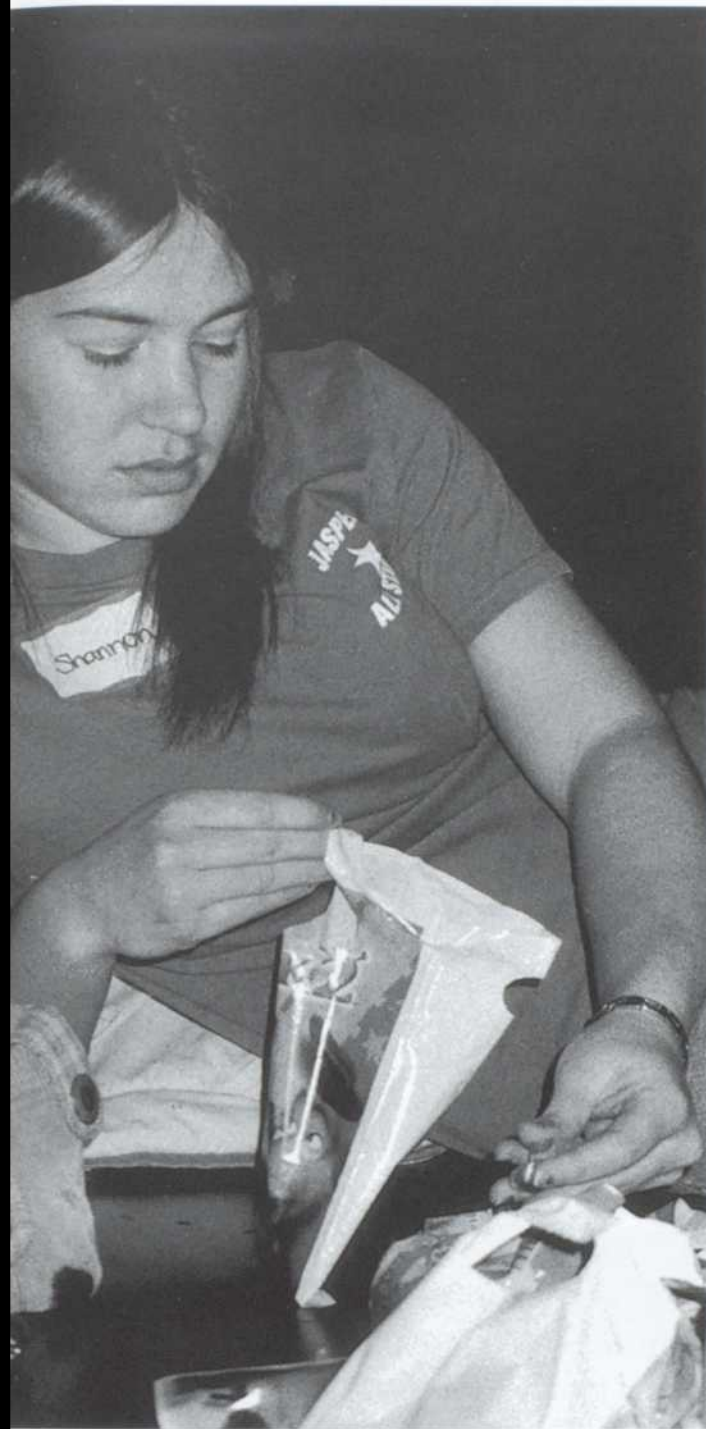

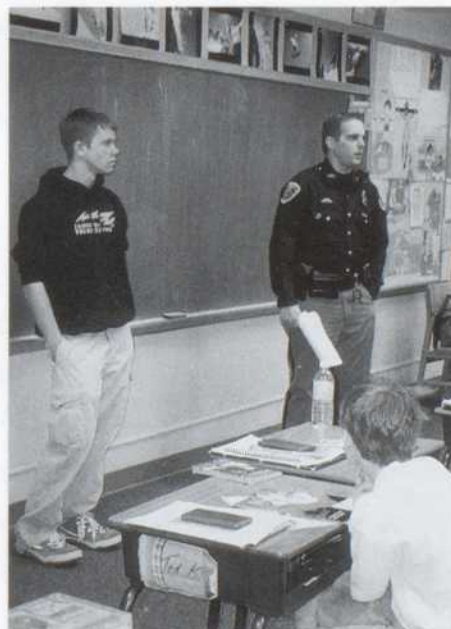

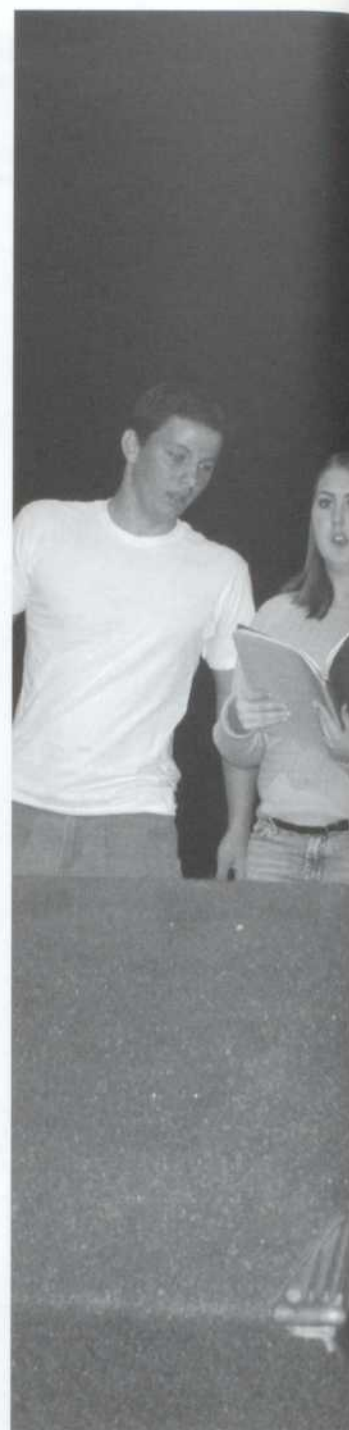

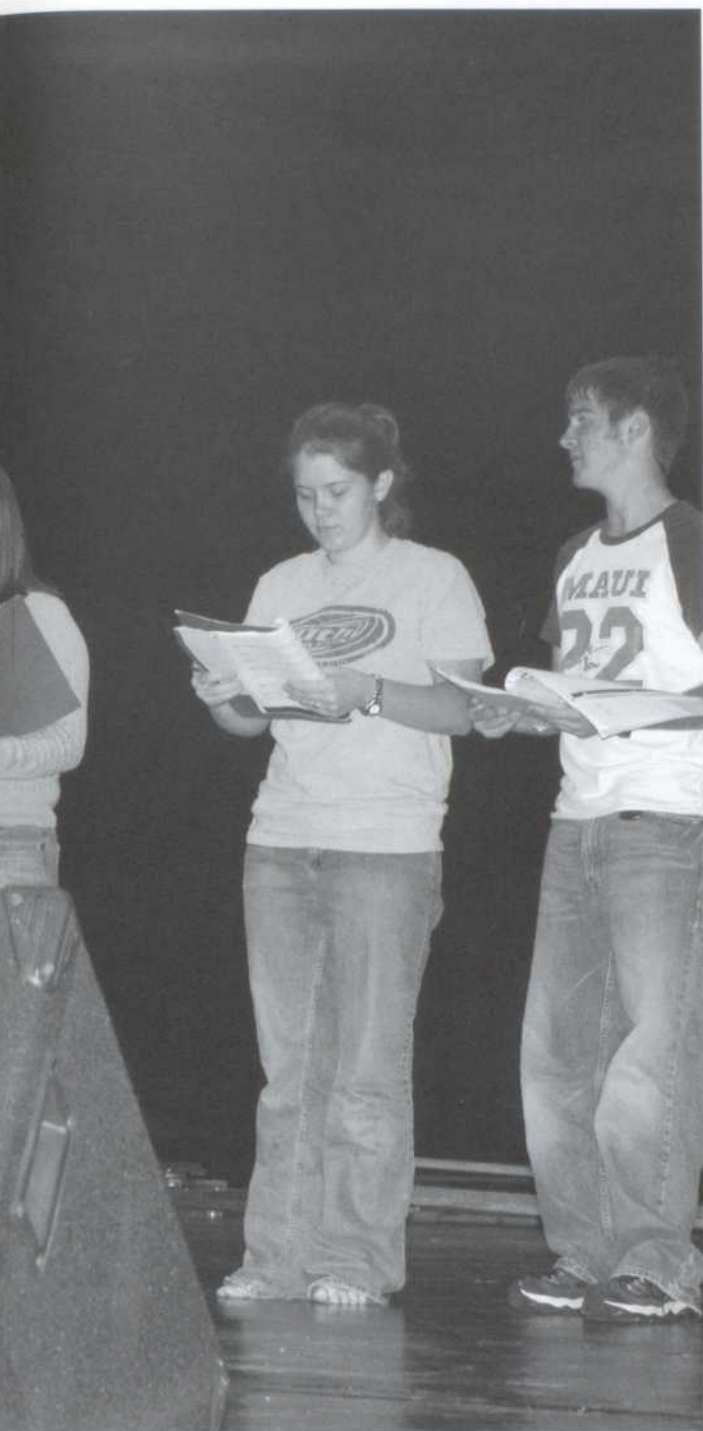

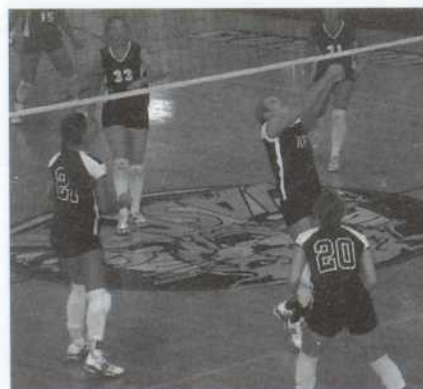

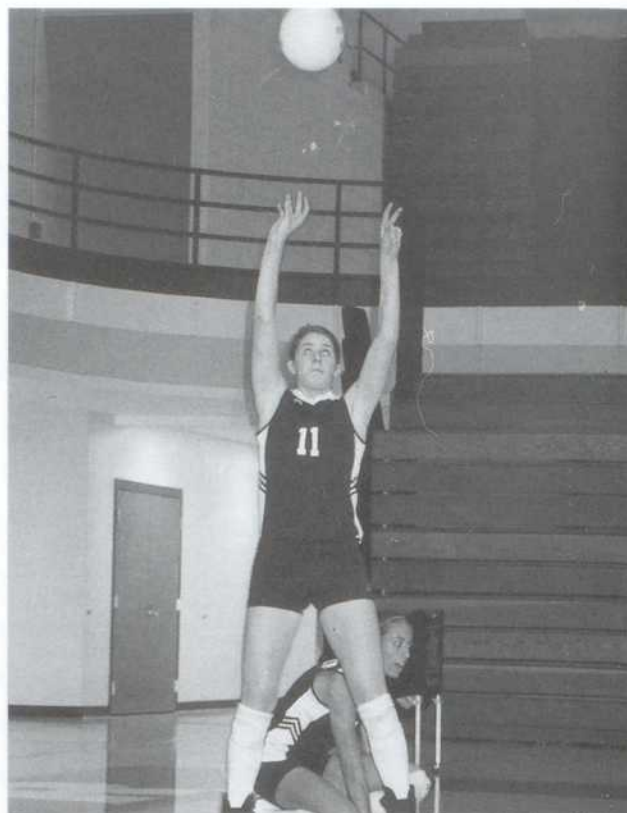

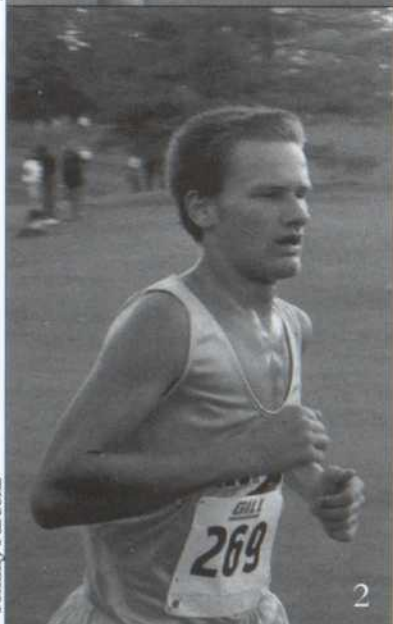

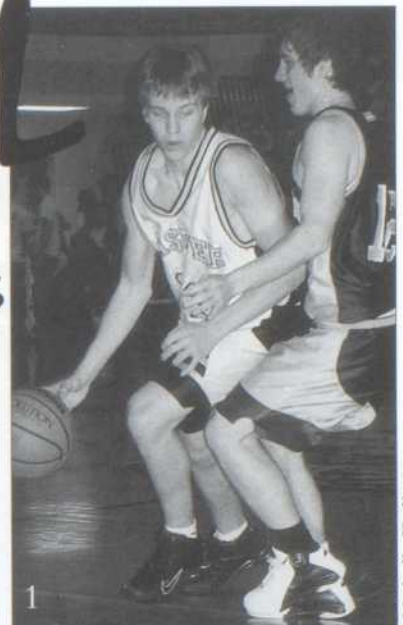

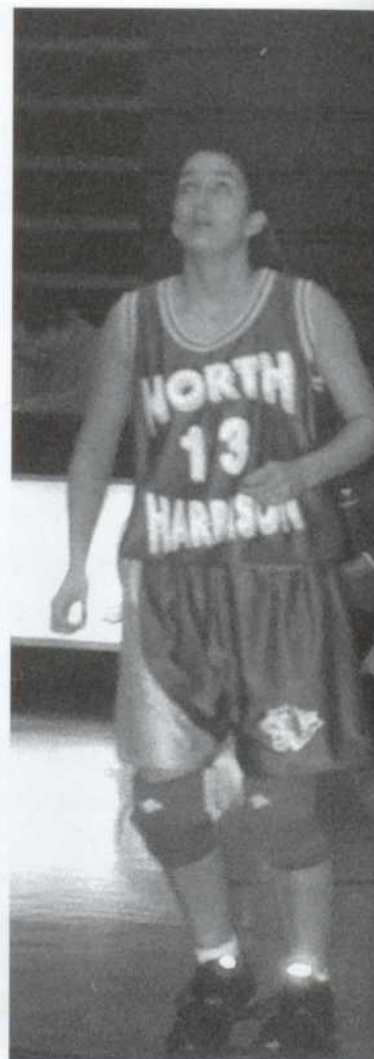

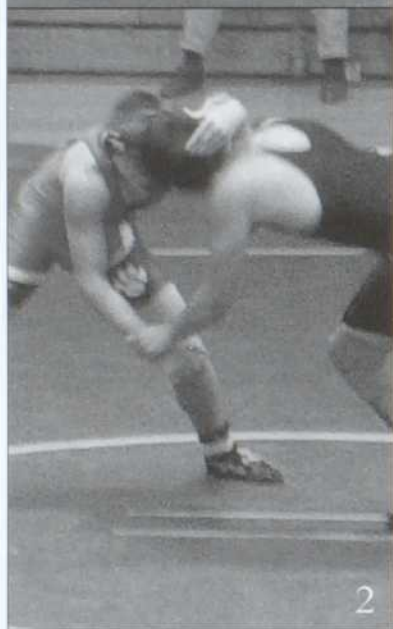

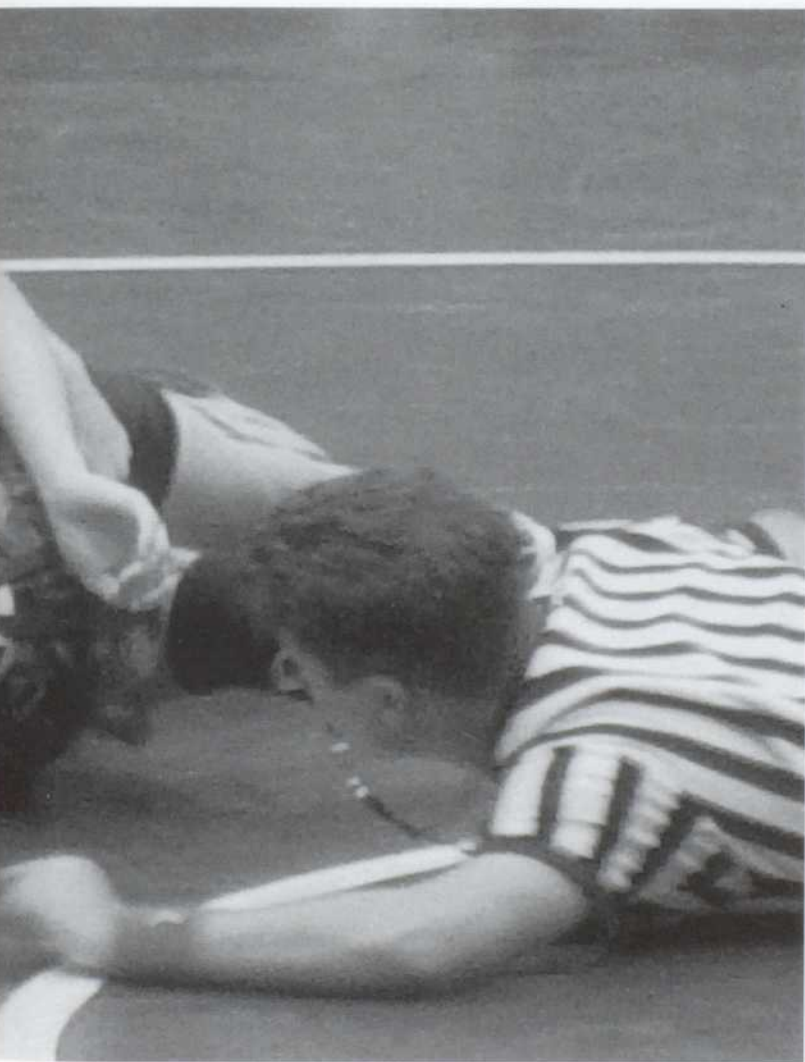

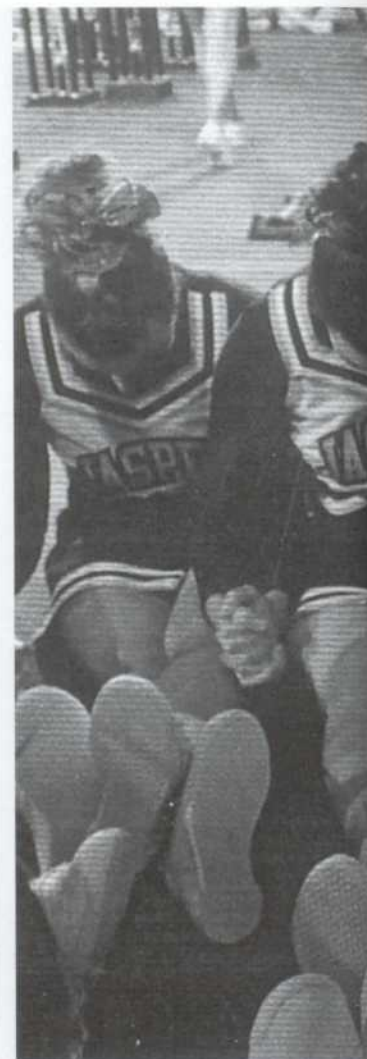

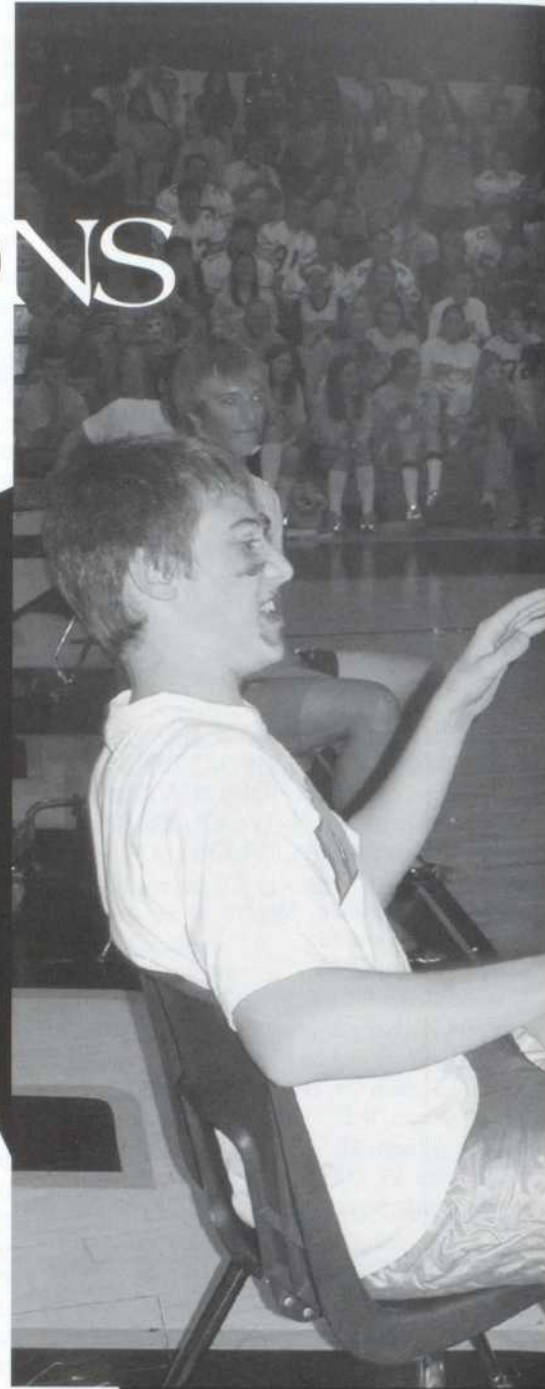
