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

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

Many students waited anxiously to send the girls' golf team off to State where they wrapped up a great season. This was the first time in many years that they made it to State.







Young Life met on Monday evenings at the


VFW. On an average, around sixty students participated.






Students were able to view many different events of variety and culture. One of the favored events was the Shakespearean festival. During each period the seniors held a variety of

our hearts.








only did we surpass testing, but we moved on to the activites provided. Roman Day brought much excitement, not only individually, but as a pack.



all really close. "There are so many various groups that I hang out with. They are all so different, and it's fun to know them all," says Brandi Hollen.




Dr. Larry Riggs





























Four school records were broken




