










Seniors

students mature.







Mr. Lewis works diligentely on organizing the athletic programs.




teaching styles that come with entering high school, while the sophomores waited anxiously for Roman Day. Juniors thrived on the






With the math standards for the


The Social Studies Department is full of extremely busy teachers. Their curriculum covered all of the following classes: United


the odds and do so. The sophomores participated in Roman Day, the juniors looked forward to watching U.S.






As each day passes, new and better technology comes out to ease the trials of everyday life. Everyone is focused on


Do you know how to cook? What about what it takes to be a parent? Can you understand how much your relationships








