





Who are we? We are the students and staff of Jasper High School. We are the future. We are unique. In this yearbook, our memories of the past year will forever be stored.








Though nothing was planned for Halloween, students who were in the festive mood dressed up as many different people, animals, and creatures.

This week was also designated Red Ribbon Week. SADD members urged the rest of the student body to live drug free lives and to make healthy decisions.











The wrestling open house took place as well. The open house allowed the wrestlers, coaches, mat girls, and their families to come together, get to know each other, and receive important information for the season.









The freshman team also prevailed over the wet weather to end with a successful record of 10-2.













