
Transitioning to New Teachers










NHS





band, as seniors graduate and underclassmen join every year. Thus the band transitions to new levels every year as young students rise to meet the challenge of the traditions set by their predecessors.






have fun. They develop great, lasting friendships while sharing music as well as laughter.










What is your tradition?




