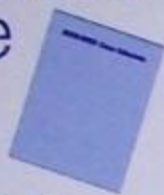

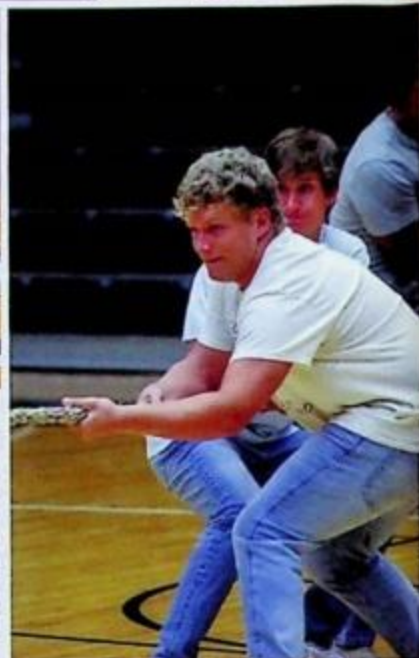

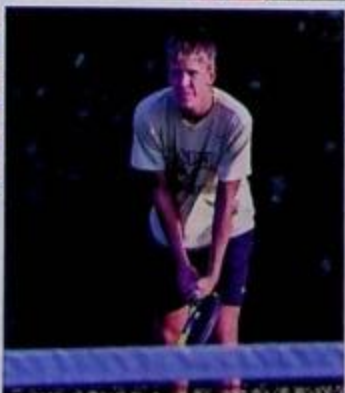

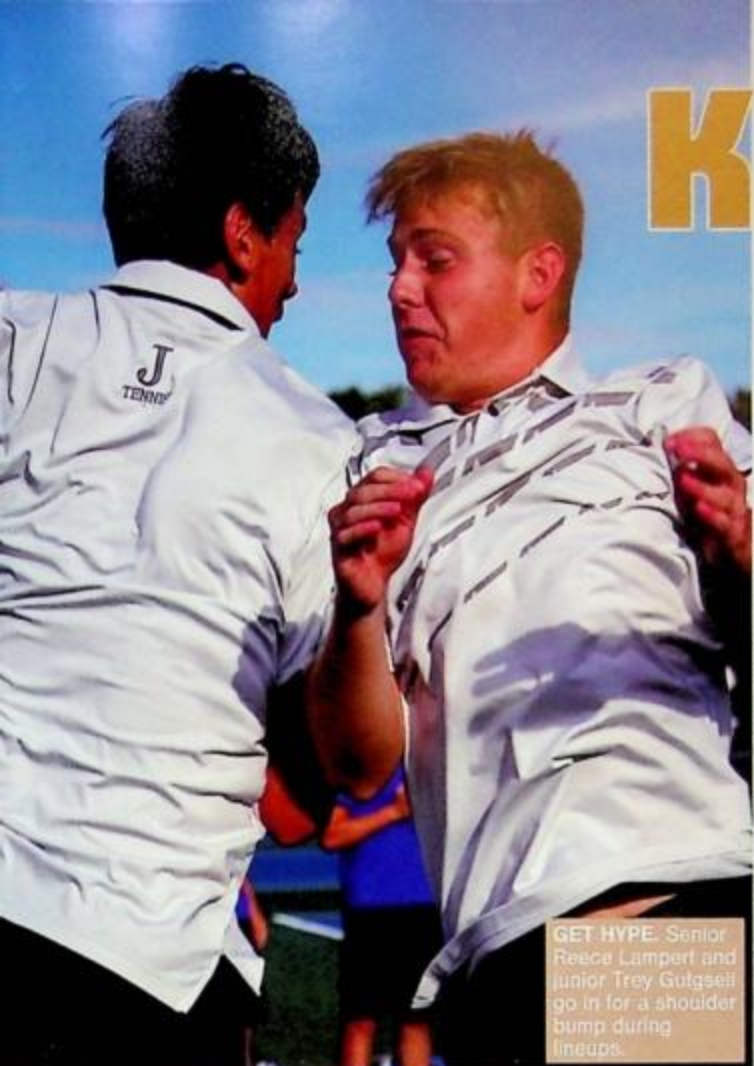

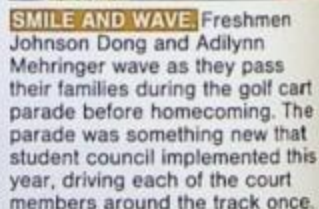

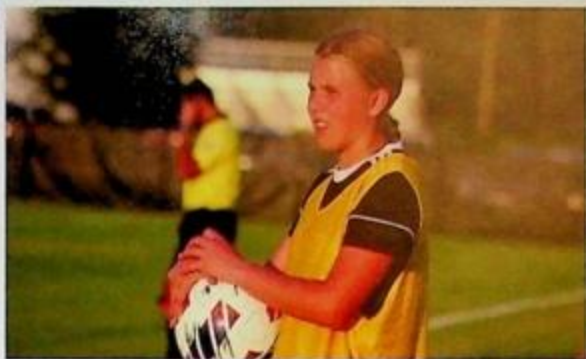

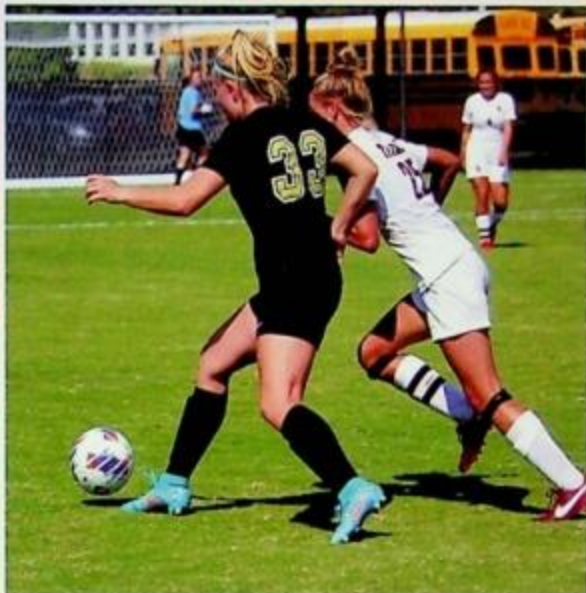

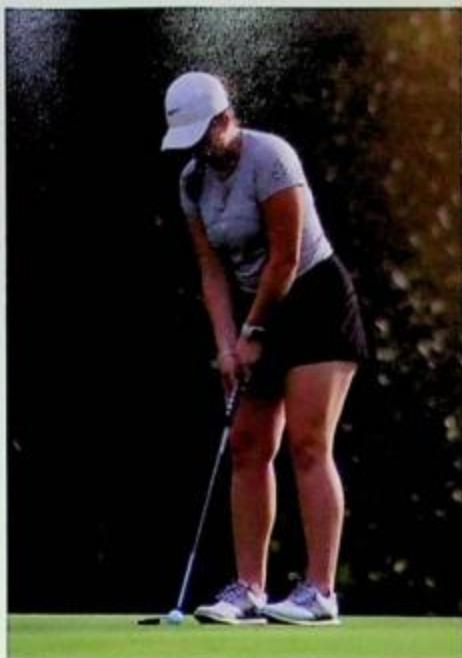

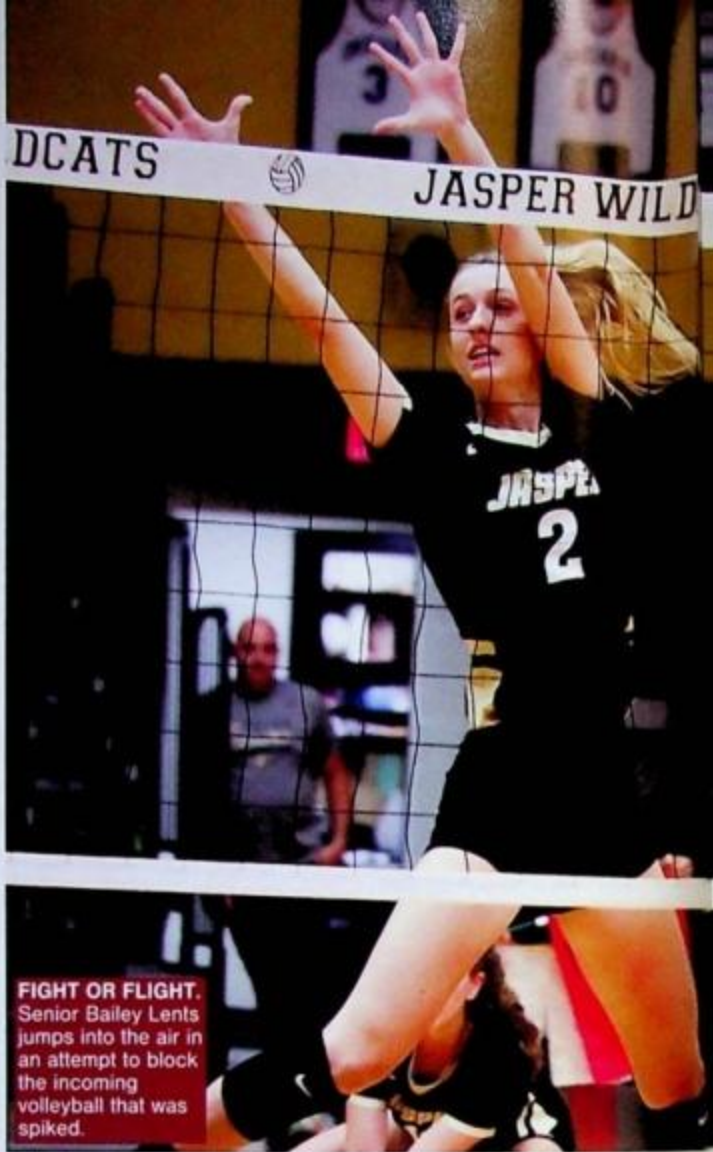

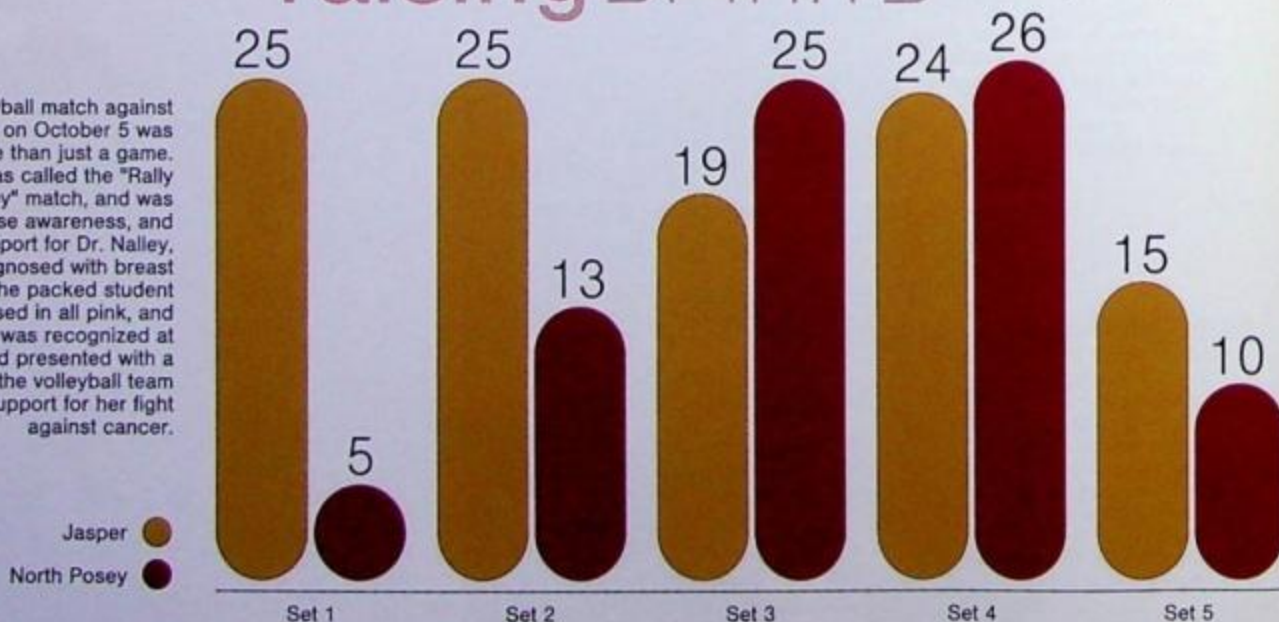

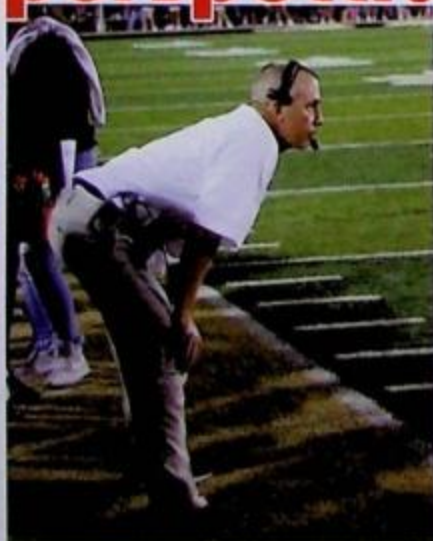

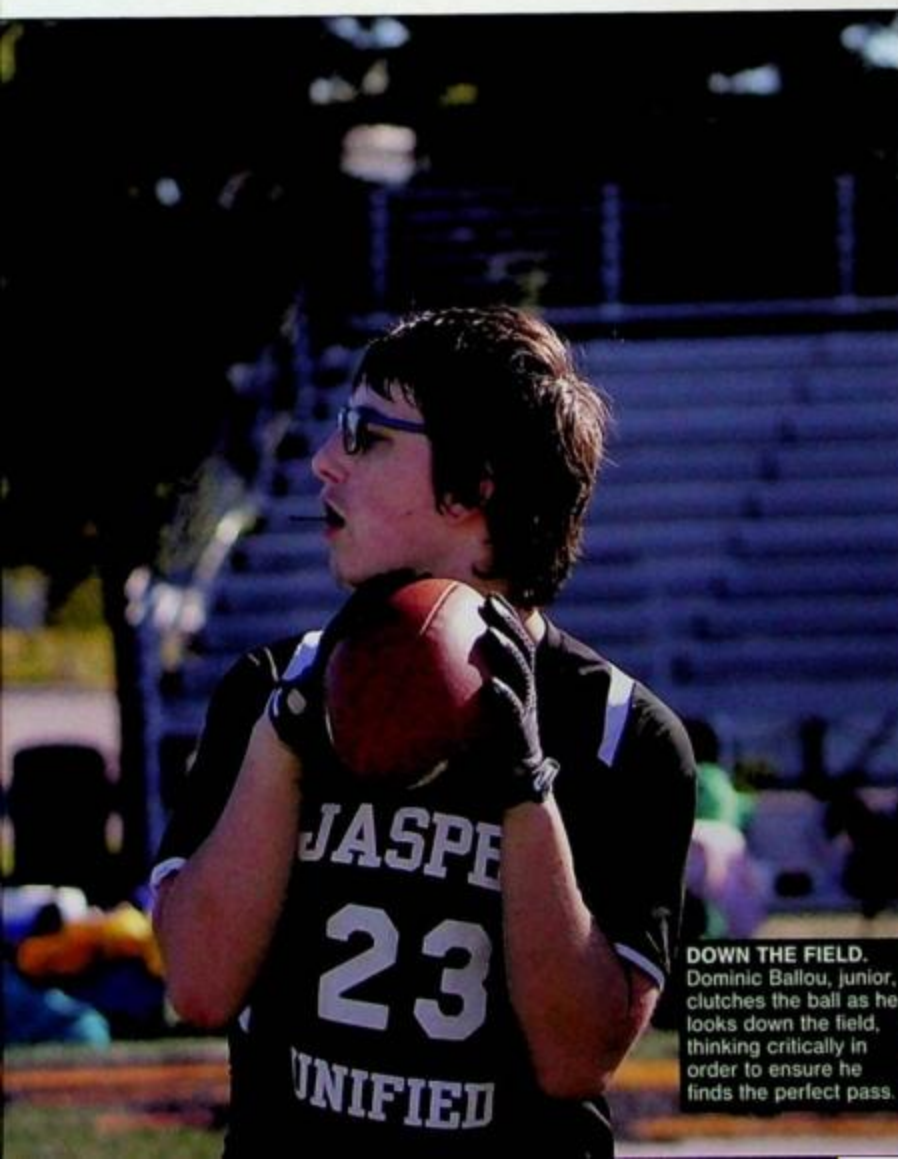
Wildcats secure a Sectional win

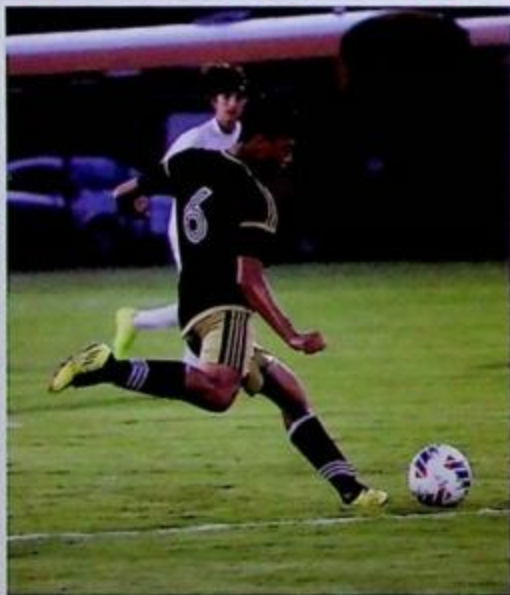

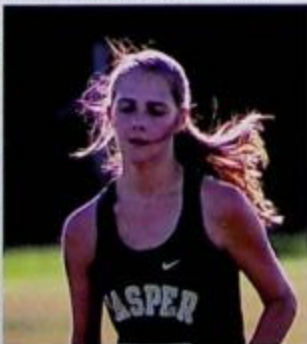

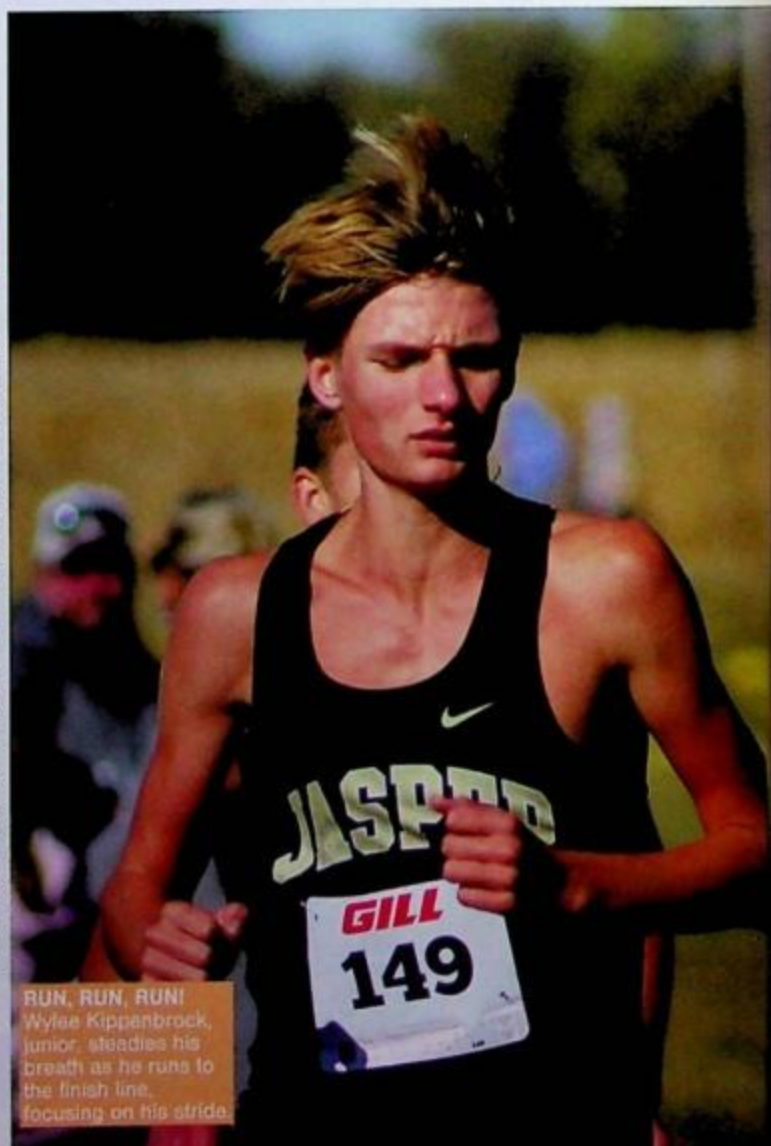

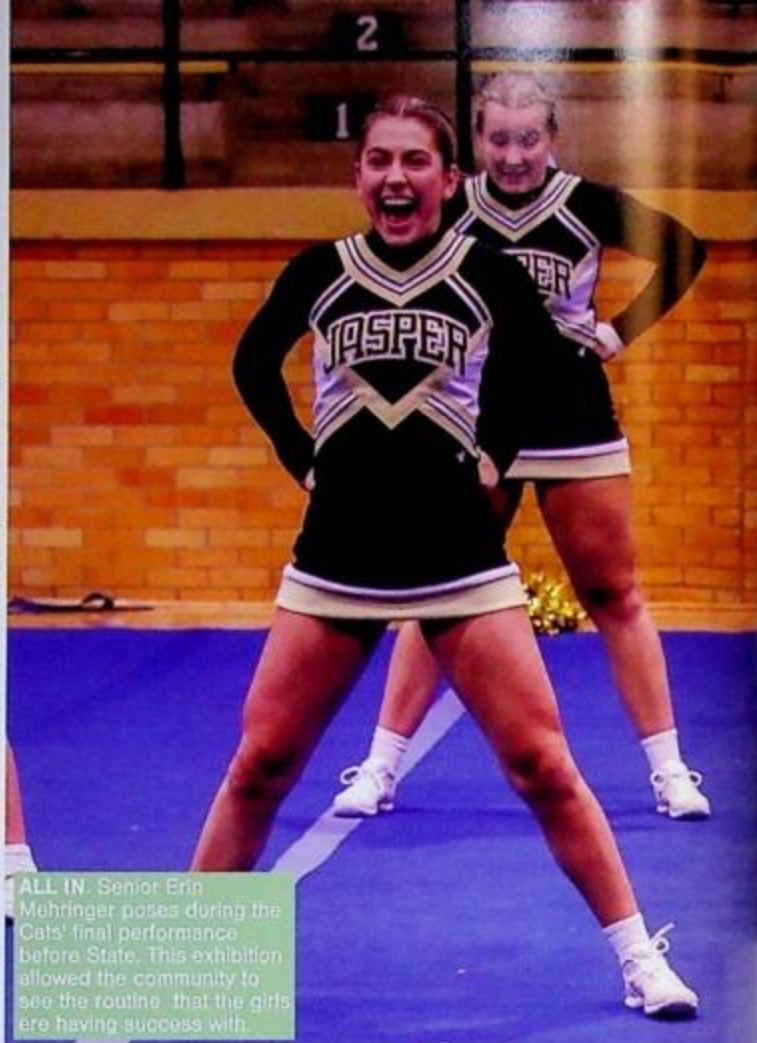

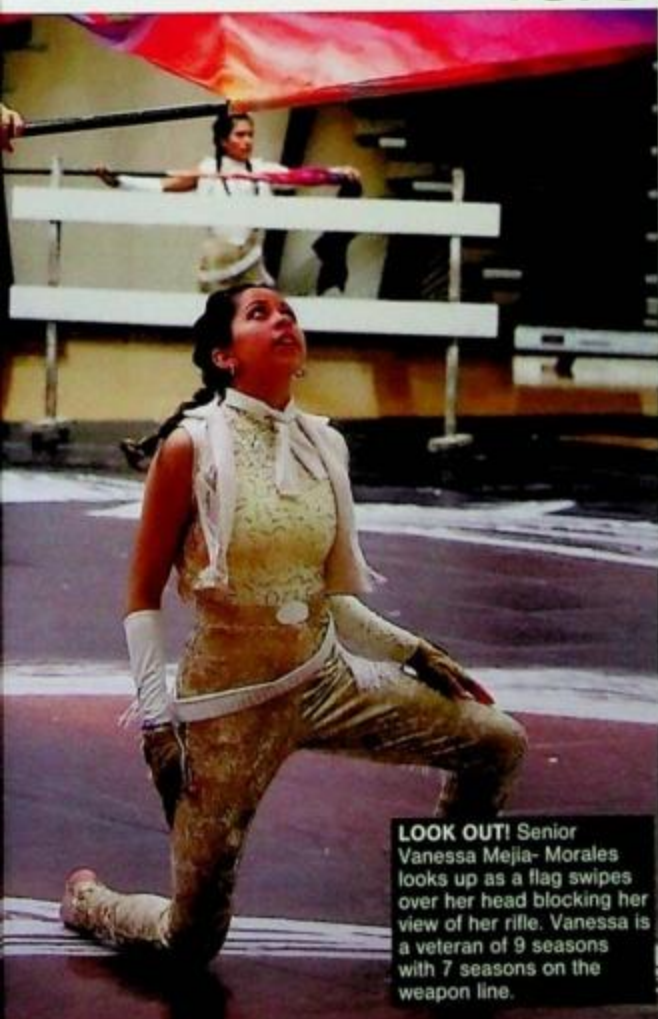

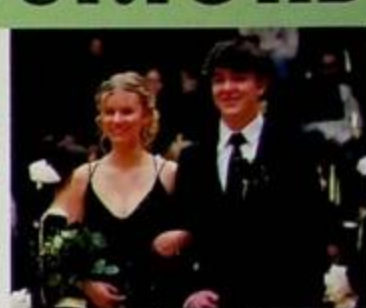

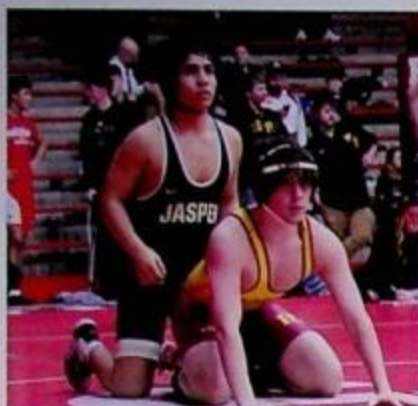

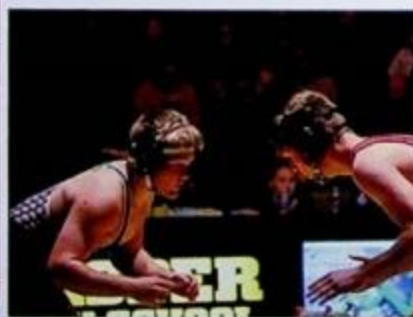

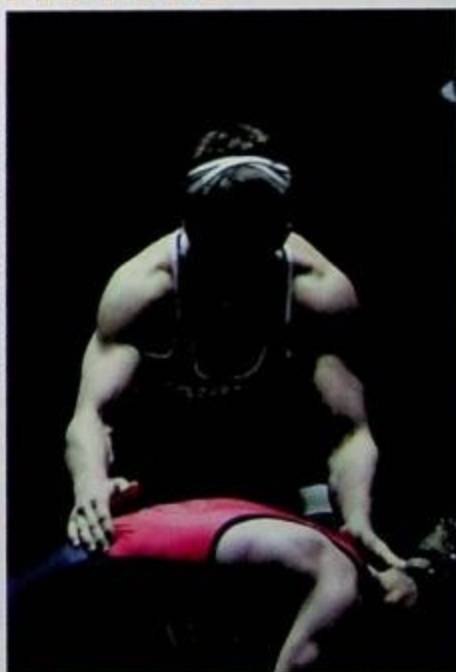

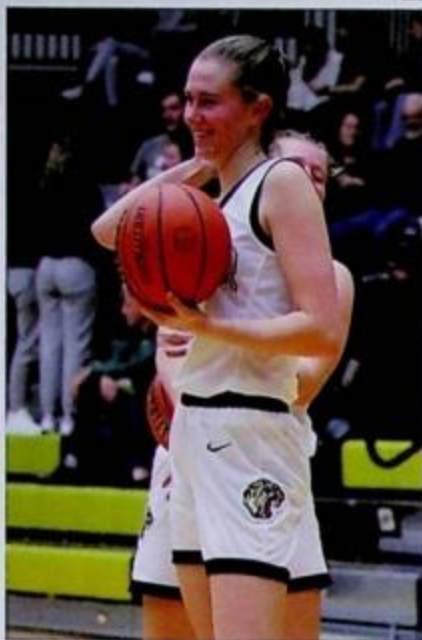

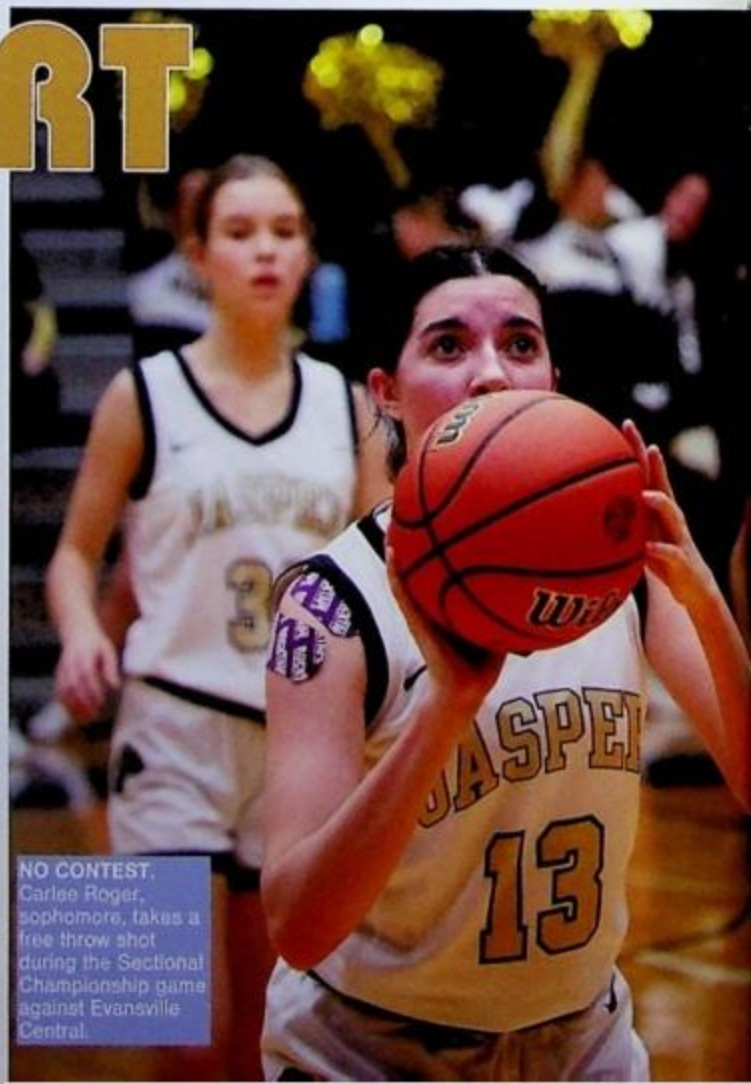



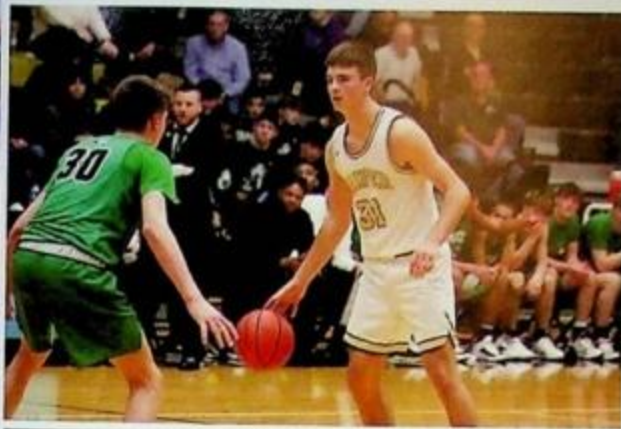

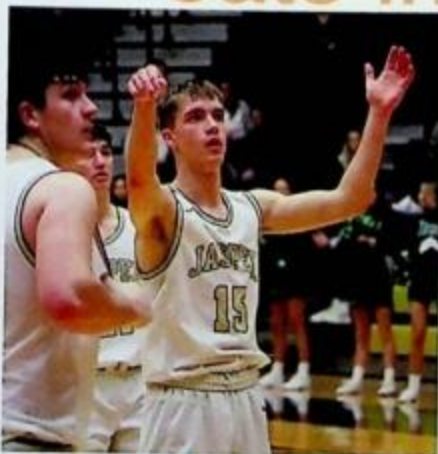

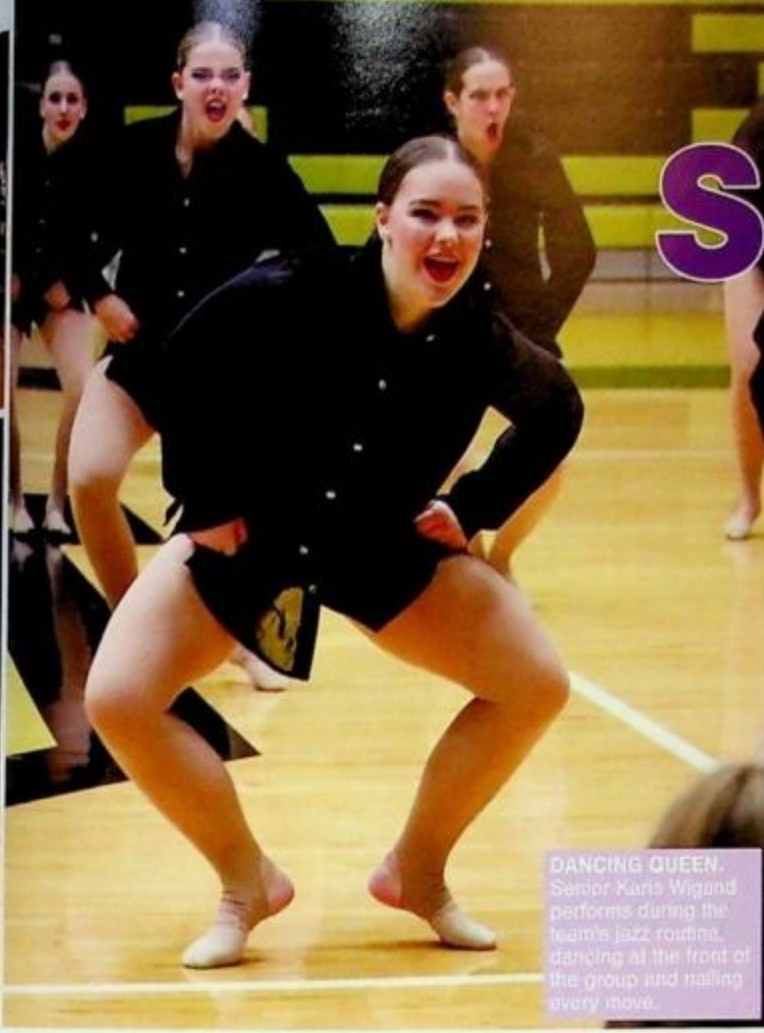

Three dances result in three State trophies

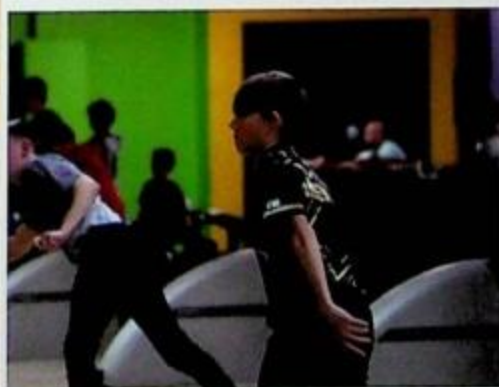

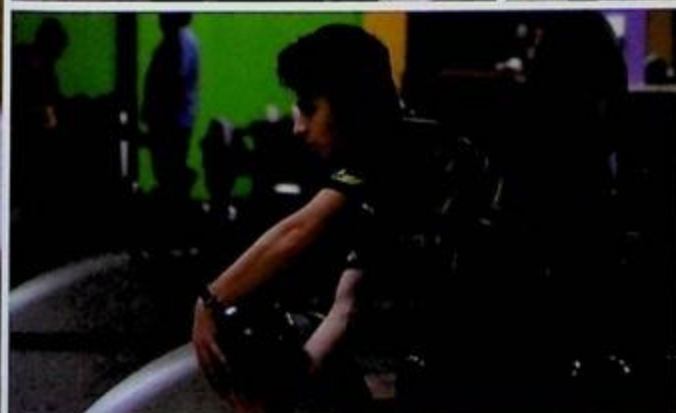

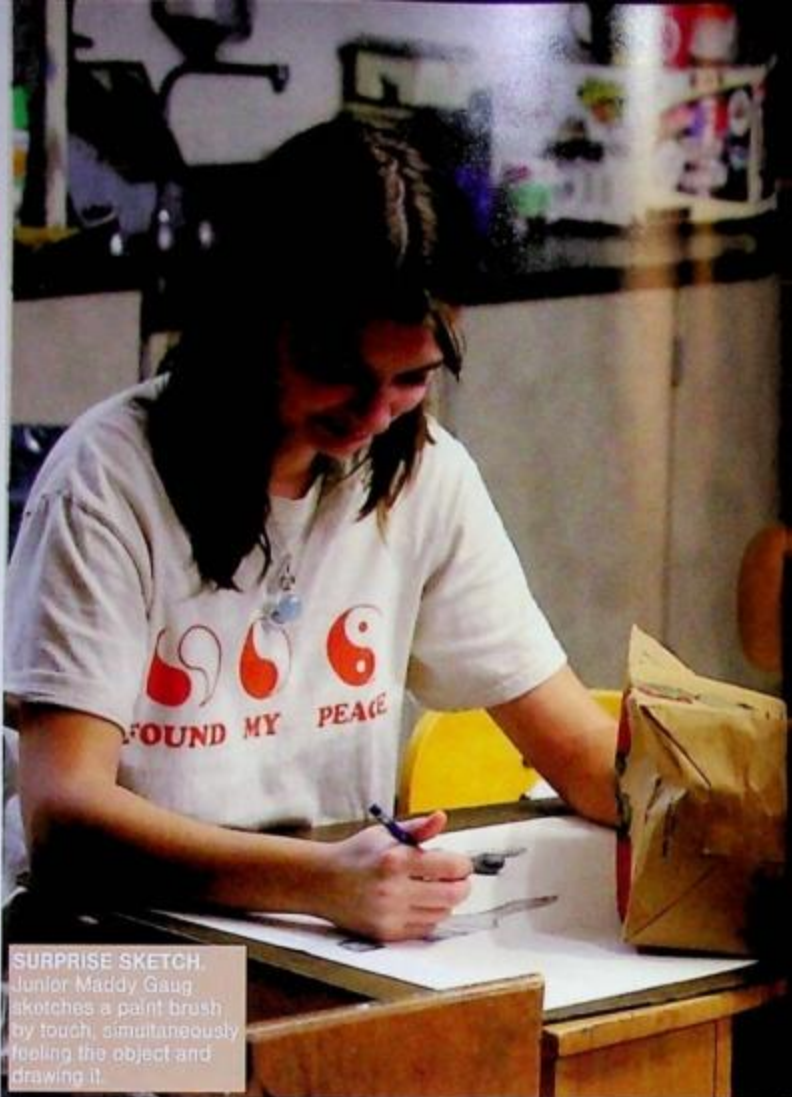

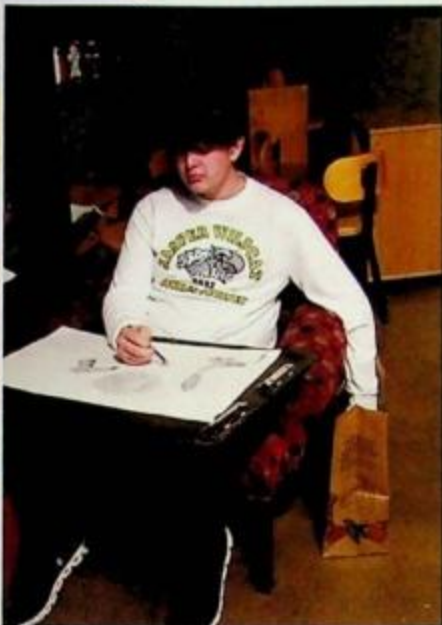

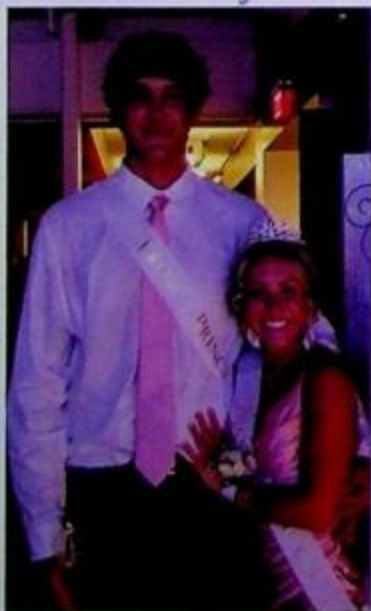

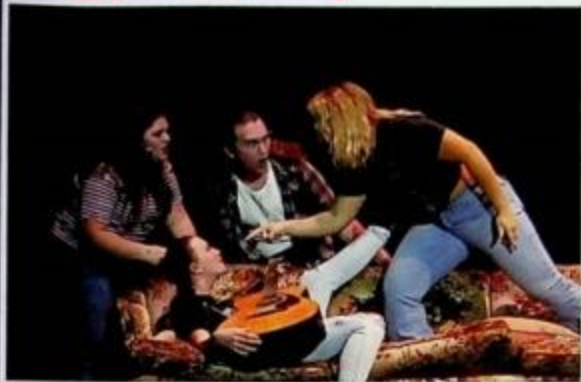

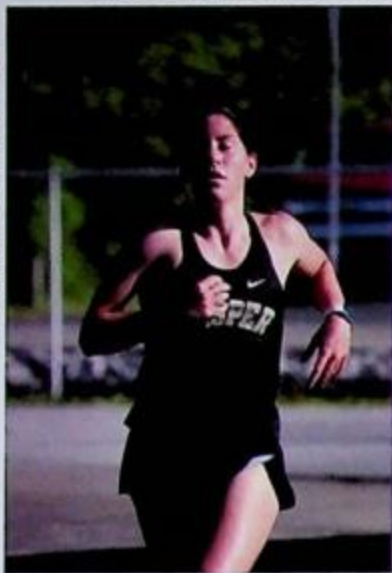

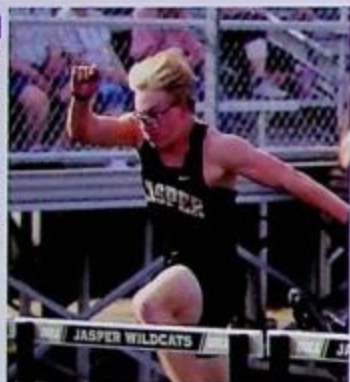

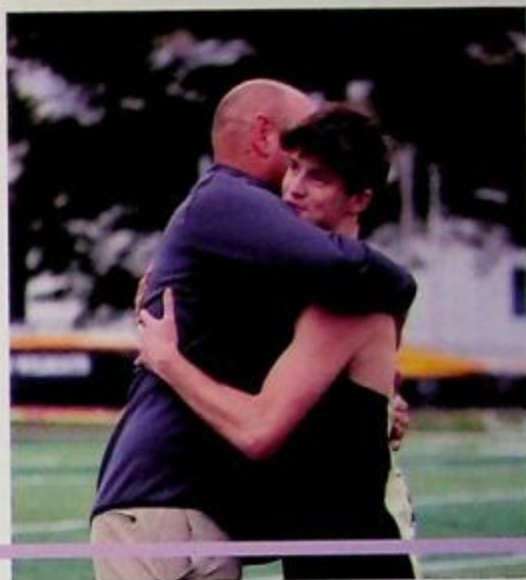

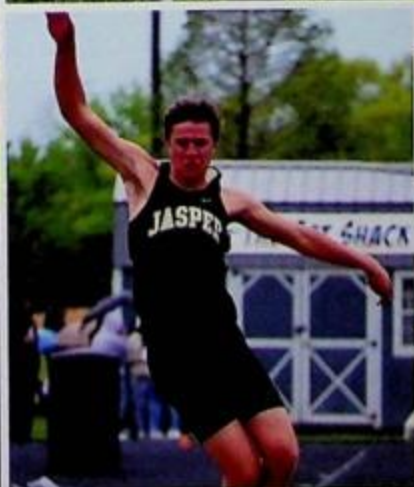

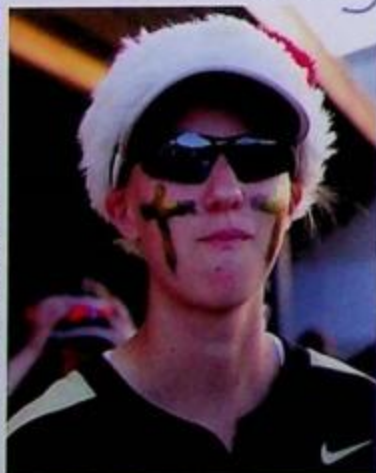

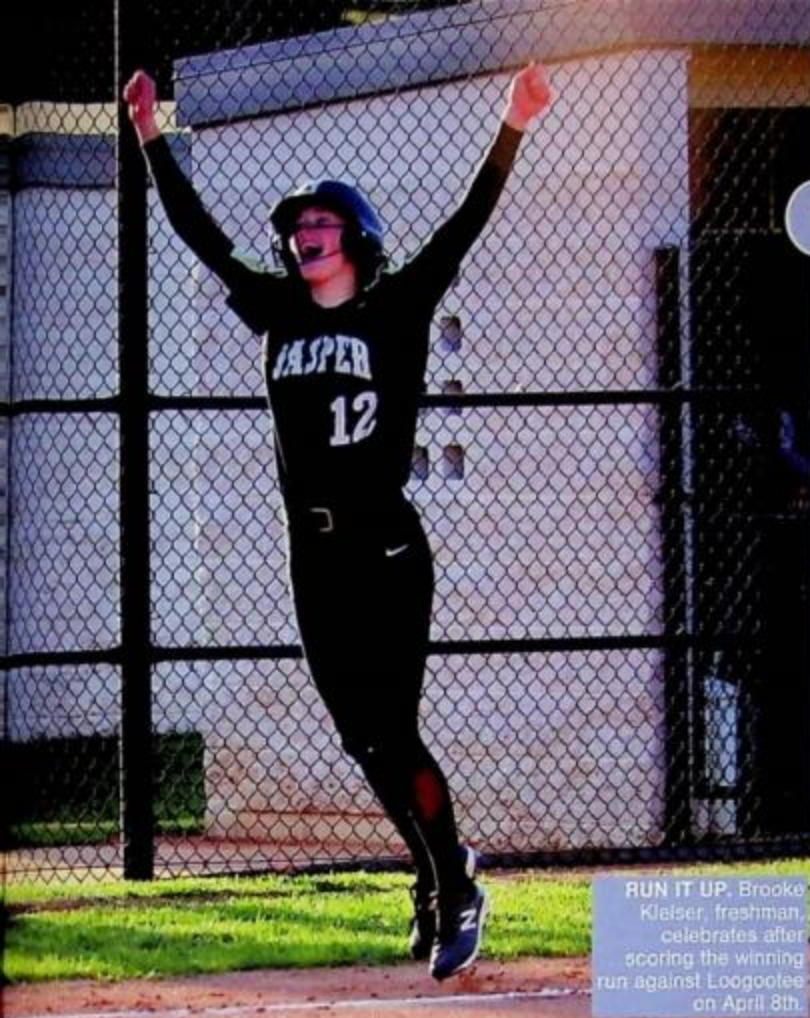

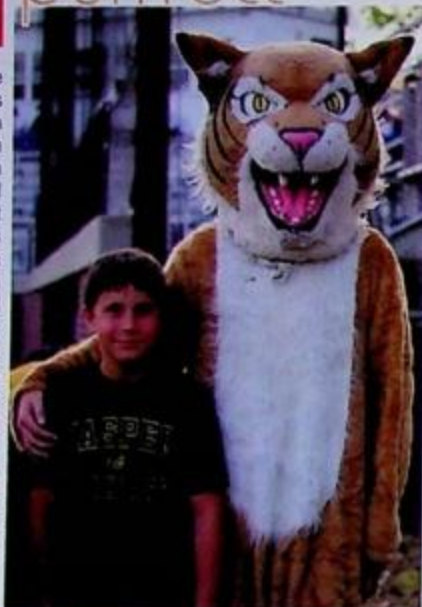

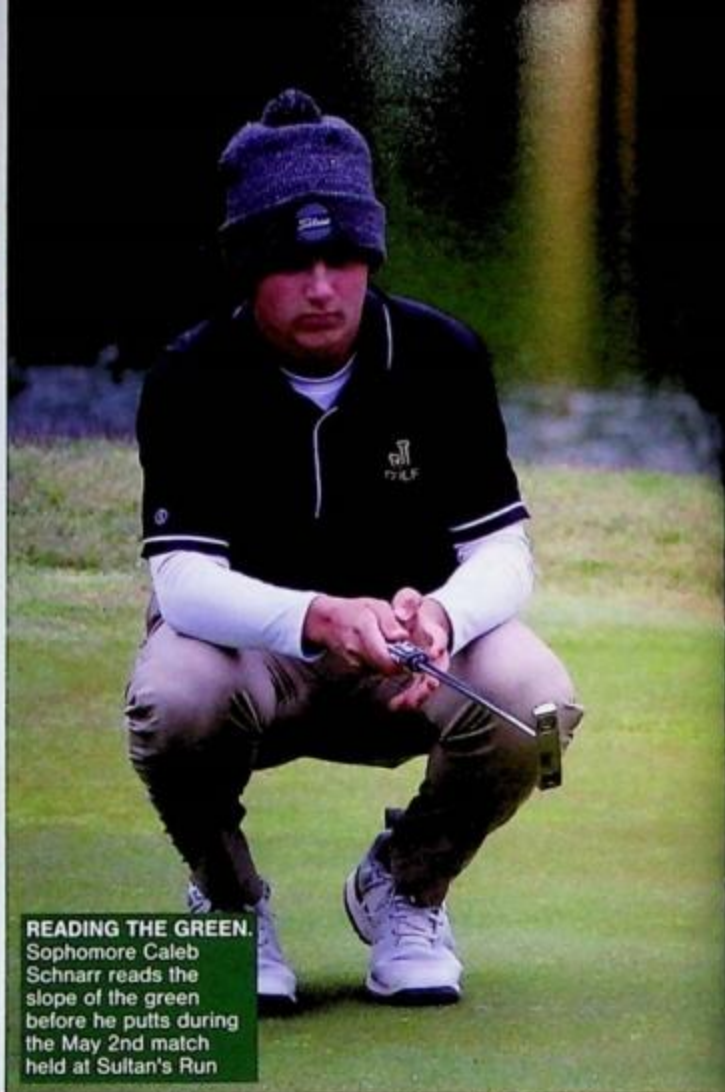

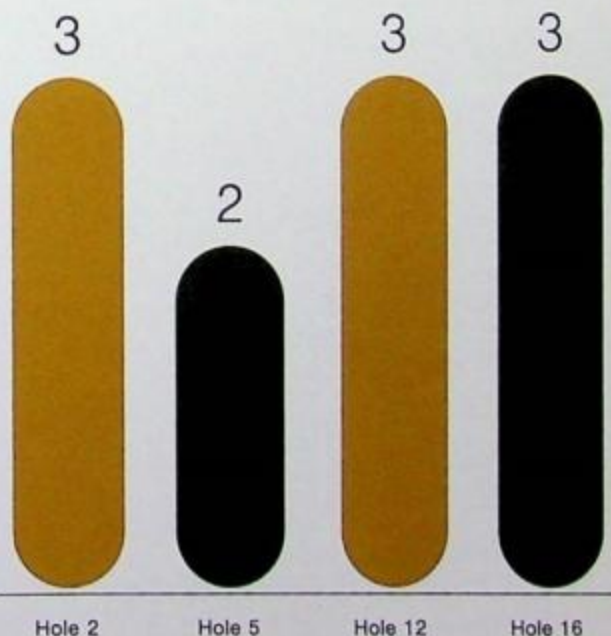

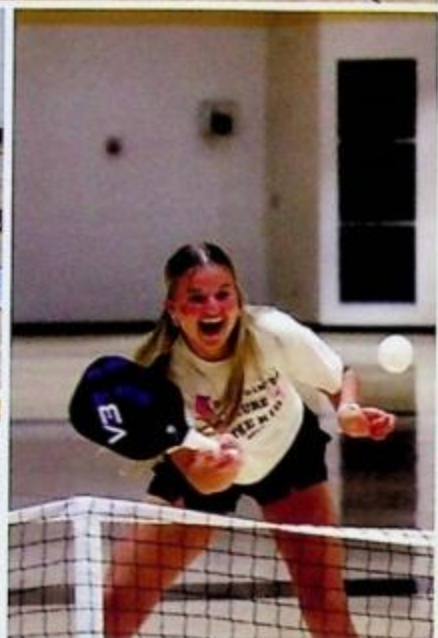

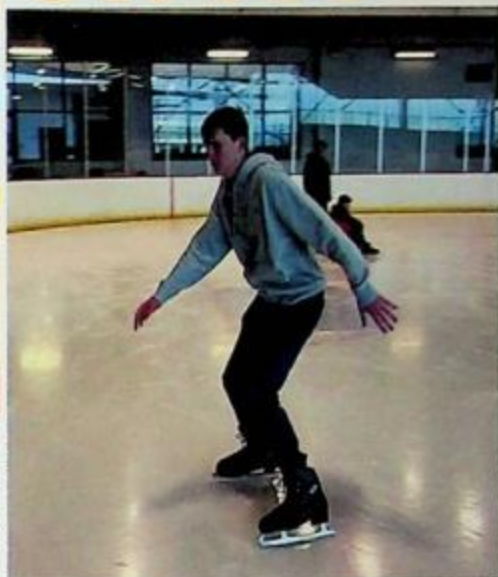

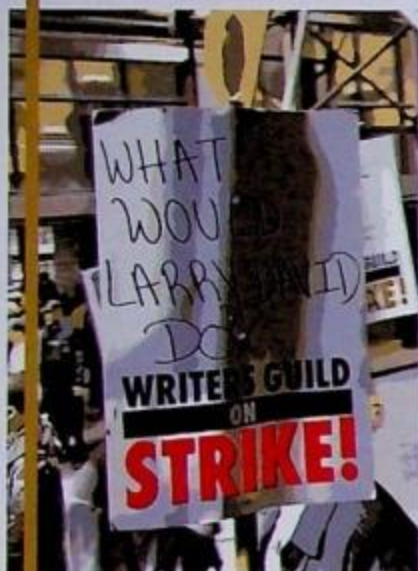

The Writers Guild of America goes on strike for fair wages

ON THE FRONT LINES: On May 2nd, members of the Writers Guild of America, also known as the WGA, took to the picket lines to strike in front of studios across the country with the goal of studios and networks giving writers more fair pay for their work. This isn't the first time the WGA has gone on strike, as they also did in 1960, 1981, 1988, and 2007. This strike raises the issue of writers in Hollywood living paycheck-to-paycheck, not getting adequate residual pay due to streaming services, and even the possibility of studios eventually using artificial intelligence to write scripts. The strike has led to production on many fan-favorite television shows and movies coming to a screeching halt until the WGA reaches a fair deal with studios.

A HARSH NEW REALITY: The last time the WGA went on strike for an extended period of time (November 2007 to February 2008), there was an increase in networks and studios ordering new unscripted programming, as well as a quicker return of existing reality shows to fill air time. It remains to be seen if this will also be the case in 2023.
